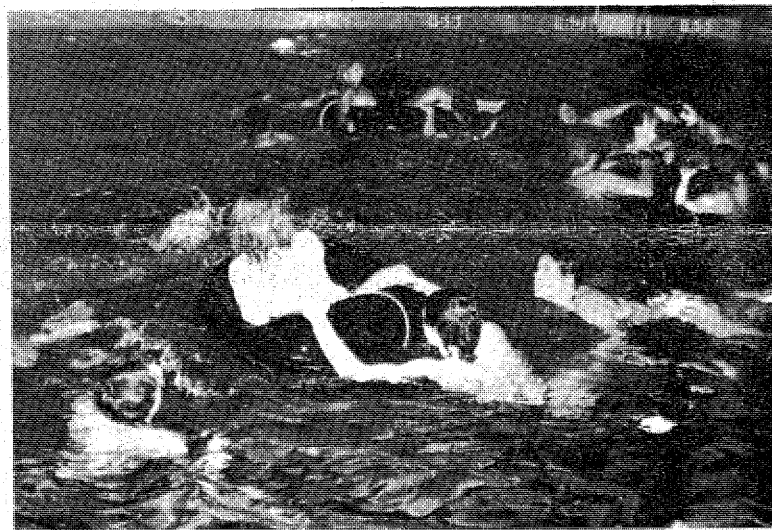

A Case Of Olympic Secrecy

The 1988 Calgary Winter Olympics are the talk of the nation this year. From Vancouver to Halifax, Canadians are "Sharing the Flame", or the spirit, of this event that may never happen again in our lifetimes. But in the same breath that the other provinces and municipalities sigh, wonder and salivate over the tremendous economic boost Alberta is about to receive, they also grimace and shake their heads toward Edmonton, as we have been falsely branded as apathetic.

Recent local and national media reports have made Edmontonians look "tight walled", by broadcasting that ticket sales for the Games are very low for some events. What the news reports do not convey is that, insofar as Edmonton is concerned, tickets have only been made available to us within the span of two months! It is a case of poor marketing and inefficient distributing on the part of the Olympic Games Commission that has led to this situation, and we are getting a tremendous load of the B.S. thrown our general direction because of it.

According to BASS ticket outlets here in Edmonton, there are tickets available, and, should they be purchased now, they would be delivered before the end of January. However, events such as the Men's Downhill, and all but two of Canada's Hockey matches have "been sold out for some time". It seems that Edmonton has only been given a "...certain amount of tickets..." for our use. Bass also says that tickets have been on sale for almost a year now, but that the ticket lists, the papers authorizing what can and cannot be sold, have only "been out for one month". Consequently, an example of the available hockey games

for Team Canada are a definite must for fans. You get to see two of the world's great hockey powers, *Switzerland and Poland*, faceoff against Canada in a test, not of athletic ability, but one of either not dying of laughter, or simply staying awake! I can hardly wait.

There have been offers heard on the radio for packaged tours, but officials at Sport Tours, the organizer of many sporting-type "excursions", indicated that these packages are also nothing to jump for joy about. "Ticket sales are dead in the water", quoted one official, "It has been a simple case of poor organization on Calgary's end." He went on to state that it is very difficult to market a product that you are not even sure you have available. The general consensus here seems to be that tickets were available, but no one knew where they were, how to get them and what was available. Those that were and are available are "second rate tickets for second rate events".

What does this all mean? It seems to communicate that the Olympic Commission enjoys spending money on flashy commercials to get us all hyper and patriotic about the games, but has trouble delivering on what they offer. It also seems to say that the "rivalry" between Edmonton and Calgary is no longer limited to the ice-arena or the football field, but now also appears to have engulfed general commerce.

Upon trying to get a comment on this situation from the proverbial "horse's mouth", (pardon the pun), namely the Olympic Games Commission themselves, I discovered that this was not possible. The Commission does *not* have an office in Edmonton, its only location is in Calgary.

Whose Body Is It Anyway?

Apparently, it is now possible to have your body medically preserved for extended periods of time and subsequently revived. There is a company in the United States making bookings. It is also now possible to transplant heads from one body to another. (It has been done with monkeys although there is still a problem reconnecting the spinal cord.)

Some of these technological achievements were recently discussed in a CBC radio interview and the implications are quite fascinating. For instance, if you were to die of an incurable disease, a new body could be cloned from yours, given birth to and grown to maturity. Meanwhile, your head, removed from your original body, would remain in a state of preservation. (It is cheaper to have just your head preserved rather than your whole body.) Some of the legal and ethical implications of anticipated medical milestones will create problems never before considered.

If this sounds too futuristic, consider the case of the

wealthy Chilean couple who were recently killed in an accident. Prior to their deaths, a fetus was conceived and frozen in a laboratory situation in Australia. Should the fetus be disposed of, further preserved or implanted in another surrogate mother? Just who was responsible for making this decision? Was the fetus a ward of government, the couple's heir or indeed a "person" at all being as it had yet to be born? Is a fetus a person and if so at what point does a fetus achieve this condition or state? If it was determined the fetus was indeed a ward of the government, which government? The Australian or the Chilean?

As far as the question of ownership of the cloned body is concerned, there are some additional concerns I have. It is assumed, of course, that you are in your head or that you are your head, or your brain, or whatever. What happens if you are somewhere else, say in your left shoulder or liver, for example? Being that you would have departed with the remainder of your body, would this mean that you are no longer the owner of your head? And how would this be determined?

What about the clone? Could it not be considered that he or she would be the one actually having jurisdiction over that body rather than you? And if you are in a body part (let's presume it is the head), where do you make the distinction between you and the head?

Heavy stuff. I'm glad I am not a lawyer.

Blood Pressure

Blood pressure is simply the push of the circulating blood against the walls of the arteries as the heart pumps blood to all parts of the body. You couldn't live without some blood pressure.

Your blood pressure changes from day to day and from moment to moment. It rises when you are active or excited and goes down when you rest or sleep. This is quite normal. In some people, however, blood pressure goes up and stays up and stay that way. When this happens, the person is said to suffer from high blood pressure or "hypertension".

Blood pressure is measured at two phases of the heart's action. The contracting phase is called "systolic" and the relaxing phase is "diastolic". Your blood pressure is recorded with the systolic reading over the diastolic, for example, 120/80.

The causes of high blood pressure are not fully understood. However, the following factors seem to be important: Heredity, Age, Excess Weight and Salt Intake. Blood pressure may rise in women on the "Pill", so they have a special

reason to have their blood pressure checked.

High blood pressure makes the heart work harder and increases pressure in the arteries. This may damage the heart, the brain, the kidneys or the eyes.

If you combine high blood pressure with smoking, high blood cholesterol levels or diabetes, the risk of heart attack is even greater. Experts estimate that about one out of ten Canadian adults have high blood pressure.

High blood pressure can be treated and controlled. This may mean taking medication, cutting down on salt, losing weight, moderate exercise or a combination of these things.

Remember... you can't tell if you have high blood pressure and being young and feeling fit is no guarantee.

Have your blood pressure checked at least once a year - more often if your doctor recommends it.

The Staff of Health Services at Main, Patricia and Plaza II Campus encourage you to come in to have your blood pressure checked, and will be delighted to answer any queries on this or other health matters.

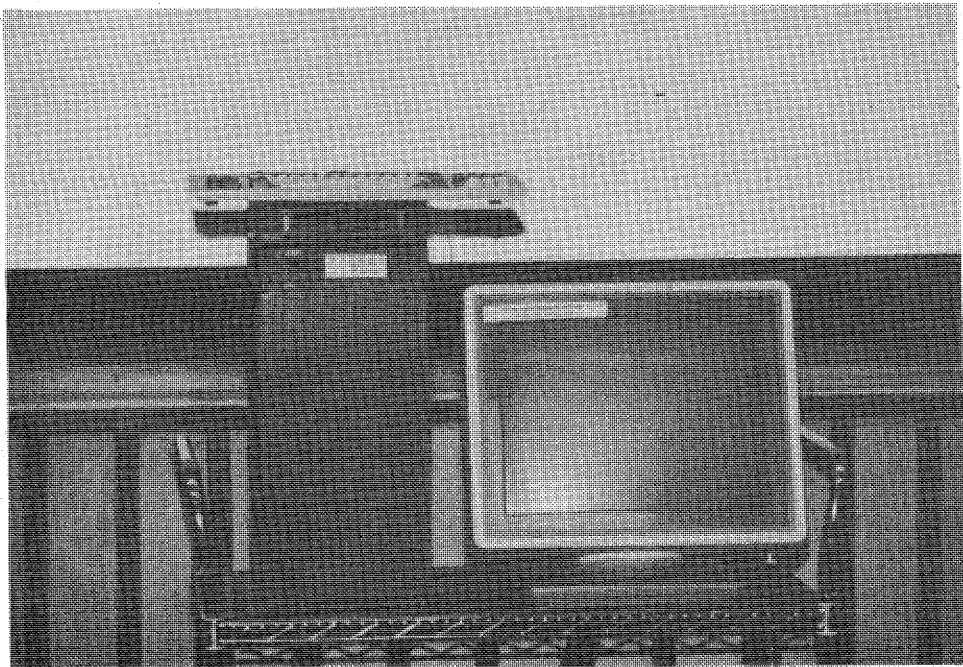

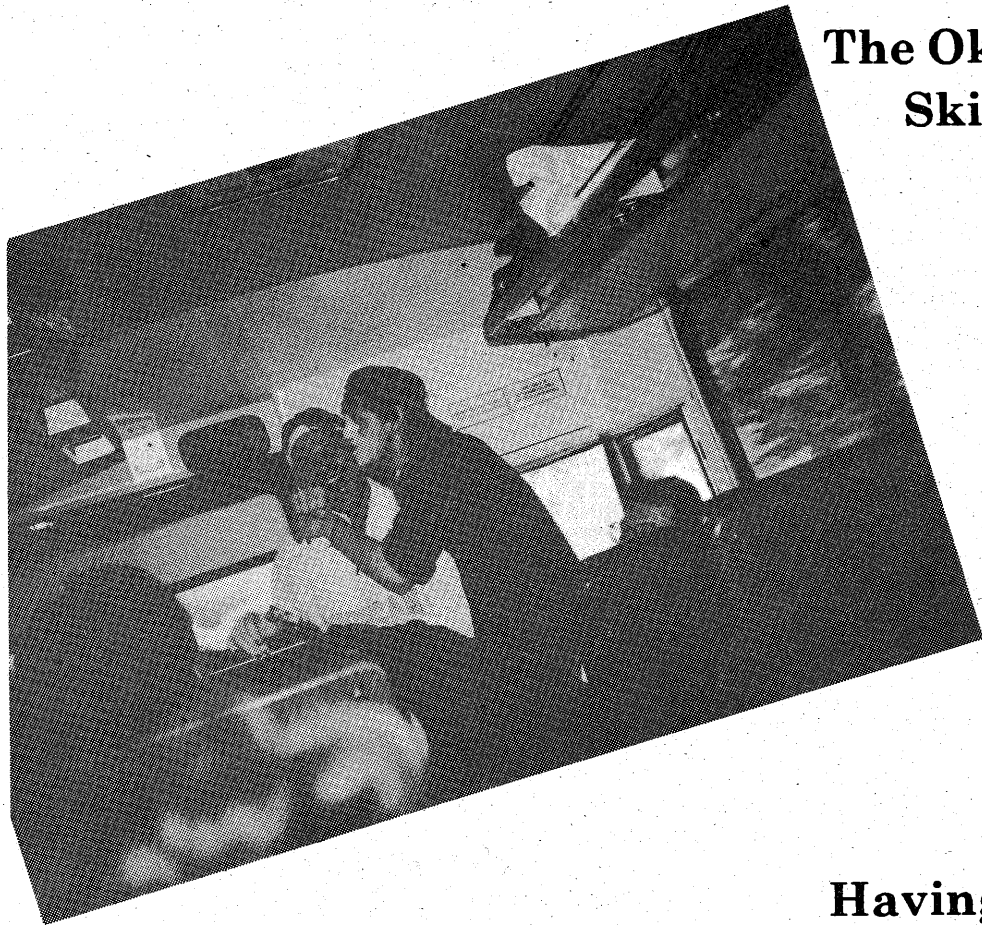

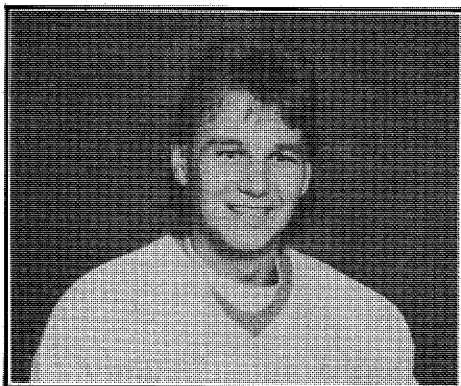

In the past twelve months, the National Hockey League has become synonymous with sports violence.

Three incidents come to mind immediately. In the Stanley Cup Playoffs of last spring, Ron Hextall did a good hatchet job on Kent Nilsson. Then, early this season, Dave Brown of the Philadelphia Flyers decided that a cross-check in an opponent's face will be sweet revenge. Then, Dino Cicarelli of the Minnesota North Stars decides to swing his stick at Luke Richardson of the Toronto Maple Leafs.

One would think the NHL would have learned its lesson years ago in that ugly stick swinging incident between Wayne Maki and Ted Green. As a result of that jousting match, Green had a metal plate inserted in his head. Even, Billy Smith's escapades in the Stanley Cup Playoffs a couple of years ago should have spurred the league into action. However, the league decided to sit still.

Since John Ziegler has become president, the NHL has deteriorated into a glorified roller-derby on ice in some instances. When there were opportunities for swift punishment, the NHL abdicated its authority to hand out fines and punishment.

Stronger fines and longer suspensions are required to take the goon tactics out of the NHL. A fight between a pair of heavyweights is understandable. In contrast, when one has to resort to using the stick as a weapon, the league should not condone the activity by doing little to resolve the situation.

The problems of stick swinging are magnified in the pros. However, if minor hockey would deal with the situation early on, the habit would not prosper later on.

If consistent refereeing would exist, hockey should institute a rule that for every eight high sticking penalties a player receives, a suspension of two games should be handed out. Players might learn self-control and coaches might be able to encourage their players to keep their sticks down.

OOKS Christmas Trip
