Do You Know Where Your Money is Spent?

When you paid your tuition fees this past summer, you may have noticed an additional \$10-\$75 was charged for the Students' Association Fee. This amount varies according to the number of hours of your course. The breakdown is as follows:

0 - 199 hours - \$10.00 200 - 399 hours - \$25.00 400 - 699 hours - \$50.00 Over 700 hours - \$75.00

The typical student will pay \$75. But just exactly where does this money go?

\$10 is automatically set aside towards a Building Fund. This fund is basically our "Rainy Day Fund". It will be used for any major purchases in future years for things such as a lounge, Students' Association building, or any major renovations. The fund was used in past years for such projects as "The Dock"at Plaza II, the NAITRIUM, the sudy hall in the North Lobby and renovations to the NAITSA offices.

Another \$30 is allocated to the Athletic Board. Students are entitled to free use of the athletic facilities (gym, sauna, weight room, arena, pool, courts, equipment usage, etc.). Students may also become a member of one or more of the various teams. Intramurals pays a major role with the Athletic Board. Members of the teams are also invited to

the annual awards night banquet held in April each year.

The final \$35 of your Students' Association fee is spent on various administrative costs. The money funds the various activities available to students at no charge or at nominal costs. Each year students receive a calendar, handbook, and weekly newspapers at no charge. The yearbook is also available to students at a low cost.

Each year the Activities Committee puts on various extracurricular activities designed to enrich the student's social life. After a tough week of exams and assignments, students can take in a movie for only \$1.00. Rock 'n Talks are held every second Friday and are a cheap source of entertainment. NAITSA also provides various speakers and entertainers during common hour at no cost to the student. NAITSA also helps fund activities such as beerfest, Queen Week and Orientation Week. The games rooms and student stores are also operated by NAITSA.

Take advantage of what NAITSA has to offer you. Remember that NAITSA is here for you, the student, and if you have any concerns about how your money is being spent, stop in and see us in room E133.

PEER TUTORING PROGRAM

been students helping other students through the introductory service offered by Student Counselling at N.A.I.T. Students who have exhausted all the regular extra-class services and still find themselves needing more help can often get that help from a student tutor.

Peer tutors are people who have already taken the course to be tutored and received a mark of 75% or higher in it. They have registered with counselling and most likely have taken the tutor orientation program offered by Student Counselling. Tutors may be second semester, second year, or graduates of a N.A.I.T. program.

When students want a tutor they are first asked if they have exhausted the other possibilities available to them. They are asked if they checked with their instructor first. Some programs also give remedial classes to students free of charge. Others have "study clubs" where groups of students get together on a regular basis to help each other. There is also the "Drop In Center" in room #A135 for students who need help in math, physics, or English up to the grade twelve level. They can sometimes also provide tutoring for some trade and electrical subjects. But for the students who need more help than the above can give, a tutor may be the next step.

If the application for a tutor is accepted by counselling a five dollar (\$5.00) refundable deposit is required immediately. The deposit is refunded when the student is finished with tutoring and hands in a Tutor Evaluation form' required by counselling. The phone number of a tutor is then supplied to the student, if one is on file for the subject in question. If counselling doesn't already have a tutor for that subject on file, an advertising campaign is conducted in an effort to find

Once the student gets the telephone number of a potential tutor it is that student's responsibility to phone the tutor and make arrangements for a place, time and fee for the tutoring (charges are usually between \$5 and \$10 per hour). If a student is not satisfied with that tutor he/she can request a different person and will usually be accommodated when possible. Not all requests can be met. There are thousands of courses taught at N.A.I.T. each semester and there are not always graduates of those courses who want to tutor. However last year there were only about three requests that couldn't be filled.

Students in any N.A.I.T. program may request a tutor, including Continuing Education registrants. Any student wanting more information should contact the counsellor for their area, or drop into the Counselling Center, room 117, next to the Registrar's Office.



GRANTS

AVAILABLE FOR ENVIRONMENTAL RESEARCH

Who may apply?

Any person, institution, corporation, or society may request research funds. The Trust will give preference to private sector applicants, including individuals, for environmental research which might otherwise not get done.

Environmental research covers a broad range of issues. Anyone contemplating an A.E.R.T. application should review the list of similar projects which can be done by consulting the A.E.R.T. annual report, or the Library of Alberta Environment. Applications should involve specific objectives with tangible potential benefits for the Environment. The proposed research should reflect an innovative concept or approach. The need for Research must be demonstrated.

Deadline date for submission of application for grants is October 31, 1987. Early submission is advised. All applications are reviewed upon receipt by the Grants Advisory Committee. Applicants will be notified as to the Board of Trustees' decision by February 1, 1988. Research projects should be planned to start after this date.



We don't like using scales; however, they do take up less space.


We shall scale movies using the five star method.

"ROBOCOP is set in Detroit in the near future. South Africa has the bomb. Rebel forces still hold the Acapulco airport. But the big story on the nightly news ("give us three minutes, we'll give you the world") is the surging crime rate across America.

A corporation, Security Concepts, Inc, has assumed control of the police station, and in their attempts to control crime have come up with ED 209, a clanging, cannon-fisted "enforcement droid". However, ED 209 fails, and something new is needed. Something like Murphy, who was one hell of a cop until the night he was murdered."

Soon he becomes ROBO-COP and the fun begins!

ROBOCOP, a sci-fi hightech flick that is also extremely violent, but it is "fun violence", not gore like "THE UNTOUCHABLES". "Fun violence"? "The Fourth Protocol"




In 1963, the United States, Britian and the Soviet Union signed an agreement limiting the deployment of nuclear weapons. All but the fourth protocol has been completed.

Pierce Brosnan plays a top Russian spy out to do no good, and Michael Caine, a top British spy out to stop him.






