



prove to be beneficial. When the selection of priorities is made life goes with the flow; not up and down like a rollercoaster.





REID REPORT IGNORES WORKING WOMEN

Today less than 20 percent of women in the Alberta workforce are unionized. This means that 80 percent of working women rely on the Employment Standards Act for protection. In December, Edmonton Working Women submitted a brief to the Reid Committee on labour law review. Based on calls received on the Working Women's Hotline, we made several important

currently posting 150 vacancies, which represents an increase over last year at this time. Most of the major oil companies have indicated that they will be hiring students for either summer or full-time positions. This is a dramatic change from last year, when no oil companies were hiring on campus. The outlook for 1987 graduates appears to be at least as good as that of the graduates recommendations regarding the upgrading and extension of employment standards in Alberta

It is our opinion that Reid Committee has failed to consider our report and has made a few very inadequate recommendations regarding the Employment Standards Act. "Nowhere in the report is there a statement regarding the urgent need for an increased minimum wage", says Kris Farkas, a local lawyer and member of Edmonton Working Women. "Nor is there any strong recommendation for improved working conditions with such things as legislated lunch and coffee breaks, legislated sick leave, and improved enforcement procedures to protect women against infractions of the Employment Standards Act.'

"The report is a slap in the face for working women in Alberta'', says Farkas; "it is a very clear message to

women working as waitresses, secretaries, retail clerks and the like that the Alberta government is not going to make any effort to help improve the povertylevel wages and abysmal working conditions in which these women work."

As a voice for the many nonunionized working women in this province, Edmonton Working Women demands a commitment from the Pro-

vincial Government that the Employment Standards Act will be upgraded and extended immediately. By failing to make these recommendations the Reid Committee has virtually ignored 80 percent of the female workforce in Alberta. For more information

NAIT Purchases 7 Acres For Future Expansion

NAIT has purchased seven acres of land for future expansion. Unfortunately, according to NAIT President Dr. Souch, those expansion plans are on hold until Alberta's economy picks up.

NAIT at the present is approximately 15,000 square meters short on floor space. To help accomodate the present 8600 full and part time students, the institute has been forced to lease buildings around the city. At its present growth, the enrollment level at NAIT is expected to increase to 11,000 students by the year 1990, thereby justifying

the recent land purchase.

"It is our intention, over a period of time, to get out of our lease commitments and satellite facilities, and unify the campus on one site".

The land itself, purchased recently from the Provincial Government, is located between 103rd and 106th streets, just north of Princess Elizabeth Avenue.

Presently, this land is occupied by 75 subsidized housing units managed by the Edmonton Housing Authority. Plans to destroy the old housing are in works for sometime early this summer. Tenants residing in

the units were informed at the beginning of January that they would have to vacate the premises by June. At the present, the housing itself has a vacancy rate of 8 percent.





Job Leads 7raditional WHERE TO FIND



Most job seekers use a traditional approach when looking for jobs. The methods they use include:

- · Answering want ads
- · Filling out applications in personnel offices
- Sending out resumes
- · Looking for leads at the local state employment agency (often called the "unemployment" office)

Some people — about one third do get jobs using these traditional methods. The other two thirds

The Hidden Job Market

Most jobs are never advertised. In fact, as many as 85% of all jobs are not. Traditional job search methods overlook most available jobs and many of the best ones. Given that, here are some nontraditional job search methods to uncover the hidden job market.

Friends and Relatives:

Probably the best source of job leads available. List all your relatives, then the people who you have been friendly with and contact them directly. Tell them what kind of job you want and what skills and other qualifications you have to offer. About 18% of all people find their jobs this way.

Acquaintances:

These are people who you don't know well but who you've had some contact with or have something in common. Exclassmates, people you used to work with, neighbors and fellow church members are some examples. List as many names as possible. Contact each one and ask for his/her help in thinking of employers who might need someone with your skills and experience.

Walk Right In:

Even without an appointment, you can usually ask for the person in charge and get to them with no problem. This seems more common for small organizations where there are fewer people between reception and the boss to screen you out.

Let Your Fingers Do The Walking:

The Yellow Pages lists virtually all organizations that hire people. Use the index to identify types of organizations that you might be interested in and contact each one. Ask to speak to the person who is most likely to supervise you in that organization. Avoid personnel departments, if possible. Introduce yourself, mention the position you seek followed by your key skills and experience. Your objective is to set up an interview or, failing that, to get a referral.

Go To Small Organizations:

Most people work in businesses and organizations considered small (less than 50 employees). They are excellent places to gain experience and make quicker advancements. Don't overlook them.

Use Special Services:

If you have access to a school or other placement counselor, he/she can be an excellent source of referrals. Check into any community programs to help you find a job. Begin with the telephone listings under local government agencies and ask for what's available. If they don't know, ask who else might.

Methods

Want Ads:

Read the want ads but do not depend on them. About 14% of all people find their jobs here, so it is worth some time. Sunday's and Wednesday's papers have the most ads. Read them in the evening and follow up on anything interesting but realize that a lot of other people will be doing the same thing. The competition is fierce.

Private Employment Agencies:

Unless the employer pays the fee, expect to pay up to 15% (or more) of your first year's salary. That is a lot of money for work you can usually do yourself. Consider using them if your skills are highly sought after or if you are presently employed and have little time available to look yourself. Only one out of 20 people who use agencies get jobs from them.

State Employment Agencies:

They don't charge a fee, but only 5% of all people get jobs this way. In most areas, they will not know of 90% or more of the jobs available; however, a weekly visit is worthwhile. Get on friendly terms with an employment counselor and ask to see that one each time. This will help him/her think of you when a job lead comes through that fits.

Personnel Offices:

They are found mostly in larger organizations and their job is to screen you out. Try instead to get directly to the person who would supervise you. Sometimes personnel is unavoidable. If you do use them, go out of your way to make yourself memorable.

Resumes:


Sending out resumes hoping one lands on some interested person's desk is likely to be a waste of time and stamps. A resume can be a useful tool once you've made contact with a potential employer but it is often unnecessary.

Follow Up

Send a simple, sincere thank you note to all people who help you in your job search: friends, people who interview you, people who gave you a referral - anyone. It is a nice touch and they will be far more likely to remember you later!

You should follow up with all your employer contacts every one or two weeks. Create a reminder system for this using 3 x 5 cards arranged by follow up date.

These are some brief tips to find job leads that I hope will help. Do realize though, that finding a job is a job. Plan to spend at least 25 hours a week at it and try to get two interviews a day. It is possible. Good luck!



Get Referrals:


Whenever you talk to someone in your job search, always ask them if they know of someone else you can talk to who might:

- a. have a job opening in your field, or
- b. know of someone else who would.

To get the most out of this method. get at least two referrals from each person you contact. Starting with just one contact, you can develop hundreds, even thousands of contacts using this simple technique.

This weekend the Ooks play at Grant MacEwan. A winwill finish their season with a 13-5 record, assuring them second place in regular season standings.





Donations




OOKS SQUID SQUAD SWEEPS SWIM MEET

Nait guard Kathy Prochnau capped an incredible season with an outstanding offensive display against the Grant MacEwan Griffins while scoring records. Kathy scored a record 46 points in Nait's 72-59 win over the Griffin's on Friday Feb. 27 at Grant MacEwan's Millwoods Campus. The 46 points is an ACAC single game scoring record erasing Mary Lynn Lang's record 45 pts. set last week in Red Deer's 121-35 win over Camrose. Kathy finished the


season with 354 points which was not only the top in the ACAC this season but established a new conference record for single season scoring, surpassing Kathy Gorman's 353 points. The sharp shooting guard was good on 3 of 6 three point shots, 16 of 24 field goals and 5 of 6 free throws.

Kathy Prochnau has now scored a total of 831 points in 3 seasons and is 2nd only to Rhonda Wolfram's ACAC career scoring record of 935 points. That record will

likely fall to Kathy next season as she completes her second year of Medical Lab.

The win gave the Chicks a 6-10 record in league play which left them in 6th place and out of the playoffs. In opening round playoff action Mount Royal will face Sait while Lethbridge hosts Red Deer in the best of 3 series. The ACAC Champion will represent our conference at the CCAA Nationals hosted this year by Mohawk College in Ontario.

Board of Governors

Our student elections are approaching, and you will have an opportunity to run for or elect two student Representatives to the Board of Governors.

For those of you unaquainted with the workings of responsibilities of the Board, I'd like to provide you with a brief overview.

In April of 1982 the N.A.I.T. Board of Governors was established to direct the affairs of this Institute. Prior to this the Government of Alberta had been in control of operations. The Board was created as a result of the Governments' realization that not only would N.A.I.T. be more responsive to change under the direction of a Board, but it would provide a better link between N.A.I.T. and it's public.

The Board consists of 10 public members appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, 2 academic staff members, 1 member of the non-academic staff, 2 student representatives and the President of N.A.I.T.

To give you an idea of the magnitude of the responsibilities of being a Board Member, it is important to realize that every employee of N.A.I.T. is an employee of the Board. Combine this fact with the knowledge that the Board of Governors is responsible for such things as preparing the budget (in excess of \$70 million last year), long and short range capital development and program rationalization, and the enormous responsibilities involved become clear.

As a Student Representative it is your responsibility to attend regular meetings held once a month, attend special functions, be a member of at least one Board Standing Committee, and be aware of students opinions on key issues. It is also essential to realize that although you are elected by the student population, you are not a member of Student Council and do not represent the students directly. Student concerns to be presented to the Board are addressed by the President of the Students' Council and channeled through the office of the President of the Insitute to the Board.
