Approximately 800 graduates from NAIT participated in the largest graduation ceremony in NAIT's history last Saturday, at the Jubilee Auditorium. In fact, the ceremony was so well attended that there were people watching the proceedings on T.V. monitors in the lobby. At two hours duration, the ceremony was relatively brisk, considering that each graduand did cross the stage.

After an informative report from the President Dr. Souch, Mr. McAgerty (Chairman of the Board) presented Mr. John Rigarlick with the Distinguished Friend of the Institute Award. Mr. Rigarlick, a former NAIT business student, is presently the President of Echo Bay Mines.



Following this, Mr. Ron Jeffels, President of the Open Learning Institute in B.C. delivered a witty and enjoyable address to the graduands. Glenn Mason, NAITSA President 85-86, then gave the farewell address on behalf of the Class of 1986. On a more serious note Glenn's speech dealt with the theme "What lies behind us, and what lies before us, are tiny matters compared to what lies within us."

The final act was the presentation of the 1986 graduands, by Mr. Len Semrau, Registrar of NAIT. This was followed by a reception hosted by the NAIT Board of Governors.

## \$1.3 MILLION SHOT IN THE ARM FOR STUDENTS

On April 29, Flora MacDonald, Minister of Employment and Immigration and Andree Champagne, Minister of State (Youth), launched the 1986 Business Drive for Jobs. A component of Challenge '86, Business Drive for Jobs provides \$1.3 million to promote non-subsidized student employment in the private sector.

Miss MacDonald, who is the honorary chairperson of the Business Drive for Jobs Committee, called it "an excellent example of business and government working together to provide summer jobs for Canadian youth."

Once again this year, the private sector will take the lead in the Business Drive for Jobs. Through national radio advertisements and through personal contact, members of the private sector will encourage their colleagues to provide students with career-related jobs and practical work experience.

Thanks in part to the Business Drive for Jobs, some 435,000 students were placed in jobs last year through Canada Employment Centres for Students and Hire-A-Student offices in Alberta.

Laurent Thibault, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and one of three chairpersons of the Business Drive for Jobs Committee, said that the Business Drive for Jobs "provides a catalyst for members of the business community to communicate the importance of creating private sector employment experience for students. By giving them opportunities to train and develop, students benefit--and so does the employer and the country."

The Business Drive for Jobs was also endorsed by the other chairpersons. "Hiring a student is not philanthropy," said Roger Hamel, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. "It's good business."

John Bulloch, president of the Canadian Federation of Independent Business added: "Young people must believe in the future. They must have hope of finding jobs. That's why it is important for small business to support the Business Drive for Jobs."

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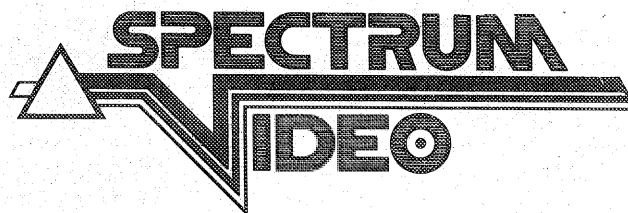

Apathy at NAIT is an old problem. It's unfortunate that the mainstream mentality at NAIT is "get your education and get the hell out of here."

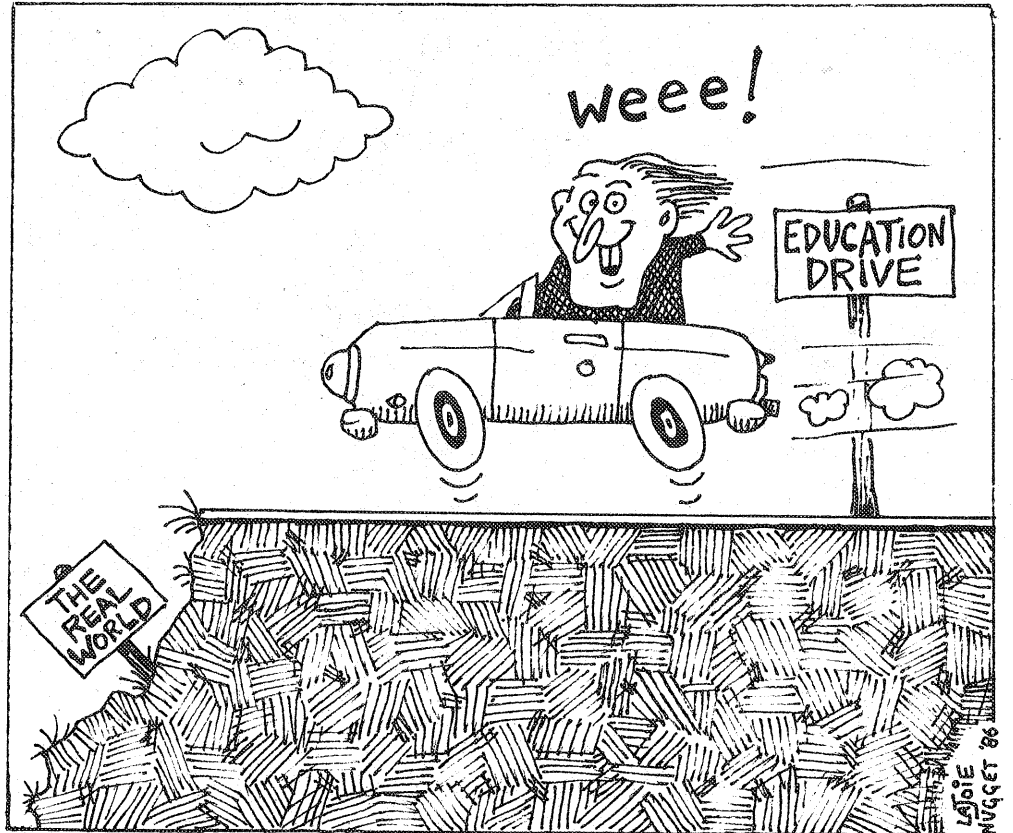
As this is the last official Nugget of the year, tradition-

## No justice for going "a bit too far"

Last Thursday May 8, a man was convicted in Edmonton Provincial Court of cruelty to animals. He was fined \$200 and sentenced to serve 21 days in jail (to be served on weekends).

Although this may appear to a few people as a fairly substantial price to pay for "kicking the dog", the offence was more serious. (This is not to say that some forms of violence directed toward animals can be regarded as less serious or acceptable. It is not.)

Robert McEwen was convicted for the cruel and sadistic treatment he inflicted on his St. Bernard pup, Max. As punishment for the puppy being a little destructive around the house and dropping excrement on the floor of McEwen's house while he was absent, McEwen tied the puppy to a

tree and forced a garden hose down the dog's throat. The dog was also beaten, kicked in the stomach, and had a bottle inserted in its rectum.

The pup was later put to sleep at the SPCA because of infection, broken ribs, severe liver damage, and cuts and bruises.

This horrific and thoroughly sickening crime is not the only crime that has occurred here. In the provincial court proceedings, the judge did not grant the prosecutor's requests that this man be prohibited from owning pets for up to two years. Instead, McEwen received the aforementioned punishment. (The maximum sentence for cruelty to animals: \$500 fine, six months in jail, and a two year prohibition from owning pets.)

As a result, he still gets to

keep his dog and cat.

Why such a shockingly lenient sentence? For a crime this atrocious, the full letter of the law must be exercised. It was not. And this, perhaps, is the greatest crime of all. The courts need to seriously review this sad absence of adequate punishment. Policy makers need to re-examine the laws regarding cruelty to animals. Ultimately, the "legal belt" needs to be tightened considerably.

There is absolutely no excuse or sufficient explanation for this man's actions. In court, McEwen would only admit he "went a bit too far" in his treatment of the dog. What a savage-like understatement, and what an unacceptable injustice to society by the courts.

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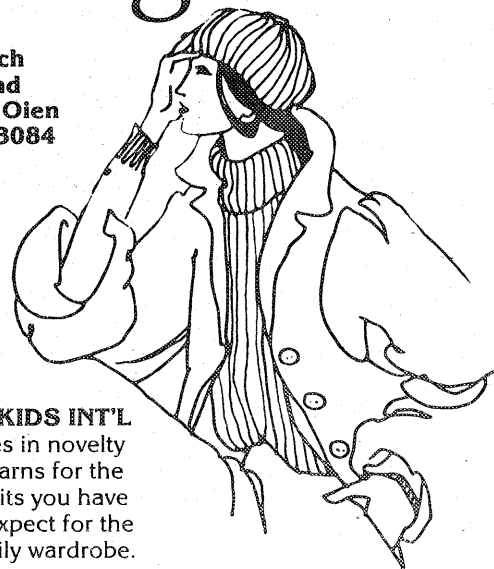
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## Of Energetic Ballplayers and Thirsty Eared People

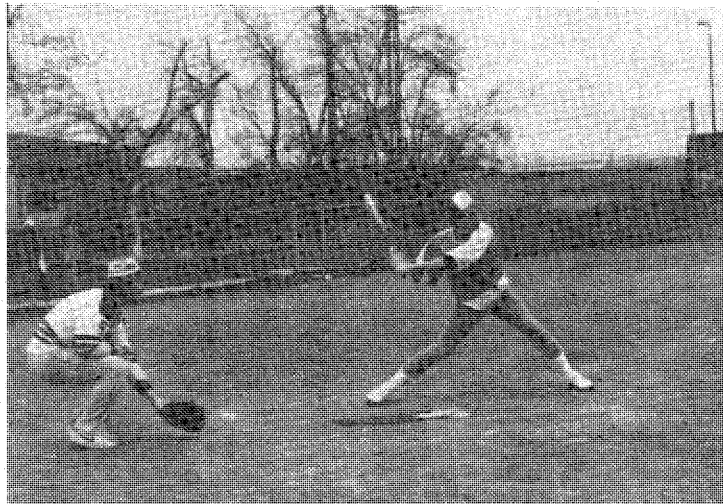
The teams that were entered were from NAIT and from a league in North Edmonton known as Lucky Eight. The NAIT teams entered were:

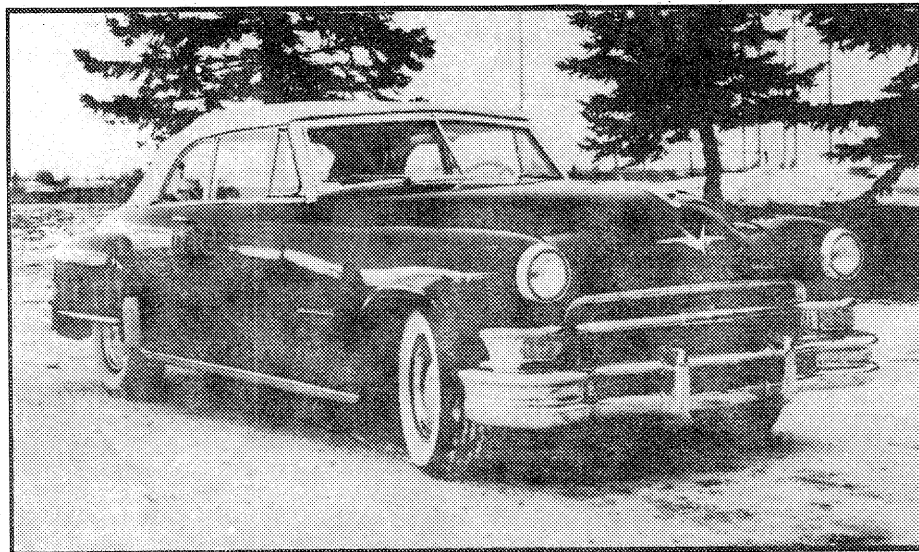

Creedence Clearwater Revival Chronicled

I recently purchased an awesome album, C.C.R.'s **CHRONICLE (THE 20 GREATEST HITS)**.

The first two songs *Suzie Q* and *I Put A Spell On You* are from their very first album which was a gold record and earned an excess of \$1 million, and in 1968 that was a great amount of money. The next two songs are both timeless hits. I'm sure everyone of us has heard J.C. Fogerty belt out *Proud Mary* and the incredible *Bad Moon Rising*. To fully understand this album and the master musicians who are responsible for it I'll relate a little history on the band.

**CREEDENCE CLEARWATER REVIVAL**, better known as C.C.R., was formed by J. C. Fogerty (lead guitar, vocals), Tom Fogerty (guitar), Stu Cook (bass), Doug Clifford (drums) in December of 1967 who had been performing together under various names since 1959.

During January of 1969, they released their second album, *Bayou Country*, and when it sold over one million copies, it earned C.C.R. their first Platinum album. In August of the same year, *Green River* was released and became quickly their second Platinum album. Just three short months later, *Willy and the Poorboys* came out and gave C.C.R. a third Platinum album. These accomplishments earned J.C. and his band the Top Singles Artists of 1969, Billboard; Trendsetter Award, Billboard; and Best American Band, Rolling Stone.

In 1970, Creedence went on their first European tour

which earned them unprecedented praise and acclaim from the European press and public. During July of that year, their fifth album and overall the most popular, *Cosmo's Factory* released, and sold over three million copies. Also in 1970, during December a little known album, *Pendulum*, was released.

Of the more than 20 major awards received, some of the more coveted were Artists of the Year Award, Music Operators of America; Top International Pop Group, New Musical Express Reader's Poll (England); and the prestigious Top Pop Group in U.S., England, Canada, Germany, France, Switzerland, Norway and Israel, *Bollboard International Poll*.

In February of 1971, the band stumbled when Tom Fogerty left to pursue a solo career. J.C. didn't let that hurt long, and in July began a major U.S. tour which led to their second European tour in October. The band slowed down after this and their last tour was C.C.R. breaking through Australia and Japan. During July of the same year, *CREEDENCE CLEARWATER REVIVAL* after three short but fully-packed years broke up.

The Chronicle is an inexpensive memory maker and awakener. There are many tunes most of us have heard before, such as *Down on the Corner*, *Who'll Stop the Rain*, *Run Through the Jungle*, and *I Heard It Through The Grapevine*.

This last song was released as an 11-minute cut on *Cosmo's Factory* and earned

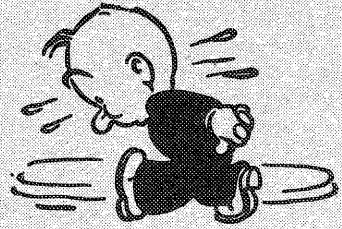
enormous airplay throughout the entire world and has become one of C.C.R.'s greatest hits. There are also a few I'm sure many music and Creedence fans haven't heard. A couple that have really attracted my attention such as *Sweet Hitch-Hiker*, and *Commotion*.

Few bands go as far as C.C.R. did even once, and especially not that rapidly. Single by single, they sang their piece and got their music and message out. Because of the near total absence of gimmicks in C.C.R.'s music and publicity, their records stand up for today far better than much of the other music recorded at the time.

Creedence believed that the music they made would always sound different from whatever else was in fashion at the time, whatever time that might be. They were right: some of their hits literally define Rock & Roll. Were *Travellin' Band* on the radio today, it would jump right off it, something else entirely, just as it did seven years. Like the other nineteen tracks on *Chronicle*, it is pure, unadulterated rock and roll. There hasn't been much of that around lately, and it certainly is collected together in this double album. I cannot remember when I have spent sixteen bucks so well, especially in this musically trash-ridden society of today. I strongly recommend this anthology to anyone who enjoys real rock and roll.

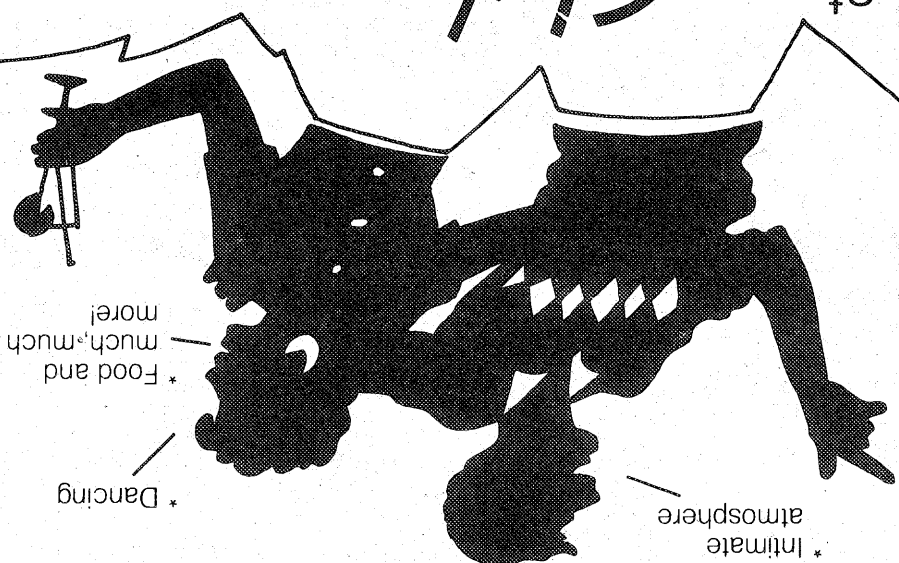
