

A Perturbed Parker



In response to the article "Urges Controls" from "The Edmonton Sun, Wednesday Aug. 27, 1986". The column stated that Canada must hang on to its tough handgun regulations. This warning came to the Canadian Asso-ciation of Chiefs of Police from Minneapolis police chief Tony Bouza. (Last year 20 000 Americans came to an end as a result of handgun shootings.) The article listed the requirement of a local police permit to own a rifle or shotgun for hunting, while the ownership of handguns requires a permit from the R.C.M.P. which strictly limits who can carry the gun and where.

This is all very nice, but what the article fails to state is that the only prerequisite for these permits is that the applicant not have a criminal record. Many people believe this procedure should have a cool down period. The way the permit system is now, if a person does all the

pavement pounding involved, they can decide to buy in the morning and have a handgun by the afternoon of the same day. (Note that no formal safety training is required) Worst of all is that in Canada you may purchase a hand-gun mail order, only a fool could call these "tough restrictions'

Many try to justify the purchase of a handgun as home security. What the experts say is, for home security a much more practical solution is a shotgun or even better, a dog. The facts are, a handgun purchased for home protection is more likely to cause accidental injury to the ones it was meant to protect. (Last year in the United States, more than a child a day died from a handgun related accidental shooting.)

A new day has been ushered in. On Thursday, October 16 the staff and students of x-ray technology received an early Christmas present. It was on that day that the NAIT Foundation handed over to the x-ray department, a brand new portable x-ray machine.

The Mobile x-ray unit is a high power and high quality machine that allows the unit to come to the patient. This state of the art machine will allow the staff and students of NAIT's x-ray technology to teach and learn the tools of their trade on a high technology machine.

The machine itself was presented to Program Head Stan Rard in a rather informal ceremony. The NAIT Foundation Chief Administrator, Bill McCallum, mentioned that the machines funding was raised through a car raffle that actually began over a year ago. He then, subsequently turned the floor over to the Foundation Chairman Ron Hodgson who with the words,"Good luck and good x-raying", formally turned the x-ray unit over to the staff and students of NAIT. Thank you, it will be put to good use.

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

The NAIT Hockey Ooks are preparing to start the ACAC hockey season of 1986-87. The Ooks are the defending ACAC and CCAA (National) Champions and will have a long, hard road in front of themselves if they want to repeat their success of the past two seasons. NAIT finished the exhibition schedule with a record of 6 wins, 4 losses, and 1 tie.

The highlight of the preseason occurred at the ACAC Pre-season Tournament in Camrose when a number of teams proved that they will be vying for a playoff spot. All teams in the league have recruited new talent paving the way for a very competitive and interesting season. The 1986-87 season will probably be remembered for its surprises when it is finished. The surprises may start this weekend when the season gets underway.

The Ooks opened training camp with 85 individuals. Heading into this weekend, NAIT coach Perry Pearn and staff have trimmed the roster to 29 players. Coach Pearn has indicated that the team will carry about 24 players this season.

The Ooks started the exhibition season with a 9-4 triumph over the Saint Albert Saints of the Alberta Junior Hockey League. NAIT and arch rival Camrose Lutheran College fought to a 6-6 draw on Fri., September 26th. NAIT then travelled to Saskatoon for the University of Saskatchewan Huskies' Invitation Tournament. At the tourney held between October 3rd and 5th the Ooks wound up with a one and two record. The Ooks scored a 7-6 victory over the host Huskies, but they also lost a pair. The Ooks dropped a 5-2 decision to the U of A Golden Bears and were on the short end of a 2-1 score to the University of Manitoba Bisons. The Ooks then gained revenge over the Bears with a 10-9 victory at Varsity Arena on October 10th.

On the weekend of October 17th and 18th, the Ooks swept a two game set from the Red Deer College Kings. On Friday, the Ooks squeaked by the Kings 7-6 in overtime at the NAIT Arena. NAIT then rebounded for a 5-2 victory on Saturday night in Red Deer.

The Ooks started off their final weekend of the exhibition season on a promising note downing the Seneca College Braves 5-2 at the NAIT Arena on Thursday,

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October 23rd. At the ACAC Pre-season Tournament in Camrose, the Medicine Hat Rattlers upset the lacklustre Ooks 8-7 in overtime on Friday the 24th. On Saturday, NAIT permitted the SAIT Trojans to score four first period goals, and the Trojans held on for a 7-6 triumph. The NAIT Hockey Ooks open up the regular season against the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings in a home-and-home series. The Ooks entertain the Vikings at the NAIT Arena on October 31st, at 7:30 p.m. NAIT then travels to Camrose on Saturday November 1st for the rematch starting at 8:00 p.m..

ON THE BENCH: NAIT hockey coach Perry Pearn is in his ninth season behind the Ooks bench. The assistant coaches for the 1986-87 season are Rick Carrierre, John Phelan, and Darrell Bokenfohr . . . The ACAC hockey schedule for this year is a bit different than those in past years with more back-to-back matchups. Ten times in the season NAIT will play the same team twice in a row. Each team in the ACAC will play 25 games . . . Six teams will be competing in ACAC hockey

this year: the NAIT Ooks, the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings, the Red Deer College Kings, the SAIT Trojans, the Mount Royal College Cougars, and the Medicine Hat College Rattlers. The 1986-87 Canadian College Athletic Association (National) Hockey Championships will be held in Camrose from March 25th through 28th, 1987.



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
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
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# Dr. Bob
