EDITORIAL: Starvation Politics - Conclusions

Last issue I wrote about the *game* and how on November 14th there was to be an unprecedented satellite conference to discuss the idea of effectively defeating world hunger by the year 2000. Well, it happened. Not only did the Edmonton chapter of the Hunger Project have close to 300 people in attendance, but over 50,000 across the globe tuned in from 17 countries, all addressing the subject at hand. They finished by addressing themselves.

Much of the conference was a review of how far the Hunger Project has come in achieving its goal in the last ten years. Beginning in 1977, with a small bunch of progressive thinkers and "do'ers", the Project formed the goal of doing what was then considered "impossible" because of a major obstacle: *attitude*.

We have had the erroneous *attitude*, for many years, that "...hunger has ALWAYS been here and ALWAYS will be...". This

absurdity is the equivalent of the Edmonton Oilers saying to themselves in 1984, "... the New York Islanders are the champions and ALWAYS will be...". They approached those then champions with the right *attitude*, and now THEY are the champions. This principal of "thought into action" applies directly to the Hunger Project, in fact it is its main doctrine.

Essentially, there exists in the world two large pies, the FOOD pie and the OPPORTUNITY pie. Phase 1 of the Hunger Project was to increase the size of the FOOD pie, which was accomplished shortly after 1977. One of the biggest fallacies around is that we don't have enough food for everyone; this is simply not true. There is enough food in the world right now to feed all; the problem is that the resources of those countries that need it are not large enough to receive even a small portion of the FOOD pie. The OPPORTUNITY pie is what now needs work, and that is the focus of The Hunger Project for the next 13 years, culminating in the completion of Phase 2.

Specifically, this means a greater emphasis on keeping up the existing programs of Self-Sufficiency education and training, plus the addition of many new and extensive programs for those countries that need it so desperately. If you sit back and consider the implications of what these dedicated people of the Hunger Project have accomplished and what they mean to accomplish, it is quite awe inspiring.

What can we do? I am not going to ask you all to "dig deep" into your bank accounts, as yours is no doubt in the same state as mine, empty. But what I will ask is that you consider what has been said here AND do a very simple thing. Start a *conversation* with your family or friends about this very subject. The result is that the IDEA of what the Hunger Project is about, obliterating hunger by the year 2000, will grow like a snowball rolling down Mount Robson!

You and I, along with the great people of the Hunger Project, will make this idea happen... we can MAKE HISTORY! Let's do it people.

Dear Editor:

Allow me to address the issue of instructor evaluations from a different perspective -- that of an instructor. First of all, let me make it clear that I am not speaking on behalf of

all instructors -- mine is just one opinion in the debate.

I, for one, welcome feedback from students and I believe most of my colleagues do too. In fact, I collect student feedback in written form at least once each term -- and oral feedback on a daily basis!!

There's a clarification that needs to be made, however. There is a significant difference between constructive criticism and performance appraisals. I suspect that some students and some instructors are not making this distinction. Of course student feedback is important, and valuable. We spend a good part of each day together and often we are blind to our own weaknesses. Who better to provide help in correcting the trouble spots than people you work with daily? Students certainly know more about my teaching style, my communication quirks, my screw ups and my successes in the classroom than my boss does. And so, student input intended to allow me to improve in those areas is going to be more valuable to me than any comments derived by a half-hour observation by my program head.

Where I draw the line in my own mind, however, is in allowing students to have a say in my performance appraisal. There is much more to my job than teaching. There is a host of responsibilities listed in my job description that the

students do not see. I am not hired by the students (the argument that tuition pays my salary is bogus -- tuition covers approximately 5% of the NAIT budget.) I am certainly responsible to my students, but not accountable to them. I am accountable to my superiors.

I have spent 13 years employed in industry, and am in my tenth year as a NAIT instructor. With absolute respect to all my students, I would quietly suggest that I know more about both my area of expertise and more about teaching than my students do.

I am reminded of a saying that goes as follows: "The old know more about being young than the young do about being old". Perhaps I could paraphrase it to say: "Teachers know more about being a student than students do about being a teacher". But just as the old can forget about being young, so teachers can forget about being a student. So keep us honest, keep us challenged, and keep the communication lines open. But also, let's remember our respective roles in the overall picture.

Please, continue to provide open and honest criticism so we can continue to improve and you can continue to receive the quality education to which you are entitled. But please, don't presume to be my boss. Not yet, anyway!

Body Language

In an age and in a society where there's a great emphasis on being youthfully slim and attractive, there is a tendency to use diet as a way of controlling weight. Not diet as in what one eats or as in sensible eating habits but diet as in starve-binge, fad or crash diet - diets such as the grapefruit diet, the cottage cheese diet, the banana diet, the cabbage soup diet, etc., etc.

Take, then, the case of Lisa, who's 20 years old, 5'5" and 145 pounds. Lisa has a lot going for her but by her own (inflated) standards, she's 40 pounds overweight.

So she decides to "go on a diet". After discussing at length the success of various diets with friends and acquaintances, she comes across a very interesting diet - the Beer Diet. It has, she hears, been given rave reviews because of its high "success" rate.

The Beer Diet allows for nothing but just that, beer, in the diet - an average of six bottles of beer per day - no less than and no more than 42 beer per week. It's a very flexible diet - one can drink six beer a day for seven days or one can drink two beer a day for five days and sixteen beers a day for the remaining two days - or one can drink all 42 beer in one day and nurse a hangover for the remaining six days. A fascinating diet - and Lisa decides that this is the diet she'll try this time.

After the first four days, her body begins to show signs of weight loss on the outside. On the inside, all is calamity. A tiny survival mechanism within the body has sent a message to the brain: "Mayday, mayday, this body is facing famine, defense needed!"

The brain in turn sends an order to a type of enzyme within the body (the body is made up of, among many other things, many kinds of enzymes) called the fat-storing enzyme. The order: these fat-storing enzymes must multiply for the purpose of storing all the fat taken in by the body that is possible. The body perceives inevitable starvation and is doing what it can to avoid that end.

If Lisa had, for example, five million fat storing enzymes within her body before getting into the Beer Diet, she may now have six or seven million of them and as time goes on, the count will be even higher.

On the outside, her body continues to shed the pounds. In seven (eventful, beer-filled) weeks, Lisa has lost nearly 30

pounds and now weighs 118 pounds. Because she's only a dozen pounds away from what she perceives to be her goal weight of 105 pounds (actually, 118 pounds is a more realistic goal weight), she decides to drop the diet and start eating again, reasoning that she can lose the other ten pounds later.

But her body biochemistry has changed. There's twice as many fat-storing enzymes within her system and so twice as much fat is grabbed by these enzymes and stored.

In less than two months, Lisa has not only gained the 30 pounds she originally lost but she's gained five more pounds besides.

Perhaps using the Beer Diet as an example to illustrate my point is stretching it (then again, maybe not). And perhaps the explanation of what happens to the body system when one goes on any crash or fad diet is oversimplistic. But the facts remain the same: the body's metabolism (ability to burn fat) slows down and the body's tendency to store fat increases. In effect, the body has been "programmed" to be even more overweight.

If Lisa tries another diet (and chances are, she will), she takes another step backward. Soon she will have only to look at food and she will gain weight.

To turn things around, Lisa first has to become more active. She can start out easy - go for a brisk walk every day for a half hour, for example. Or she can participate in some type of sport activity.

If she exercises regularly and eats sensibly, it will probably take her body system about a year to stabilize. But it will have been a year well spent. Well spent because Lisa will hopefully have exercise habits in place, will look good and feel good - and as a plus she will have found a sensible way to control her weight. Most important of all, she will no longer mess up her body system by resorting to "dieting" again.

SOUTH AFRICA

A few weeks ago I mentioned I that I might be commenting on the situation in South Africa. Well, Ted Byfield of the Alberta Report has beaten me to the draw with his weekly editorial. His commentary is one of the best that I have seen concerning that country and if you are interested in this topic, try to obtain a copy.

Because of the recent developments at the Commonwealth Conference, specifically with regard to Canada's position on sanctions against South Africa, I feel this may be a good time to broach the subject.

Often when I say I am not in favor of sanctions or that I am opposed to the rapid dismantling of apartheid, I find myself having to explain that this does not necessarily mean that I am in favor of apartheid. I am opposed to ANY form of oppression, but I am also in favor of representing the situation in that country in a realistic light.

When I first travelled to South Africa, I was determined to be as objective as possible in my observations. Some might say that I was perhaps not entirely successful in doing so but the experience was a very interesting and eye opening one for me just the same.

What I found most interesting (and now most annoying when I see examples of it in the news media) was the degree of misinformation we have on just what conditions are like in that country. It is not at all what I expected;

What exactly do I stand for? I stand for outrageousness. I will show you the darker side of student life. My articles will be outrageous, obscene and sometimes hilarious. Sex and violence will run rampant through these articles. I do not believe we should totally ignore what some of the student population does on weekends. Many of those situations are in fact very funny.

I am not, however, merely a one dimensional author.

the cultural disparities, the attitudes of citizens, the sense of history.

Perhaps I was anticipating the situation to be more black and white (no pun intended) but I became aware that South Africa and America are two very different places and one cannot use the standards of one to judge the other.

Believing that the problems of blacks in South Africa would somehow magically disappear overnight if groups like the ANC were in power or that the whites are just being stubborn about relinquishing their position because they are merely unwilling to share the wealth is not an uncommon sentiment. But this is a very narrow view and a tragic one at best.

It is easier to adopt a holier-than-thou attitude when we are far removed from the situation of others, but how willing would we be, say, to deal with a native Indian population roughly six times that of the whites, when their leaders have vowed to take violence into the homes, kitchens and bedrooms of the whites? When their leaders have vowed to undertake a campaign of violence against more moderate dissenting Indians? Would we be willing to hand everything over to someone who would demand we go back to Europe where we came from?

I think the dismantling of apartheid is inevitable. I also feel that it should be done. To advocate doing so in a manner our government proposes, however, is genocide.

More than just a weekend party pig, I have a multitude of opinions on a plethora of topics. No one shall be safe from my rapier-like pen. One week I may discuss the drunken decadence of the weekend's cabaret and the next week give you my view of apartheid. Or free trade. Or the Catholic Church. Or even (God forbid), teacher evaluations.

I found it interesting that the concerned reader who wrote in felt the editor had breached his responsibility by allowing my column to be printed in this student newspaper. Well now, I seem to be a student, writing about student situations or giving a student opinion for other students to read. It seems to me that an article such as this is best printed in a student newspaper.

What do you think? But then again who really cares what you think? Oh well, see you next week, kids.

Evaluation For Balanced Bias

Are we agreed that the objective of instructor evaluation is to ensure that the students of NAIT are served by a faculty comprised of the most credible and academically responsible instructional staff available?

Questions of balance in political bias arise when NAIT, through its instructors or its curriculum, allies itself with a point of view which serves specific interests in an academically irresponsible fashion.

A case in point which I will use to illustrate this concern involves the Forestry Technology Department.

NAIT's Forestry Technology Department stresses methods of forest management which centre around the use of chemical herbicides. These methods, not surprisingly, are strongly supported by the large chemical manufacturing companies like Dow Chemical (manufacturer of Agent Orange).

Non-chemical methods of forest management are sounder ecologically and have been employed profitably in Europe for years. Such ecologically responsible methods have been rejected by Canada's forest products industries which, incidentally, are largely foreign-owned and controlled.

It does not seem unreasonable to assume that NAIT's Forestry Technology instructors, having come from the private or public sectors, might aspire to attain one of those well-paid management positions in the forest products industry. It can be appreciated that the prospective candidate who has demonstrated a bias in favour of the interests of big business by advocating its preferred chemical forest management methods would be chosen over one who chose to give credibility to alternate methods of forest management.

By giving credibility to the environmentally responsible non-chemical methods of forest management used

effectively elsewhere, an instructor would diminish his chances for career development in the private sector.

Clearly the instructors' career interest and the academic integrity of the curriculum of NAIT are not necessarily the same. The less than arm's length relationship between industry and those responsible for curriculum development and implementation at NAIT must be evaluated to ensure academic integrity is maintained.

I contend that any method of instructor evaluation would be deficient if it did not include a means of assessment to ensure a balanced bias in the interest of academic integrity.

The Forestry Technology Department is not the only example of pseudo-academia subject to distortion by self-serving interests to be found at NAIT. I call upon the administration to give serious consideration to a means of evaluating its curriculum for a balanced bias. I suggest that until any question of academic integrity is resolved, the expectation that degree granting institutions could seriously consider crediting NAIT graduates is unreasonable.

Programming Competition

The results of the November 7th Association of Computing Machinery's Annual Programming Competition are in! Although NAIT's team of Ian Johnstone, Mark Gregson, Daryl Thachuk and Dave Sharp, did not win, they placed a very commendable 7th out of 16 competitors.

The winning team was Northern Arizona University, followed by the University of Alberta in second place. Considering the field consisted primarily of Universities, which have Undergraduate programs running from 4 to 7 years, 7th place, ahead of 9 (mostly American) universities is an achievement worth the highest of compliments. Congratulations guys!

It has been three weeks since this paper requested submissions for a Student Instructor Evaluation Questionnaire. The response thus far has been rather dismal considering the seriousness of the issue. It seems odd when the major topic of most NAITRIUM conversations revolve about how bad so-and-so is teaching this-and-that course.





Not as good as *Terminator*, but a good film for your dollar. This gets a ★★★ on the Arnie scale.




One of the great moments in the history of NAIT Athletics occurred over this past weekend when the NAIT Soccer Oaks captured the Canadian Colleges Athletic Soccer National Championship in Montreal with a 1-0 win over Seneca of Willowdale, Ontario.

For NAIT Athletics, this is the fourth national title and the first in a sport other than hockey. The win by the Soccer Oaks means that NAIT has the ability to be the best in the CCAA in more than one sport. For too long, observers of the NAIT Athletic program believed that only the hockey team was of national calibre. As of today, you can add soccer to the list.

The credit for the victory must be given to both the players and the coaches. Coaches Stuart Brown and Bob Buchan prepared the NAIT team to perform at their peak at the most crucial time of the season. However, a team can only win if the players come through and this time the players did their job.

As for the players, not one can be singled out for the victory. Winning a national championship is not done by the effort of one team member but rather the whole team. There is no doubt that some players contributed more than others at different times of the year, but each individual played a part.

Let's take time out this week and salute the 1987 Canadian College Athletic Association National Champions—the NAIT Oaks.

Chicks Brace for Home Opener

On Friday, November 20th, the Basketball Chicks open their league schedule at home hosting the SAIT Helenas at 6:30 p.m. followed by a Saturday afternoon at 1:00 p.m. matchup with the Mount Royal Lady Cougars. While SAIT has lost team leader Eve Pollitt to graduation, the Helenas return three year vet Yvonne Van Middlekoop who runs the show from the backcourt.

Saturday's matchup with Mount Royal will feature a strong Cougar squad with a lot of depth. Last season's C.C.A.A. Bronze Medallist, the Cougars, are led by fourth year swingman Dawn Foster, an Edmonton grad who provides strong leadership on the floor.

The Chicks are still on the limp as guards Des Lupul and Kathy Prochnau have been out of action for two weeks and several others are nursing minor injuries. The loss of the backcourt tandem has slowed the Chicks' offensive production and resulted in a personnel shuffling. "We have been struggling lately making a lot of uncharacteristic mistakes as players familiarize themselves with some new roles," noted coach Mero-poulis, who is hopeful the team can get at least one of the injured guards back.

On the weekend the Chicks dropped a one point decision to Grant MacEwan despite leading the whole game and then were soundly beaten on Sunday by Barry T's, a senior women's team.

Soccer Oaks Are National Champs

The NAIT Soccer Oaks left Edmonton on Tuesday November 10th as ACAC soccer champions. When the team returned from Montreal on Sunday November 15th, the Oaks could claim they were the best in the land and brought the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association National Championship home to quell the doubters.

The Oaks became the first soccer team in ACAC history to reach the national championship game and bring home a national title. The Oaks were undefeated in play at Montreal scoring wins over Kings College of Nova Scotia, Durham of Ontario, and Seneca of Ontario.

Game I

The Oaks started the tournament on Thursday, November 12th against the Nova Scotia representative Kings College of Halifax. The Oaks were looking forward to their first game and played well scoring a 6-0 victory.

The Oaks opened the '87 C.C.A.A. National Championships with confidence after a layoff of over a month on a cool Montreal morning. In the first 20 minutes, the Nova Scotia team pressed numerous times, but Edo Otuomagie, Todd Shaw, and Dave Vriens preserved the shutout with outstanding defensive plays.

The opening goal was scored by Charles O'Toole with a low shot from just inside the 18 yard line. The goal was set up on an accurate thread-the-needle pass between two Kings fullbacks off the foot of Scott Parsons. The second goal came from Troy Berkely who connected with a rocket off a volley past a

sprawling Kings goalkeeper. A cornerkick taken by Charles O'Toole set up the marker. Keith Johnson tallied for the third Oak goal from a penalty kick awarded after a hand ball by the Kings inside their own 18 yard box.

In the second half, Scott Parsons was perfectly placed to set up Johnson's second goal. Brian Daniels scored a goal with a header from a Scott Parsons throw in. Daniels set up the last goal by sending a ball to Stefan Johansson, who made a solo run from mid field, got by several players and put the ball into the far corner of the net.

Stuart Brown utilized his strong bench and substituted Lionel Gomes and Roger Payne into the game.

Tim Cleveley recorded his fourth consecutive shutout, making it a remarkable seven shutouts for the '87 season.

Semi-Final

NAIT then advanced to the semi-finals against the Ontario champions, Durham. The Oaks expected a tough match and Durham provided one. When the final whistle sounded, NAIT had advanced the CCAA final by scoring a 3-2 overtime win over Durham.

The Oaks' opening goal resulted from a rush down the left wing by Carlos Melara, who crossed the ball into a crowded 18 yard box causing a scramble. Scott Parsons, pounced upon the loose ball and gave the Oaks a 1-0 lead. Durham College equalized the score on a free kick from outside the 18 yard box on their third attempt to penetrate a strong NAIT wall.

Within five minutes of the

start of the second half, Durham capitalized on a defensive miscue which resulted in a breakaway. NAIT wasn't disenchanted with the early second-half goal and attacked in waves. The pressure continued from NAIT but not until Charles O'Toole had an encounter with Durham's sweeper (resulting in the expulsion of both players) did the tide turn.

Stuart Brown substituted Mike Lelkes for Carlos Melara. This move proved to be beneficial to the outcome of the match. Scott Parsons scored his second goal with minutes remaining and sent the game into overtime.

There was no score in the first 15 minutes of overtime, but both teams did not capitalize their offensive pressure.

At the 5 minute mark of the second half of overtime, the "Hungarian Connection" brought the stands to a roar!! Nadar Takats blasted a shot from 30 yards out which wasn't held by the Durham keeper. Mike Lelkes capitalized on the rebound by slotting the ball into the back of the net.

There were several close calls by Durham to equalize but NAIT withstood the pressure. The Oaks showed the intestinal fortitude and determination required to make it to the national finals.

Final

The national final game could have been billed as the pretenders against the contenders. The NAIT Oaks had never been in championship game before, while the Seneca Braves of Willowdale, Ontario had already savoured victory at the nationals in soccer. NAIT

outscored Seneca three goals to two and wins the national title as the score goes into the record books as a 1-0 win for the Oaks.

In the second half, the action intensified, with hard punishing play and both teams looked for the go ahead goal. The best chance for NAIT occurred early in the half with Brian Daniels beating two players in the mid field and crossing the ball to Scott Parsons, who blasted a low shot at the Seneca goal keeper. A large rebound resulted and Nadar Takats vollied a shot off the crossbar.


Late in the half, Stuart Brown brought in Carlos Melara and strong hitting Kevin McCabe for fresh legs with the looming presence of overtime.

With the match ending in a scoreless draw, two 15 minutes overtime halves were needed to determine a winner. The two overtime halves were uneventful, causing the outcome to be decided on penalties.

NAIT's five shooters for the penalty kick were, in order, Todd Shaw, Keith Johnson, Nadar Takats, Dave Vriens, and Scott Parsons. Tim Cleveley preserved the gold medal by stopping 2 out of 5 Seneca shooters.

To summarize, in the words of coach Stuart Brown, "The win required a gold medal performance to become Alberta's first national champions in men's soccer."

At the nationals, the tournament MVP was Brian Daniels of NAIT. Captain Dave Vriens and goal keeper Tim Cleveley were selected to the national all-star team.
