SOVIET DEFECTOR SPEAKS OUT

"Do not underestimate the power of the Soviets." This was the message that was received as 150 people listened to Soviet Red Army defector Mikhailo Movchan speak on Tuesday the 28th of January.

Mr. Movchan told his story of escape from the Soviet officials into the hands of Afghanie rebels. Once drafted in the army at the age of eighteen, his company was sent into Afghanistan. He stated that no person (Soviet) was completely prepared or informed as to the events leading up to the war and the present situation.

"One reason for invasion was primarily for strategic military location," stated Movchan. Over the course of six years, approximately one million persons have been killed, some 30,000 being Soviet soldiers.

Mr. Movchan stated two major problems facing the Soviet army in Afghanistan: the ever-increasing problems of senior officials shirking off duties on young soldiers, and that 90 percent of the soldiers are constantly high on hashish.

Gruesome stories of Soviets bombarding "anything they could" revealed that discip-

line lacked. "They killed whatever they could," stated Movchan. It was also noted that Chemical warfare was used quite frequently and effects were becoming apparent.

After spending 18 months with Afghanie rebels, Mr. Movchan, with the help of an American civil rights group, escaped to New York where he presently resides. Exactly how he escaped has not been revealed for the security of those soldiers still waiting to immigrate to the west.

RUNNING SCARED

Why is it that the people of our society are harbouring feelings of terror when they go out on the streets at night? Why is it that children as well as adults are being put on the Missing Persons' List in record numbers? Why is it that people who have suffered from some type of abuse are running scared? WHAT CAN WE DO? These are questions that have gone through all our minds at some point of time.

I am 18 years old, and one person out of many at NAIT who has suffered from some form of sexual harassment and now I am scared.

Three of my friends and I were driving from Westwood to Plaza II one day. We were followed extremely close by a man in a white car. The driver of the car was very intimidating, and stayed with us for some time. We ended up parking our car in front of Plaza II and sat there for a while. The white car parked across the street from us, and there he sat, waiting!?

I was once told to be smart if anything like this ever happened to me; don't get out of the car; don't leave your friends; always stick with a group. We consider ourselves to be extremely lucky: the car left after a while.

We shouldn't be afraid to talk about incidents that have happened to us. If we need

more information on what to do, we should feel free to talk to someone: from Students' Union, our friends, a service that deals with teaching us self-defense. The more people talk about this very important issue, the more aware society will become. This type of sexual intimidation is not just happening to "someone else"; this type of abuse could very well happen to you, or even one of your loved ones.

Ask yourself these questions: a) how would you feel if one of your family members were attacked?; b) are you afraid to stay late after school to do extra work?; c) do you walk to the bus stop or to the parkades alone at night?

There are steps that we can take to feel safer. Do what Plaza II has done: adopt the buddy system. Do not walk anywhere by yourself. Be aware of the issues of this problem, and try to stop it before another one of our fellow students is attacked or even abducted. Think about it, and let's all talk about it.

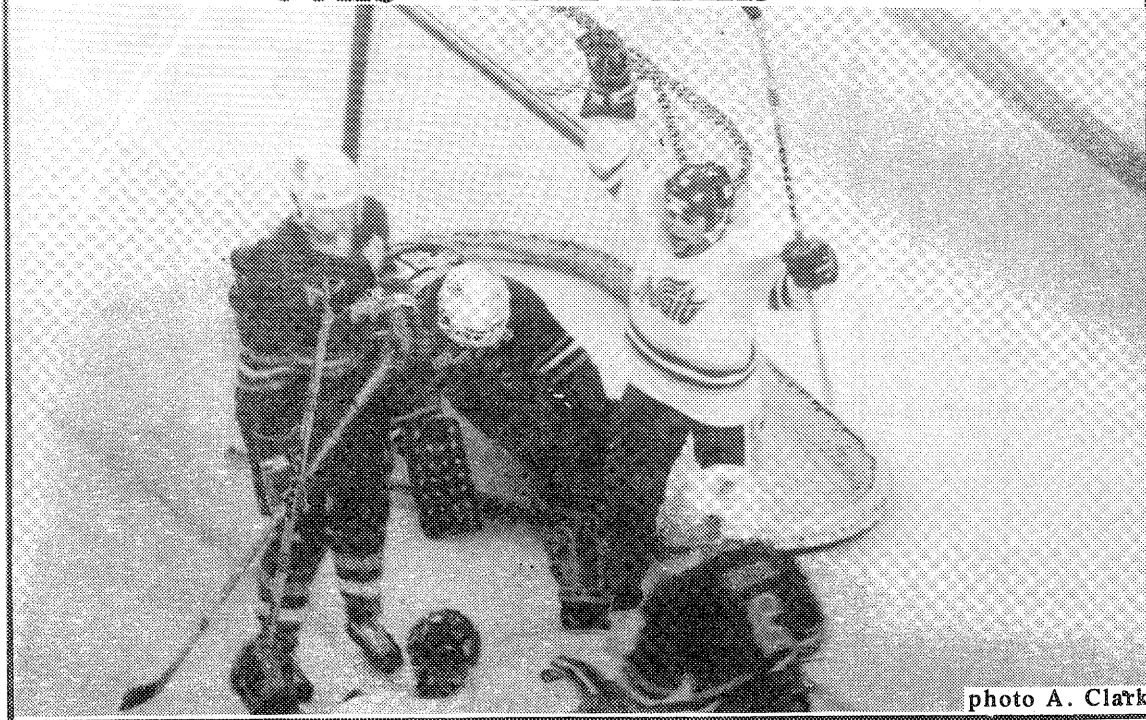

12) To conduct successful NAITSA elections through promotions that encourage quality candidates and voter turnout. Once elected, to provide a smooth transition that ensures the ongoing dedication towards serving the students of NAIT.

The constitutional changes in the elections area should provide for smooth elections. NAITSA promotions will be aimed at increasing voter interest and participation. A comprehensive retreat involving both incoming and outgoing NAITSA executives will be held to ensure a transfer of vision and full exchange of knowledge and experience.

13) To establish a policy manual that will govern the day-to-day operations of NAITSA.

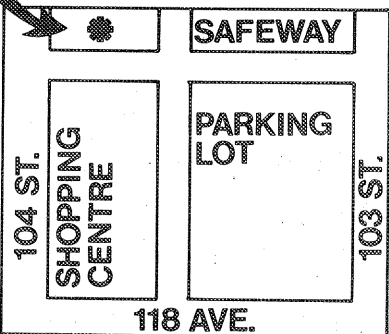

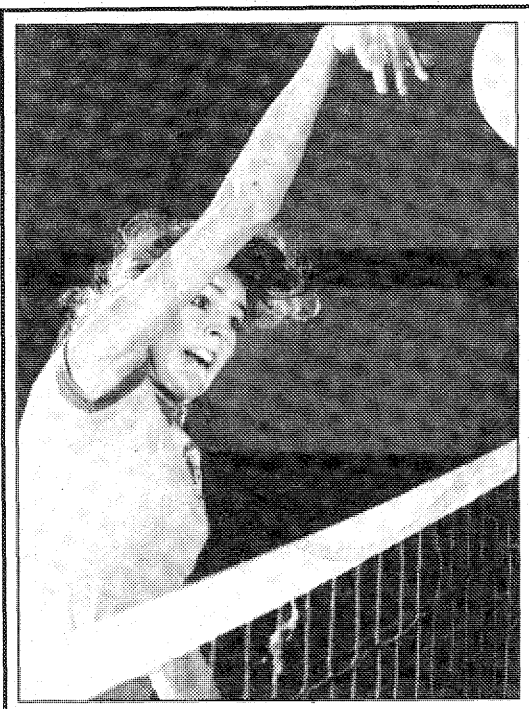

During the Reading Break the Nait Bowling Team traveled to Red Deer to compete in the ACAC Bowling Tournament. Teams from Medicine Hat College, Keyano College, Red Deer College, Sait and Nait met to decide the championship in a men's event; a ladies event and mixed team event.

Tournament format was ten games with a total pinfall to determine the winners. All teams rolled two blocks of three games on Friday, Feb. 7 and one block of four games on Saturday, Feb. 8 afternoon.

Nait teams fought hard to stay competitive in the early sets but gained momentum as the tournament progressed. The men's team consisted of Neil McNeil (Electrical Accelerated) Garnet Lovasz (Hydrocarbon) Ken Klassen (Forestry); Ken Tulloch (Plumbing). The team moved to a slim lead of 128 pins over Red Deer and 237 pins over Sait after six games. Despite the pressure exerted by the Red Deer Men's Team chipping away at Nait's lead, the Nait Men's team managed to bowl up 50 pins. It was an emotional win since the Men's trophy has been away from Nait for the last seven years. Congratulations men!

Nait ladies distinguished themselves with a respectable third place finish to Red Deer and Sait. Team members included Teresa Haine (Accounting); Gloria Salamon (Health Records); Laurie Wells (Accounting);

and Lainie Mailer (Animal Health). Their combined skills brought them to within 70 pins off the second place Red Deer team.

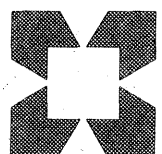

Basketball Oaks Split on Crucial Road Trip

Last weekend the Oaks made their toughest road trip of the year, enduring the endless bus ride to Medicine Hat and Lethbridge. The Oaks came out of the weekend with a split, losing to Medicine Hat College 77-61 and defeating Lethbridge Community College 68-63.

The game against Medicine Hat College was a scrappy one. The Oaks started the game shooting extremely poorly and quickly fell behind by 11 points; by the half it was 37-26. In the second half the Oaks played much better

and managed to close the 11 point lead to 7 points after 5 minutes. At that time a crucial turning point in Medicine Hat's favor occurred as the Lead Official interfered with 3 breakaway layups the Oaks had. After that, the team lost their composure, taking a technical foul. Medicine Hat, with some excellent perimeter shooting, regained their 11 point margin and went on to win by 16 points. Midway through the second half, Oaks center Brian Lazaruk was ejected from the game after he was

provoked into a fight by a Medicine Hat player; despite that he finished the game with 13 points. Brian Glowinski lead all NAIT scorers with 14 points and Scott Holmes added 12.

On Saturday Feb. 1, the Oaks recovered from their big loss to the Hat and defeated the Lethbridge Community College Kodiaks 68-63 in arguably the toughest gym in the Conference to win in. Lethbridge led most of the way, but the Oaks kept coming back and finally took the lead with two minutes to go. Oaks Head Coach Dave Hoy was very pleased with his team's ability to come up big when it counted: "We had to win this one in order to keep our playoff hopes alive ...After losing to Medicine Hat, we showed a lot of character coming back to win in Lethbridge."

Brian Lazaruk led all NAIT scorers with 20 points in only 23 minutes played before fouling out. Travis Heighington contributed 10 points, including a key basket with one minute to go. Danny Bohaychuk added 9 points.

The split raised the Oaks record to 9 wins and 5 losses and ties them with Grant MacEwan for third place. This past weekend, the Oaks faced Olds College on Friday Feb. 7th and won 85-48, and SAIT on Sat. 8th and lost 81-41. The split in this series keeps the Oaks in the play-off hunt. SAIT remained undefeated in ACAC play this season and is currently ranked number one in Canada. Travis Heighington had a 35 point weekend for the Oaks to lead all NAIT scorers. The Oaks' league record is now 10 wins against 5 losses.

GET WITH IT FANS!

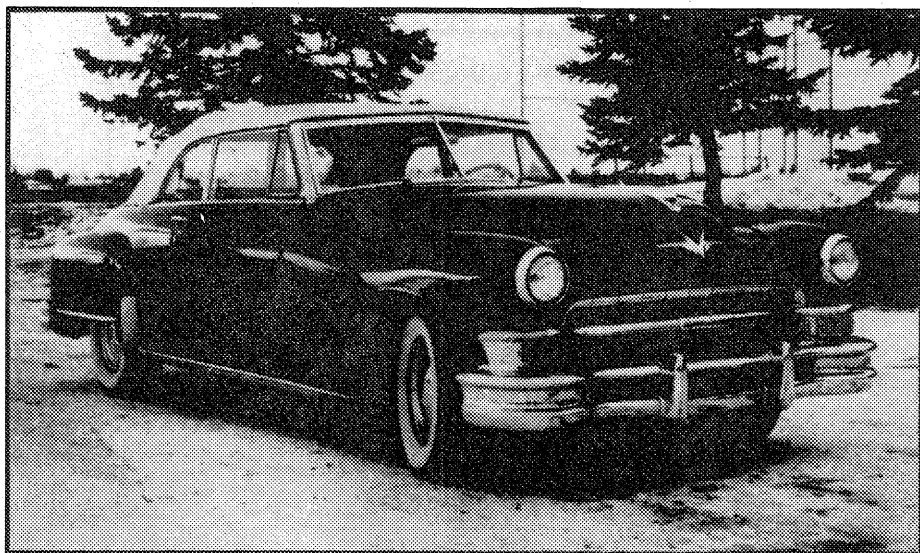

Up from under *Third World* film

Giving a voice to the poor and oppressed is the purpose of the Third World Film Festival, says Program Director Keith Wiley.

"We want to create a sense of world citizenship, of belonging to the world as a whole. We want to break down this sense of us and them," he says.

"We get films from independent filmmakers because that allows, as much as possible, the people to speak for themselves. Most often they speak to the poor and the oppressed and that's who this festival primarily represents. The poor and the oppressed are not your newsmakers and not your celebrities. Most often they don't have a voice on television," says Wiley.

The three-day festival, running from February 28 to March 2 in the Tory Theatre on the University of Alberta campus, will be screening over 35 films--most of them documentaries. A lot of the work is done by independent producers and festival organizers prefer this because they feel the independents are the ones who give the festival the voice it wants.

Currently in its sixth year, the festival is sponsored by a large number of organizations including CUSO, OXFAM, the U. of A. Students' Union, and churches with development interests.

According to Wiley the reason they all give support is because the festival is an effective way to put Edmontonians in touch with the aspirations and struggles of people in the third world.

"People who come to the festival say to me again and again, 'I didn't know that.' They leave with a real sense of their eyes being opened," he says.

The selection of the films was done by Wiley and a committee of volunteers. Their main criterion for the films, particularly the documentaries, was the factual quality.

"We picked films for the sense of reality they carried," says Wiley. "Also, we looked for how much they allowed for voices that you don't often hear. We screened as many as we could and tried to pick the best of what's new. Almost all the films in the festival are new."

The committee, though, steers clear of the preachy films.

"The credibility lies in the strength of the films and in how well they're made. We deliberately avoid ranting and raving films because they're just not important."

The festival has a number of focuses: food and famine, South Africa and Central America. The committee deemed food and famine a necessary topic.

In addition to the documentaries, the festival also has a number of feature films on the program--two notable examples are *El Norte* and *Yol*.

El Norte concerns the plight of two Columbian refugees who are on their way to America--supposedly the land of opportunity.

"The movie is filled with Latin American magical realism," says Wiley. "It's a literary Latin American tradition to present the fantastic as if it were real."

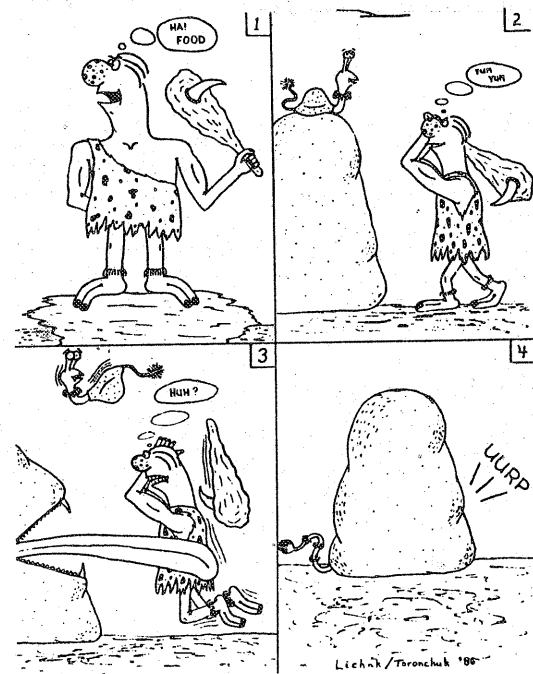
Yol, a Turkish film, is the story of five prisoners who, on a two-week pass, find life on the outside to be just as harsh and restrictive as it is on the inside.

"It's about repression," says Wiley. "This film has been banned in Turkey. It's not sweet but it's very powerful."

Although the Third World Film Festival has been a popular success, Wiley is not sure he wants the attendance to improve.

"The festivals draw about two thousand people every year and two years ago it was almost up to three thousand. We're not looking to make the festival bigger because that's about all Tory can handle."

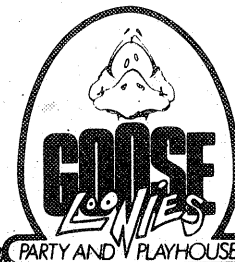

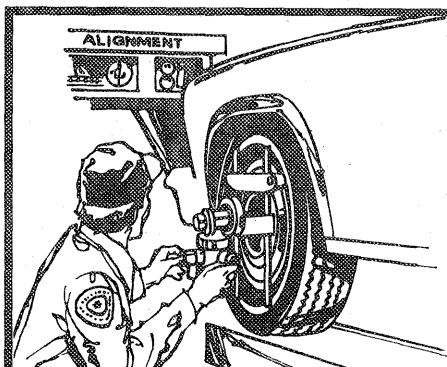

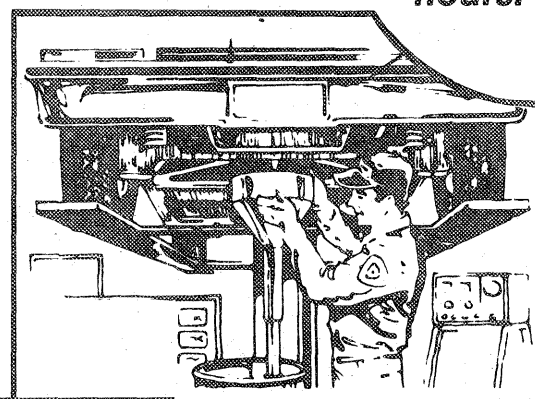
