





## STUDENTS RIPPED-OFF AT BEERFEST

There are two major student events each academic year. Each one is heavily anticipated. This year, these two major events have been major disasters. The two 1985-86 NAITSA Beerfests have been failures, manifesting a shocking lack of consideration for students' enjoyment.

In September, NAITSA booked a declining, boring band by the name of Harlequin (now playing in the Beverly Crest Hotel and other similar "respectable" venues). Most people complained about the choice of bands, citing the cost of the tickets in comparison to the level of entertainment as an inequitable trade-off to say the least. But students were optimistic. They knew there was one more Beerfest that a large amount of student funds were invested in to ensure a first rate event for all students. The May Beerfest had always been known as the big event of the entire year. Last year, more than 2000 students jammed into the Convention Centre to bop to Doug and the Slugs (a fantastic party band for all musical tastes).

This year, ticket sales lagged. Only 1400 students purchased tickets (at \$10 each) and saw three bands that were as talented as any mediocre bar band you could see for a four dollar cover charge. They were not major names, they were not bands that catered to all tastes, they were not polished, professional entertainers, they were plain nobodies. But the bands were not the only disappointment. Many students also complained about long breaks between bands, unorganized bar service, no food and high liquor prices.

In sum, the May Beerfest '86 was a flop. Students were ripped off by inferior entertainment and poor service. Their scarce monies were thrown down the tube. And no one else but the 1985-86 NAITSA Executive can be blamed. Their utter lack of in thoroughly planning an event for all students to fully enjoy are inexcusable. The May Beerfest is The Big Event of the year, but it can only become the big event through adequate planning. NAIT students did not get this from their NAITSA Executive. Instead, they got a half-assed, second rate cabaret.

NAITSA made the naive assumption that students are not conscious of quality entertainment and value for their dollar. They assumed anything thrown together and called "Beerfest '86" would sell like hotcakes. They were wrong. Students are not that dumb. Most people were very disappointed with the May Beerfest (ticket sales proved this). Especially when last May's event was such a phenomenal entertainment success.

Why wasn't this considered by NAITSA? Perhaps their pet project, the ACTI SEC Leadership Conference, drew time and effort away from the all-important May Beerfest. Granted, the Leadership Conference was a first class event, but it was only taken in by the 200 people or so who could afford the price tag (\$75). What about the concern, and incompetence thousands who anxiously looked forward to Beerfest? Their voices were not heard. For the most part, their requests fell on deaf ears. The Executive operated in a closeminded vacuum. Hopefully, the 1986-87 Executive will learn from the '85-86 Executive's blunder. Students should never allow this kind of rip-off again.

# Student Lounge to be Completed for November 1.

Plans for Plaza II Student Lounge are wellunderway, according to architect Norbert Lemermeyer. Mr. Lemermeyer, head architect, indicates that the project will begin construction June 1, 1986 and completion date is expected for November 1, 1986.

In order to complete the \$275,000 lounge, NAITSA has provided \$75,000 from its building fund. The remaining \$200,000 will be provided by NAIT and the Provincial Government.

Other parties playing a significant role in the construction of the Student Lounge are:

According to Mr. Lemermeyer, the new lounge will accommodate etween 250 and 300 students. The area of construction, located at the loading docks, will encompass 3610 square feet and include: hard seating with tables, soft seating, mezzanine, two televisions, stage and conversation pit.

# Plans Come Alive for New Student Lounge

Spring seems to be a time for a multitude of activities, especially ones involving changes. One of the major changes occurring this Spring at NAIT is the construction of a new student lounge at Plaza Two. This is not just a minor change that is taking place, but a major one that is beneficial to any student attending classes at Plaza Two.

Some people may feel that another student lounge is an expenditure that is unnecessary and will not be of any benefit to Main Campus students. This may be due to the fact that a majority of the student population is attending classes at Main Campus. However, the facts do indicate that there is a need for a Student Lounge at Plaza Two.

Presently, Plaza Two has only a few facilities to offer students. These facilities include: a small library with a seating capacity of approximately 40-50 students, the B.C.E.T. study lounge with the capacity for 30, a vending machine lounge that has six tables, two designated areas in the building (smaller than the average classroom) with plastic chairs, and a cafeteria smaller than the one at Main Campus.

With five technologies housed at Plaza Two and a variety of other technologies using Plaza Two on a daily basis, the need for a student lounge is very evident.

Drawing a comparison to Main Campus, Plaza Two does not have facilities that even come close. Main Campus students enjoy a multitude of facilities on a daily basis, in particular two cafeterias, a library, the Tower Lounge and the Naitrium.

For a Plaza Two student to enjoy Main Campus facilities, a walk (rain or shine) is required.

Sympathy is not the answer to Plaza Two's student needs, the new lounge is. After all, is it not only fair for fellow NAIT students to enjoy a sought after luxury that is long overdue?





Edmonton's own NEO A4 has gained a lot of critical acclaim since they formed four years ago. They've also won themselves some popular appeal in and around our fine city.

NEO A4 is Ric Johnston on guitar and vocals; Joel Anderson, drums and vocals; and John Tidswell on bass, keyboards, stick and vocals. Together they have put together the album The Warmer Side of You which, while not without some flaws, is a pretty decent work.

On the whole, it's a warm, pleasant album that show-cases well the surprisingly professional talents of these three young men. The album has a Phillip Glass kind of "minimalist" feel to it, and

while several different noises and instruments are used, none ever seem to be competing with each other. Add to this the competent songwriting and outstanding musicianship, and you have a rich mixture of varied textures and styles.

Lyrically, the band could use a little more maturity. I don't think that there is anything really silly or irrelevant in the lyrics, but then again there doesn't seem to be anything new and inspiring in them either. By this I mean that the band seems to rework some age-old cliches at times. Still, the subject matter is dealt with appropriately and tastefully - not your traditional club music slop are these boys.

Another area in which we might see a little improvement is the vocal department. The vocals never seem to really take off and fly. Only in the title cut do we get a little emotion and energy otherwise, the mood is essentially the same throughout the record.

Overall, The Warmer Side of You is a great effort by our local musicians. It shouldn't be long before a major label signs them up.

Think about it.



In 1983, Cinderella debuted as the Alberta Ballet Company's longest three act ballet. ## "Group of Seven" artist's later work opens at the Edmonton Art Gallery

A challenging new perspective on the work of Group of Seven artist Arthur Lismer is presented in an exhibition showing at The Edmonton Art Gallery April 26 through June 8. Canadian Jungle: The Later Work of Arthur Lismer, organized for the Art Gallery of Ontario by Denuis Reid, is the first examination of the post-Group of Seven work of this well-known Canadian painter.

The Group of Seven's tremendous success during the late '20s and early '30s has overshadowed the subsequent artistic achievements of Lismer and other members. This exhibition demonstrates that Lismer's works, many of which have never been exhibited before, form the crowning achievement of the artist's career

Canadian Jungle focuses on the development of Lismer's art alongside his activities as an Important art teacher. It shows how during the '40s - affected by concerns of art education - he concentrated his attention on the formal values in art. Listner worked out these concerns in a series of small, intense paintings with themes he found while on heliday on the two coasts of Canada. His discovery of the great rain forest of the Pacific coast resulted in a highly expressive body of work during the '50s.

Organized and circulated nationally by the AGO, Canadian Jungle: The Later Work of Arthur Lismer is made possible by a generous grant from the Chemical Bank of Canada and the Museums Assistance Programmes of the National Museums of Canada Anachibition catalogue accompanies the show and will be available at the EAG's Gailery Shop.


## Les Ballets Jazz de Montreal at the Arden Theatre


The Arden Theatre will host the internationally acclaimed Les Ballets Jazz de Montreal for one performance only on Saturday, May 10 at 8 p.m.
