Stagnant Students?

Just what has happened to student involvement? Has the ever increasing complexity of today's technology, (combined with a shorter study period caused by the semester system), tightened the time schedule of students? Has tighter student financing caused an increase in the number of students forced to hold part-time jobs? What can it be that has had an impact on participation in worthy activities such as Shinerama, the Student Association, and aspects of student life other than the norm (i.e. the Nugget, the Northern Torch, intermurals, etc.)

It is discouraging to think that an event such as Shinerama could only attract a roster of 64 students, yet a NAIT cabaret can attract over 400. I would not suggest that students do not deserve a chance to unwind, but I would suggest that if your life involves no more than study or stagger, you are in serious need of self-evaluation.

Instructor Evaluation

In the interests of maintaining and improving professional standards one would expect that any professional body would have, as an integral part of its charter, provision for periodic evaluation of the conduct and performance of its members. The fact then, that any standardized or officially recognized form of instructor evaluation is non-existent at NAIT is a rather interesting oversight.

What is also interesting is the fact that since this situation was made an issue of over a year ago, it was not until much later that student input in instructor evaluation achieved official acceptance.

I believe that an educational institute could be likened to a law firm where students are in effect, the clients and instructors the lawyers. The 'clients' pay a fee (their tuition) and can reasonably expect to be 'represented' in a competent and professional manner, I also feel that if the 'client' finds the arrangement unsatisfactory then he or she

is justified, indeed, ultimately responsible for ensuring that the situation is remedied.

(This may be an unfortunate choice of analogies as circumstances involving lawyers tend to be extreme in nature. I would like to make my position very clear at this point by reiterating that I believe the primary purpose of an evaluation is to improve the quality of education and not to initiate search-and-destroy missions.)

A pilot form of instructor evaluation is currently being mapped out by the Academic Council and the sub-committee responsible will be asking for submissions from both students and instructors. We will have student representation but with this comes considerably more responsibility. It is my job to ensure that students have more than a token responsibility and yours to ensure that it is deserved. John Brownlee

I know I should detach myself from any personal

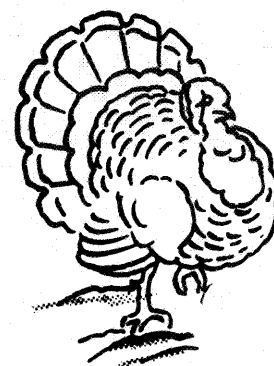
feelings but I just can't seem to do that. Last year I maintained 90 averages in all my courses, *except* for the course with the instructor I couldn't stand.

Women's Self Defence

Recently, NAIT sponsored a Women's Self-Defence class which was cancelled due to lack of interest. Do the women at NAIT feel "protected" by all this male presence? Or do they feel that taking a self-defence course is unfeminine or would make them seem hard or masculine?

Ask yourself, "Am I afraid to walk to or from my car alone when it is dark? Do I worry about my safety when my roommate (husband) is out of town?"

'Wen-Do' is a self-defence class taught by women through the Faculty of Extension at the U of A, and also privately. The basic course takes only 12 - 15 hours and can be done over a three week, six week or an intensive two day workshop. Children as young as five years and women in their seventies have taken this course.

The system is based on three factors: AWARENESS, AVOIDANCE and ACTION. Thus, when you are aware of a dangerous situation or can avoid it in some way, action may not be necessary. If action is required however, anyone can learn basic techniques to defend oneself and get away to safety.

The course is taught by qualified, skilful instructors and learning takes place as a group with all members participating in 'dry' one on one, or even two on one situations.

If you have nine other women interested you can have your own class going. It's fun, it's a good workout and I guarantee you will leave feeling good about your own capabilities and RIGHTS as a person.

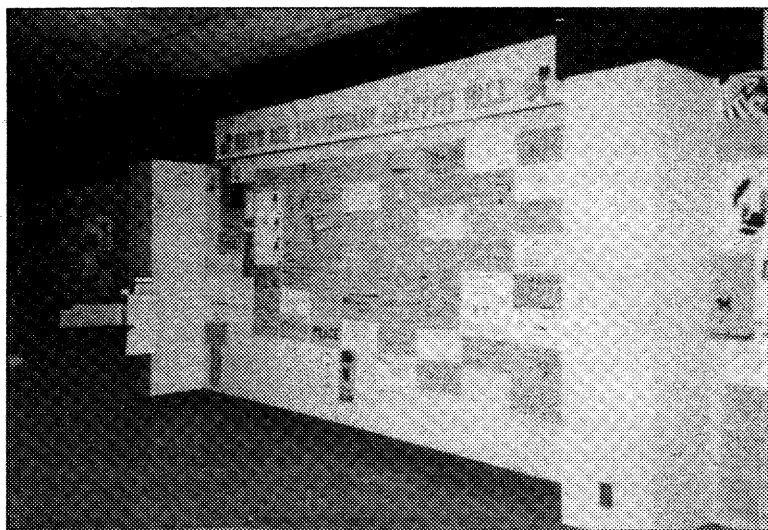

The suspense the movie is aiming for is present in a few spots, but don't worry if you don't find them, just enjoy the rich surroundings.

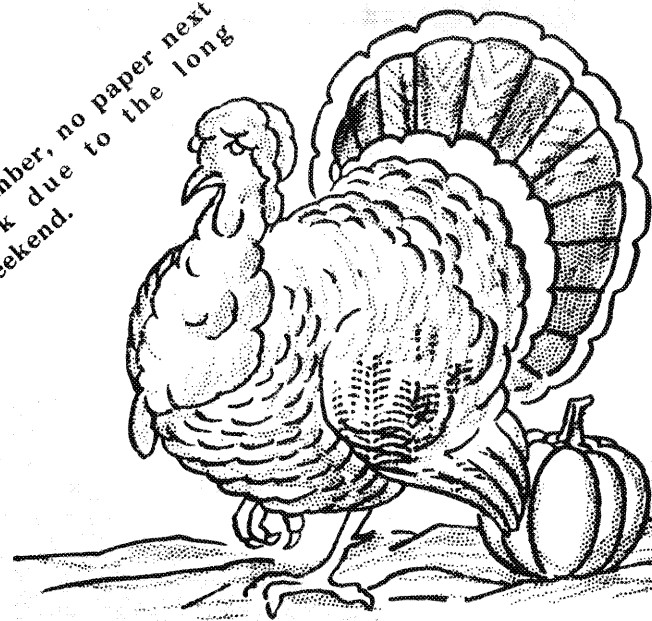

The Princess Bride

The Princess Bride opens this weekend in Edmonton, and I will recommend it to anyone. It is a movie that is part fairy tale, part sword and sorcery, part slapstick comedy, and all fun. Based on the William Goldman book, it is shown as the story of a grandfather, beautifully played by Peter Falk, reading to his grandson, who is sick in bed. We only see snatches of those two, generally concentrating on the story that grandfather is reading.

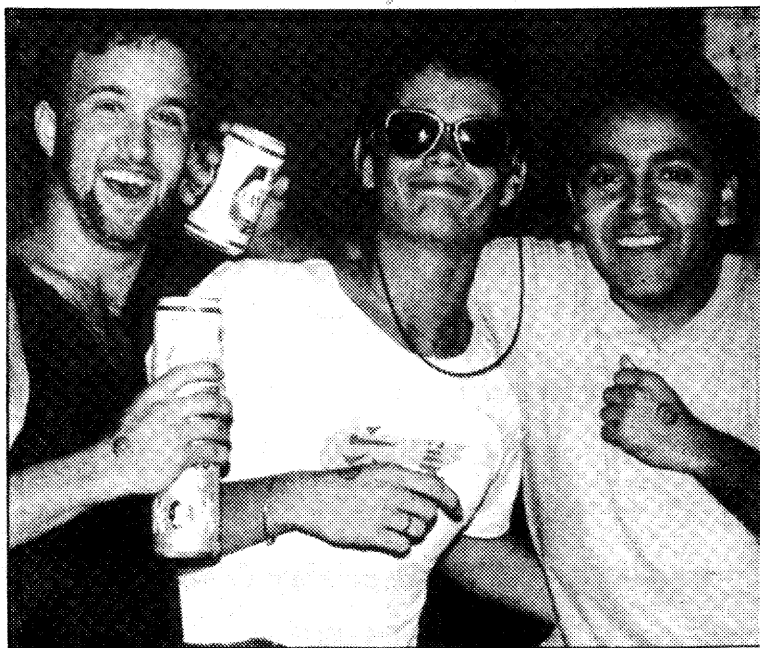

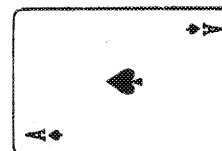

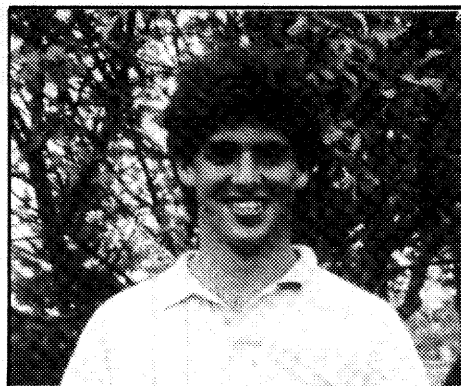
ATHLETE OF THE WEEK

Tiebreaker Decides Tourney

The NAIT Blue-Gold Invitational Hockey Tournament was staged this past weekend for the first time since 1983 and proved to be a resounding success. In the end, three teams finished with records of two wins and one loss (the NAIT Oaks, the Red Deer College Kings, and the Stony Plain Eagles). As a result, a tiebreaker had to be used to determine the winner. The Stony Plain Eagles became the 1987 winners of the tournament on the basis of best goals for and goals against.

The tournament opened up on two fronts on Friday night. The NAIT Oaks scored a dramatic 7-6 come-from-behind victory over the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings at the NAIT Arena. In Stony Plain, the Eagles needed overtime to squeak by Red Deer 6-5.

Saturday night's match-up between NAIT and RDC featured a come-back that fell short for the Oaks as Red Deer held on for a 6-5 win. Tim Willoughby and Roger Holm paced the Kings with two goal performances. Kent Maltais answered with a pair for the Oaks while Dan Hart, Craig Cripps, and Blaine Peerless added singles.

On Sunday, Red Deer downed Camrose 5-4 to keep their chances of winning the tournament alive. Nine

different goalscorers found the net in the contest.

As fate would have it, the last game would decide the winners of the tourney. For NAIT to win the tournament, the Oaks needed a six goal victory. For Stony Plain to win the tourney, the Eagles needed to lose by less than the six goal margin. When the final horn sounded NAIT won the game 3-2, but Stony Plain won the tourney. NAIT goalscorers on the evening were Brian Powell, Rick Chauvette, and Allan Cherniwchan.

The competition in the tournament was very intense. Five of the six games were decided by one goal and one cannot ask for much more.

NAIT now has a pre-season record of six wins, two losses and one tie. The Oaks will close out the pre-season in Calgary with the ACAC Pre-Season Hockey Tournament from October 16th through the 18th. Before the Oaks play in the tourney, there is one more pre-season game. The Oaks travel to Red Deer to take on the Kings on Thursday, October 8th. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

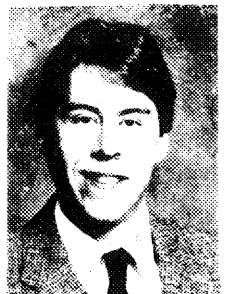

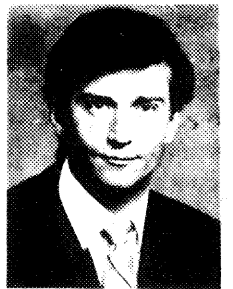

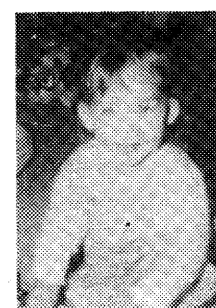
