





General Council Meeting

It was a meeting for those who like to see a husband and wife fight, or for those who are upcoming politicians wishing to learn how to talk in circles for hours

But first, some old business. NAIT's constitution is now with the lawyers for review at the Business Offices and NAITSA is hoping to have it by the next council meeting on November 18, 1986. It will take approximately three meetings and a 70% majority in a vote. Extensions of computer facilities and institute hours for weekends will be hopefully reviewed in the next few weeks. And to everyone's amazement, Respiratory finally showed up to accept the Shinerama Trophy for raising the most funds during the Shinerama campaign. Mark Grubisich happily handed over the trophy that has been sitting in his office for approximately one month.

Elections for the position of Activities Chairperson took place after each candidate gave a quick speech on why they felt they were the best person for the position. Election votes were tabulated after the meeting and it was motioned for a verifier to be nominated to observe the ballot counting. Gary Dusenberger (Telecom) was nominated for the job.

Now for new business. NAIT has been receiving calls from management of halls concerning that certain technologies had a party at their hall and have not paid for their usage.

NAITSA was hoping to institute some sort of control so that if this happens, the responsible parties would pay the debts owed. NAITSA is worried about these outstanding debts for three reasons:

1) The calls of complaints being received by NAIT administration, such as Dr. Souch.

Therefore he may cancel the privilege for any technology to hold a cabaret.

2) This years graduating class could have a big party at the end of the year, leaving next years executive debt ridden.

3) The idea of halls not being paid for may not only give a technology a bad name but NAIT as a whole and therefore certain halls may not rent out their facilities to any NAIT technology.

NAITSA feels that the responsibility for the unpaid bills is up to the technology in question and not to NAIT as a whole. Their policy has been that NAITSA will not approve a Cabaret for a technology with an outstanding debt unless the Cabaret is being put on to rid the technology of their debt.

From this point on for approximately an hour the Earth Resources and Hydrocarbon technologies discussed with NAITSA about what happened to them this year. Earth Resources was involved in such a situation. The people involved were dismissed from NAIT, yet during their stay left unpaid bills. Materials then motioned that if the hall clears a technology of a debt (such as the case with ER) and then

proceeds to take legal action on the people who signed the contract then so should NAITSA, and allow that technology the privilege to have Cabarets. This motion met heated discussion from both supporters and opposition. Later the motion was defeated in a close vote much to the discontent of ERT and HET.

Mark Grubisich, in response to the discussion, motioned that NAITSA continue its present and past policy that if a technology has an outstanding debt, NAITSA will only approve a Cabaret for that technology if the money made would be used to pay off the debt. This motion was then taken to a vote and passed with an outstanding majority.

A couple of final notes, there is an open position on the Academic Council. This position requires one Monday a month of time from a student between the hours of 11:15 to 1:15 of that day. If anyone wishes any further information, they are asked to contact Chris Rienert (NAITSA President). And for all of us at Plaza Two, the official opening of our new, wonderful, colorful Lounge is December 10, 1986. Lets hope we get our TV and Satellite Dish before then.



A Canticle For Leibowitz

"A Canticle For Leibowitz" is a play set after a nuclear war. It shows how ignorance leads to superstition, the fear people have of change (rightfully so, sometimes), the conflict between science and religion, the conflict between medicine and religion, and how giving people more knowledge than they are ready for is dangerous.

This might sound too serious to be appealing but it isn't. There are some very humorous scenes and some very dramatic ones. The music was very carefully chosen to add to the mood of the scene, and the costumes, makeup and special effects were very well done. The play revolves around

an Abbey in the desert between Denver and Tex-Arcana. There is an orphanage for the children who were born deformed by the radiation, but who could be the future of the human race. For centuries, the Monks copy all the information they can obtain from the pre-war period. Eventually, a scientist starts using the information, and history is being repeated. The question is HAVE PEOPLE LEARNED FROM THE MISTAKES OF THE PAST? See it and find out.

The Chicks open their sea-







With the man advantage, Don Simpson found the net at 2:07 of the second on a play with Murray Melnyk and Mike Tookey. Daryl Shudra gave the OOKs a 4-1 lead with a powerplay marker at the 9:27 mark. Rick Chauvette and Mike Tookey collected assists. Mike Tookey then finished the second period scoring with an unassisted marker eight minutes and 36 seconds later.

The NAIT OOKs directed 51 shots at SAIT netminder Rob Nichols. At the opposite end, Kevin Stapleton was tested 26 times.

Sunday, November 9th - NAIT OOKs 3, SAIT Trojans 2 at the NAIT Arena. The NAIT OOKs completed a series sweep of the SAIT Trojans with a 3-2 win at the NAIT Arena on Sunday Afternoon. The victory was not an easy one for NAIT as the Trojans controlled a fair portion of the play.


