Starvation Politics - An Introduction

Any glance to the right or left going down a major Alberta Highway, and you see them. A symbol of Canadian agricultural success basking in the sunshine, with perhaps a town name or even an appropriate prayer carefully painted on the side. But behind the rustic image that we have all grown up with,

the grain elevators of this and many provinces across the country are facing hard times along with their oil, fishing, mining and lumber counterparts. What makes for unique consideration though, is not only the tragedy of the situation farmers face today, but the absolute absurdity that is *Starvation Politics*.

The food industry in a prosperous country such as Canada, where we grow a variety of commodities for consumption by humans, is involved in a great *game* that is being played by world powers. The unfortunate part

of the *game* is you get to be a part, but no one tells you the rules or lets you make any moves on the board. They also neglect telling you when it's over. That is because this fiendishly ridiculous *game* has

been going on since the days of colonialism. It basically involves three distinct groups, two of which have no any control of the board and the other, not only telling his fellow players how and where to move, keeps changing the board! Two of the *game's* losers mentioned are the growers and consumers. The third (controlling) party is government; perpetual winners in a match they created.

We have petty dictators in the African and South American countries that provide excellent examples of CYA, or "cover your ass", policies designed to take all they can away from the destitute of their "nation", before their week in office is

up and a new, infinitely stronger dictator assumes power with the cycle repeating. Europe also presents an interesting piece to the puzzle, with their tendency toward heavily subsidizing their farmers. This has the absolute effect of paralyzing the wheat market as North American farmers cannot keep up with the volume of grain coming out of Europe, consequently producing the pictures we see of overloaded graineries sitting idle because of the "glut" on the market. Glut, that is, for countries that can pay for it in the first place.

So, caught in the middle of it, we have the sickening senario of farmers' families being ripped apart as the bank forecloses on their mortgage, coupled with the muted cry of the dying baby desperately attempting to suckle a mother's decayed breast that once provided milk.

On NOVEMBER 14th of this year, an event is taking place that will no doubt signify the realistic beginning of the end of the *game* on this planet. THE END OF HUNGER: A NEW ERA is a satellite forum, linking together 60 cities in 15 countries. Vienna, Helsinki, Bombay, Sydney, New York, Miami and Edmonton, will all participate with the intent of transforming the *idea* of ENDING WORLD HUNGER into a *REALITY*.

The cost for attending the conference in Edmonton is \$30 in real or plastic money, which is well worth the cost of totally ending ..., not reducing ..., *ENDING* world hunger by the turn of the century.

I have been encouraged by more than a few positive comments and lo and behold someone even took the time to compose a written acknowledgment which appeared in last week's Nugget. This is very much appreciated but I tend to be my own worst critic and sometimes wonder to what degree effort rather than content is being acknowledged.

It is therefore especially gratifying to note spontaneous and positive comments about a column. Part of my job as I see it involves locating

Designated Driver Program - They give free pop or juice to anyone who wants it. BCET said that they provide free pop not only to people who would rather not drink, but also to people who have been drinking. This provides people with an alternative to alcohol when they want to stop drinking.

BIO SCIENCE

Designated Driver Program - Bio Science advertises free pop on posters. People who are not drinking, will give rides to others. They have posters listing people willing to drive.

Taxis - Cabs are in front of the hall between 12:30 and 1:30 a.m.

Bio Science had not held their first cabaret before this questionnaire, so they could not say how these programs are working.

CHEMICAL TECHNOLOGY

Designated Driver Program - A pin is worn by the designated driver. People who are wearing the pin get free pop throughout the night. They have had no problems finding rides for intoxicated people from their designated drivers.

Food - They serve a lunch and snack food, such as popcorn, throughout the night.

Chemical Technology said that this has worked reasonably well so far.

CIVIL ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY

Designated Driver Program - Designated Drivers get free soft drinks. Anyone leaving is advised, by the door-men, to call a taxi. They have stickers posted.

They say that this is only half effective because you can't force a person to take a taxi.

COMPUTERS

Designated Driver Program - Free pop or coffee is given to all designated drivers. It has been effective so far.

Advertise - They advertise dancing, prizes and other attractions to get people to their cabarets.

Food - Free food, usually of cold cuts, is served between 11:00 and 12:00. They also serve free pop or coffee.

Security - Security is advised not to let people drive if they are intoxicated. At the last cabaret this was done several times and they called cabs for those people.

Drunkeness - They monitor drinkers and try to reduce drunkenness. They said that this works great.

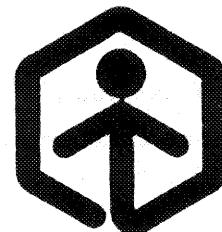
MIC

The Alberta Government has reacted positively to a request by the NAIT Foundation to have \$250,000 of NAITSA's money matched one to one under their matching grant program. Thus, a total project cost of approximately \$685,000 would be funded \$250,000 by NAITSA, \$250,000 by the government, and \$185,000 by the Administration. The project also involves a new office bank for NAIT's athletic coaches and a new Fitness Centre. fine advertising medium, then let's ensure this behaviour does not continue. If anyone sees another person deliberately removing a poster that is not theirs, please let your tech rep know.

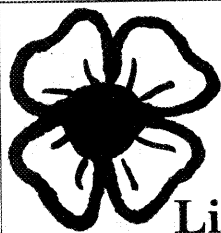
Have you got your ticket for the Nov. 6 Beerfest yet? How about for the Great Ock Fun bus? Just checking.

NAITSA Books Audited

This week auditors have been scrutinizing NAITSA's accounts. Karen Smith (NAITSA Treasurer) anticipates the auditors' report will cross her desk next week.

Students' association fees represent NAITSA's primary source of revenue. Each full time day student at NAIT pays approximately \$75 in Student Association dues.

Of the dues collected 40% is earmarked for the Athletic Board's budget. In the 1986 - 87 term the Athletic Board spent \$159,663. For the 1987 - 88 term \$164,634 has been budgeted. Hockey, with a budget of \$31,839, represents the greatest single expenditure.

We can expect a more complete report on NAITSA's financial status from Karen Smith in the next few weeks.

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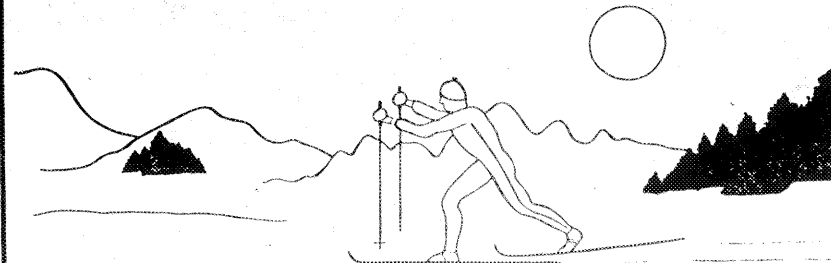

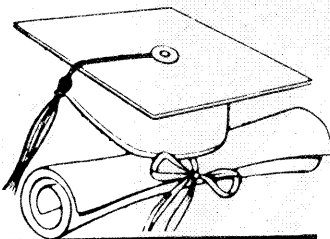

The Career Fair is an excellent opportunity to:

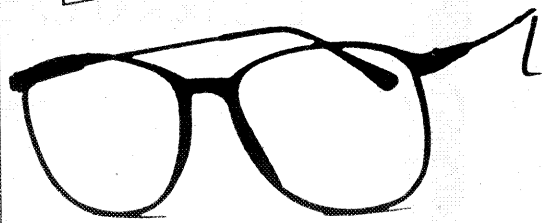
1. Establish contacts for later use in a job search;
