



Instead of encouraging this and brightening the future for Alberta, the government has chosen now to cut back on money for student loans and destroyed some peoples hopes for a better education. The government is also cutting back on money for special programs and for supplies for these programs. It's unfortunate that politicians can afford to give themselves raises, but can't afford money for teachers or school supplies.

One of the governments most hypocritical moves is reducing funds for educating the handicapped and those with learning disabilities

while matching, dollar for dollar, the money donated to Rick Hanson. It is a great cause and politicians should be donating their own money to it, but the provinces money will do more good if it is used for educations that will help the handicapped right now. Instead it is being added to the already substantial amount of money being used to find a cure for the future.

Today I spent one of the worst afternoons in my history at NAIT. I was sitting in a young man's home, trying to persuade him to retract his decision of withdrawal from an engineering technology. I am not speaking of a student who is having difficulties with his course

academically, but one who has decided that his program suffers from a lack of unity (teacher to teacher, student to student, and student to teacher) and that this particular technology offers him little (because of this internal strife). I myself am enrolled in this program and am having a difficult time forming an opinion that I would willingly air on such a delicate issue, but would like to bring this incident to light so that I may hopefully prevent a future waste of talent. I feel that the word "waste" is the only way to describe withdrawing at this stage of the game. Hang on, hold your ground, and finish this year. Withdrawal is not the remedy to your problems. I believe that this institution is fair in its dealings with students and has developed means of seeing grievances through to a just

end.

If you have a legitimate beef regarding your academic evaluation or any other grievance, here is the procedure:

- speak to your instructor.
- take up your concern with the program head.
- complete a re-evaluation form (\$5) within 90 days of examination/assignment and submit it to the registrar.

This procedure may be used for re-evaluation of entire course loads within 90 days of course completion. This re-evaluation shall be performed by the program head and at least one other instructor not involved in the original evaluation, and if the ruling is in your favor, the \$5 fee will be refunded.

I would hope that this procedure is never required, but it sure beats the solution of 'waste'.


OPEN HOUSE AFTERMATH





I have been a part of the labour force and I am more than aware of the uncertain job market facing graduating students. I also understand the value of a quality post-secondary education.






I have lived and worked in Australia, New Zealand, the United States and South

KEN KENDALL BOARD OF GOVERNORS




The Board of Governors is the overall decision making body of NAIT. All employees at NAIT are employees of the Board.








This position entails open communication between you, the students, and the Institution. This can be achieved through strong leadership, dedication, motivation and a strong voice on all committees.





Although the Oaks lost in the championship final to the veteran SAIT Trojans, it was a season of success for the Oaks. The team finished with an overall record of 24-14 and an ACAC record of 15-7. The Oaks closed out the season ranked number 8 in Canada and are certainly deserving of that placement. It was the best overall performance ever by a NAIT Basketball Team and very special to Head Coach Dave Hoy "... to this point in my coaching career it has been my best year and I will remember this season and these players for a long time."


OOKS VOLLEYBALL WINDS DOWNS



ATHLETE OF THE WEEK



Ooks Win 4th ACAC Title

The NAIT Ooks have won their fourth straight ACAC hockey title, a feat which stands alone. The Ooks swept their best-of-five final series with the Red Deer College Kings over the weekend. The Ooks now advance to the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (National) Hockey Championships which will be in Camrose from March 24th through the 28th.

GAME 1 THURSDAY, MARCH 12th -- NAIT OOKS 8, RED DEER COLLEGE KINGS 0 AT NAIT ARENA

In the regular season, the Ooks were winless against RDC in their last three meetings. NAIT was out to prove that Red Deer would not have the same degree of success in the playoffs. In Game 1 of the series, the Ooks gained control early and shutout the Red Deer College Kings 8-0 at the NAIT Arena on March 12th. The Ooks played one of their best periods of the season when it counted the most--the initial frame of this first game. The NAIT powerplay started the scoring at 4:07 as Darren Schmidt scored the goal from Ron Amyotte and Mike Tookey. The next goal proved to be the turning point in the contest. The Ooks were killing off two penalties when Ken

Goodwin and Ron Amyotte of the Ooks were in on a two-on-one breakaway. Goodwin fed Amyotte who made no mistake and the Ooks were in front 2-0 at the 7:22 mark. Darren Schmidt netted his second of the contest at 12:07 from Brent Weller and Murray Melnyk. Nigel Cripps then scored on a play with Ron Amyotte, one minute and 18 seconds later. Kurt Roebuck of the Ooks then tipped in a point drive from Ken Goodwin with 2 seconds left in the period to make the score 5-0. Mike Nottingham, who won the faceoff leading to the Ooks fifth goal, was also credited with an assist.

In the second, the Ooks added a pair of goals. Nigel Cripps received credit for a goal at 10:18 when the Red Deer netminder, Bruce Cory tried to redirect the shot and put it in his own net. Cripps then completed his first playoff hat trick with the seventh Ooks goal at 17:24. Marty Volcan and Mike Nottingham assisted on the play.

The Ooks then added one more goal in the third. Rich Chauvette tallied from Mike Tookey and Darren Schmidt at 7:05. When the final horn sounded, the Ooks had their first shutout of the season.

Jeff Lastiwka guarded the NAIT crease and earned the shutout by playing well. The Ooks outshot the Kings 49-27.

GAME 2 FRIDAY, MARCH 13TH-- NAIT OOKS 5, RED DEER COLLEGE KINGS 4 AT NAIT ARENA

Friday, the 13th, proved to be unlucky for the Red Deer College Kings. The NAIT Ooks gained a 2-0 lead in the best-of-five ACAC final series with a 5-4 triumph at the NAIT Arena on Friday night.

The Kings scored the first goal of the contest at 2:59 on the powerplay off the stick of Cam Bowles. The Kings jumped in front 2-0 on Ross Jeske's marker at 7:11. The Ooks cut the Kings lead to one goal 51 seconds later as Brenn Leach scored on a point drive from Mike Nottingham.

The Ooks tied the contest with 1:10 gone in the second period as Brent Weller found the mark. Rick Chauvette and Darren Schmidt assisted. The Ooks powerplay then capitalized for the third NAIT goal. Darren Schmidt scored with the man advantage from Ron Amyotte and Mike Nottingham at 6:26. The Ooks lead was shortlived as Cam Bowles of RDC evened the score at 3-3 at the 7:18 mark. Mike Nottingham of the Ooks gave NAIT the lead at 12:31 on a play with John Walker and Ron Amyotte.

In the third, the Red Deer College Kings attempted a comeback but it fell short. Ross Jeske made the score 4-3 with help from RDC teammates Todd Lorenz and Dan Toperosky.

Although the Red Deer College Kings outshot the NAIT Ooks by a count of 37-25, the Kings never had an opportunity to get back into the game until the third period. Jeff Lastiwka continued to mind the NAIT nets and came up with big saves at critical moments.


Now that NAIT is in the CCAA Nationals, the Ooks must realize that hard work and discipline will control

NAIT goaltender, Jeff Lastiwka was a unanimous selection to the first team. Forward Ron Amyotte and rear guard Mike Tookey of NAIT were also chosen to the first team. NAIT defenceman Brenn Leach and winger John Walker were selected to the second team. The CCAA National Hockey Championships go in Camrose from March 24th through the 28th. NAIT's first action will be on Wednesday, March 25th against Saskatchewan at the Camrose Rec. Center. Game time is 7:30 p.m. The winner of the NAIT-Saskatchewan match-up will advance to one semi-final on Friday, March 27th against the second place team in Pool B at 3:30. The second place team in Pool B would be Camrose, Nova Scotia or Quebec. The CCAA National Championship Final goes on Saturday, the 28th at 7:30.


Darren Schmidt






