Hopefully service announcements like Julie's and editorials of this persuasion will increase the utilization of this paper by staff and students alike.



Literacy

Almost everyone in the world knows at least one language in spite of every conceivable form of economic, geographic, physical, cultural, racial or emotional handicap. Is it not logical to assume that, given a reasonable opportunity, almost everyone should also be capable of reading and writing at a comparable level?

According to the recent Southam News survey, as reported in the Edmonton Journal, this is not at all a valid conclusion. This survey indicates that five million Canadians and as many as one in three Edmontonians are functionally illiterate; meaning that they cannot read, write or use numbers well enough to meet the literary demands of today's society.

Specific figures aside, this survey draws attention to a serious and fundamental flaw in modern instructional methods. Try to read something like the American constitution and you will see how much the standards of literacy have dropped over the last few hundred years. Of course, the literacy rate was lower then as a much smaller proportion of the population was educated, but it is this fact of the lowering of the literary standards that points to the source of the problem. Obviously, the methods of instruction employed to achieve the then standards of literacy are not the same as those employed to instruct more modern populations. Perhaps to educate everyone we have sacrificed educating anyone.

My own experiences include tutoring people on a number of different levels. I found that a principle source of difficulty was deficiencies in fundamentals including grammar, spelling, phonetics and definitions of simple words, and that concentrating on those areas produced the best results.

Almost invariably, the best students are the best readers. Universal education would be a far simpler, more feasible and less expensive concept if people were taught to read well first, regardless of the time spent to achieve this.


15th Annual B.C.E.T. Bridge Building Competition
