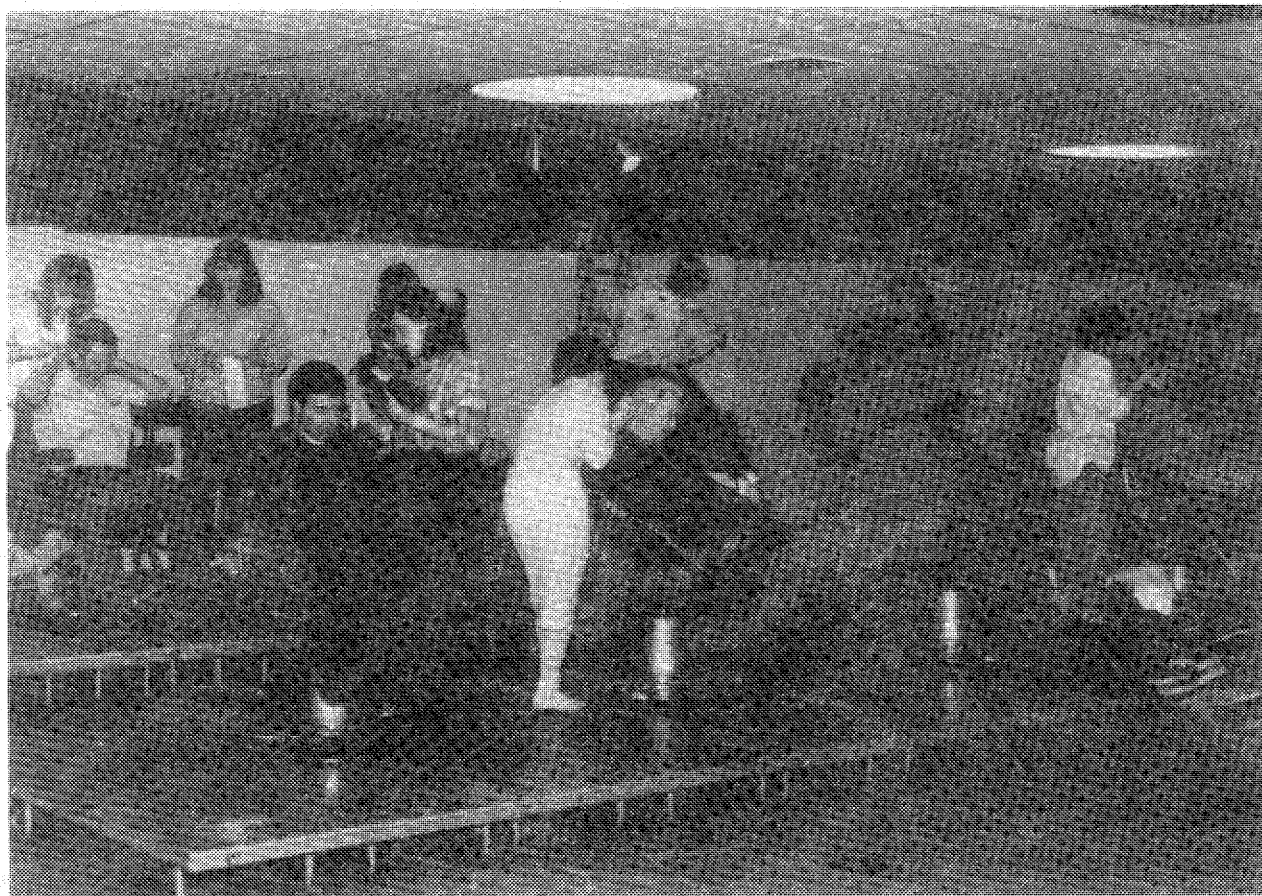

SURVEY RAISES \$400.

Surveying, with cooperation of BCET, EDDT and Civil Eng., raised \$400 in an effort to help in the search for Brenda McClenaghan. The money has been donated to Crime Stoppers in an effort to find the person responsible for the tragedy.

NAITSA'S CHALLENGES '85-'86

In the beginning of its term, the '85-'86 NAITSA Executive established ten goals which they set out to accomplish by the end of their tenure in office. On December 23rd, the NAITSA Executive once again met for a goal-setting retreat. This time, however, the meeting began with an evaluation of their record-to-date. The results, they determined, were as follows:

1) Maintain harmony and communication with the Executive.

All members felt that group relations were exceptional, given the size and diversity of the group. Individuals definitely had ups and downs, but these situations have been dealt with openly and maturely. This goal was recognized as an ongoing goal.

2) To increase and maintain two-way communication and awareness between NAITSA and students.

This was a hard goal to evaluate, needing to be judged by the student body. NAITSA felt, however, that a lot of students took advantage of this openness and were able to express their views. The Executive also felt that 'NAITSA, as a whole, has been well-publicized and promoted this year. Again, this is a goal which must be continued and improved upon in order to create more awareness.

3) To address the problem of quiet study area.

In spite of the space problems at NAIT, the NAITSA Executive has been able to secure classrooms as designated study areas. The room numbers have not yet been revealed; however they are rumored to be announced with the Lotto 649 numbers on Sunday evening. Seriously, though, the room numbers should be posted within a few, short weeks.

4) To obtain word processing equipment in the LRC.

A full proposal has been presented to both General Council and NAIT Administration. The wheels of bureaucracy are turning slowly: while all sides like the idea, the details are being hammered out. Again, positive results are expected soon.

5) To revise the NAITSA Constitution (eg. Elections '85)

A full-day work session of the NAITSA Executive was devoted to this challenging task. The results have been sent to the lawyers to be translated into Legalese. Once this is done, the changes will be presented to General Council for debate and approval.

6) To actively participate within ACTISEC to address such issues as student loan remissions and taxation.

This year NAITSA is respected as one of the leaders of opinion in ACTISEC. NAITSA representatives serve on all major subcommittees of ACTISEC, and are actively persuing NAIT students' interests at these meetings.

7) To raise \$12,000 in Shinerama.

Although this was deemed by many as a lofty goal, NAITSA, with support from all areas, not only equalled the past NAIT record, but resoundingly surpassed it!

8) To designate and initiate existing capital funds into a specific project for student area.

Through debate in General Council, a \$225,000 lounge was committed to be built in Plaza II. This structure will be open for student use in Sept. '86. This area is another tri-funded project with the Provincial Government, NAIT Board of Governors and NAIT Student Association sharing the load equally.

9) To attempt to install a whirlpool on campus.

Another approved project, this proposal is being submitted to the Provincial Government for shared funding. If this meets with approval, construction may begin before the end of the school year.

10) To take steps to achieve a licensed student lounge on campus.

On Nov. 4, 1985, the NAIT Board of Governors approved in principle the possibility of NAITSA operating a licensed premise on campus during certain hours. This is the first major step in obtaining a pub on campus. The future of a licensed premise on NAIT campus is now secured. Many more steps must be taken to fully realize the students' desire for a bar. Undoubtedly, this issue will continue to occupy the attention of future NAITSA Administrations.

Based on the success of the goals that were achieved, the NAITSA Executive felt it necessary to set new goals for the balance of the school year. Adding to the ongoing goals, the four new NAITSA goals are as follows:

11) To host a successful ACTISEC Leadership conference which is professional, informative, motivating and socially entertaining.

May 1-4 are the conference dates. L Shaw Smith (a dynamic educational speaker from the Student Services area) and Jack Donahue (coach of the Canadian Olympic Basketball Team and highly renowned motivational speaker) have been confirmed as Conference keynote speakers. Students from across Alberta and Canada will be attending to learn more about personal leadership skills. NAIT students are strongly urged to participate, and any questions can be answered at the NAITSA offices.

These goals are the results of hours of deliberation. While the NAITSA executive feel these goals are attainable, only you the students are qualified to assess the success or failure of these endeavours. Your feedback and participation is critical in order for NAITs' Student Association to be truly successful. Remember, WITH YOU WE CAN ...

It is a sad, cruel fact that women can't walk the streets alone at night without being terrified. Children can't play in a park without fear. We must never forget to always be on guard.

Although doctors can diagnose a dangerous psychotic, they cannot cure the disease. Perhaps, one day, they will. It could also be the day when we see the number of mental health facilities increase to a level that will provide treatment for all mentally ill people.

These hopes and goals and hundreds more will not end the pain, but as the grief fades, over time, we must keep strong our memories of Miss Brenda McClenaghan, never forgetting the constant battle against the terror and sickness that took her life.

Ooks Basketball Back on Track

The Ooks got back on the winning track with 3 wins over Red Deer, Camrose, and Olds. This boosts their overall record to 21-12 and 8-4 in conference play which puts them in a third place tie with Grant MacEwan.

Camrose at Nait - Jan. 17/86

The Ooks rolled to an early 34-8 lead and never was the game in doubt. Camrose pulled to within 17 points (42-25) as the Ooks tended to lose a bit of intensity with the big lead. The second half followed the same pattern as the team started hot again and tailed off but still won the game with a score of 89-51. High school teammates Adrian Toppin and Brian Lazaruk lead the scoring with 15 and 14 points respectively. The coaching staff was pleased with the win but as Assistant Coach Mike Suderman says, "It was frustrating to see such good things, then periods of lack of concentration in the game".

Red Deer at Nait - Jan. 18/86

For the last 5 years the Red

Deer College Kings have always been a thorn in the Ooks side in league play. This day was no different for 25 minutes as the Kings played a tight, disciplined zone which caused Nait to shoot a dismal 31 percent at half-time and they trailed 28-26. Red Deer shot well but their turnovers hurt them in the first half. Between halves the Ooks responded and shot a blistering 54 percent to ensure their 72-54 win. The difference in the last 15 minutes according to Head Coach Dave Hoy was the teams ability to be poised on offense and intense on defence. Travis Heighington with 18 and Lazaruk with 16 paced the team. Brian Glowinski hooped 14. The effort in the second half was the thing the team will have to continue to do down the stretch run.

NAIT at Olds College - Jan. 24/86

The team ventured to Olds for a 1 game weekend on this Friday night. Really the story of the game was the play of veteran guard Travis

Heighington who finished with 21 points and freshman Brian Lazaruk who netted 25. After a slow start the Ooks trailed 10-5 as the Broncos hit the offensive boards and scored easy hoops. With the lead 17-11 for Olds, Lazaruk got started and cruised to 16 half-time points to get NAIT the lead 42-35. The coaching staff was not pleased with the first half of defense played by the Ooks but a goal to hold them under 30 points for the second half was laid down. Lazaruk continued to dominate inside and Heighington caught fire from the perimeter and helped the team post its third win in a row 80-61. Third year forward Mike Klein chipped in with 10 points. This upcoming weekend has the Ooks travelling to Medicine Hat and Lethbridge for two very big games. Two wins for Nait can almost clinch a playoff spot. Although these are 2 of the toughest gyms in the conference to play, Ooks Assistant Coach Mark Dobko believes the team can win both "if we execute and are very intense".

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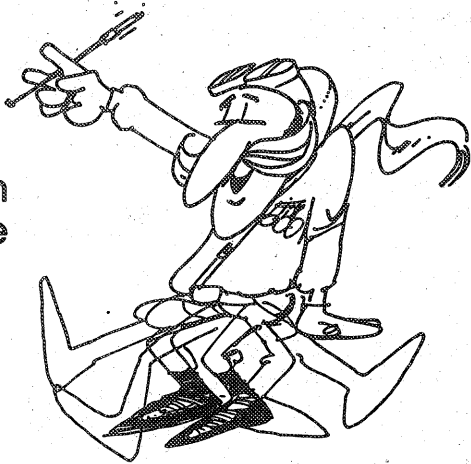
Short Shots

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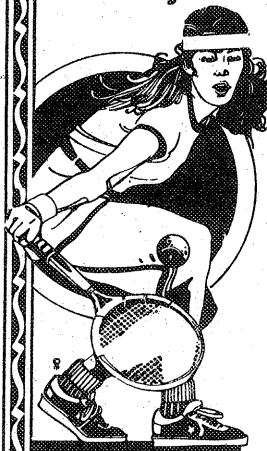
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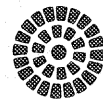
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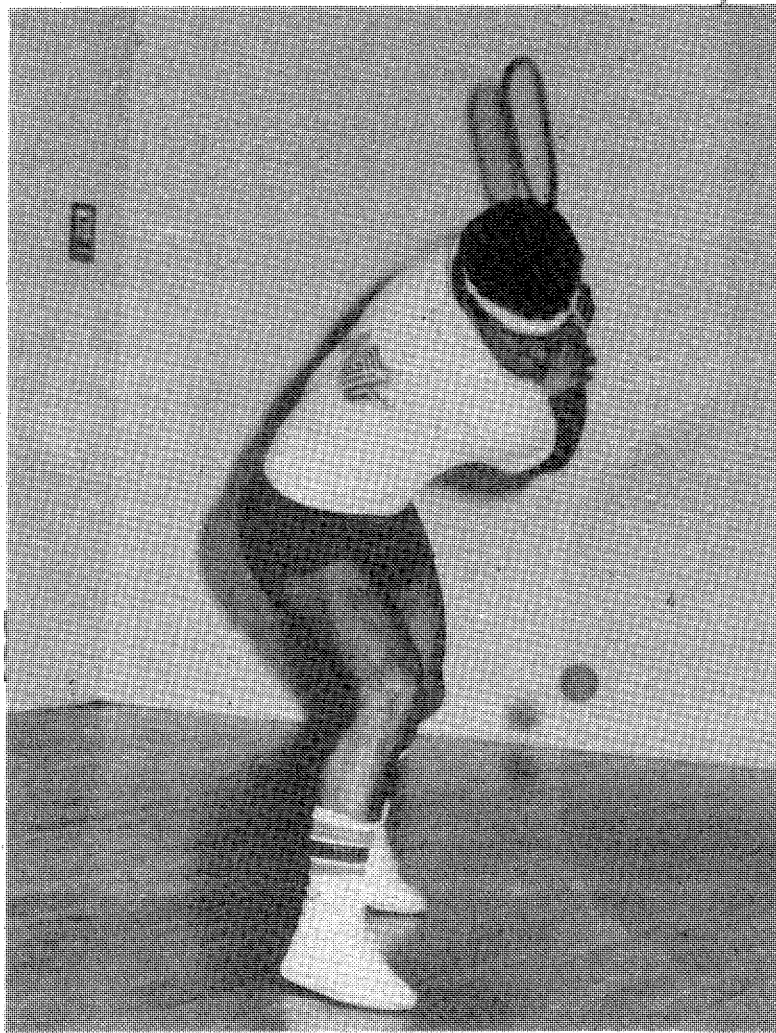


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Racquetball Ooks Ready For Championship

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INTRAMURAL ATHLETE OF THE WEEK

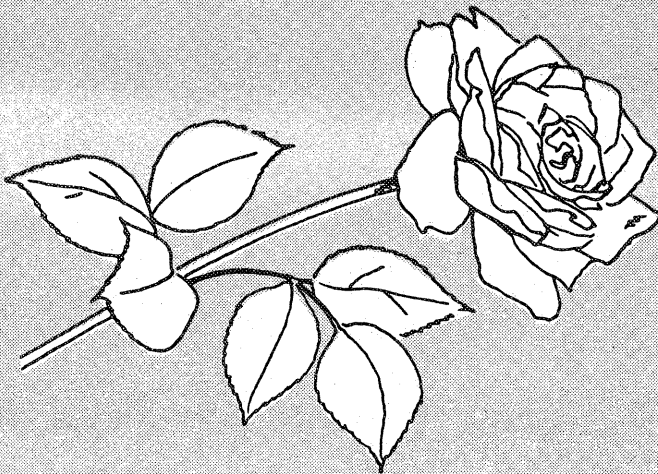

BCET**

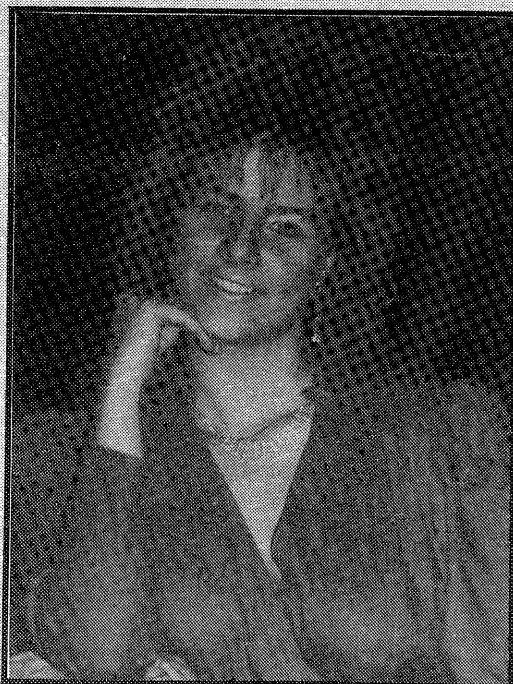

The man is the epitome of vomit. I mean, Corey, what's with the hair? And why do you sweat so much? Corey Hart, you make me vomit.

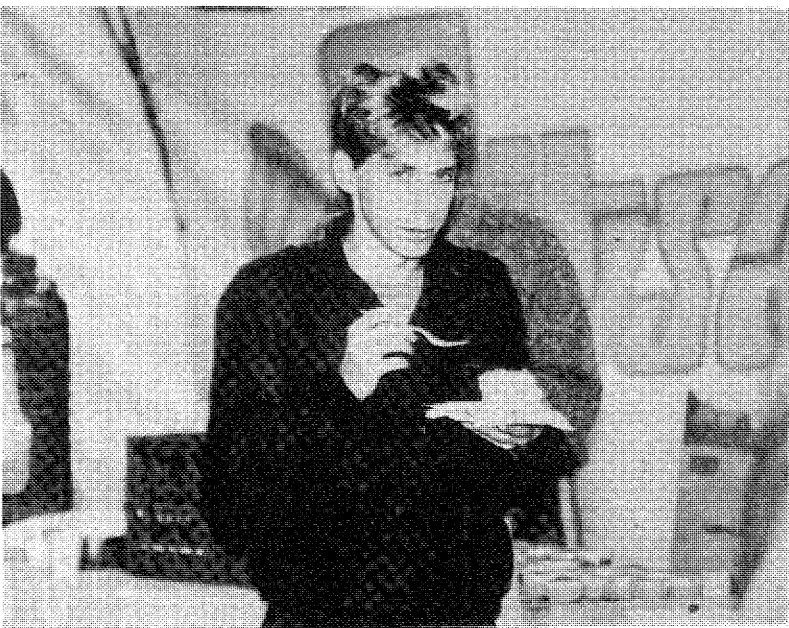
2. WHAM...

Consider, for a moment, the implications of that thought. It's your life activity moving towards the quality of your-

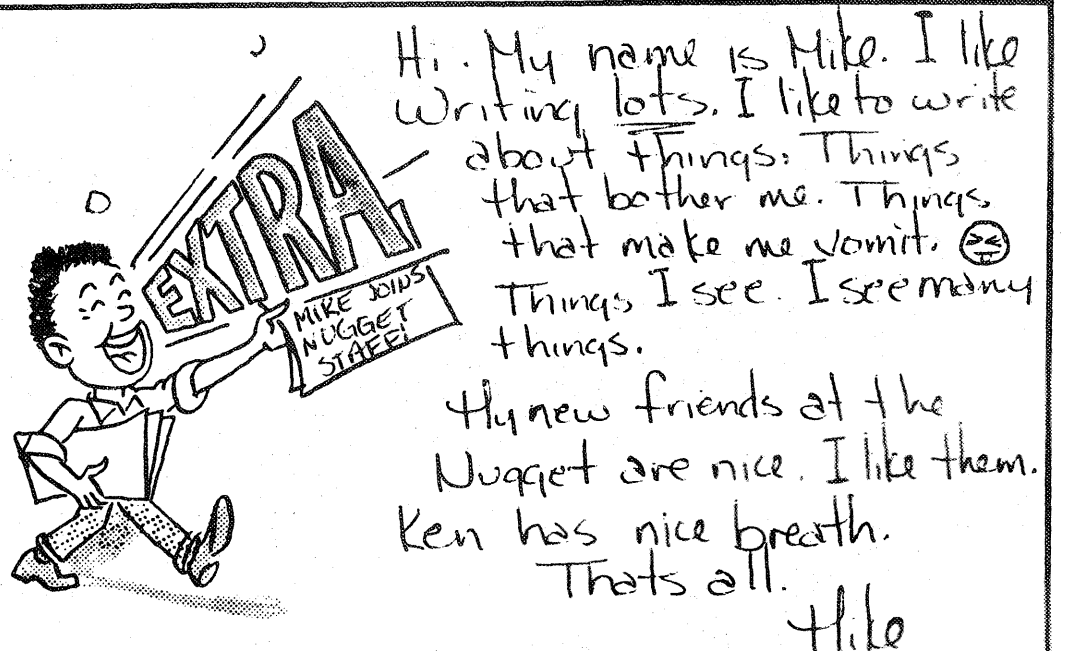

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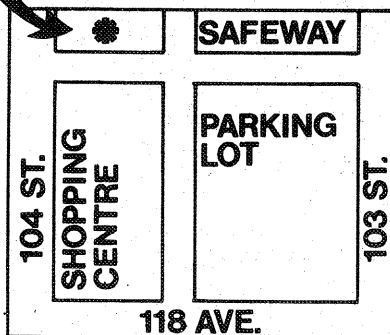
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Where was I?

Closing Time recently won Libman the Alberta Full-Length Playwriting Competition Award as well as the Tyrone Guthrie Award at Stratford.

The dialogue between the four characters is captiva-

ting. Stan, a hard-nosed businessman (played by Blair Hynes), and Serge, his quick-witted partner (Christian St. Pierre) run the cooperative shop, "La Presse Chien Chaud" ("Hot Dog Printing Company"). Working with them are David, a young apprentice, and the old man Willy, who is partially responsible for the economic dilemma. The four of them engage the audience with their passionate, often comical, conversations.

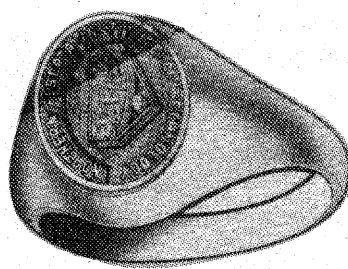
