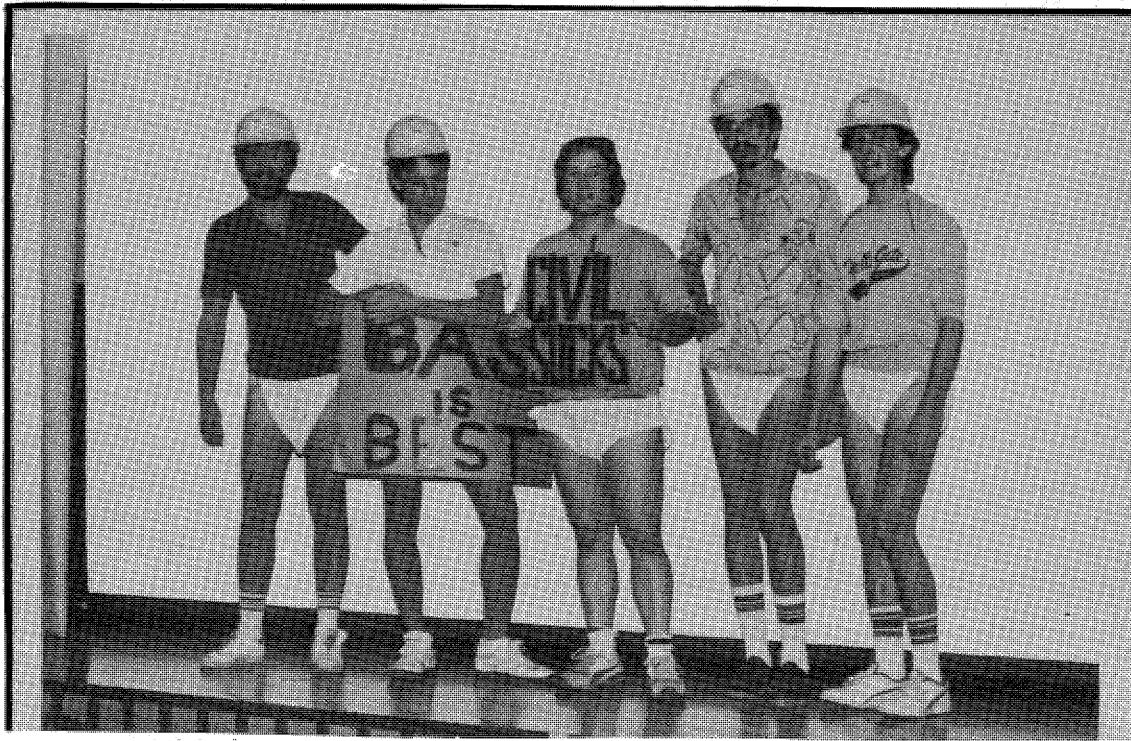

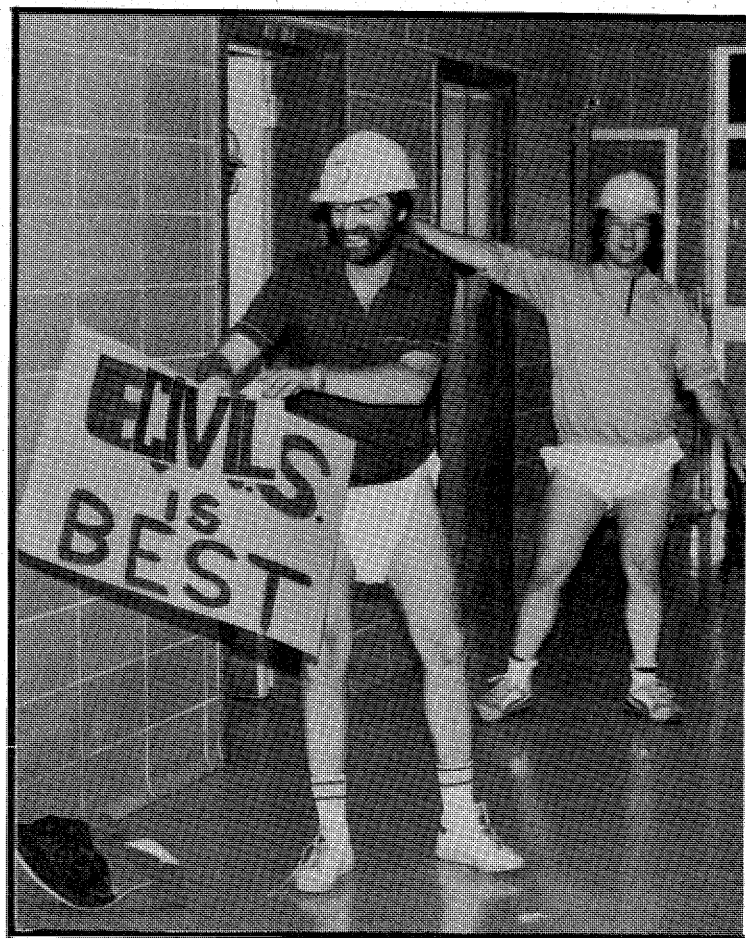

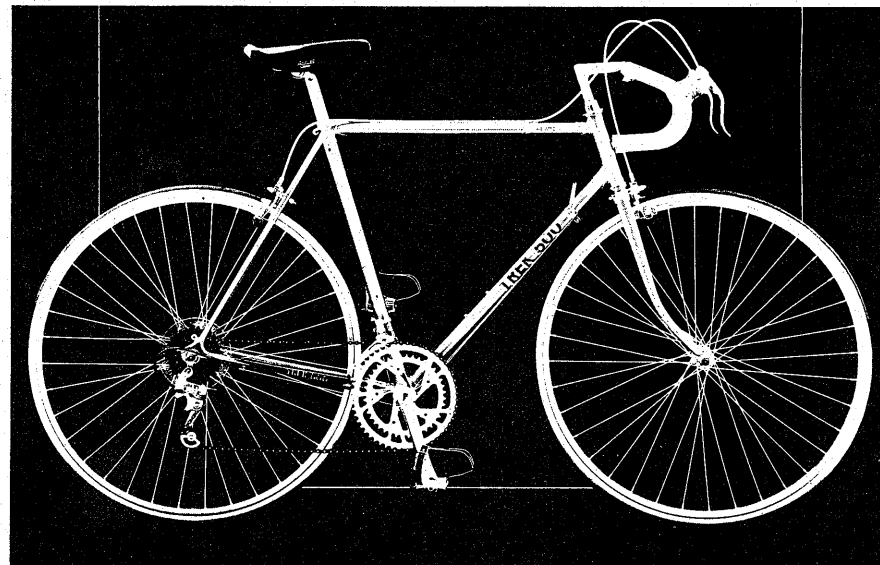
DID YOU KNOW?


WASN'T THAT A PARTY!!!

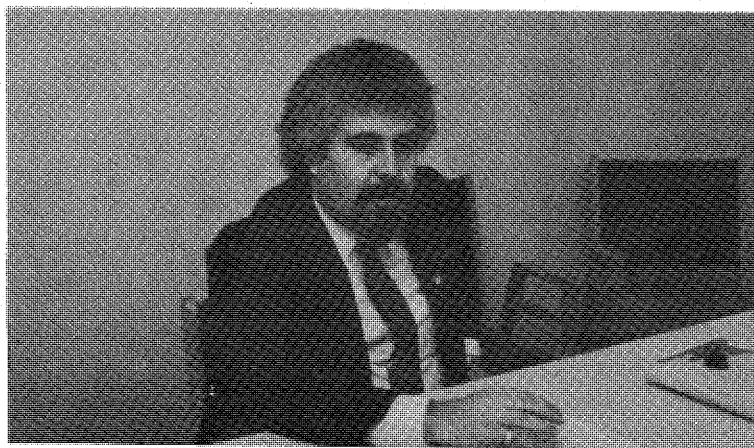

THE WORLD CALLS TO YOU

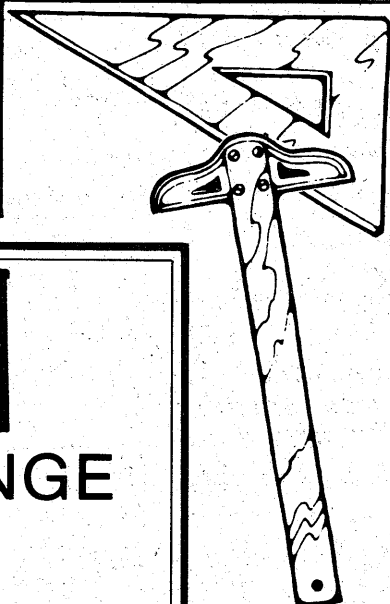
How would you like to experience the thrill of seeing the great cities of the world? Well you can; the Students Work Abroad Program (SWAP) can do just that.

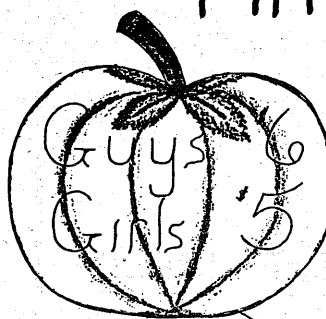

In semi-final action the OOKS were faced with the challenge of upsetting the conference winners, SAIT. The OOKS were eliminated in two games and SAIT went on to be Canada's College National Champions. Confident they will improve on last years fourth place finish, the OOKS set their sights on the conference crown. To capture the conference limelight from SAIT, the OOKS will have to focus in on two of their strongest assets, speed and height. Taking a look at the depth on the team at guard are:

Travis Helghington- finished in the top 10 in scoring at 15.2 pts/game.

Mike who is in his 4th yr with the OOKS will bring leadership to the rookies on the team. He also has a good shooting touch from the perimeter.

Kirk Jones

Hometown: Edmonton, Alberta; Height 6'1"

This is Kirk's 1st yr with the OOKS, he last year played in Scarborough, Ont. for W.A. Porter. He is a very flashy type player with great leaping ability and quickness. He will add an extra dimension to the OOKS backcourt.

Chris Nielson

Hometown: Edmonton, Alberta; Height 6'1"

Chris is another 1st yr OOK with quickness and a good shooting eye. He will help open the middle with his outside shooting. Very good on the defensive end of the floor.

Andy Lawrence

Hometown: Calgary, Alberta; Height 6'0"

Andy is also in his 1st yr with the OOKS. Lawrence is a very physical type player who likes to bang the boards. He is an excellent defensive and offensive rebounder.

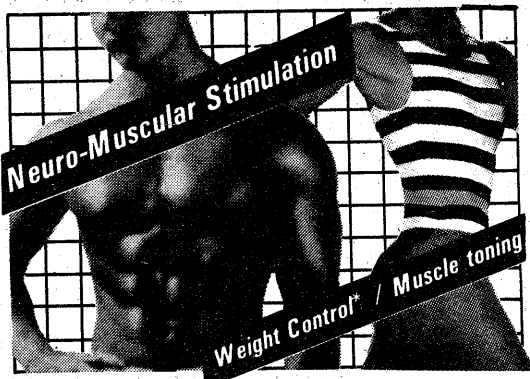

Did you ever wonder what happened to your suggestions? Bet you thought the boxes were emptied once a month and the suggestions discarded. Not so, your suggestions and comments written on the "happy face" pads are used to help the Library decide what changes or improvements to make.

Oh sure, you say, well then how come my suggestion was never adopted? Reasons vary but all suggestions are read and carefully considered. Following is the Library's response to some commonly expressed concerns that you may think have escaped our notice.

Longer Hours: Why isn't the Library open longer hours? The Library's response to this question was to survey library users to see how common a concern this was. Six hundred questionnaires were distributed at various times over a one week period. Four hundred were returned. Since budgetary constraints do not permit an increase in the total hours of library operation students were asked to choose one of four feasible alternatives. The choices provided

ed were longer weekend hours with reduced evening service (2 options), longer Friday hours with reduced evening service on other evenings (1 option) or existing hours. The "existing hours option" was chosen by the largest number of respondents by a significant margin; 492 as opposed to 202 for the next most favored option.

Noise: Noise in the Library also draws comments. The fact is some like it quiet and some don't. We try to satisfy all your needs by providing a full spectrum of study space, from the very quiet in the Quiet Room to group study areas where talking is fully permitted and in fact encouraged. Libraries change with demands. Several years ago when all our areas were quiet we received many requests for group study space. In response to this expressed need we added large tables for group study and rearranged our carrel grouping to provide the most variety possible. Libraries with tomb-like

atmospheres are a thing of the past. As in any environment where people are working, you will find the normal noise of human interaction.

Automation: Why is the Library not automated? Don't we realize this is the twentieth century? Don't we know how time consuming it is to fill out little pieces of paper for every item you want to borrow? Of course we do. We have to file them. Library staff probably want to be automated more than anyone and we are lobbying hard for funding. While we wait we are cleaning up internal records so that when the opportunity comes we will be ready. Your support is welcome. Make your feelings known.

Photocopiers: Photocopiers do break down. Quite often this happens at peak times when they are receiving the most use. Staff place a service call immediately when they are informed that the photocopier is not working. Follow up calls are made if we receive no response. Other than that all we can do is refer you to other areas in the Institute where photocopiers are available.

What about the price of copying? Well, you can always buy a large volume copy card. The ten dollar copy card reduces the price of copying from fifteen cents to only ten cents a page.

Plaza Two: Why are Plaza Two books placed in the Main Library? The truth is they are not Plaza Two

books. Books ordered by Plaza Two instructors are sent there. However many programs such as Civil Engineering and Materials Engineering, and Building Construction and the Construction Department have overlapping subject areas. As a result students will find books on the subjects taught in these programs in both Plaza Two and in the Main Library.

So you see, we do read your suggestions. Keep them coming. We are listening.

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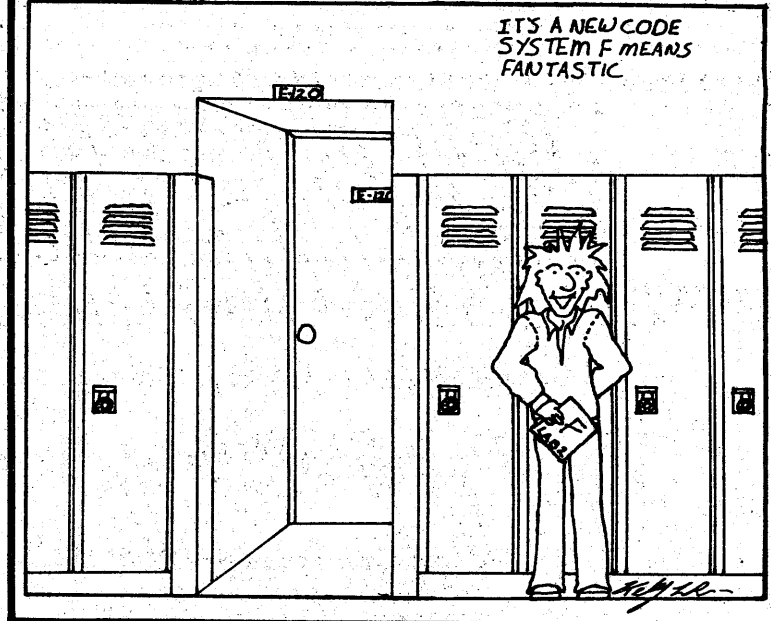

Artificial Intelligence

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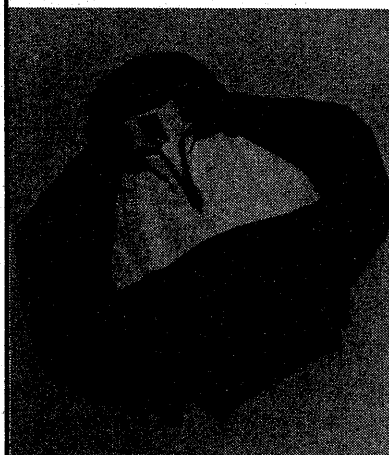

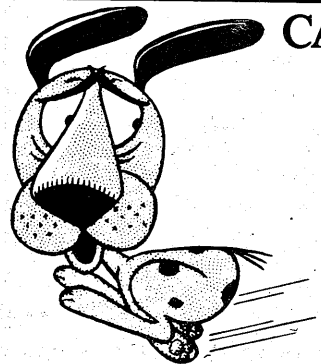
