We Are Not Cows, We Are Poor Movie Buffs!

All the pure economists out there are no doubt shaking their heads. "Increases are a fact of life!", they cry. "Without them we would not have inflation or the downturning spiral Ruthian effect which keeps our economy alligned with that of Jupiter's second moon...", and on they go trying to justify pure greed under a mask of theorems and postulates.

I have nothing against these people, even when they are occasionally right about something. But when I get approached and asked why I so adamantly oppose the recent hikes in movie theatre admissions, and am told that my wrath is unjustified because of this or that graph, I ask if that theory can place \$7.00 in my pocket. True, movies do not cost that amount yet, but there is strong indication that this, and higher prices, will be the norm for us helpless fans of the silver screen in years to come.

Now it's true that we don't have to go to the theatre. With nearly every home owning a VCR, Pay TV, or both, it would be logical to assume that more people are spending time indoors. However the recent upsurge of people going back to the theatres has prompted the fat moguls to scratch their bellies in delight while seeing how much a gullible public will shell out for entertainment. Prior to 1981, an adult admission was \$4.50. According to a survey of 10 theatres in Edmonton, the price rose 50¢ during Christmas of 1981 and remained dormant for 4 years, no doubt due to the VCR craze. In Christmas (again) of 1985, admissions again swung up, reaching \$5.00, but this was before theatres regained their lost popularity with the general public. In 1985, when both Cineplex Odeon and Famous Players recorded the

best overall season for sales in 10 years, the price again shot up to \$5.50.

As the good times for the companies continued, prices again went up at Christmas time to \$6.00 and to \$6.50 a year later in '86. In December of 1987 they AGAIN went up to \$6.50 and in the U. S. they went to \$7.00 this Christmas as a "test" of the market.

As you may guess, neither Cineplex Odeon nor Famous Players head offices were available for comment on the reason for these latest increases over so short a time. Even Odeon theatres, such as the Cineplexes and the downtown theatre, declined comment, saying that "Toronto is the place to talk to." Famous Players Theatres were a little more cooperative, but even they were not "allowed" to discuss prices or potential increases. So whether or not we ARE going to \$7.00 will remain a mystery until the mega-corps make up their minds.

The sad part of this whole absurd escapade, is that ordinary people are the ones who will suffer. I am one of the fortunate ones that can still afford to go to films, even at the current rate. But there are those that are not so lucky and cannot see the movies they like unless they come on television. I happen to love movies because I grew up viewing them at least once every week. It is hard to imagine being a child today and NOT being able to go to a film because even mom and dad can't afford it.

This policy is long term suicide for the movie theatre as we know it. If this trend continues, we may see many theatres going out of business when the population decides it will not or can not provide the funds to get in, and this will hurt anyone who has ever enjoyed a movie. Let's hope that the big movie moguls prove they don't have popcorn for brains and the vision of dim houselights.

Money

According to Edmonton Sun columnist Bogdan Kipling, the White Houses' "Report of the Presidential Task Force on Market Mechanisms" indicated that America's entire financial system "approached breakdown" the day after last October's stock market crash.

It is scary to think that our financial system could be so fragile, especially when we stop to consider the ramifications of its possible demise. i.e. a global depression.

How did this situation come about in the first place? I think this question could best be answered by looking at money from a fundamental viewpoint.

What is money but a medium of exchange? We provide a service or goods in exchange for something of equal value. Before money there was a barter system. Money is a refinement of that system.

In a capitalist system, money can be made without providing or producing anything of exchangeable value. This is called speculating. If you bought enough gold when it was worth \$35 an ounce, you would be rich today.

Fortunes are made and lost speculating on the projected prices of land and commodities, etc. Speculation creates an artificially inflated value on goods. (A Van Gogh painting recently sold for over \$40 million.) The end result is loss of confidence in the monetary system and a huge disparity of wealth between average citizens and those of financial means. (The rich get richer and the poor get children.)

A government can prop up or bail out the system for a time but the actual worth of an individual, company or country is based on exchangeability, be it smiles or exports. As long as this fundamental is absent, money is no longer fulfilling its function and will eventually be replaced.

NAIT Team Stunned At CMA Competition

A marathon student business competition held on January 15 and 16 resulted in students from Lethbridge Community College chosen as the best strategic decision-makers during Bus-Comp 88, held at the University of Calgary.

The competition, sponsored by the Society of Management Accountants attracted nearly 60 business students from 10 post-secondary institutions across Alberta, including a team from NAIT. As yet, there is no word on how the BAS team of Burt Huot, Graham Dobson, Bruce Kirk and Mark Maltese ranked in the competition, but team coordinator Bill Fricker says they were not too pleasantly surprised by the case they were given to solve.

The problem involved the weakness in the budgetary control system of a decentralized, multi-national firm and the relationship between head office and unit managers. The case, which is a sample problem from the Harvard Business School, was 14 pages in length and took the full 9 hours, over 2 days, to solve.

"We put on a good display, but we were expecting a more numbers oriented case", said Bill Fricker, "Instead, we got a managerial case that we were able to apply some accounting principles to, but on the whole it was far removed from what we expected."

All of the teams' recommendations were presented to a panel of 6 judges who simulated a Board of Directors. The judges, all Certified Management Accountants (CMAs), evaluated the quality of each team's plan of action and representational style.

Each competing team was scheduled with nothing but their business knowledge, a computerized information system and preliminary reference material on the company and industry. A data manager in another room transmitted quarterly consulting reports and economic and financial conditions to each team via computer. Teams responded by feeding back operating results based on this information.

From all reports, the NAIT team did exceptionally well. From this year's experience, NAIT will certainly be a contender for taking the next Bus-Comp title.

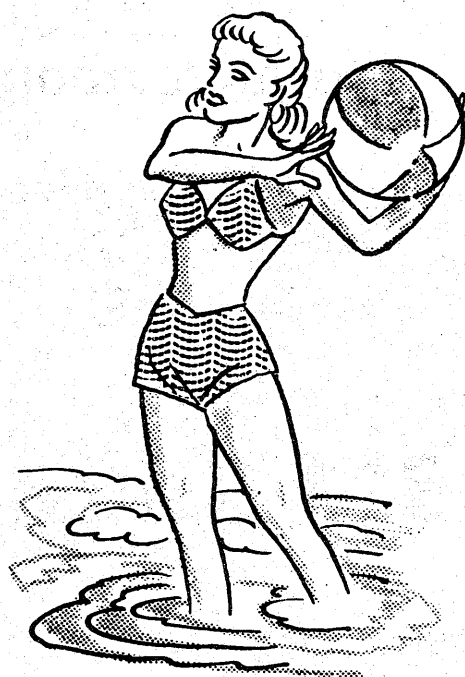
BAS / Secretarial Beach Bash

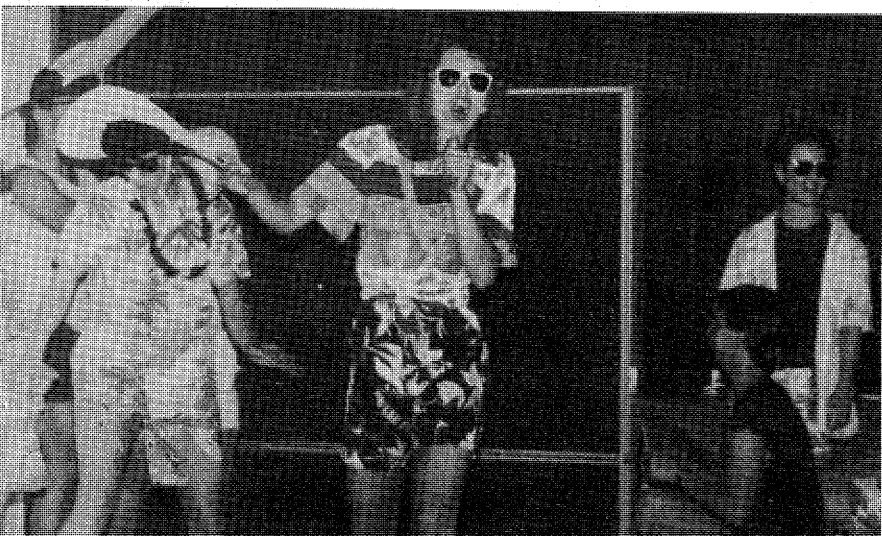
The week was a fun-filled one with many surprises. All the contestants had terrific spirit and would have all equally represented NAIT well.

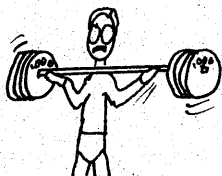

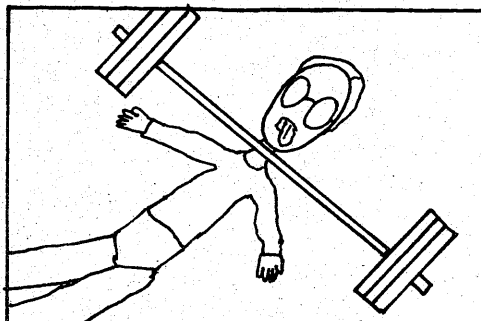

The Last Emperor

If your movie recipe calls for a liberal dose of "Hugeness" and "Colour" along with Peter O'Toole and a wartime chronology, then *The Last Emperor* is definitely your movie. If, however, you tend to get a numb butt after watching *Dynasty* at home, then 2 hours and 45 minutes of straight screen ingestion may not suit you. My knees were telling me, as I walked back to the car afterwards, that this film is perhaps a little too long! However, I also feel that the film does not completely represent the whole story of the Last Emperor.

It details the life of the last Emperor of China, Pu Yi. From 1903-1967, we see him thrust into power, and relative imprisonment in his own city and eventually fall from power, if it was truly ever attained. Peter O'Toole makes a brilliant, but all too brief appearance in this film, as the Emperor's tutor, and is one of the few who actually tell the poor man the truth. This film is a chronicle of despair, with the historic protagonist portraying the Aristotelean tragic hero.

I highly recommend this film, even if you are not a student of recent history, and give it ★★½.

Fighters should not be allowed in the ring unless they are in top physical condition and in top mental condition. Changes are required immediately before another individual becomes a vegetable or a fatality.

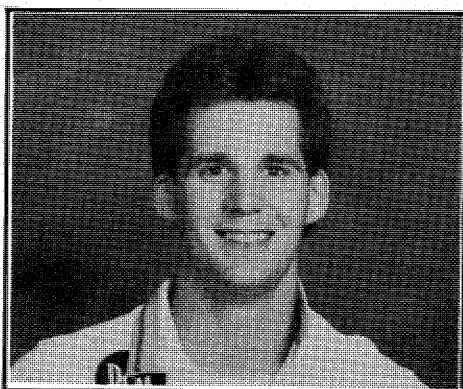
