There are many things at Nait that could be held off that are not associated directly with learning (ie. the proposed lounge). Many students, especially those at Main Campus, many not be able to associate with this impending loss, but it is equivalent to that of shutting down the Main Library. Many disagree and feel the "Glorified Reading Broom" should go, but there are many reasons why it should stay.

The biggest hassle over the Library going is due to the fact that students will now have to trek over to the Main Library on the average of once to twice daily. Since Plaza II comprises mainly Engineering diciplines, their studies concentrate on the design principles which put these students in the position of utilizing reference material based in the Library. A student will not take a drawing over to the Main Library to find information required for important aspects of the drawings. The only other alternative is to have the Library remain so students will only have to take 5-15 minutes to find the necessary information and bring it back to the class. It's unrealistic to think that instructors will permit students to utilize class time to walk over to main campus to get information, especially since it would take up a good portion of their time.

Another aspect is that instructors at Plaza II have resource material for students. If the library is not there, no reserve material would be present for the students. If instructors are

requesting this material, it is for a reason, the items they request are necessary for the projects or assignments the students are undertaking. If the library goes, and instructors want to reserve material, what will happen?

There are many services the students at Plaza II do without simply because of the location, but the services provided by the Library are a necessity. Photocopying, there are two copiers for students at Plaza II, both housed and maintained in the Library. The storage of audio-visual equipment used by students and staff. The staff at the Plaza II library, willing and able five days of the week to devote time to students who require

Much more could be brought up, however, the bottom line is: Students at Plaza II pay the same for education and services to attend Nait as Students at Main, why should their education be minus a needed facility just because somewhere someone needs to adjust their socks amidst the cutbacks. To all of you who contributed to the success of the NAIT Clinics in any way thank you!


MANDATORY SEATBELTS

The Alberta Society of Respiratory Therapists members feel very strongly that the Alberta Government should pass legislation regarding the mandatory use of seatbelts by people operating a motor vehicle.

Respiratory Therapists in this province observe human pain and suffering attributable to motor vehicle accidents. They also see the emotional trauma experienced by the family and loved ones. They believe that the mandatory use of seatbelts could make a significant contribution to the reduction of mortality and morbidity in this province.

Perhaps seatbelt legislation may assist in containing our health care costs!

Opponents to their position often cite the basic fundamental freedom provisions in the Canadian Constitution. This argument cannot be accepted due to the vast amount of government regulations that currently exist regarding the operation of a motor vehicle. The Respiratory Therapists of Alberta encourage you, the readers, to initiate meaningful dialogue with your member of the legislative assembly and, if need be, the president of the party sonstituency associations.



So, you're all upset about the new Provincial Budget. You feel it's a ripoff for you to pay more money for your booze and cigarettes.

At least this is what I have heard so far. The complaints go: "I gotta pay \$1.10 extra for beer", or "\$3.40 for a pack of cigarettes, the government must be nuts."

Unfortunately, none of you (nor I) heard about the 9.5 per cent cut to the Student Finance Board, the revenues that allow you to receive a student loan. According to the budget, the \$116,002,632 that was made available for loans in 1986-87 will now be cut to \$104,982,382 for the 1987-88 term. This is a difference of about \$11 million dollars.

Now you say, "Yeah, so what does it mean?" Well the "So what" is the fact that you may get a student loan next year. Or at least this is what I've been told by my colleagues. I think the "not get" should be

1)...not be able to rip-off the government and get a BIG loan that I really don't need, except for the fact that I want to buy a car...


OR

Let's face it folks, there's a lot of abuse on the loan system. Recently a student was found guilty of fraud for asking for a big loan. The loan was not necessary, yet it probably detered money for more loans to students who needed it. The cut of \$11 million should eliminate abuse of the system. This could be accomplished by the Finance Board first going after the people who apply for the ''above average'' loan. The "average loan" could be figured out by what the majority of the students of Alberta apply for, and the government can take it from there. So if any of you figure on getting a big loan after you play the violin for the Finance Board, then going out and buying a car, beware.


As far as I am concerned, students have NOTHING TO COMPLAIN ABOUT. After Health Services, the largest spending the government of Alberta budgets for is Education. 23.1 percent of funds available to the government is used for the education department. This is seen in the lowest tuition fees comparable to other provinces in Canada for the same Education. And it is also seen in the option for a student to receive a loan, something very few other provinces offer.

As the saying goes in the weather forcast: "If you don't like the weather... move...and see if it is nicer somewhere else;" the same goes for the Education system in Alberta.





Parent Counsellor Recruitment Begins

A campaign to recruit a minimum of 10 parent counsellor homes was launched by the Edmonton Region of Alberta Social Services.

This recruitment is part of the Edmonton Region's implementation of its Children's Services Plan, a document which outlines the Region's intention to move to a system of family and community based resources for the children in its care.

Alberta parent counsellors offer a different approach to child care - allowing interested and motivated individuals to become involved with children who may otherwise be placed in institutional settings. The program, funded by Alberta Social Services, was established in 1974. In the Edmonton area, parent counsellors presently care for 50 children, providing them with the help and support they need to resolve their emotional and behavioral problems.

Before assuming responsibility for a child, parent counsellors participate in an

orientation and training program. This program is designed to further develop their capabilities as parents and care-givers and to learn helping skills necessary in child care work. As well, opportunities are provided for personal growth and development, as parent counsellors become more aware of thier own needs and strengths in working with vouth.

Parent counsellors provide care within their own home for children who are unable to remain with their natural families. These children have emotional and behavioral problems, showing their hurt and anger over past experiences. Parent counsellors are people with unique skills and understanding who are able to assist children in becoming responsible and happy in-

As part of the professional team, parent counsellors work closely with natural parents, social workers and other professionals in the

community, providing a therapeutic family setting for children, in most cases parent counsellors care for two children at a time.

In order to support parent counsellors with their often challenging role, there are bi-monthly support groups and ongoing training sessions.

Parent counsellors must be prepared to meet the challenges and responsibilities this position demands. It requires warmth, flexibility, commitment, tolerance to stress and a stable family

unit.

In recognition of the total involvement of parent counsellors a daily renumeration of \$30.80 per child is provided. Alberta Social Services also covers all medical, dental and educational costs. Additional funds are available for other special needs or interests of the

NEWAVENUES EXPLORED IN CARE OF TERMINALLY ILL •

Music has always helped people relax. Since the beginning of time mothers have sung their children to sleep. For many years, office workers have said music helps lessen stress.

Music therapy has proven itself effective in many facets of health care practice. Maternity wards, intensive care units, burn centres, and dental offices are only a few of the settings where music is used to help patients relax.

However, one of the applications of music therapy still being examined is in the area of palliative care - care of the dying. The Alberta Foundation for Nursing Research recently awarded a \$46,739 research project grant to three Calgary nurse researchers to study the impact of music therapy on terminally ill patients. These people, by the nature of their illness, must cope with a number of physical and psychological stress factors, including pain and anxiety.

The research study, based at the Calgary Foothills Hospital, is being done by nurses working at the facility. The research team includes Marilyn Day, the Palliative Care Nurse Coordinator and principal investigator of the study; Judith Hanson, the Director of Nursing for the Hospitals Medical and Surgical Programs; and Norma Thurston, Director of Nursing Research, Quality Assurance and Education. The research project is expected to be completed by the end of 1988.

Thirty-two terminally ill cancer patients are taking part in the investigation. Their comments, suggestions and reactions form the central focus of the study. Patients choose what they want to listen to from four musical selections featuring different musical tempos

and keys. They have the opportunity to tell the researcher how the music affected them personally. For instance, the patient may feel the music is beneficial because it reminds him of pleasant things. Or, depression.

This study will look specifically at four research questions. Which types of music do the patients prefer? Do they consistently select the same music over a period of several days? What immediate and prolonged effect does a 30-minute music therapy session have on the patient's moods or pain symptoms, compared to no music therapy at all? Finally, what are the perceived effects of music therapy on the patient's thoughts and feelings?

Obviously, this study has tremendous relevance for palliative care nursing. If proven effective, music

8926. **Inequity Funding Study**

EDMONTON - Dave Russel, Minister of Advanced Education, announced the appointment of Dr. J. Stefan Dupre of Toronto to conduct a study into the matter of alleged inequities in funding among the Province of Alberta's post-secondary institutions.

Dr. Dupre has been a professor of political science at the University of Toronto since 1963 and has served as a member or chairman of approximately a dozen federal and provincial councils, commissions and task forces. He was the founding chairman of the Ontario Council on University Affairs, created in 1974 as the agency charged with advising the Government of Ontario on the funding of the fifteen universities in the province.

Dr. Dupre has been a member of the National Research Council and of the Social science, and Humanities

Research Council of Canada. He is also the co-author of a book concerning federal manpower training policies and community colleges. He is a past president of the Institute of Public Administration of Canada a recipient of the Institute's Vanier Medal and an Officer of the Order of Canada. He received a Ph.D. in political economy from Harvard University in 1985 and holds honorary degrees from Laval, McMaster and the University of Ottawa.

Mr. Russell stated, "I believe the Government of Alberta is indeed fortunate in acquiring the services of Dr. Dupre, who is well able to determine if there is indeed an inequity in funding." Dr. Dupre will then make recommendations to the Minister regarding any changes as may be necessary to rectify this situation prior to the fall of




84'Charing Cross Road







The Institute recognizes that prevention of harassment is a responsibility shared by all constituent members, however, should harassment occur, the Institute will take appropriate disciplinary action to redress

I. GUIDELINES

1. A constituent member is defined as any student or employee, any person who provides a service for or receives a service from the Institute, or any person who interacts with the Institution in the context of its role as a public, post-secondary Institution.

2. The term "harassment" is defined as any unwelcome conduct, comment, gesture or contact, including physical contact, that is reasonably likely to cause offence or humiliation to a constituent member, or that might reasonably be perceived by a constituent member as placing or attempting to place an offensive or humiliating condition on employment or on any opportunity for education, training or promotion.

3. It is a responsibility of each constituent member to maintain conduct respectful to the dignity and rights of

4. It is a responsibility of

every manager or supervisor of activity to investigate complaints of harassment promptly, seriously and in a strictly confidential manner. 5. Constituent members who believe they have been the subject of harassment are encouraged to make an obiection clearly known to the perceived offender and/or the person in authority as may be appropriate. If resolution is not successful at this stage, or if it is considered inappropriate or uncomfortable to approach the perceived offender, the complainant may seek the confidential advice of the Director of Human Resource Ser-

6. The Institute shall:

(a) Inform students, staff and other members of the NAIT community of their rights and responsibilities in the prevention of harassment;

(b) Develop methods to raise awareness in the NAIT community of issues related to harassment and its prevention:

(c) establish appropriate procedures for registering and resolving harassment complaints, and inform its constituent members of these procedures;

(d) Receive and attempt to resolve complaints in a manner that preserves confidentiality for all parties;

(e) Take appropriate disciplinary action in substantiated cases; and

(f) Monitor the outcomes of decisions and actions.

II. PROCEDURES

A. Procedures - Filing of Complaints

1. A complaint of harassment must be made, in writing, to the Director, Human Resource Services. The Director will provide assistance in completing a written complaint for those individuals who are less comfortable with the written language. The complainant may invite a confidant when a complaint is being registered.

2. Complaints must be filed within 30 calendar days of the alleged incident. Except under extenuating circumstances complaints shall be investigated and resolved, or a recommendation for action referred to the President, within 30 days of the complaint being made.

3. Complaints of harassment shall be treated in confidence. The name(s) of complainant(s) and the circumstances surrounding complaints will not be disclosed to any person except where disclosure is necessary for the purpose of investigating the complaint or taking disciplinary measures in relation thereto.

B. Procedures - Resolution of Complaints

1. Informal

(a) When a written complaint of harassment is filed, the Director, Human Resource Services shall investigate the complaint by meeting with the person(s) against whom the complaint has been lodged to hear his/ her response.

(b) The Director shall carry out an investigation and attempt to resolve the complaint to the satisfaction of both parties.

(c) In the event the Director is unable to satisfactory informal resolution, she/he recommend to the complainant that the complaint be heard by the President's Committee on Harassment.

2. Formal

(a) A President's Committee shall be established to hear, investigate and handle complaints of harassment not resolved at the informal level.

Committee Structure:

(i) The Vice President, Educational Support Services shall serve as on-going chairperson.

(ii) Two additional members shall be selected by the President; one from lists of up to four nominees submitted annually by NASA, AUPE Local 38, and NAITSA; and one Dean or Director.

(iii) Lists of nominees submitted to the President by NASA, AUPE and NAITSA shall be representative of the population mix.

(iv) Both Complainant and respondent have the right to challenge, for cause, any member serving on the panel to review a particular complaint.

The validity of the challenge shall be at the discretion of the Chairperson. Cause may include any direct or indirect involvement with the case or other factors likely to prejudice a fair hearing.

Terms of Reference The Committee shall have full authority of the President to:

(i) investigate complaints of harassment at NAIT; (ii) seek resolution of problems that have been iden-

(iii) refer results of its investigations to the President along with recommendations for disciplinary or other action as appropriate; (iv) prepare an annual statistical report to the President on complaints received and their resolution.

(b) The Chairperson shall arrange to convene the President's Committee on Harassment to hear and investigate the complaint, and shall notify the respondent a minimum of 5 working days in advance of the scheduled date to allow time for preparation.

(c) The complainant and respondent shall have full opportunity to be heard and to reply to allegations of the other.

(d) The recommendations of the Committee following their investigation shall be made to the President and shall be in writing.

(e) The complainant and respondent, and their counsel (if any) shall have full opportunity to be heard and to reply to the recommendations of the Committee.

(f) The President shall review and consider the recommendations of the Committee and shall receive and consider any submissions on behalf of the complainant and the respondent, and shall inform both the complainant and respondent, in writing, of his decision and such disciplinary or other action as he deterimines appropriate.

Records Management

The director, Human Resource Services, shall maintain a confidential record of complaints and their resolution. Records of complaints which have been dismissed at any stage will be used for statistical purposes only. In the event there are no further proceedings in a given case following initial resolutions of a complaint, the contents of the file shall be destroyed after a period of two years.



Ooks Hockey CCAA Preview

This weekend, Camrose will be playing host to the 1986-87 Canadian Colleges Athletic Association National Hockey Championships. The action started on Tuesday, March 24th and continues through until Saturday, March 28th.

Camrose stepped in as host when Brandon, Manitoba pulled out ten months ago.

The format for the CCAA National Hockey Championships is diffreent from past years. There will be two pools at the tourney and each will have its own playoff format. In one pool, the hosts, and teams from Nova Scotia and Quebec will play a round robin series with the best two teams advancing into the finals. The PAC representative from Saskatchewan has almost always been over its head in the CCAA National Championships. Cariboo is considered a good club, but lacks competition in its own conference.

The Camrose Lutheran College Vikings and the University College of Cape Breton Capers are underdogs going into the CCAA

Nationals. Both Camrose and Cape Breton require strong goaltending, hard work and a little luck to pick up a medal.

The NAIT Ooks, the Humber Hawks of Ontario and number one ranked St. Laurent of Quebec will be strong contenders for the title. Humber was a bridesmaid at last year's CCAA National Championships in Kamloops, and if they have the talent they did last year. the Hawks could be tough to beat. St. Laurent is a skating club, and if they are not pressured, Quebec could have its first CCAA title in hockey since 1984. NAIT needs to play to its potential and stay out of the sin bin in

order to repeat as CCAA champs.

ON THE BENCH: NAIT'S first action at the CCAA Nationals in Camrose occured Wednesday night at 7:30 against Kelsey. With a win against Kelsey, the Ooks would then play at 3:30 on Friday in one semi-final against either Camrose, Cape Breton, or St. Laurent. The CCAA National Championship game is slated for Saturday, March 28th at 7:30 p.m. in

Camrose.



BIOTECHNOLOGY TRAINING AT NAIT



DNA The Molecule Of Life

The NAIT Board of Governors has recently authorized funding for a post-diploma program in Biotechnology. This program has been developed as a joint venture between the

chemistry and bioscience sections at NAIT and will be offered to students in both programs. This certificate course will be scheduled to run for six weeks in May and June of the two years the students are at NAIT. This twelve week course will consist of nearly four hundred hours of specialized training in Biotechnology. The following background information will be of interest to those who are curious about this course.

No other scientific area has had such tremendous advances as biotechnology has had in the past decade. These advances have resulted in a necessary marriage between biochemistry, genetics and cell biology that few would have envisioned twenty years ago. This new marriage is often referred to as molecular genetics, and involves the use of biochemical techniques in the isolation and manipulation of cellular genetic material.

With todays techniques in molecular genetics we are able to isolate and purify genes for specific proteins, sequence these genes,

change them at will and reintroduce them back into individual cells. There the genes will be expressed and produce the desired proteins. If necessary these proteins can then be isolated, purified and put to their intended use in the food industry, agriculture, medicine or other areas of interest. Some well known examples are the production of insulin and the human growth factor.

We have also seen new techniques developed for the culturing of cells from both plants and animals. This has been especially important in regards to monoclonal antibodies, which show such tremendous potential for the treatment and identification of human health problems. Recent advances in carbohydrate synthesis, most notably Lemieux's work at the University of Alberta, have enabled us to synthesize carboydrates that can be used in the isolation and modification of monoclonal antibodies.

Another area of advance has been in protein chemsitry itself.

We now have the chemistry that allows us to build predetermined peptide on various organisms. We are able to apply the vast information storage capability of computers to every area of biotechnology, including the X-ray crystallograpy studies of proteins. From structural information obtained we are able predict

how the molecule works, and how change through mutations affects the protein.

Our ability to work with and understand how cellular molecules work has also been greatly enhanced by recent advances in instrumental methodology. We now have the ability to purify and identify biomolecules at the nanomole and lower levels using preparative and analytical high performance liquid chromatography (HPLC). New methods are appearing almost monthly.

Although the major public focus on biotechnology advances has been on U.S. companies, the research is being done on a world wide basis. Edmonton has been one of the brighter areas on the Canadian scene, where the University of Alberta and local companies have been at the forefront in protein chemistry, carbohydrate chemistry and monoclonal antibody research. The number of people employed in these fields has been increasing steadily, and the outlook is for the creation of

many more jobs. biotechnology The committee has now put together a general course outline streamlined to meet requirements. employer Course content was finalized after analyzing feedback from an industry survey. Major emphasis will be placed on the following topics: protein chemistry and purification; enzyme chemistry, including immobolized enzymes; recombinant DNA methodology; monoclonal antigeneration, purification and modification; cell culture techniques, including an advanced course to bioscience students; fermentation technology including basics in chemical engineering; and radioisotope techniques.

These courses will be taught as a post-diploma program to students in the bioscience and chemistry diploma programs, and will consist of two-six week sessions with a total of approximately three hundred and sixty hours of lecture and hands-on experience. This additional training will be added to the present analytical and organic strengths of the chemical technologists, and the biology strengths of the bioscience technologist. The employer will then have the added advantage of being able to pick a biotechnologist who best suits his The program needs. graduates will have major strengths either in biology or chemistry, and the employer can best judge where his job requirements fit in the broad spectrum of biotechnology.

A possibility for the near future is to offer individual courses or the complete program through continuing education. This would allow our past graduates a chance to upgrade themselves in this field of study, and would offer employers an opportunity to send their employees to NAIT for some upgrading in a particular area of interest. The possibility of this option has already created considerable demand among bioscience and chemistry alumni.
