
part of the world.



educational institutions are planning will help students in deciding which career path to follow.



Did you ever wonder what happened to your suggestions? Bet you thought the boxes were emptied once a month and the suggestions ed were longer weekend discarded. Not so, your suggestions and comments written on the "happy face" pads are used to help the Library decide what changes or improvements to make.

then how come my suggestion was never adopted? Reasons vary but all suggestions are read and carefully considered. Followis the Library's Noise: Noise in the Library response to some commonescaped our notice.

Longer Hours: Why isn't the Library open longer hours? The Library's response to this question was to survey library users to see how common a concern this was. Six hundred questionares were distributed at various times over a one week period. Four hundred were returned. Since budgetary constraints do not permit an increase in the total hours of library operation students were asked to choose one of four feasible alternatives. The choices provid-

hours with reduced evening service (2 options), longer Friday hours with reduced evening service on other evenings (1 option) or existing hours. The "existing hours option" Oh sure, you say, well was chosen by the largest number of respondents by a significant margin; 492 as opposed to 202 for the next most favored option.

also draws comments. The ly expressed concerns that fact is some like it quiet may think have and some don't. We try to satisfy all your needs by providing a full spectrum of study space, from the very quiet in the Quiet Room to group study areas where talking is fully permitted and in fact encouraged. Libraries change with demands. Several years ago when all our areas were quiet we received many requests for group study space. In response to this expressed need we added large tables for group study and rearranged carrel grouping to provide the most variety possible. Libraries with tomb-like atmospheres are a thing of the past. As in any enviorment where people are working, you will find the normal noise of human interaction.

Automation: Why is the Library not automated? Don't we realize this is the twentieth century? Don't we know how consuming it is to fill out little pieces of paper for every item you want to borrow? Of course we do. We have to file them. Library staff probably want to be automated more than anyone and we are lobbying hard for funding. While we wait we are cleaning up internal records so that when the opportunity comes we will be ready. Your support is welcome. Make your feelings known.

Photocopiers: Photocopiers do break down. Quite often this happens at peak times when they are receiving the most use. Staff place a service call immediately when they are informed that the photocopier is not working. Follow up calls are made if we receive no response. Other than that all we can do is refer you to other areas in the Institute where photocopiers are available.

What about the price of copying? Well, you can always buy a large volume copy card. The ten dollar copy card reduces the price of copying from fifteen cents to only ten cents a page.

Plaza Two: Why are Plaza Two books placed in the Main Library? The truth is they are not Plaza Two

books. Books ordered by Plaza Two instructors are sent there. CHALLENGE CUP CONTEST RULES


- 1. The purpose of the Challenge Cup is to play up novelty events for everyone to enjoy (watching or participating).




