

This is a guide to the various displays and attractions featured at this year's Open House. Please see the map on page 5 for additional location information.

Air Conditioning Engineering

Labs A182a and A182b will be open. Program Head Jack Aanen will discuss job opportunities, type of work, work environment, earning power, and course content in T503 at 11 a.m. on March 11.

Animal Health

There will be a surgery (static) simulation in E-210 and E-211. E-212 will also have displays. Other displays include a video tape, blood collection, and a microscope. Course descriptions will be available.

Architectural

Four strong architectural elements will be displayed in the North Lobby. There will also be architectural models of an office tower and house construction. Samples of student work from all three options and first and second years will be shown. A slide show on effective communication skills will be presented.

Athletics

There will be general information on team sports and A.C.A.C. in the gym.

Business (All areas)

There will be an interactive TV (much like "Max Headroom") in E-115

showing well-known personalities. As well, there will be a continuous showing of computers and video tapes.

Chemical Technology

Chemical technologists are employed in environmental study and research, chemical production and quality control, food industries, oil and hydrocarbon study and research, chemical sales, general chemical research, and other fields too numerous to mention. Location: G109, G110, 1st floor G-Wing.

Biological Sciences

Poster display, cell fermentation and electrophoresis setups. Location: F-202, F-206, F-210, E-201, E-102.

Building Construction

A display in the North Lobby will consist of scaffolding built by students. A mascot will also be present.

Combined Lab and X-Ray Technician

Lab equipment, ECG machine, X-Ray film, and slide presentation in gym.

Computer Systems Technology

On the second floor of the Tower Building there will be three rooms of exciting computer displays, demonstrations, films, and video tapes, all showing continu-

Dental Technologies (all)

Dental clinic open for walk through. Demonstrations of procedures, dental radiography display, nutrition and health, teaching videos. Mascot is the Tooth Fairy. Locations: F-207, E-201A, E-203, F-213, F-208, E-205.

Engineering Design and Drafting

A display in the North Lobby will consist of demonstrations and samples of student work (sample drawings, design sheets, AUTOCAD drafting software). The six areas of E.D.D.T. will be covered:

- municipal topographical
- 2) electrical
- 3) structural/architectural
- heating, ventilation, and air conditioning
- machine design 5)
- process piping and pressure vessel.

Geosciences (formerly Earth Resources)

Photos of student activities (labs and field trips) along with the tools of the trade (maps, cross-sections, charts, and equipment) will be displayed in the gym.

Hairstyling

On both Friday and Saturday at 11:30 and 2:30 there will be a hair show. Theme is 60's, 70's and 80's. In addition, demonstrations of hair coloring, perming, and bleaching will be given. Location: E-232, E-227.

Industrial Heavy Equipment

"Dr. Diesel" will be distributing pamphlets. The labs from A-101 to A-107, and A-114 will be open to the public. Some of the 5 areas of this technology to be displayed are: thermo, hydraulic, power train and electrical. As well, a hydraulic loader will be exhibited.

Machinists

Computer numerical controlled machine tools will be demonstrated. The brass that will come out of this demo will be for sale to the public. Location: N110, Gym.

Materials Engineering

Equipment displayed and demonstrations include materials testing, mechanical testing, strength of materials and radiography. Major features of display are: (1) metallography - the science of examining materials under a microscope (2) non destructive equipment - some examples of welds and castings and (3) Josephine an arm wrestling dummy used to measure force. Location: Gym, E-216.

Motor Mechanics

In A-109, A-111, A-113 and A-115, students will be working as they normally do. Visitors are invited to walk

through and ask the students questions.

Petroleum Engineering

There will be models of a drilling rig, some production equipment used in industry, and videos in E-219

Physics

A one hour light show will be presented by "Dr. Vanderfool" in F6 (basement). Some of the 10 areas of interest to be demonstrated are: (1) a rocket propelled bicycle (2) how stress affects humans through the use of light, (3) X-rays of people and (4) the turning on of a fluorescent bulb using Dr. Vanderfool as a human conductor to complete the circuit. Times: Friday - 10:00, replicas of the Olympic Torch 12:00, 2:00, 4:00. Saturday -9:00, 11:00, 1:00, 3:00.

Plastics Engineering Technology

Plastics will have a display in the gym and will be operating their equipment in the Plastics lab ('B' building). Products being made include: bags, bottles, dice, bus pass holders and more. Samples will be given away.

Power Linemen/Power Systems

The electrical displays are done in conjunction with the electrical technologies (rooms A183 - A187, A147). First and second year students' work will be displayed. Computer drafting and estimating software, motor control circuits and ratiometers are

The World Bank Dilemma

The following is an open letter written to the Members of Parliament as part of our continuing interest in problems outside our walls here at NAIT.

I recommend that you all write a similar letter to your MP, since it has been found that letters to politicians have a significant impact on their actions. Studies show that one letter to an MP is worth at least 500 votes to that politician.

An Open Letter to the Members of the House of Commons, Ottawa.

As the Assistant Editor of the NAIT Nugget, and as a citizen of Canada, I continually find concern for the poor of developing countries, as well as our own problems at

I strongly urge you to join with David Kilgour and other MP's in Parliament in signing a letter to Mr. Barber Conable of the World Bank. I am enclosing a copy of that letter for your perusal. In it, I would like to point out the second suggestion being made to Mr. Conable, that of elimination of rates on loans made by IDA (the International Development Association). This will bring the World Bank practices in line with those of Canada and other major supporters of developing countries, who are making grants rather than loans. Considering the state of the economies of most of these countries, it makes little sense, in any way, to expect them to repay this money, with the added burden of interest and an increase in their debt. Perhaps, by eliminating that worry, some of these countries can become productive members of the world community.

This proposal, while different in scope, can be viewed as similar to the purpose of the Student Loans so familiar to my readers. 🥌

Last year, a similar letter was sent to Mr. Conable and his reaction to it, and his actions following its receipt prove that he is willing to listen to suggestions for improving the effectiveness of the World Bank in its attempts to eliminate world poverty and develop the Third World.

The letter to Mr. Barber Conable, the President of the World Bank, follows:

Dear Mr. Conable:

pleased to see from your met. address to that gathering that you share our concerns. We ments that:

"Our greatest goal is to reduce the poverty, misery and destitution which blights our world ... rapid economic growth or the advances of modern technology seem of little consequence if nearly a billion people do not have enough food, clean water or shelter....

. there is little reason to expect that future growth alone will attain the progress against poverty that it has failed to secure in the past..."

"... Although we shall pursue the eradication of poverty globally, the effort in Asia, which contains more than 500 million of the world's absolute poor, has particular relevance. In the large poor countries of Asia we wish to support government strategies to eliminate the worst aspects of absolute poverty by the year

We join our colleagues from other countries in raising three issues on which progress should be made:

1) the use of social indicators to measure development progress;

2) future IDA terms; and

3) structural adjustment lending.

1. In light of your comments regarding eradicating the worst aspects of absolute poverty in Asia, we were particularly pleased to learn of the discussions that have been going on for some time between the World Bank. donor governments and others about the much wider use of social indicators as well as economic indicators to measure progress in development.

The conditions of the poor can best be measured by social indicators, such as the mortality rate of children under 5; life expectancy; access to safe water; the adult literacy rate. particularly among women; the proportion of children suffering from malnutrition. Public support of funding for the World Bank and other development institutions ultimately depends on their contribution to progress in key areas such as these.

We urge the World Bank to agree by its annual meeting this Autumn on the principle of using social indicators to monitor progress on development, which social indicators will be used and how these should be measured and monitored. Discussions should then begin with individual recipient countries on targets for improvements in specific social indicators, target dates Many of us wrote to you for achieving these and last year prior to the Bank's planned bank activities to annual meeting, and we were ensure that these goals are

2. One of the major factors note particularly your state hindering progress in development is the burden of debt.

Unlike the middle income countries, such as those in Latin America, whose debt is primarily owed to the commercial banks, the poorest countries, particularly those in sub-Saharan Africa, are mainly indebted to governments and international financial institutions such as the World Bank's affiliate the International Development Association (IDA).

When IDA started lending to the Third World's poorest countries in the early 1960s, its terms were amongst the most concessional of any aid donor. However, since then the governments of many donors such as the United States, the United Kingdom, and the Federal Republic of Germany have switched to providing nearly all of their bilateral aid to the poorest countries on grant terms.

In the discussions beginning this year on the ninth replenishment of IDA, we urge that you put proposals to donor governments that the funds they supply for IDA should then be provided to the poorest countries on grant terms. This would not place on the world's poorest countries the burden of having to repay additional aid loans well into the next century.

3. In the letter many of us signed last summer, we expressed our concern about the effects of structual adjust-

ment programs on some of the poorest sections of the population in developing countries. We suggested ways in which policies could be tailored to the needs of the poor, particularly by involving representatives of the poor. We were therefore pleased to see the agreement reached last December by the major aid donor countries constitute the Development Assistance Committee of the OECD on guidelines for structural adjustment prog-

"Ensuring that overall funding levels for structural adjustment programs are sufficient to regain growth and development momentum, and that such programs are so designed as to cushion the impact of adjustment on all vulnerable groups with special attention to women and children.

Improvement of the design and delivery of public services to poor people, with an emphasis on financial and institutional sustainability and local community involvement.

Support for policies which promote widely shared growth and, in particular, foster the creation of productive employment.

Strengthening the productive role of the poor in the economy.

Enhancement of the capacity of developing country governments to monitor and analyze the impact of policy reforms on poverty and to generate better information on poverty and nutrition.

Strengthening arrangements for consultation, coordination, and monitoring."

We strongly support these policies for future adjustment lending and welcome the special attention paid to the needs of the poor in these guidelines. On the assumption that the Bank has now adopted these guidelines for its future structural adjustment loans. you have our full support for the careful monitoring that will be required to ensure that future structural adjustment programs reflect each of these six guidelines. We urge you to prepare a poverty impact statement on each adjustment loan as part of the loan document which goes to the executive board. Such a statement should give a full account of how the poorest people will benefit from the program.

We wish you well as you seek to utilize the considerable resources of the Bank in the battle against world poverty. You can anticipate the continued support of the undersigned for the policies outlined in this

Transfer Program

A two year university transfer program at Grant MacEwan Community College has been approved by Advanced Education. In order provide greater accessibility for universitylevel entry in the greater Edmonton area, a total of \$1.6 million will be provided to the College in 1988/89. The initial approval is for a threeyear period.

Beginning in September 1988, the College will admit up to 300 new students each year into university-level programs in Arts, Science and Commerce. 

Academic Council

In practice, the Board may refer any matter it wishes to Academic Council, and the Council may make any recommendation it chooses to the Board.


NAIT's Academic Council consists of 15 members: The President, who is Chairman; the Vice-President, Instruction; two chief academic officers; the Registrar; five members of the academic staff, elected by their Association; four students, elected by the Students' Association; and one

additional member appointed by the Board. Their terms of office may vary.

Meetings of Academic Council typically occur on the second Monday of each month, and, with the permission of the Chairman, any member of the Institute community may attend. Any such member who wishes to make a representation to Council must do so in writing to the Chairman at least five days before a meeting.

The Board Of Governors

This is the principal body of the Institute; it sets the policies and determines the direction of NAIT. It was created according to the requirements of the Technical Institutes Act, which in 1981 was enacted to provide for the conversion of NAIT, SAIT, and Westerra (the new institute at Stony Plain) from provincial to board-governed administration. This means that the President now reports to the Board instead of the Deputy Minister of Advanced Education. It also means that every staff member of NAIT is an employee of the Board, not government.

Even though NAIT gained considerable autonomy in the conversion, it is still a public. not a private, institution. It is funded by public money. Its budget, though determined by the Board of Governors, must be approved by the Minister of Advanced Education. The Board must submit an annual report to the Minister. Thus is

NAIT's accountability to the public established.

The Board of Governors, which is appointed by the Provincial Government, is composed of 16 people: ten public members, four staff members, (two from the academic staff, one from the support staff, all elected, and the President), and two students, elected by the Students' Association. Their terms of office vary from one to three years. Regular meetings of the Board are held usually on the first Monday of each month and begin at 4:00 p.m., the open sessions occurring between 4:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. Any students, staff member, or member of the public is entitled to attend the open sessions.

Board of Governor members for 1987 were Curtis Dobush and Ken Kendall.

Dinosaur **Lecture Series**



Turn Out The Lights...

The NAIT Hockey Ooks reign as Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference Champions, is over. The Red Deer College Kings eliminated the Ooks from the playoffs this weekend with a two game sweep of the best-of-three playoff series.

Going into the series, the Ooks were looking to win a fifth straight ACAC hockey title. The Red Deer College Kings derailed the Ooks plans with strong forechecking and rigid discipline.

On Thursday, March 3rd, the Ooks hosed the first game of the best-of-three series. The Red Deer College Kings emerged from the game with a 5-2 win and a 1-0 lead in the best-of-three series.

In the first period, the Ooks gained a 1-0 lead on Kent Maltais' goal at 2:53 from Al Cherniwchan and Blaine Peerless. The Kings tied the game at 15:14 when Jay Glass found the mark. Cam Bowles lifted the Kings into a one goal lead with 92 seconds left in the period.

In the second frame, Dan Hart pulled the Ooks even at 3:40 completing a quick break out which was set-up by Bill Davidson and Wayne Bosse. The Kings moved in front at 15:28 as Jeff Leyer tallied for the Kings. Brendon Black increased the Kings lead to 4-2 at 17:24.

In the third stanza, Tim Willoughby rounded out the scoring with a goal at the 15:37 mark.

NAIT goaltender Bill

Clyne stopped 29 of 34 Red Deer shots. At the opposite end, Rich Plester blocked 32 of 34 NAIT drives.

On Saturday, March 5th, the Ooks needed a win to stay in the series. The Ooks fell one goal short dropping a 7-6 decision to the Kings in double overtime.

Red Deer jumped out to the early lead in the first period. Jay Glass and Dan Gunton scored at 1:10 and 5:43 respectively to give the Kings a quick 2-0 lead. Craig Cripps of NAIT cut the advantage to one at 8:31 as he completed a play with the help of Kent Maltais and Wayne Bosse.

Penalties proved to be the downfall of the Ooks in the second period. The Ooks tied the game 2-2 at 1:19 when Al Cherniwchan scored shorthanded from Murray Melnyk. On the same penalty, the Kings regained their lead as Jay Glass tallied 13 seconds later. Cam Bowles of the Kings made the score 4-2 at 3:26 as NAIT was killing off another penalty. The Kings moved in front by three goals when Mike Kadar scored at 7:42. Murray Yewchuk of the Ooks closed out the period scoring at 19:50. Assists went to Mario Sicolo and Kent Maltais.

The Ooks staged a rally in the third. NAIT's Nigel Cripps completed a scoring play with Wayne Bosse and Lubo Dzurilla to cut the deficit to 5-4 at 6:20. At 10:17, Nigel Cripps netted his second of the game to move the Ooks on even terms. Dan Hart and Wayne Bosse assisted on the play. The Ooks gained the lead 26 seconds later as Al

Cherniwchan potted his second of the game. Pat Mohrmann was credited with an assist. The Ooks lead was shortlived as Red Deer's Brendon Black forced the game into overtime with a goal coming at the 17:25 mark of the third.

Following a scoreless first overtime period, Tim Willoughby of the Kings lifted a shot into the NAIT net at 2:03 of the second overtime period to end the game and the series.

Both teams decided to stick with their goaltenders of the first game. Red Deer outshot NAIT 44 to 34.

NAIT coach Perry Pearn reflected on the loss. "You can't be successful when you don't play well defensively. The reason we did not win this series is that we lacked discipline. We took too many bad penalties."

Although the officiating was weak in the series, it cannot be blamed for the Ooks' defeat. At NAIT, the game was out of hand before the referee attempted to gain control. At Red Deer, the Ooks had two goals called back on questionable calls. In regards to the refereeing Coach Pearn stated, "The level of refereeing was below the level of play exhibited by both teams."

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks would like to thank the administration, the athletic department, and the fans for their support of the NAIT Hockey Ooks this past season. The Ooks look forward to your support in the fall of 1988 when the 1988-89 hockey season begins.





In my opinion, this is probably the toughest test that the Red Deer Queens have come against this year and they showed why they are favored to be in the National final.


All of the team members of the NAIT women's volleyball team should be congratulated on a job well done this season, as well as the fans that followed the team.




