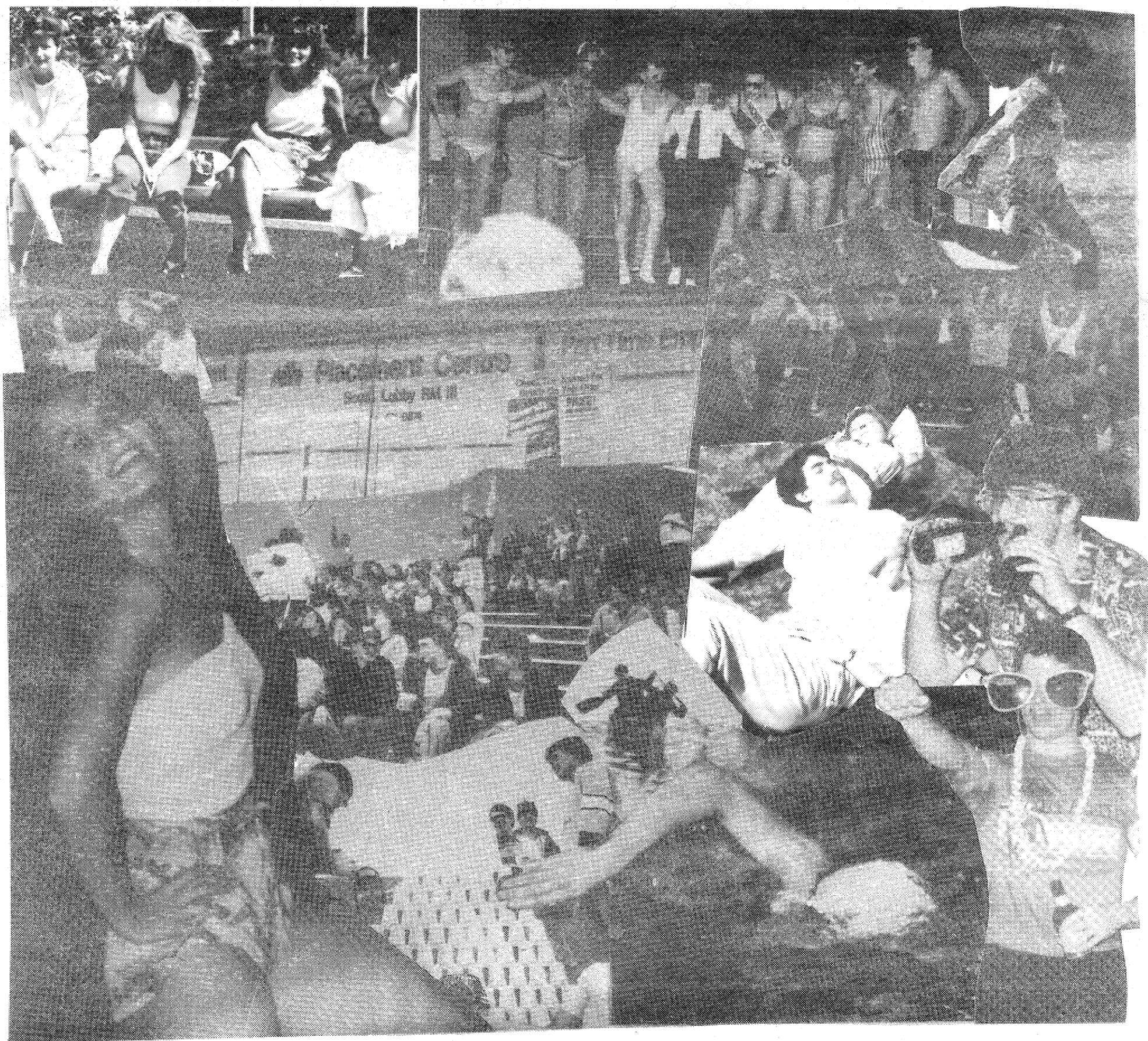

Wanted: Census Reps

Harold MacKay, Manager of the downtown Canada Employment Centre today announced that a number of temporary jobs are still available as Census Representatives for the 1986 Census of Canada.

Candidates must be at least 18 years of age, have access to a car, be available from May 15 to June 30 and be willing to work evenings and weekends. The wage, based on population density and the size of the enumeration area, could vary between \$700 and \$900 for the four- to five-week period.

"Students, in particular, may find these jobs attractive, especially if they have not yet found summer employment," said Mr. MacKay.

Interested applicants should contact the nearest Canada Employment Centre to fill out a Census Representative employment application form. Students can apply directly to their Canada Employment Centre on Campus.

Statistics Canada will be responsible for the screening and testing of all applicants. Successful candidates will receive a minimum of two half days of training and a home-study assignment prior to beginning work.

The deadline for applications is April 15.

The census will update information on population and agriculture obtained last in the 1981 census. Federal, provincial and municipal governments rely on census data to develop and administer public programs. Plans for school construction, housing and water and power supplies, fire protection and location of hospitals are often based on census facts.

Ex-Convict to Speak at NAIT

Canada's most celebrated convict, Roger Caron, will be speaking to Students and Staff April 16, 12:30 p.m. in the Little Theatre.

Mr. Caron, who received the Governor General's Literary Award for nonfiction for his novel *GO-BOY!*, will speak on the Canadian Penal system. More specifically, why crime was his vocation, how a prison system works, brutality in prisons and how it reinforced his pursuit of crime.

At the age of 16, Mr. Caron was first jailed, and only eighteen months made the first of six successful escapes. At the age of 17, Caron was the youngest inmate in Kingston Penitentiary.

A history of family problems, stealing, and fighting indicated Caron was a problem from the start. After several arrests and many bungled bank robberies, the press named him "Mad Dog Caron".

While in prison, Caron recalled the 1971 Kingston Penitentiary outbreak in his book. "The bloody climax

was so primitive that it left even the most hardened criminals gasping in awe-stricken horror, as 14 didlers (child molesters), rapos, and stool pigeons were tied with chains to chairs in a circle in the centre of the dome. Under ghostly illumination they were ritualistically tortured while hundreds of convicts lined the four circular galleries pounding rhythmically with steel clubs on the hollow railings like jungle drums. By daybreak 12 of the 'undestrables' were horribly mutilated and in critical condition; two others were dead."

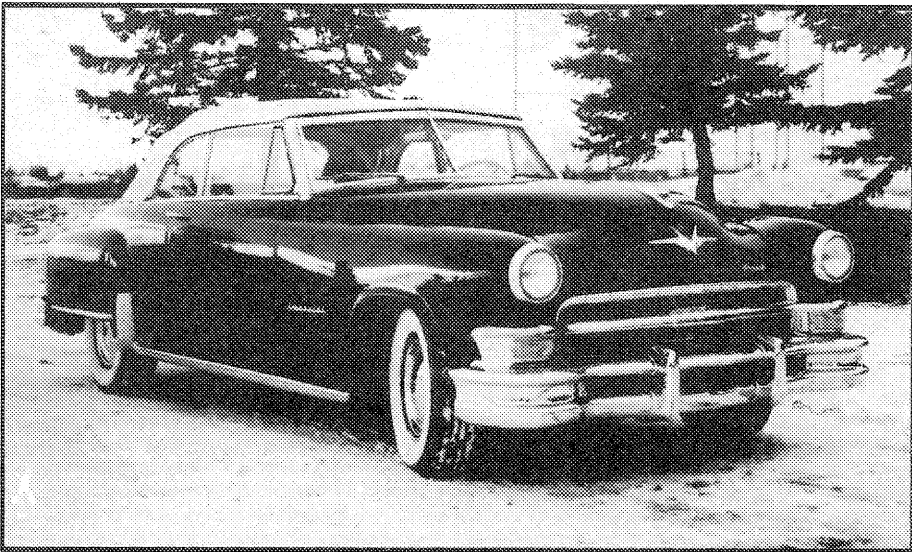
It was in 1963 during his two years of solitary confinement that Mr. Caron began writing his book. After many refusals from the publishing community, his book was published in 1978 with the help of Pierre Berton.

Talking about his book and personal experiences, Caron will also talk about his ongoing struggle with integration into society.

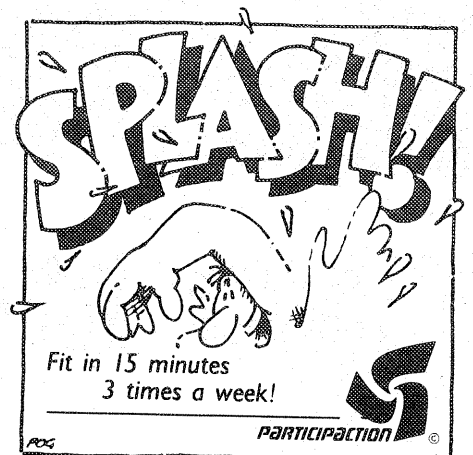

NO LAUGHING MATTER

A few weeks ago it was reported that two females from Plaza II were being followed by a gentlemen. Westwood Campus was disrupted by men verbally abusing females.

These situations reflect only a portion of the incidents of sexual harassment which occur at NAIT. Due to contrary belief, sexual harassment is not always a male provocator/female victim relationship, there have been cases of females harassing males.

At NAIT many beleive harassment does not exist. This is a fallacy. Although it may not be an epidemic there are cases of staff harassing students, students harassing students (male/male, female/female, male/female, female/female).

Many students and staff will laugh at such a suggestion, which only proves that many are ignorant to the situation. For those who have experienced some form of sexual harassment (verbal, physical) it is not a laughing matter. Presently there is no policy on sexual harassment or any other type of harassment. (A policy is presently being drafted for the '86-87 school year.) So what does one do if harassment occurs?

It is suggested that students talk to their program heads. But there is a problem of not trusting this person. So the next logical step would be to seek the advice of a counsellor. It is at the counselling level in which problems may be discussed openly and possible resolutions be made. If there is a serious case of harassment the individual may want to submit a complaint to the Human Rights Commission.

If you as feel that you have been harassed it is your responsibility to let someone know. It's time that students and staff had the chance to stand up for their rights and stop sexual harassment at NAIT.

Making the Necessary Changes

With the proposed change to the semester format well into the planning stages, it seems inevitable that three-term academic years are a thing of the past.

The semester system will be the catalyst for many additional changes to the programs affected by the switch. Courses will be added or dropped, and timetables will be overhauled, all in an effort to make a smooth transition possible. It is highly probable that more changes will take place over the years as the new system becomes more firmly established. Department planners have an enormous task ahead of them. At the same time, however, the opportunity for significant changes to many of the redundant, time-consuming courses in the various programs is at a highpoint. Now we have the chance to make some real changes!

Many students complain of workload redundancy or courses that are uninspiring, repetitive, and a complete waste of time. An excellent case in point: the Business Administration program.

I am a second year Marketing student and I have seen the desperate need for course revisions or deletions. I have left classrooms after an hour of instruction, completely frustrated and angry about the time consumed.

Of course, the immediate rebuttal to my complaint would most likely be: if you don't like the course, drop it. If the courses were optional, I would, but the courses in question are CORE.

So what do you do? Well, I, and many other students in Marketing, simply "stick it out" to the end of the year.

But why should any individual forsake his time to sit (suffer) through a course when his time can be best spent learning more pressing material, or job searching? I value my time, investing it in quality activities; consequently, sitting through an hour of bullshit is an injustice which should not be tolerated.

Courses like Marketing Policy B270, for instance, need serious review, or more multi-dimensional instructors. How can a student get

interested in a course when class time is consistently made up of reviewing headlines on handouts which a student could easily review on his own? In addition, I am quite sure that some of the honorable instructors of this institute would candidly admit to (at one time or another) throwing together material to "kill" an hour of class time.

David Seltzer's "Lucas"

See "Lucas" at Capital Square, Gateway, and Westmount Cinemas.

"Lucas" is the story of a spunky teenage individualist who risks his neck and his sense of values for love.

A Lawrence Gordon Production, the Twentieth Century Fox Film is directed by David Seltzer from his original screenplay and produced by David Nicksay. The young and talented cast includes Corey Haim, Kerri Green, Charlie Sheen, Courtney Thorne-Smith and Winona Ryder. Reynaldo Villalobos is the cinematographer, and Priscilla Nedd is the editor.

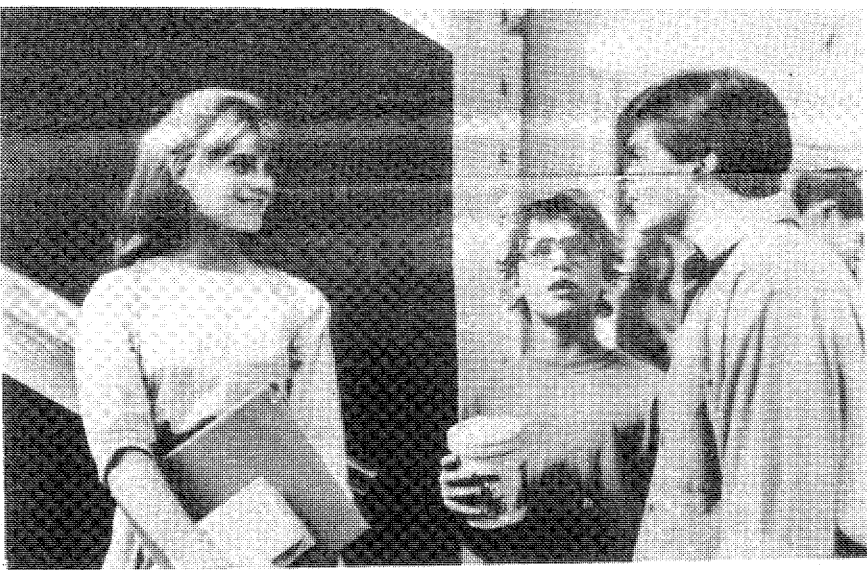
Fourteen-year-old Lucas Blyde is not like the other kids in his school. Slight, inquisitive and a loner, he's more interested in symphonies and science than in parties and football games. One summer he meets Maggie, a lovely sixteen-year-old girl who has just moved to town, and things change. They strike up a friendship that turns for him--and him along--into something more.

During the summer, Maggie would agree with Lucas's assessment of football players and cheerleaders, finding them "superficial", but when school starts, she begins gravitating toward that world, leaving Lucas feeling inadequate and alone. From an ever-growing

distance, he watches Maggie become a cheerleader and start going out with Cappie Roew, the captain of the football team and Lucas's protector.

Suddenly Lucas, who never minded being "different" wants desperately to become like the others. Although he's diminutive in stature and completely unathletic, his self-esteem has plummeted so low that he attempts the impossible: he goes out for the football team. Hurling himself into a game, he risks injury and ridicule in an attempt to emulate the boys that Maggie is attracted to, and thus win her love.

Although writer-director Seltzer's screenplay is admittedly semi-autobiographical, its themes are universal. "Identity and self-esteem are bottom-line issues for everyone," Seltzer says. "The agony of the teenage years is understanding that you're different and fleeing from that difference instead of embracing it and cultivating it. Lucas comes to a point where he denies his own value by trying to be like the other kids, and almost kills himself in the attempt—which is certainly what we do to ourselves psychologically when we try to conform to someone else's standards. Because all we ultimately have to work with is our own unique individuality. It's our greatest asset."

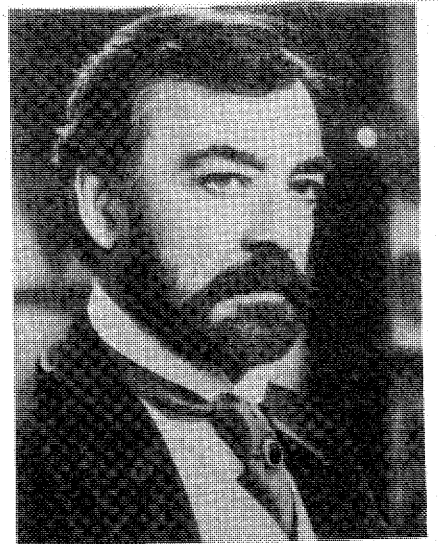

The two sisters named Sir Charles Dilke, adding that he had proposed to Virginia that she share his favors with Fanny, a servant girl. Hence, the "Three-in-a-Bed" scandal.

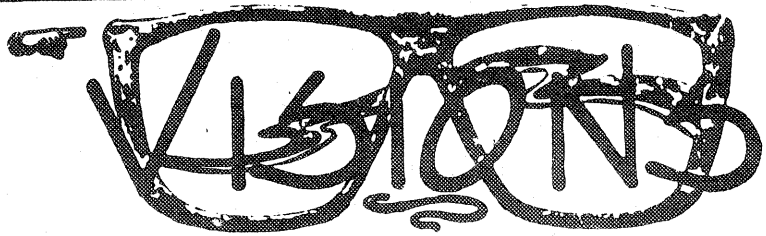
Was Dilke innocent of any involvement with Virginia? He quickly discovered that his reputation as a philanderer played havoc with the trial.

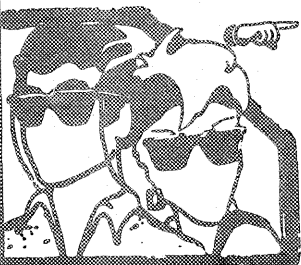

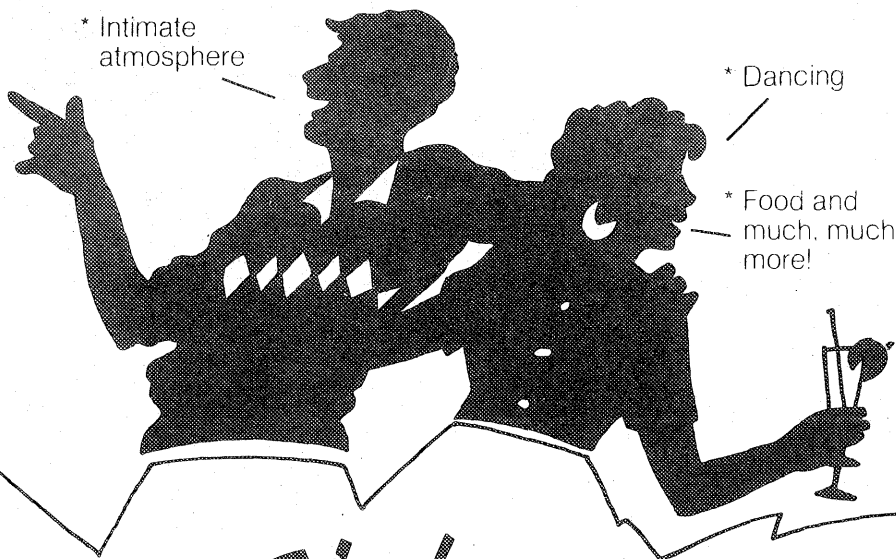
