Canada, Shinerama provides 18% of the funding for the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. This money is used for research on cystic fibrosis.



- CF patients must undergo rigorous treatment programs just to stay alive.


There is no cure.


#### Resident Only **Parking Program** Extended

This is to inform you that the Transportation Department will be extending the existing N.A.I.T. parking program to include the Spruce Avenue neighbourhood. The neighbourhood boundaries are 111 Avenue to Princess Elizabeth Avenue and 101 Street to 106 Street.

The planned extension is the result of a petition from the Spruce Avenue Community League requesting a parking program. To gauge the support for such a program two traffic bulletins were distributed in the area this summer. The result was an overwhelming vote in favor of the implementation of a resident only parking program. The implementation will occur at the end of September, 1987 and the restriction will be:

> Two (2) hours parking except residents with valid permits 0800 - 1800 hours, Monday through Friday

The map shows the revised N.A.I.T. parking program boundaries for your information.









#### **Sports Comment**

At this time athletic departments across the nation are caught in a financial squeeze. The squeeze that has occured is in part the result of government cutbacks. Government funding both at the federal and provincial dropped levels has dramatically in recent years causing a number of colleges and universities to cut their athletic programs as well as their educational programs.

The presence of athletic departments at colleges and universities in Canada has opened up education to individuals who might not have benefitted otherwise. Some students were in the past drawn to schools due to their athletic activities. While these individuals just wanted to participate in a sport at first, they realized that a sound education would be the key to their destiny. As a result, individuals could make a change in career in a method that would cause minimal stress and hardship.

Now with the downsizing of advanced education institutions in general, opportunities for development and selfgrowth have dwindled. The CIAU and the CCAA have slashed budgets drastically and institutions such as NAIT and the U of A have difficulty maintaining the standards required for the world today.

To ensure an educated work force and to encourage development of talents, more government funding is required instead of less. Let's get some action from the governments at both the provincial and federal levels instead of lip service.

The N.A.I.T. Hockey Ooks opened training camp with over 80 indiviuals hoping to make the squad. Of the 80, only eight played with the Ooks last season. Back from last year's A.C.A.C. Hockey Champions trying to win spots are defencemen Marty Volcan, Brenn Leach and Pat Mohrmann, wingers Nigel Cripps, Murray Melnyk, and Darryl Shudra as well as centers Rick Chauvette and Kent Maltais.

Four players trying out with the Ooks have A.C.A.C. experience. Goaltender Bill Clyne and forward J.C. McEwen were members of the Ooks national championship team of 1986-87. Denis McCormack played briefly with the Ooks two years ago. In addition, former Western Hockey Leaguer and Camrose Lutheran College Viking Dan Hart will be trying to stick as a forward.

#### The Future Looks Bright for Hoop-Chicks

With the initial week of tryouts behind them, this year's edition of the Basketball Chicks are looking much improved from last year's squad.

A fine mixture of youth and experience should help the Chicks improve on last year's sixth place finish in the tough A.C.A.C. The Chicks are led by three returnees, guard Kathy Prochnau and forwards Chris Franke and Tracy Guhle. Two rookies with college playing experience will add even more maturity to the squad. Denise Mills (Red Deer College) and Val Duree (Grande Prairie Regional College) should bolster the Chicks front line. Add in a strong rookie crop and the future looks bright for the squad, who have an extensive exhibition schedule planned.

Murray Yewchuk and Brian Powell both played with the Hobbema Hawks while John Curran toiled for the St. Albert Saints.

At the forward position, the Ooks are looking at a number of players. Allan Cherniwchan (formerly of the Sherwood Park Cruscaders), Vince Ashton (previously with the Hobbema Hawks), and Dean Ruthledge (past memeber of Richmond in the BCJHL) are three players wit a good chance to make the Ooks.

The Ooks have also strongly recruited from the Junior B ranks. Craig McJannett, Dean McDonald and Craig Cripps were all members of the Alberta Junior B all-star team last season.

The Ooks played two preseason intersquad games on Thursday and Sunday of last week. Players who looked particularly impressive were Kent Maltais, Wayne Bosse, and Blaine Peerless.

The Ooks will open up their pre-season schedule on Thursday, September 17th against the Hobbema Hawks of the Alberta Junior Hockey League at the N.A.I.T. Arena. The action starts at 7:30 p.m. On Friday, the 18th, the Ooks travel to St. Albert to take on the Saints and on Sunday, the 20th, the Ooks go to Hobbema for a return engagement with the Hawks.
