NOTHING ON LOOKS HOCKEY INSIDE!

THE HARD WORK PAYS OFF

There's a lot more to running a business than just hanging your name on a door, according to local student entrepreneur Mike Evans.

The 22-year-old learned the hard way about bookkeeping, labour standards, taxes, and insurance last summer through some on-the-job training as an owner and chief bottle washer of his landscaping company.

But Mantike Landscaping Services flourished employing seven people and generating about \$15,000 in revenue during its four months of operation, despite the University of Alberta Drama student's lack of business know-how.

Evans said part of his success was due to the fact he was familiar with the landscaping business already and knew a market existed for the service he was able to provide.

But the rest of the credit belongs to Employment and Immigration Canada's Student Business Loan program, which provides interest-free loans up to \$2,000 from the Royal Bank and business planning and marketing expertise through the Federal Business Development Bank (FBDB).

Last year Evans received the \$2,000 loan maximum. The ready cash helped him to meet the first payroll and to

buy some necessary equipment, he said.

More importantly, the loan also started him off with a positive cash flow allowing him the luxury of waiting for larger contracts to come along, he added.

His first contract was with the Edmonton Co-op Association for maintenance of its store grounds and orders kept rolling in after that.

"Trial and error is not the way to go," said Evans who encourages potential student entrepreneurs to get some advice up front before setting up their own business.

One good source of information is local FBDB offices which conduct Business Development Seminars, he said. During the seminars the Student Business Loan program is discussed and help with filling out the application form is provided.

Interested students should call their local FBDB offices for times and locations of the seminars or contact their nearest Royal Bank branch or Canada Employment Centre for Student Business Loan application forms.

One of the bonuses of being your own boss is that if you are willing to put in a few 18-hour days at the beginning you can eventually reward yourself -- and not just financially, said Evans referring to his four-day weekends in the mountains.

1986-87 Academic Council Chosen

positions after nominations had been closed.

To eliminate another general election, general council was asked to vote upon the four nominees. The results are as follows:

Kendall and Borowski join Leszek Cyrynowski and Bill Elzinga to make up the student representation on the 1986/87 Academic Council.

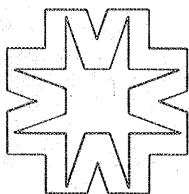

Research Projects for Technology 1.2 Million Dollars

Labour Minister Bill McKnight today announced contributions of more than 1.2 million dollars to 16 additional research projects under the Technology Impact Research Fund. This brings to 48 the number of research projects that have now received funding under the program, for a total federal contribution of 3.1 million dollars.

The Technology Impact Research Fund was established on June 5, 1984 to help finance practical research into the human and social impacts of technological change. The Fund is directed at research projects relevant to the workplace, particularly projects undertaken by those directly affected by technological change.

The projects announced

technological change on factors such as: employment levels, productivity, skill requirements, health and safety, collective bargaining, labour management relations. In addition, several of the studies will consider the way in which new technology is introduced and the attitudes and expectations of workers. The projects included in this announcement focus on such diverse sectors of the economy as: automobile industry, mining, education, forestry and wood industry, metallurgy, communications, health care, provincial and federal governments.

Resources allocated for this program were committed prior to the Treasury Board's temporary freeze on discretionary spending and staffing.





INTRAMURAL BALL HOCKEY RULES

There seems to be a lack of regard or maybe ignorance to the I-M Ball Hockey Rules. Here are the rules and I suggest teams follow them diligently. It is very easy for an eye injury or a serious cut to occur so we must be very careful.

Regular CAHA Hockey rules apply except for the following:

EQUIPMENT

- a) BALL - Jelinek soft indoor ball.
 - b) STICKS - Regulation hockey sticks (FOR I-M, ALL PARTICIPANTS SUPPLY THEIR OWN STICKS).
 - c) GLOVES - Some type of glove must be worn (regulation hockey glove is recommended).
 - d) HELMETS - Goaltenders must wear a cage - others HELMETS ARE OPTIONAL.
- NOTE: GLOVES AND HELMETS ARE AVAILABLE IN SPORTS EQUIPMENT CENTER (S-7)

PENALTIES

- a) Body contact rules of Basketball apply where body position may be gained but NO BODY CONTACT IS ALLOWED. Accidental or minor body contact can result in:

1. change of possession of the ball.
2. 10 ft. player zone being awarded.

- b) Any deliberate penalty results in an immediate whistle and a two minute penalty given to the offending player (the player MUST remain in the designated penalty box until the next whistle following his or her expired time). eg: deliberate body checking, slashing, hooking, any illegal use of the stick. After a penalty the ball goes to the non-offending team. A 10 foot margin is given to the player who has 5 seconds to put the ball into play. No goal may be scored directly from this situation.

- c) No penalty for handling the ball with your hands so long as it goes straight to the floor. Goaltenders are treated differently: they may smother or hold the ball. No whistle is blown, the goaltender has 10 seconds to throw the ball out. Ball must not go past the center directly off the goaltender's throw.

- d) Any other undesirable conduct (major penalties) means automatically leaving the game (expulsion). Player must leave the playing area and go to the dressing room.

eg: 1. fighting

2. abuse of officials

3. unsportsmanlike conduct

The player is ineligible (suspended) until he or she has seen Irwin Strifler (office E-134). Referee(s) must write a report on the back of the score sheet.

PLAYING RULES

- a) LENGTH OF THE GAME - 15 minute halves.
- b) Drop the ball at face off to start the game

only. NOTE: After a goal is scored, play begins immediately after any member of scored upon team crosses center.

(SUBSTITUTIONS WOULD NORMALLY COME IN AFTER GOALS)

- c) OUT OF BOUNDS - As long as the ball is clearly visible and is in play and IN bounds. Should it go out of court or out of sight it is ruled OUT OF BOUNDS. The team last touching the ball loses possession to the opponent who is given a 10 foot margin to put the ball in play.

NOTE: NO GOAL WILL COUNT ON A DIRECT SHOT INTO THE NET FROM AN OUT OF BOUNDS PLAY

All walls, nets and other apparatus are considered in play specific to each court.

- d) STICKS ABOVE THE WAIST - Automatic whistle when any stick goes above the waist. Possession goes to non offending team. Joint infraction the defending team (DEFENSIVE SIDE OF COURT) gets possession.

- e) There is no offside rule.

- f) Most goals wins.

- g) In the play-offs, no game shall end in a tie. First goal in overtime wins. Team plays with 4 players, no goalkeeper.

NOTE: ALL DECISIONS BY THE REFEREE(S) ARE FINAL AND NOT SUBJECT TO PROTEST

Stallone, who wrote the screenplay, plays Cobretti

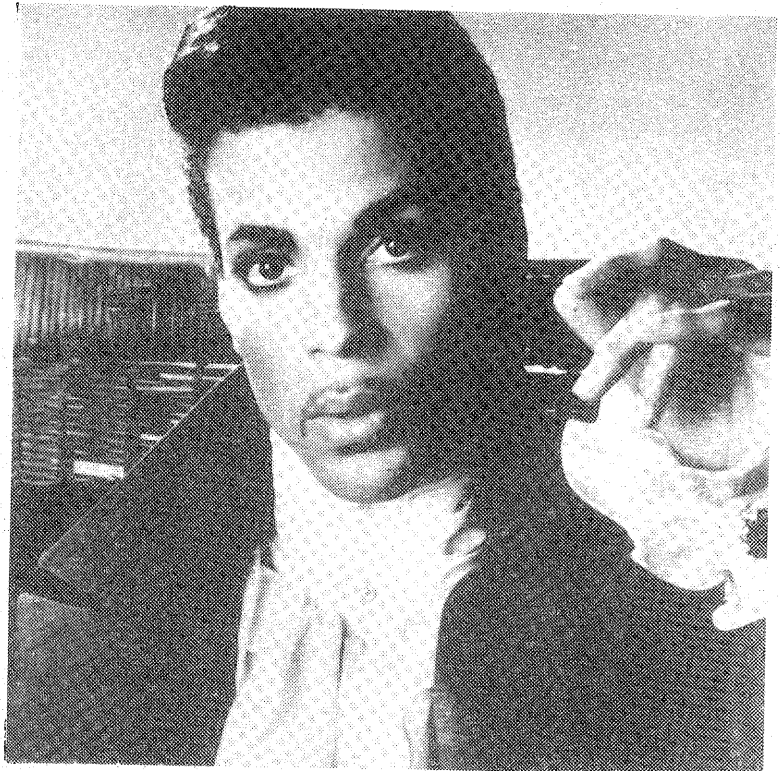

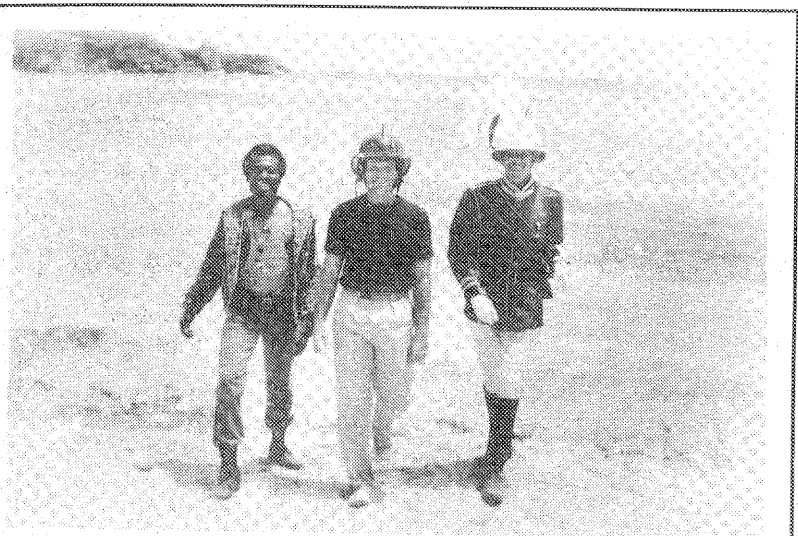
This might be a good one

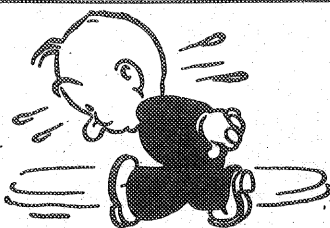

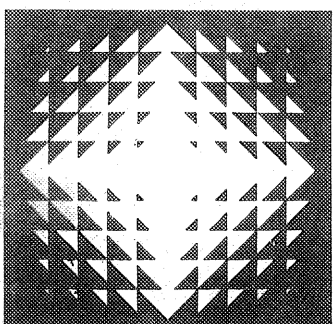
