What is the Goal of the Foundation?

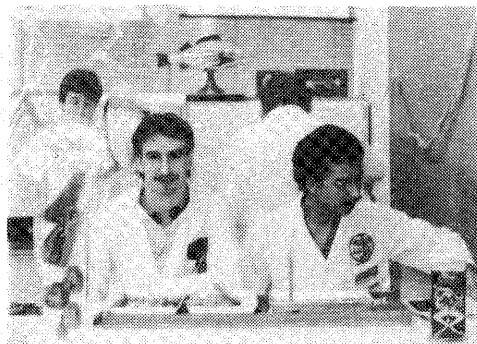

Job training (in the eyes of a student)

For the past years, job markets in Alberta for the graduating students have become unpredictable. As the month goes by, the anxiety and faith of each student is now becoming eminently cloudy.

Consequently, one should now realize that the elements of celebrating graduation with joy and laughter and confidence of securing a promising job career will change one's life style. For the better have diminished and the question as to the validity of college education as the key to success is yet to be answered by the college education as the only means of escape from frustration caused by job hunting prey. It is also the only way to receive secured assistances from the provincial and federal government.

The high competition that exists in the job market opens rooms for nepotism, discrimination and too much expectation from the candidates. Some employers become too adamant and instead of helping the students, turn the situation to their own advantages, as if they have never gone through such a road before.

They set their priority with an intent of making "Jack of all trades" from the applicant. To qualify for their vacant position requires that you know everything, ranging from your own career to unrelated careers in the college. For example, electrical technologists must have knowledge of instrumentation, welding, diesel engine, power engineering and business administration, on an average wage that is below \$1200 per month.

Lately, the predictions that most often make it into the news are too devastating for ambitious graduating students to handle. The news such as the low price of crude oil by the OPEC cartels, the sinking of Canadian dollars and the increase of the interest rate by the Bank of Canada are sure deterrance to the up going investments of our society. Until now, the students only rely on Triple 5 multi-investments in Edmonton, and the Taxi-cab industry as the only source of quick means of making dollars to keep body and soul together. Once again, the graduating students will be subjected to the move by

the federal government to cut down the deficit now as 1.2 million Canadians cannot even find jobs. This cut will only aggravate unemployment.

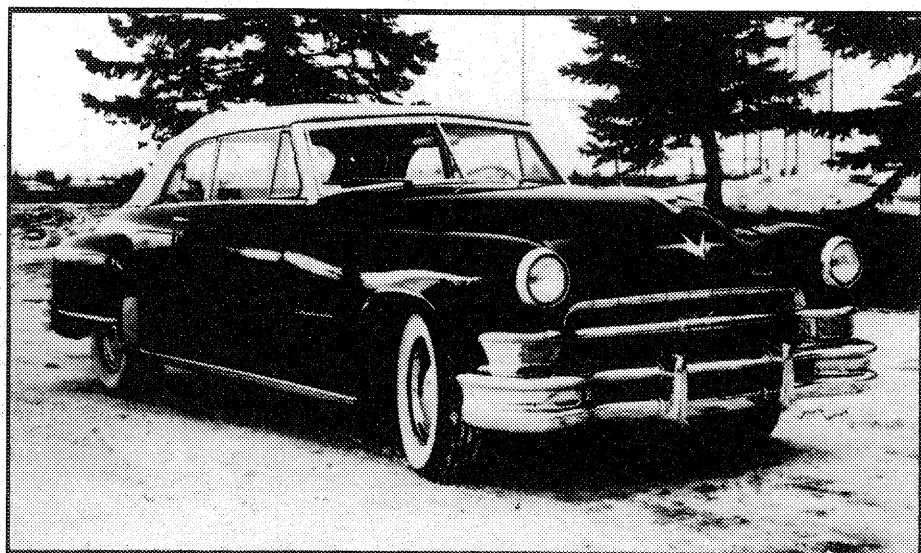
Based on surveys concerning employment after graduation among the undergraduates students, one can deduce that 50 percent of graduating students of 1986 will be forced to take off jobs in contrast to their career; 80 percent of the minority students will not secure employment despite the lack of equal employment opportunity that exists in Alberta; 50 percent of female students will be forced into part-time employments and eventually marry; 25 percent will continue their education in any of the Canadian Universities, while 10 percent will go to any college in the States despite the fall of Canadian dollar; 10 percent will secure promising jobs either by merits or by patronizing manner; while 40 percent will continue to look or do something else.

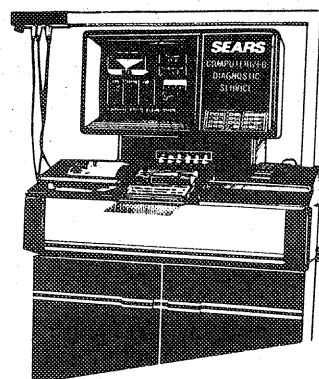

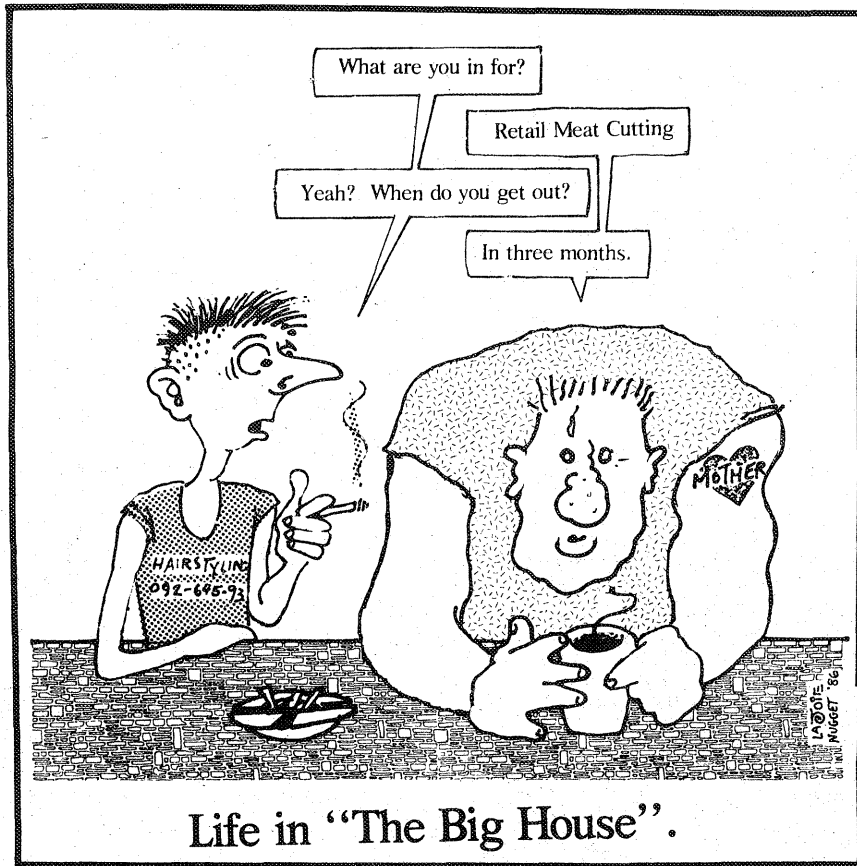
I personally have heard comments such as 'Hey, who do you think you are, Prince?'

Today, March 20, 1986, the U.S. Congress will vote on the Reagan Contra aid proposal. If Congress approves Reagan's plot, 100 million dollars in aid (70 per cent military and 30 per cent non-military) will be allocated to the Nicaraguan Contras [counter revolutionaries]. A 'yes' vote on this aid package will be a grim tribute to the ignorance and immorality of our "neighbour" to the South.

It has been seven years since the Nicaraguan revolution saw the U.S.-backed Somoza government overthrown by the socialist Sandinistas. In that time, we have seen the Sandinistan government struggle to restructure its nation. Moves were made to eliminate the Somoza power structure, which consisted of atrocious inequities in wealth as a result of a corruption-infested government. The Sandinistas have strained to set the groundwork for a restructuring and redistribution of wealth. The poverty-stricken (the vast majority of Nicaraguans) were finally given a piece of the economic pie. To date, some plans have succeeded. Aid for Nicaragua from the Soviet Union, Sweden, Canada, etc. have helped the Nicaraguans in striving to achieve their goals. However, a constant thorn in their side has been the counter-revolutionaries (the Contras). A rag-tag guerrilla army of Somoza

faithfuls called the Contras have literally terrorized the nation. The U.S.-backed, CIA-trained Contras have pillaged small, poverty-ridden villages, burning shacks, killing domestic animals, and brutally murdering villagers. (Two years ago, an entire bridal party was slain by the Contras, including babies and pregnant women. This is just an example of their hideous work.)

It is glaringly apparent, to most people, of the evil deeds of the Contras. Yet Mr. Reagan has called the Contras "the moral equivalent of our Founding Fathers..."; he has declared himself an "honorary Contra."

His obscure reasoning (at best) is that the Contras are capitalists! Reagan is demanding the 100 million dollars in Contra aid in order for the 'capitalists' to continue their struggle as they seek to overthrow the Sandinistas (the communists).

If you haven't guessed by now, there is indeed a method to Reagan's madness. It is the dreaded Red Scare. Simply put, Reagan does not want another Cuba, and he will pull out all stops in order to succeed. (if the Contra aid proposal is rejected, this might provoke Reagan to send in U.S. troops.)

Perhaps with three years left in his White House term, the 74-year-old

Reagan wants one last flag waving tribute: to conquer communism in Central America...whether they like it or not!

What a glorious legacy!

A struggling country where equality and justice are slowly being restored is completely obliterated in the name of U.S., flag waving Capitalism!

If a senile old man gets his way, this tragedy could become a reality. However, if humanity, idealism, and righteousness count for anything, the Contra aid proposal will be rejected by the U.S. Congress. I pray that the latter condition will prevail.

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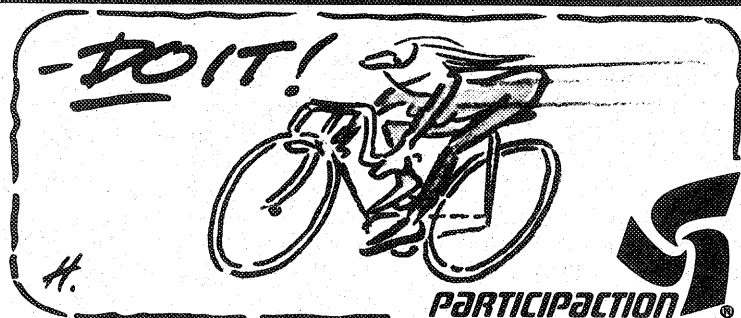

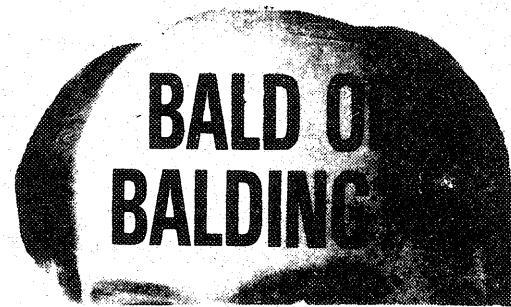

“Watchdogs” join to protect Canadian culture

Film producers, writers, publishers and other members of Alberta's cultural industries have formed a watchdog committee to keep an eye on the Canada/U.S. free trade talks.

At a day-long seminar held recently in Edmonton, concerned individuals plus representatives of more than 25 producer groups, expressed their concerns that Canada's cultural industries might be bargained away during the negotiating process.

In general, Alberta producers are particularly concerned that their access to the existing Canadian market might be severely eroded by further opening Canada to American films, books and magazines. The assembly called for better access to the Canadian market, especially for regionally based producers.

In a subsequent letter to Alberta Culture Minister Mary LeMessurier, Myrna Kostash, Acting Chair of the newly-formed “Owning Our Own” watchdog committee, pointed to 1986 as a

critical year for Canada's cultural industries.

“During free trade talks, we will learn what degree of importance our governments give to Canadian culture,” wrote Ms. Kostash. “Those of us involved in the cultural sector will continue to work together to monitor this and related issues.”

Culture ministers from across Canada will be meeting in Montreal in early March, specifically to discuss the film and book publishing industries.

The committee is asking Mrs. LeMessurier, in her role as Canada's senior provincial culture minister, to seek the advice of and consult with, representatives of the arts in Alberta.

The Owning Our Own committee is planning further public education events on the issue of Canada's culture and free trade.

It's offensive, that's what it is.


What's more despicable than the look itself is the fact that these half-witted imposters strive to look like someone else and probably always will.


