



A LITTLE ELBOW GREASE IN THE SHINE



FROM THE STUDENTS

UNFAIR, UNJUST, AND JUST NOT FAIR.

With feelings akin to those of the dissatisfied customer in Monty Python's famous "Parrot Sketch", "I would like to register... a complaint!"

Sadly, my complaint is not a comedic one. My complaint is one that concerns the performance of certain faculty staff who shall remain nameless but not blameless. As a second year Business student who has one year's educational background at the U of A, I feel qualified to speak out on this topic. I have had excellent instructors and I have had poor instructors but never have I had instructors that have made me feel so frustrated and angry as some of this year's "crop".

This is not to say that all of my instructors are incompetent.Far from it. NAIT houses some of the most dynamic, interesting and qualified instructors I have had the pleasure to study under. The fact remains, however, that some people on the payroll simply are not fit to teach. Some are new and lack the experience and supervision. Their techniques and capabilities may improve with time but some of the violators have been here for years. How many students have suffered under themand gained little but the knowledge that life is not fair?

So what exactly am I getting at? I'm trying to bring to attention the fact that there are instructors here who admittedly know almost nothing more about the subject they teach than the students in their classrooms. I'm saying that there are instructors here who enter the classroom not knowing exactly what they are going to teach that day but are so adept at putting the class to sleep that the students hardly notice. I'm saying that there are instructors here who re-teach last day's lessons and don't get as far the second time as they did the first ! I'm saying that there are instructors who ask questions of their class, consistently shoot down

any succinct answer, rephrase it into an unintelligible pool of sludge and drool which, if distilled, boils down to the very answer proposed by the student who will never make the mistake of speaking out in that class again.

I could continue, I could go on and on and on and on and not really accomplish anything; much like some of the indicated instructors. I won't do that. I think you will get my point and my point is: why should we have to pay for, listen to, and rely on persons who cannot perform their duties? Why should we have to suffer the extra burden of teaching ourselves course and gain only the privilege of writing exams and working on assignments which will be graded by the very people we cannot stand to listen to in class? I'll tell you why. It is because life is not fair. Life may not be fair but is does allow for a certain amount of justice. My cause may not be pretty but I believe my cause to be just. I propose a possible solution to the problem at hand. Although we may not benefit from it's outcome in the brief time that we are here at NAIT, perhaps the students who follow us in the years to come will appreciate the effort. I propose that we be allowed to

candidly evaluate the performance of our instructors at the end of each semester, much like those students in the continuing education division are allowed to evaluate theirs. I propose that evaluation documents be made available to students prior to final exams, that these documents be submitted not to the instructors but to an independent agency (perhaps the Board of Governors) who will quantify the results and pass them on to persons with the power to hire and fire these people. Termination may not be necessary; reform most certainly is.

So you are not actually losing anything in the overall picture, and may actually be gaining.


NAIT has many benefits, I would like to hear from you first year students why you chose NAIT over he other schools.

LABOUR CANADA

In a recent information release by Labour Canada, they stated that during the summer of 1985, the federal government commissioned Hay Management Consultants to survey and prepare a report on part-time employment in federally regulated industries.

Their findings show that between 1983 and 1985 the growth in part-time employment exceeded that of full-time employment. Further findings indicate that part-time employees have to cope with fewer advancement opportunities, fewer fringe benefits and lower wages than their full-time counterparts, yet are seen by employers as being equally productive.

The study covered almost 2000 companies employing half a million people, and has been published by the Publication Division of Labour Canada. The study itself supplies many statistics dealing with part-time workers, including their salaries and the fringe benefits currently being received.

EYE OPENING EXPERIENCE IN ECUADOR

Kevin Tilroe, a first-year Electronics student at N.A.I.T. spent two months last summer working for HCJB as a technician in their World Radio's Television Department. HCJB stands for Heralding Christ Jesus' Blessings.

What HCJB does is run a missionary broadcasting organization in South America. Their program last summer involved 29 participants representing the broadcasts in 13 languages. U.S., Canada, and England Summer missionaries work in four areas - health, care, broadcasting, Spanish ministries and technical services - doing everything from producing radio programs and building antennas to answering mail and nursing in HCJB's two hospitals. Living and working in a foreign culture can prove to be a growing experience for everyone involved.

When missionaries weren't working they travelled Ecquador. One highlight of last summers expedition was HCJB World Radio, a camera shooting session in Guayaquil. Ecuadors largest city with a population of 1.5 million. Besides this trip there

were some field trips organized for the group as a whole. These included Indian Markets to a jungle hospital.

As for HCJB's religious affiliations, it is an interdenom in ation al organization concerned mainly with broadcasting and health care. HCJB's international shortwave broadcasting site is near Quito, Ecuador and Also there are two hospitals run from Ecuador, that help serve rural areas with mobile medical clinics and community development. HCJB has offices in more than 20 countries with local radio ministries in Europe, Panama, Texas and Ecuador..





Competency at this level is acheived when an individual can swim 75-100m using all strokes continuously.

5 Bronze Medallion (RLSSC)

A 2 PLE credit course, training candidates to respond effectively in a variety of aqautic emergencies through

developed swim skill. fitness and judgement to effect rescues. Bars to this award may be taken by seeing the instructor prior to the exam scoring. Those wishing to challenge the exam must pay an exam fee to RLSSC.

6 Bronze Cross (RLSSC)

A 2 PLE credit course, training candidates to extend their capacity to respond in a variety of aquatic emergencies clearly focusing on the difference between life saving and life guarding. Bars to this award may be taken by seeing the instructor prior to the exam screening. Those wishing to challenge the exam must pay an exam fee to RLSSC.


NAIT vs Lethbridge

CANADA Leads CF Research

Dr. Lap-Chee Tsui and Dr. Manuel Buchwald of Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children and a team of scientists from Collaborative Research Inc. of Boston, headed by Dr. Helen Donis-Keller, have announced a significant breakthrough in the search for the gene causing cystic fibrosis.

Using a procedure called DNA linkage analysis, these investigators have been able to narrow down the search for the CF gene to less than 1/ of all the genetic material present in body cells. Until now, scientists have had few clues with which to track down the elusive gene. This breakthrough will facilitate the eventual development of accurate diagnostic tests for carriers of the CF gene. So far none exists. "I'm very happy to hear about this important

breakthrough in CF research", announced Mrs. Mila Mulrony, Honorary Chairperson of the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. "I'm especially happy for the courageous young people and their families who are battling cystic fibrosis and who have been given hope by this discovery. But until we finally have a cure, I hope that Canadians will continue to support CF research generously."

In their study leading to the finding, Dr. Buchwald and Tsui analyzed blood samples taken from 54 families across Canada who have at least two children with cystic fibrosis. Local CF Clinics in St. John's, Halifax, Chicoutimi, Toronto, Kitchener-Waterloo, Regina, Saskatoon and Edmonton cooperated in the project.

"We're proud of the role played by Canadians in making this achievement possible," said Cathleen Morrison, Executive Director of the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. "It's been a collaborative effort all along involving not only the scientists and families, but also individual donors, volunteer leaders and service clubs like the Kinsmen and Kinettes."

The Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has supported Dr. Buchwald since 1975 and Dr. Tsui since 1981, and has invested half a million dollars in their current work in cell culture and molecular biology which led to their finding.

"We're delighted to have backed this research," declared Ian Thompson, National President of the

CCFF. "There is still a way to go before we pinpoint the cause of cystic fibrosis and find an effective control for it. But this is a very important step forward and it shows that our investment in research is paying off."

Cystic fibrosis, a geneticallytransmitted incurable disorder affecting the lungs and digestive system, takes the lives of more Canadian children than any other inherited disease. Approximately one in every 2000 children born in Canada has cystic fibrosis. However, 28/2 of all persons receiving treatment in Canada's 28 CF Clinics are now 18 years or older. In fact the proportion of children born with CF now reaching their adult years is currently higher in Canada than in any other country.

65 Roses

At the conference I viewed a film entitled 65 Roses, that would find a soft spot in anyones heart. In the film I was introduced to a young brother and sister, both CF patients.

The title of the film came from the young girls inability to say the words Cystic Fibrosis. Instead she said 65 Roses. As a result, her father

bought her the same number of roses as her age each year on her birthday.

We followed the girl from childhood to her 25th birthday, at which time we saw her graduate from nursing school and pick up her uniform. She was given 25 roses but died one week later.

She never had the chance to wear her uniform or work at the carrer she studied so hard for.

This film paints a far too clear picture of how important events like Shinerama are. On October 4,1986, come be a Shiner and help give a child the breath of life.




