Just a reminder to those who applied for a parking spot. The acceptance list will be posted on September 15, 1986 at three different spots around N.A.I.T. The lists will be posted in the South Entrance in Plaza II, in Westwood Campus, and in the South Lobby on Main Campus.

If your application is accepted you will be required to pay for the entire year of your program for parking. The amount will depend upon the length of your program and the lot you have been accepted for. Fees may be paid at the Cashier's Office (room 114) at which time your permit will be handed over to

you, also present your ID card. However, you must remember to pay for your permit before 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, September 17 or else it will be cancelled.

Any student who wished to appeal his/her acceptance has until Sept. 17 to do so. Appeals must be in written form and include your name, technology, student number, and explanation as to why you feel you need a parking stall. You will be able to discover whether your appeal has been accepted or not as of September 19 at 8:30 a.m., either by checking with the Parking Office or by phoning 471-7539.

GRANTS AVAILABLE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL RESEARCH

Who may apply?

Any person, institution, corporation, or society may request research funds. The Trust will give preference to private sector applicants, including individuals, for environmental research which might otherwise not get done.

Environmental research covers a broad range of issues. Anyone contemplating an A.E.R.T. application should review the list of similar projects which can be done by consulting the A.E.R.T. annual report, or the Library of Alberta Environment. Applications should involve specific objectives with tangible potential benefits for the Environment. The proposed research should reflect an innovative concept or approach. The need for Research must be demonstrated.

Deadline for submission of application for grants is October 31, 1986. Early submission is advised. All applications are reviewed upon receipt by the Grant Advisory Committee. Applicants will be notified as to the Board of Trustees' decision by February 1, 1987. Research projects should be planned to start after this date.





up and dancing and that made you anticipate 1964.


