

The Philosopher's Corner "Observing The Obvious"

I did a course one time that consisted of little more than exercises in observing obvious things. Now while that may sound ridiculously easy, I found it to be quite the opposite. Simple, yes, but not

I'd always felt that my observations of life and others around me were fairly accurate but when actually doing the exercises I became aware of a tendency to "fill in" areas of missing information with assumptions that I subsequently (and unconsciously) accepted as fact. Later, I began to notice this same tendency in others.

The implications of this inclination struck me as being quite ominous. Just how many observations had I made in my life that were based on assumptions and therefore inaccurate?

(Whether or not drawing this specific conclusion was an object of the exercises is irrelevant, I believe. What I found personally rewarding about having done them, was the resolve I formulated to try to really "look" at life and the world around me in the future.)

What brought this to mind now, was an example I learned about the other day. A man quite set on divorce complained to his psychologist that his wife always nagged him. She would go out to a meeting leaving him to clean up the kitchen. He would do this, but later, when she arrived home, not only would she not bother to thank him. as soon as she walked in the door she would demand to know why he hadn't cleaned the dishpan in the sink.

The psychologist responded by agreeing that yes, that was interesting. But why hadn't he cleaned up that dishpan in the sink?

Well, the question nagged at this man for several days before he realized the answer. His wife hated seeing things left incomplete and he was

from August to April.

deliberately creating a situation that he knew would irritate her. It was his means of establishing control in their relationship. By creating that effect on her he was demonstrating that he was not going to be pushed around.

I was very impressed by this psychologist's approach. I don't know if his client's realization salvaged the marriage or not. The point is the psychologist asked what turned to be a very logical, significant and obvious question. But the assumption that I guess you or I would make is that yes, he was being victimized by a nasty and inconsiderate wife, how unfortunate that he had to put up with her, etc. We make the wrong assumption and sympathize with him. (We may be kind but not very effective.)

Some of us are in this educational institute to acquire a degree of management skill. When we are dealing with others and their problems the natural thing to do is to lend them a sympathetic ear and try to see things from their perspective. While this may be helpful, I believe it is a somewhat limited approach.

I am not saying that we all have to acquire the skills of a deep dark recesses of everyman in the above example to lock the doors, yet allow drew his own conclusion, the psychologist did not do it for

We want to be effective in our dealings with others. When we become managers we want to be successful. Granted, we need to acquire skills in order to achieve this and it can be difficult and it does require practice, but it does not have to be complex.

I contacted the University of Alberta and inquired as to what their hours were during the holidays. The head of security told me "...the actual time varies from building to building, yet we were open from December 29 to January 3 excluding December 31."

When I asked if lockers were available for access during that time, he indicated that those areas were freely accessable. I then spoke with Mr. Bob Kerr, NAIT's director of the physical facilities. I asked him to comment on why NAIT is closed during these times. He replied that two main concerns fall into play. One is trust. There is a collective agreement with the union for security staff that provides for time off during the Christmas/New Year extended hours during Easter. Secondly, power and utilities are "a concern" which is maintained by shutdowns during these periods. He also indicated that we are always looking to evaluate and improve the situation for students. In other words, if the demand is seen, it will be provided for Furthermore, work is being done to facilitate one of the tower computer labs being open 24 hours, which would be a marked improvement for CST students.

I suppose that we can conclude from this little story that no matter how absurd "policy" may seem at the time it is implemented, there is method to all "madness," even at NAIT.

"It's the only competition of its kind in Western Canada," said Edith Wieler, SMA's Director of Marketing. Students may work 15 hours a day in the marathon competition. Apart from Bus-comp '88, the only other similar competition in all of Canada is held by Queens University in Ontario.

The Computerized Business Simulation Competition team will be chosen from Dale Bowes, Dennis Poon, Greg Dougan and Sandra Tchir. The Case Competition team will be chosen from Graham Dobson, Bert Huot, Bruce Kirk and Mark Maltais. The three team members will analyze an accounting case and present it to a panel of judges.

Judges were chosen from government, industry and public accounting practice and include CMAs, MBAs and a

New Cars For Students

NAIT Automotives students are now using 12 new General Motors cars and 3 new Fords in their training.

Eight Chevrolet Celebrities have been completely stripped and their parts mounted on stands.

The Celebrities were part of a donation by GM of a Cadillac, an Oldsmobile Tornado, and two Buicks, all received toward the end of September. A 1987 Mustang and an '87 Tempo were also received in mid November from Ford Motors.

"We're first on the list for donations, but we don't have to abide by any rules GM sets down," said Blaine Thorsley, Program Head of the Automotive Section. NAIT is involved in a GM co-operative training program, and GM technicians also use the Cadillac, Tornado and Riviera in their training.

A car engine might last 8 to 10 years in the Automotives program. They are taken apart and put back together again 10 times a year, for a possible total of 1000 times.

I think it is not very good because if you allow for a summer semester it will deprive NAIT students of finding jobs.





QUALIFICATIONS

CAMPAIGN CONDUCT

- 1. There will be no kidnapping or stealing of candidates.
- 2. Common sense regarding campaigning must be used. Each technology is responsible for their members' actions. If a member is caught not following the rule, his or her technology will be disqualified from the Queen campaign

REQUIREMENTS



So many movies we see are so categorized. You pay your \$6.50 (or now \$7.00) and can tell within 5 minutes if you are watching a typical boy meets girl story or an action adventure. For the 1980s audience, movies have become somewhat predictable. Fortunately we have films like Broadcast News to remind us that movies are also reflections of the complexities of true life.

Set in a Washington television news centre, it is the story of three people. They are: an anchorman (William Hurt) who knows nothing about the news he reads; a brilliant reporter (Albert Brooks) who can tell a story with bombs going off or interview Khadafi, but feels inferior as he does not read the news, and therefore cannot earn the 'big' money; and a very capable and tough producer (Holly Hunter) who happens to have one of these gentlemen fall in love with her while she loves the other. The plot is rather simplistic yet one of the richest of the year, with the actors displaying human emotions which, for once, are as confusing and unclear as those of regular people.

While the film does drag a little at some points (such as the "emotional" scenes with the producer all by herself) it NOTE: comedy; it kept me mostly to offer this wonderful film. chuckling throughout.

When Steve Martin merely appears in a film, it is treat for comedy lovers. However, when he writes, produces, and stars in a (distinctly) unique film, it is simply marvelous. Roxanne is such a film, as can be seen this weekend in the Little Theatre. For the first time, we observe-Martin in a role that is apart from his tradition "slap stick" genre. "The Man With Two Brains" and "All of Me" were two of his best, and yet seemed to lack the subtle realism of this film.

Shot in Nelson, B.C., it's the story of a small town firechief (Martin) who has an uncharacteristically big nose, plus an equally wholesome debonaire quality. This fellow can defeat anyone, with rapier-like wit, or the nearest tennis racket, if need be. He ends up falling for Roxanne (Darryl Hannah) a visiting astronomer who in turn has fallen for a new fireman, a gentleman who possesses regular facial features as well as inferior interpersonal skills. He is as debonaire as the proverbial bull in a China Shop. A fascinating triangle develops into a wonderful story that is sure to charm and entertain.

Over the past three years, more than 30,000 fans have been attracted to Northlands Coliseum to see the annual matchup between the NAIT Ooks and the University of Alberta Golden Bears.

Before Faceoff '85, there were many individuals throughout. Northern Alberta who felt a game between the Bears and the Ooks would fall flat on its face. The attendance of that first game speaks for itself. Over 13,000 fans watched the Bears down the Ooks.

One of the image problems the Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference has faced over the years is that of being able to compete with CIAU counterparts. NAIT proved once and for all that the U of A Bears can be the second best amateur hockey team in the city when the Ooks soundly defeated the Bears in Faceoff '86.

Although the fan support in 1986 was slightly less than in 1985, many observers believed that the annual showcase for the Bears and the Ooks at the Coliseum would go the way of the dinosaur. The fans proved the pessimists wrong as over 10,000 watched the Bears triumph in Faceoff'87.

Faceoff '88 between the Bears and the Ooks is coming up on Tuesday, February 2nd at the Northlands Coliseum. NAIT coach Perry Pearn is hoping to avenge last year's defeat while Bears' coach Clare Drake wants to prove his Viking Cup victory was no fluke.

In contrast to the NHL, which has become a skating league by most standards, the battles between NAIT and the U of A are usually hard hitting affairs. If last year's game is any indication, there will be more hitting in the first five minutes than you see in an entire NHL game.

As for price, the game is one of the best entertainment values in town. The price for a family of four going to an Oilers game could easily exceed \$100. In contrast, tickets for Faceoff '88 are reasonably priced at \$7.00 in the reds and at \$5.00 in the blues.

With the game being played in the Coliseum, the players are given the chance to display their talents in a game which will be one of the high points of a hockey career. More often than not, the players excel and the fan is the winner.


