Bears 8

Close to 7,500 fans watched the University of Alberta Golden Bears down the NAIT Ooks 8-2 at Faceoff '88. Despite the score, the game at Northlands Coliseum was an entertaining, hard hitting affair.

In the first, the NAIT Ooks gained a powerplay advantage in the first minute of play, but failed to capitalize. The U of A then opened the scoring at 4:09 when former Ook Sid Cranston beat NAIT netminder Gates Genereux. The Bears increased their lead to 2-0 on Bret Walter's marker at 7:13. Stacy Wakabayashi of the Bears notched the third goal of the game at 13:40. The

Bears rounded out their first period scoring on goals by Robert Glasgow and Bret Walter at 15:04 and 19:04 respectively. The NAIT powerplay then capitalized with two seconds left in the period as NAIT captain Murray Melnyk completed a Darren Schmidt-Brian Powell set-up.

In the second, the Bears increased their lead to 7-1. Adam Morrision scored on the powerplay at 6:10. Dennis Cranston widened the gap to six goals 36 seconds later.

The Ooks showed some spark in the third as Murray Melnyk scored his second of the game at 2:05 from Mario Sicolo and John Curran. The Bears' Jeff Helland completed the night's scoring with 101 seconds left in regulation.

In the NAIT net, Bill Clyne and Gates Genereux faced 29 shots. At the opposite end, Darren Turner and John Krill were tested 18 times.

NAIT captain Murray Melnyk commented on the loss, "We made some mistakes. We must correct these mistakes and improve our play in order to do well in the post-season."

After the game, NAIT coach Perry Pearn stated the obvious, "We have to learn a lot. We can't expect to win cutting corners. We have to work hard every game."

### **Instructor Evaluation**

I have some good news to instructor evaluation.

A questionnaire soliciting specific views of students regarding individual instructors was piloted in a few classes in December. In January, the Academic Council and NAIT President, Dr. Stan Souch, formally approved a proposed version of the same questionnaire for implementation throughout campus. Later this semester you will be given copies to fill in yourself.

This program will be under review on a regular basis now and in the future.

Part of the problem in An Open Letter adopting a policy of this nature stems not so much from blanket objections on the part of certain individuals (although this was a factor to some degree), but rather from the logistics of arriving at a conclusive form or document that would be both effective and non-prejudicial.

> While the need for such a policy was both recognized and agreed upon by the large

majority of instructors, we did not wish to alienate staff and student bodies by creating anything that could be construed as a witch-hunt.

As well, a program of this nature can be very expensive to administrate. The projected costs for this one are expected to be close to \$20,000 annually.

In my experience on the committee researching an acceptable format, I found the tone to be very cooperative and productive. I feel that the staff and student representatives should be congratulated for their efforts.

My principle objective when I ran for Academic Council last year was to see a policy of this nature in effect. Now, I can safely say that this has been done.

We are already into February and the students' terms on this Council will be over shortly. If you as a student are interested in campaigning or seeking a position in this capacity, now is the time to begin to give this serious consideration. Students CAN have an effective voice in the policies of this institute. Find out more about this through me or your student representative.

shape physically) there are other benefits to consider. There's the mental stimulation that comes from learning something new (or, the satisfaction of doing something well). Horizons expand; a person meets new people, forms new social contacts. Further, a person's perspective and personality changes--there's usually more of a feeling of confidence.

Taking part in a sport or other activity quite often gives a person an added advantage in the career world. That is, if an employee plays squash and so does the employer (or even if the employer simply believes in being active), there's a good possibility--all other things being equal--that a career advantage exists.

Everytime you give up too soon, everytime you don't give an activity a chance, you lose the less obvious--but important-benefits.

If each person approached a sport or other activity with the philosophy: "What was done yesterday is water under the bridge--today is a new chance to do better," there would likely be a lot more consistently active people out

### **Computer Managed Learning**

Computer Managed Learning (CML) has been used for some of the advanced courses at NAIT since 1982. This year, NAIT began a pilot project of introducing CML to Pre-Technology students as well.

CML is a concept in which students interact with the school computer to do their assignments. Let me explain this a little differently. The idea behind CML is that all students work at their own pace. They study a segment of their course, then access the NAIT computer for a print-

outof a quiz on the work they have just studied. Every person gets a slightly different quiz. This makes cheating rather difficult. After the students answer the questions on the quiz, they access the computer again and type in their answers. The computer then checks the answers with the questions and gives you a read-out of the questions you got wrong, along with the correct answers and prints your percentage for that quiz.

There are many advantages to this system of learning. First, it gives students a chance to get hands-on experience with a

computer. Another, as already stated, lets you work at your own pace. Still another added benefit for those who own computers at home, is the ability to do your assignments from the comfort of your own home. A modem and a printer are necessary items if you wish to work from home though. A terminal program with compatible emulation protocol to the NAIT computer is also a must. VT-100 is the most common.

As you can see, there are many positive benefits from this type of learning. The negative side must be con sidered as well. The computer has very little leniency in your answers. They MUST be typed in exactly as the computer would expect them. An upper case "M" is NOT a lower case "m". Instructions must be followed to the letter. If you do not enter your answers exactly as the computer expects then you get it marked wrong. This can be extremely annoying at times.

All in all, it would seem that the good out-weighs the bad and I, for one, feel this type of learning is a good method of taking us closer to the 21st century.

### Acclamations Abolished

When looking at the playoff formats in sports, one notices that some are better than others. The one which is the worst belongs to the National Hockey League.

There is no doubt that Calgary and Edmonton are two of the top teams in the NHL. However, it is unfortunate that only one of these teams can make it to the final.

Over the years, fans have noticed that one team in the Norris division always makes it to the semi-finals while better teams in the Patrick and Smythe Divisions have been eliminated. In addition, some of the teams in one division have a point record which is better than some of the other teams in the playoffs.

One of the better solutions to the problem of playoff format is to allow 12 of 21 teams into the playoffs instead of the current 16. Each division winner could receive a bye into the second round of the playoffs while the remaining four teams in the conference would meet in the first round. The top two teams from each division could advance to the playoffs, while the other two positions would be taken by wild-card teams.

This format would allow the best teams in a conference into the playoffs. In addition, teams would be given the incentive to improve to make the playoffs. Teams would not be able to limp into the playoffs.

At the present time, the owners want to milk as much money as they can out of the fan in the playoffs. The possibility of greater income has meant the first series in the Stanley Cup playoffs has increased from three games to seven games in recent years.

In addition, the owners are fearful that if less clubs make the playoffs the NHL will lose some franchises. At present, the play in the NHL is watered down compared to the six team league. The loss of of one or two franchises would improve the quality of play in the league.

Let's cut the season schedule or cut the number of teams making the playoffs. One does not need an 80 game schedule to trim five teams from the playoffs.

The NAIT Men's and Women's Volleyball Ooks travelled to Olds on Friday, January 29th to tangle with the Broncos. Both the men's and women's teams swept their matches in three straight games.

In women's action, NAIT became stronger as the match wore on. The Ooks fell behind early but bounced back to take the match in three games (15-12, 15-6, 17-15).




In men's action, the NAIT Ooks dominated the Broncos and won the match three games to none (15-8, 16-14, 15-8).


In women's doubles. Nicole Perrot and Kim Shomachuk brought home the silver after losing in the final to Red Deer College.

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
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
