HAT-TRICK BRONZED



It was two CCAA Championships and three tough seasons of regular play, each with their own nerve wracking post season playoff schedule that put the Ooks in contention for a third consecutive hockey championship. This in itself is an achievement of which NAIT students, staff and especially the players, their coaches and team support staff can be proud.

The Ooks did not return with Gold, instead it was with a third position Bronze Medal and a whole bunch of respect, great memories and a tradition that may well be difficult to surpass.

"Disappointment" is mainly what Coach Perry Pearn felt as he reflected on Friday's 4-2 loss to the Montreal St. Laurent Patriotes. That disappointment, however, plays second fiddle to the class the Ooks demonstrated. "What happened at the tournament not only showed they (the Ooks) know how to win" said Pearn, "but also that they know how to lose!"

As for the player's, most feel anywhere from

empty to numb or haven't quite realized it's all over. "We could've been more prepared, mentally" said John Walker, "The coaches did an excellent job. I guess we were relying too heavily on last year's reputation." Perhaps the most bitter of all pills to swallow was watching Humber and Quebec play in the final game on Saturday. "We all just wanted to get on the bus and leave," said Walker. For outgoing veterans like Kevin Stapleton,



Ron Amyotte, Mario Sicolo and John Walker that illusive third gold is a source of major frustration. However, for those players returning, like rookie center Mike Nottingham, the imminent taste of success served only to whet unsatisfied appetites.

The next Ooks hockey team won't be the same as the present one, but this years team was not the same as it's predecessor. Player turnover for the '86-'87 season was larger than that anticipated for the coming season. Even though eleven men are leaving, three former Ooks, T.C. Mcewan (now playing in Germany), Scott Melnyk (of the W.H.L. Portland Winter Hawks) and Ken Snieder may return. All in all only eight players will have to be replaced next season in comparison with ten this season. With NAIT's Hockey Program reputation,

the ongoing effort in scouting and the excellent training camp, Pearn feels it is possible to produce another team of equivalent calibre and has no plans of turning his back on the NAIT Ooks at this point in time. He has applied to work with the





General Council Meeting

March 24, 1987

For those of you who missed the meeting, feel sorry. It was a good one.

After the minutes of last meeting were approved, the council was in for a surprise treat. A vintage 1965 movie was shown. This film, shot in black and white with no sound, displayed to the audience life at NAIT, and NAIT related activities from that time period.

Teacher Evaluation

After the fun, the real business began. As you know, the Board of Governors is working on a proposal for student evaluation of the academic staff. An address to the council from both Dr. Souch, NAIT President, and Fred Williamson, Vice-President of Academics, re-

vealed that they are in favor of the evaluations. "This move is felt to be a positive one, and one which comes of need", said Dr. Souch. But there is a catch. It **must** be handled with maturity by the students of NAIT. So for this, an open forum on the topic has been set for the date of April 15th, 1987. This will be held in the Board room, and will give the students a chance to express their opinions and suggestions to the proposed evaluation system. The idea is to go as a group and have **mature good ideas**, because if the students display to the Board of Governors that they cannot make mature decisions, then there is no call for the students eval-

uation of the facility.

Whirlpool Update

The new price is \$68,000. The money comes from NAIT, NAITSA, Government Grants, and the Athletic department.





Alcohol and Drug Awareness Committee

A committee has been established through NAITSA to develop and promote a program for the safe and sensible use of alcohol and to create an awareness of the potential dangers of alcohol and drug abuse. Committee

members are: Art Hooks, Student Services; Fran Leroux, Health Services; Farley McKenzie, Chris Reinert, Sylvia Waddell, NAITSA; and Chairperson Marlene Emerson, Counselling Services.

Investment Development Program

The minister for International Trade, The Honourable Pat Carney, today announced that Canadian Investment Counsellors from nine major foreign posts, including London, Paris, Bonn, The Hague, New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Tokyo and Hong Kong,

such consultations is to ensure coordination of federal and provincial activities in promoting investment in Canada and to inform the business community on the assistance available to them in prospecting abroad for foreign investment."

These activities are part of Investment Canada's Investment Development Program, announced by the Minister of Regional Industrial Expansion in September, 1985. The Program is aimed at encouraging the flow of selected types of foreign investment to sectors where there will be a net benefit to the Canadian economy. Posts abroad assisted by specially-designated investment advisors, on loan from private industry, are engaged in locating sources of desired investment including financial and technology-based to fill gaps in the Canadian industry or to locate partners for Canadian corporations to do so.

will participate in a series of meetings in Canada the weeks of March 9 and 16, 1987, aimed at furthering Canada's investment promotion activities abroad. In addition to meetings with provincial officials, the week of March 9, 1987, the Investment Counsellors will meet industrial commissioners, financial institutions and other investment-oriented business groups in Halifax, Montreal, and Calgary and be available for consultation at the Opportunities Canada Conference in Toronto, March 18-20, 1987.

Minister Carney noted that "The main purpose of

Summer Employment Funding


This year's student summer employment program, Challenge '87 is being funded for \$180 million. Unfortunately, this is \$30 million less than the 1986 program. Challenge '86 was funded at \$210 million.

With increasing post-secondary enrollment across

Canada, the cuts to this year's program will have an even more dramatic effect on the unemployment rate of students returning to school. In July 1986, the national returning student unemployment rate was at 13.3 percent, with extremes of over 20 percent in British Columbia, and 29 percent in Newfoundland.

Minister of State (Youth) Jean Charest stated that approximately one-third of the Challenge '87 funding will go to the private sector. This move has been deemed unwise and useless by opposition critics since the private sector has had a poor showing record of career related jobs for students seeking work experience in their field.

The Michael Luchkovich Scholarships for Career Development

An accounting technician with a company in central Alberta is striving to earn certification as a Registered Industrial Accountant.

A business development manager working for a chamber of commerce in a large Alberta municipality is embarking on a management program to improve administrative skills.

A shop foreman with an Alberta engineering company is enrolled in a specialized welding course on steel alloys to improve the company's business prospects.

What could these three individuals with such diversified backgrounds possibly have in common? Each is a recipient of a Michael Luchkovich Scholarship for Career Development.

One of ten programs of the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund, the Micheal Luchkovich Scholarships for Career Development have helped numerous Albertans achieve their career goals by assisting them with direct educational expenses.

Intended for members of the province's professional, managerial, administrative and skilled labour force, the Micheal Luchkovich Scholarships are awarded through competition to dedicated individuals striving to upgrade their training or

education in order to reach their personal career goals. They are people who are good at what they do and who realize that upgrading skills and knowledge is important in a competitive job market. They are Albertans who know where they want to go and are willing to work hard to get there.

According to Dave Russell, Minister of Advanced Education, the scholarships have helped people from all walks of life. "Recipients have included people who have tremendous potential to get ahead but may be lacking in some specialized skills or training. There are those whose career plans would be enhanced through formal certification in their field. Others are taking specific studies to improve their existing expertise". Mr. Russell adds that each scholarship recipient has the support and recommendation of the employer. "Without a doubt, these are people who contribute much to Alberta by sharing their expertise, energy and enthusiasm. Their efforts have not gone unnoticed", said Mr. Russell.

Micheal Luchkovich Scholarship recipients are selected by a five-member committee representing business, academic and labour inter-

ests in Alberta. The applicants must have worked in the province for at least three years and should be pursuing a program of study related to their current employment. The scholarships are intended to assist with direct educational expenses, such as tuition, books and supplies, for short-term or part-time programs of study.

Named in honour of an Albertan who understood both the value of education and of a rewarding career, the Micheal Luchkovich Scholarships for Career Development recognize the contribution of the provinces work force to the development of Alberta's economic strengths and resources. A teacher, parliamentarian, businessman and author, Micheal Luchkovich dedicated his lifetime to working for and with Albertans. This scholarship program recognizes his personal commitment to the province by investing in career development plans of Albertans.

Micheal Luchkovich Scholarships for Career Development are awarded three times a year. Anyone interested in obtaining more information about this program is invited to call the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund at 427-8640.

Here are some suggestions:


1* When dropping off a friend after work, or from a party, don't leave right away. Watch and make sure he or she gets into his or her house/appt.

Now I am NOT trying to instill fear into the populus of Nait, but remember what happened to Brenda McClenagh. If a friend would have walked her to









Olsen Wins Silver at Provincial Championship



The NAIT Ooks defeated the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings 5-3 to bring home the bronze medal in another Saturday match.

The top three teams at the CCAA Hockey Nationals each lost one game. Humber lost in the final to St. Laurent. St. Laurent suffered a loss to the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings in the round robin. NAIT's hopes of a third straight CCAA title ended with a Friday night loss to St. Laurent.

Game 1 -- CCAA Hockey Nationals -- Wednesday, March 25th -- NAIT Ooks 4, Kelsey Amarkus 1 at Camrose Rec. Centre.

The NAIT Ooks started off the CCAA National Hockey Championships with a 4-1 win over the Kelsey Amarkus of Saskatoon Saskatchewan on Wednesday night at the Camrose Rec. Centre.

At 4:12 of the first period, Darren Schmidt scored for the Ooks from Mike Tookey and Murray Melnyk. Only 36 seconds later, the Amaruks evened the score on a goal by Bryan Kunkel. NAIT captain Ron Amyotte gave the

The third period was scoreless. The Ooks would outshoot Kelsey 16-2 in the third, but could not put the puck in the net, a problem which would also play a role in the next game.


The Ooks outshot Kelsey 43 to 21. Kevin Stapleton was between the pipes for NAIT.

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


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
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ATHLETE OF THE WEEK

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
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
