According to Edmonton City police, Brenda was last seen at the Convention Inn South Lounge, after two of her friends left just prior to her intended departure.

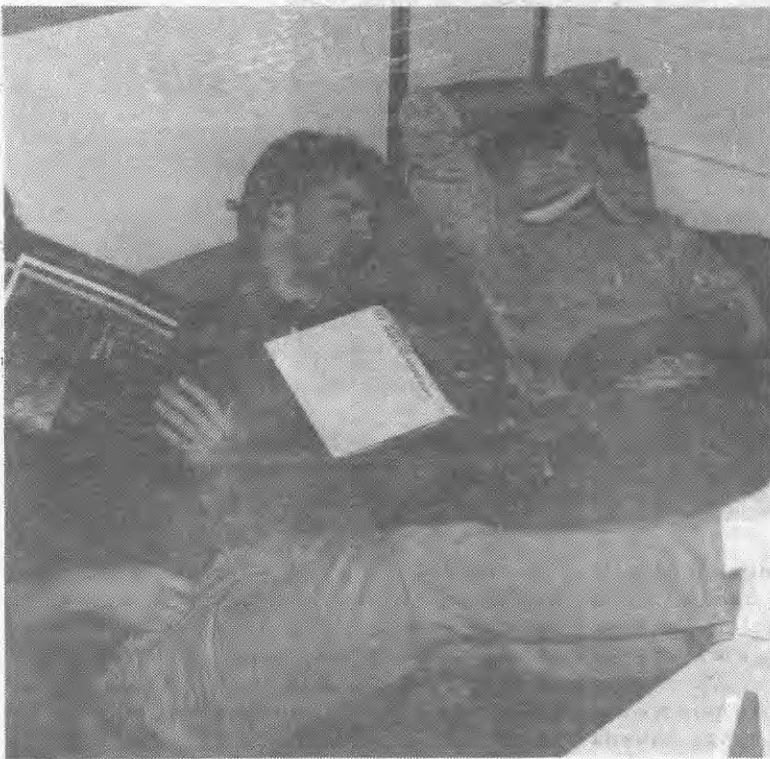
Police have been searching since Saturday evening. On Tuesday they found Ms. McClenaghan's car at the NorthWood Mall.

Brenda has been described by her classmates as friendly and very pleasant. She is five-feet-six inches tall, 105 lbs., with green eyes and long light brown hair.

A Little Nap Can Do Wonders For You

Struggling through the long hours of NAIT classroom instruction, a student can become completely drained of energy. To revive yourself you drink coffee, diet Coke, Coke Classic, Pepsi: anything with caffeine in it. But in severe cases, even this nerve stimulant can't help you. You need sleep! You have become a classroom napper, and feel guilty about it. Well, take heart, for according to an article in the National On-Campus Report, a psychologist at Philadelphia's Institute of Pennsylvania Hospital recently found that 55 percent of college students nap one or more times a week.

It goes on to say that napping can be very refreshing, reducing stress and renewing energy.

There are, however, keys to successful napping. It's best to rest between 2 or 3 p.m. because body temperatures drop slightly then as part of our natural biorhythms, and this is believed to promote sleepiness.

"I Have a Dream"

With all the racial violence and unrest we hear about in South Africa, the thousands that have already died in their struggle for equal rights and justice brings to mind the struggle of the 60's in the U.S. A long and hard struggle for the American Blacks paid off in the end and shot America into the 80's as a country that is as close to "True Democracy" as one could expect, without anarchy.

Martin Luther King Jr. is probably the one man that can be singled out as the leader of the Black Movement in the 60's. Born January 15, 1929, and growing up in the days when being Black meant being "not as good", he learned from his parents how to handle the situation. He learned that violence wasn't the answer to segregation. His father was a Minister and he taught young Martin and other children to protest and demonstrate without violence. Martin grew up with this in mind, but planned to do something about the injustices and miseries put on the Blacks. His personality was mild-mannered and even-tempered, but he was determined not to be treated as a second-class citizen.

The King family was very religious. Sundays were sacred and devoted entirely to Church activities. Martin's life was very much influenced by religion, but like other boys growing up, he had interests in sports and music and girls.

Like many other "Freedom Fighters", Martin Luther King Jr. was determined to take a stand for what he believed. At his first attempt to relieve Blacks from the torment they faced, he thought he might be fighting evil with evil. But as he reflected back on all the injustices Blacks had been facing throughout the years, he knew that this was just an

honest attempt to speak out against unfair treatment of Blacks. After the first protest in which Dr. King took part in Blacks united to organize. An organization was formed and Dr. King was elected president. The organization was called the Montgomery Improvement Association [MIA].

In his first speech as president of MIA, he asked the audience to protest and do it with courage, dignity and Christian love. The first protest of MIA was aimed at the way Blacks were treated in buses. [Blacks were to sit in the back of buses and give their seats to whites whenever they were told.]

After the peaceful demonstration, Dr. King and his followers were arrested for protesting. Some were killed and many, including Dr. King, had their homes bombed. But in the end, they had won their cause.

After the victories of the MIA, a new organization was formed and Dr. King was elected president again. They formed under the name of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference [SCLC]. It was formed to further the progress already accomplished by all Black organiza-

tions and to continue along the path of nonviolence.

Martin Luther King Jr. continued his struggle to free Blacks from the hardships and miseries which were placed on them. He met other Freedom Fighters. Among them was Marcus Garvey, a brilliant Jamaican. Marcus Garvey was responsible for organizing the largest and most successful Black Movement in the history of Black resistance. Martin Luther King Jr. would have had more of an impact on the world, like Garvey, but on April 4, 1968 his life was ended by James Earl Ray, the man responsible for his assassination.

January 20th, 1986 marks the first time in the history of the United States that a national holiday has been named in honor of a Black leader. The United Nations is issuing a special resolution calling for a world-wide "day of peace." On Sunday, January 19th, there will be in Edmonton a special candle-light ceremony at Churchill Square. It is a special birthday celebration to commemorate this historic event that will take place in the States on Monday. See you there.

Committee on College
Affairs, chaired by Doug
MacRae, will conduct a pub-
lic meeting in Edmonton this
month.

The Committee will meet
Tuesday, January 21, in
Room 318 at The Millwoods
Campus of Grant MacEwan
Community College, in
Edmonton, beginning at 2
p.m.

The Minister's Advisory
Committee on College Affairs
receives public input on
college-related issues in post-
secondary education. It pro-
vides a direct link for public
input to Dick Johnston,
Minister of Alberta
Advanced Education.

The committee considers
briefs and presentations from
individuals and groups. At
past meetings the committee
has received submissions and
proposal from interested
community members,
chambers of commerce, stu-
dents and prospective stu-
dents, faculty members,
municipal council members,
associations and agencies.

Presentations made to the
College Affairs Committee
have dealt with such issues
as tuition fees, transferability
of programs, college facilities
and community use, student
loans, and confidentiality of
student records.

The College Affairs Commit-
tee is one of six advisory
committees reporting to the
Minister of Advanced Educa-
tion. The other committees
deal with student affairs,
further education, university
affairs, technical/vocational
education and Native
peoples' Education and Tech-
nical/Vocational Education
also advise the Ministers of
Alberta Education and
Alberta Manpower, respec-
tively.

What Is An Animal Health Technologist ?



When our class president asked me if I would
write an article for the Nugget about Animal
Health, I was totally lost for anything to say.
After pondering the problem for a while, I did
come up with a few things.

I'm sure everyone at Nait knows where we are
located, probably due to the strange sounds
that are heard emerging from our clinic in
E212. Contrary to popular belief, these
animals aren't being bounced off of the walls
or anything. Animals often react vocally when
they are scared and sometimes the simple act
of being handled by strange people is enough
to set them off.

We have a very nice clinic upstairs where we
help to perform surgery, examine animals,
bath and groom them and all sorts of other
things, for the staff and students of Nait only,
for a nominal fee. One question we are often
asked is: "Do you vaccinate animals?"
Unfortunately, the answer is no.

Our course is a two-year program after which
we emerge as Animal Health Technologists
and are an important part of any veterinary
clinic. During the two years we are trained in
many areas including laboratory, radiology,
surgery, anesthesiology, pharmacology and
nursing care. This is quite a lot to learn when
you consider that some people specialize in
only one of these areas. We as A.H.T.'s need
to be proficient in all these areas to be
competent. You might say we're "jacks-of-
all-trades!"

In the lab we are trained in hematology,
urinalysis, bacteriology and parasitology. We
are also versed in how to collect the samples
as well as performing the tests on them.

For radiology, we learn to take diagnostic
radiographs for the veterinarian and process
them. This is fairly easy with human patients
but have you ever tried to tell a dog to sit or
roll onto its back? Not so easy.

Even though we ourselves don't perform
surgery, we are responsible for many aspects
of it. We help anesthetize the patient and
then we monitor them throughout the surgery
as well as preparing them, assisting the
surgeon and cleaning up after. We also
prepare all the instruments, gowns, etc.
needed to perform the task. We are also
versed in monitoring the patient after surgery
to be sure no complications arise. Of course
we also handle most of the interactions with
the clients whether it be over the phone or in
person.

As you can see, our jobs aren't always easy,
none ever are, but at the same time we really
enjoy what we do. There's nothing better
than seeing the relieved face of a client after
you explain to them that their animal is on the
road to recovery. Or a happy, healthy animal
go home knowing that you are partially
responsible for their progress.

THE DEFECTORS

For close to six years Afghanistan has been under seige by Soviet forces. For six years the Afghan rebels have been fighting back.

With a puppet government initially set up by the Soviets and then the so called 'invitation' to invade, Afghannies have been suppressed into fighting an ongoing, stagnating battle. For years we have heard the appeals and cries of support from the Rebels, and now there is a new wave of resistance. A documentary done on the CBC's Journal exposed the ever increasing number of Soviet defectors who are turning themselves over to the Afghan cause. It was reported that many Soviets, including Russians, Ukrainians, and Latvians, fearing their lives have defected from the Red Army, into the Afghannies hands. In turn they are seeking possible immigration into Canada and the united States.

It was recently reported that four Russians and one Ukrainian have escaped the army and have sought assylum with the rebels waiting to recieve permission to enter Canada. The immigration department under Flora McDonald have been contacted. But Miss McDonald has cold bloodedly denied these men any chance of freedom.

The immigration department has inconsistently accepted and rejected immigrants. For example, a Czech hockey player was recently allowed into Canada without any problems, while on the other hand a South American woman was murdered because of postponement of her immigration papers. It are these inaccuracies that have given Miss McDonald and her department a bad name.

One successful attempt brought Ukrainian army defector Mykola Movchan to New York. After a heroic attempt by several Americans he escaped Afghanistan. But it was only after continual lobbying by numerous slavic groups that Mr. Movchan was allowed to immigrate. Mr. Movchan was one of the fortunate ones. -Women have always been subjected to sexual prejudice in all corners of the world.

-People of the Jewish faith have had a long history of being ostracized. To this day we find violent opponents to any kind of economic success by Jewish people.

-Inter-racial marriages are still frowned upon in our society.

-Pakistani, Lebanese, Chi-

nese, Jamaican, all immigrants to Canada have met with some degree of hostility or prejudice.

Yes, even in Canada we encounter prejudice, and it isn't found only in the "less developed" areas of Canada. It thrives in the major cities and towns as well.

The most despicable place of all to find prejudice is in our post-secondary institutions. Here, the instilling of knowledge is the supposed conqueror of blatant ignorance. But listening to the opinions of some people regarding apartheid and what should be done in South Africa, or even a look at the graffiti in the washrooms of NAIT is a cold, bleak reminder that even education cannot wipe out prejudice.

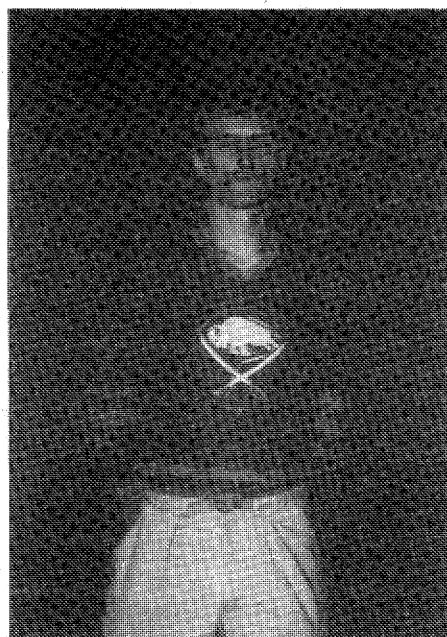

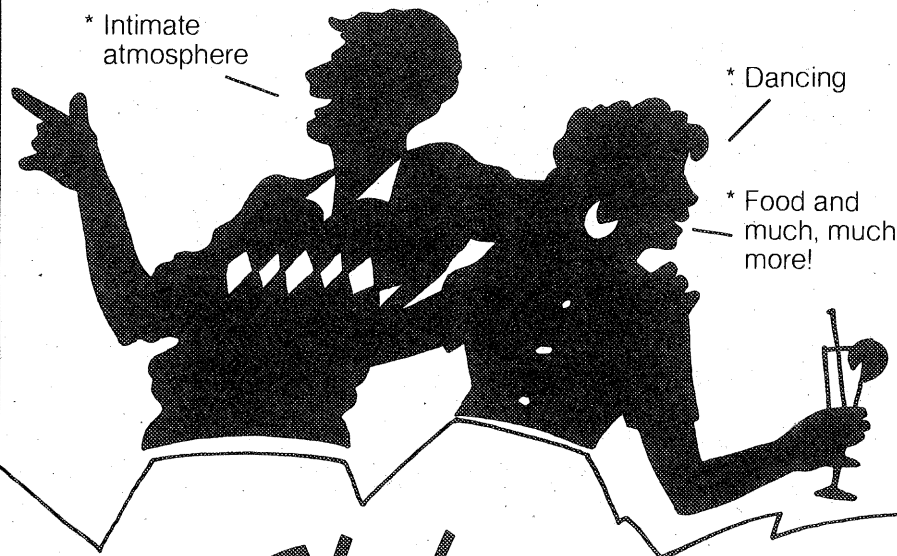

Chicks Basketball Squad

In a scene that may have come straight out of Mash the battle weary Chicks limped, hopped and dragged themselves onto the bus for the long trip home to Edmonton after dropping two games to Calgary teams. The Chicks took nine healthy players on the road, Robbie Drake recovering from a knee injury. In action last Friday the Chicks faced arch-rival Sait and got soundly beaten 70-44 by the fired up Helenas. Point guard Sherry Lee was recovering from two sprained ankles and her game was hampered considerably. Center Patti Marcinyshyn shot 1 for 10 in the first half, but turned on to score 17 second half points and finish with 19 points. Sait was led by veteran Cheryl Stargrath who bombed 23 points from the outside.

On Saturday the Chicks squared off against the top ranked Cougars of Mount Royal and were plagued by several injuries losing the game 87-62. Sherry Lee sprained an already weak ankle, Kim Guthrie went down with ankle problems, Chris Larson sprained a thumb and when Meach Cuccinotta fouled out the Chicks were left with only five bodies for the last four minutes of the game. Patti Marcinyshyn made some huge strides towards establishing herself as the premier centre in the league by scoring 23 points against Lisa Anderson, last years conference All-star. It was a
