This week auditors have been scrutinizing NAITSA's accounts. Karen Smith (NAITSA Treasurer) anticipates the auditors' report will cross her desk next week.

Students' association fees represent NAITSA's primary source of revenue. Each full time day student at NAIT pays approximately \$75 in Student Association dues.

Of the dues collected 40% is earmarked for the Athletic Board's budget. In the 1986 -87 term the Athletic Board spent \$159,663. For the 1987 -88 term \$164,634 has been budgeted. Hockey, with a budget of \$31,839, represents the greatest single expenditure.

We can expect a more complete report on NAITSA's financial status from Karen Smith in the next few weeks.
