

## NAITSA Executive Positions Available For 1988/89

NAITSA Executive

(1) There shall be a NAITSA
Executive consisting of the following officers:

(a) President;

(b) Vice-President;

(c) Secretary Treasurer; (ex-officio, nonvoting)

(d) Activities Director;

(e) Athletic Director; and

(f) Publications Director(2) All candidates for the NAITSA Executive must:

> (a) be enrolled in a course or program of two years or more;

> (b) be in attendance at NAIT for the entire length of the term of office; and

> (c) be approved by the President of NAIT.

(3) In addition to the requirements of 19 subsection (1), a candidate for the position of Secretary Treasurer shall:

(a) be able to type at a rate of forty-five (45) words per minute; and

(b) have some knowledge of basic secretarial skills including the taking of minutes, word processing, transcribing and preparation of correspondence.

(c) be bondable.

(4) The term of office for each officer shall be one year.

(5) The President-elect shall serve under the President from the date of the election until the last day of April. The President-elect shall become the President on May

(6) All other officers shall take office on the Monday following the elections.

(7) The NAITSA Executive shall meet weekly except during the summer and holidays when it shall meet as required at the call of the President.

(8) Three (3) voting members of the NAITSA Executive constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

(9) The President shall vote only to break a tie.

Members Of The NAITSA Executive

President

The President shall:

(a) preside over all meetings of NAITSA, the General Council and the NAITSA Executive and all other board and committee meetings that he/she deems necessary;

(b) represent the student body at all occasions where it is deemed necessary by the General Council and/or where he/she deems necessary;

(c) be responsible for maintaining due observations of the constitution and bylaws and the correct administration of the same;

(d) be registered in a minimum of three (3) and a maximum of fifteen (15) hours a week:

(e) upon request interpret the constitution and bylaws:

(f) be responsible to the student association membership in so far as the activities of the student association concerned;

(g) have the power to break a tie;

(h) be responsible for the revisions of the bylaws when necessary;

(i) be responsible for presenting a budget for his/her division to the Secretary Treasurer;

(j) be a member of activities and publications committees.

#### **Activities Director**

The Activities Director shall:

(a) be responsible for the coordination of all social and cultural activities of NAITSA:

(b) be responsible to the Secretary Treasurer for the maintenance of the financial records of all social and cultural activities;

(c) be a member of the Athletic Board and Activities Committee;

(d) carry recommendations to and from the:

(i) Activities Board

(ii) Executive Council

(iii) General Council concerning social and cultural activities on campus;

(e) be responsible for ensuring the necessary staff are hired for the social and cultural activities of NAITSA;

(f) be responsible for preparing budget for his/her division to the Secretary Treasurer.

(g) preside over all meetings of the Intertech Activities Council.

Vice-President

The Vice-President shall:

(a) perform all duties and assume the responsibilities of the President in his absence;
(b) be responsible for the public relations of NAITSA;

(c) be responsible for all NAITSA elections and be the Chief Returning Officer if running for reelection, shall appoint another Chief Returning Officer;

(d) be a voting member of the activities committee;

(e) provide support for special projects to be approved by the executive.

#### **Publications Director**

The Publications Director shall:

(a) preside over all meetings of the Publications Board;

(b) be responsible for all publications of NAITSA;

(c) be responsible for hiring the necessary staff for publications;

(d) act as liaison carrying recommendations to and from the Executive, General Council, and Publications Board;

(e) be responsible for presenting Publication Board budget to the Secretary Treasurer.

#### Secretary Treasurer

The Secretary Treasurer shall:

(a) be the Chief Financial officer of NAITSA;

(b) be a non-voting, exofficio member of NAITSA Executive and General Council;

(c) take and maintain minutes of all meetings of the NAITSA Executive, General Council and any other committees for which minutes are deemed necessary by the NAITSA Executive;

(d) be responsible for assisting in the administration of the office functions of NAITSA.

(e) be responsible for cash management of social functions and other events:

(f) authorize all NAITSA payments;

(g) prepare and maintain budgets;

(h) assist the auditor in the annual audit and present to Executive and General Council;

(i) assist the incoming Secretary/Treasurer for the remainder of the Academic year.

(j) an appointed position-already filled.

Athletic Director

The Athletic Director shall:

(a) preside over all meetings of the Intramural council;

(b) be a member of the Athletic Board;

(c) There shall be no acclamations. In the event one person is nominated for a position, that candidate shall campaign normally and the position voted upon by a yes/no vote on the ballot. The candidate will take office if he/she receives greater than 50% yes.

(d) A candidate must be a member in good standing of NAITSA;

(e) A candidate may not hold an executive position in any other technology club.

(f) Candidates who are elected shall be reimbursed for their campaign costs by showing receipts to the Chief Returning Officer.

(g) be responsible for hiring and supervision of a head referee and assist the Coordinator of Intramural and Intercollegiate Athletics;
(h) be responsible for

(h) be responsible for presenting the Athletic Board budget to the Secretary Treasurer;

(i) act as a liaison, c a r r y i n g recommendations to and from the Executive, General Council and Athletic Board.

#### Academic Council

(a) pursuant to section 13 of the Technical Institutes Act, there shall be four students elected to sit on the Academic Council.

(b) The election referred to in 54 subsection (1) shall take place at the time and in the same manner as the election of the NAITSA executive.

(c) student members of Academic Council shall be non voting ex-officio members of the General Council and shall not concurrently hold office as a member of the NAITSA Executive, or any Technology Club on campus.

#### **Board of Governors**

(a) pursuant to section 5 of the Technical Institutes Act, the General Council shall nominate two (2) students to sit on the Board of Governors.

(b) the General Council shall nominate those two (2) students who have been elected by the students at the same time and in the same manner as the election of the NAITSA Executive.

(c) the student members of the Board of Governors shall be non voting exofficio members of the General Council and shall not concurrently hold office as a member of the NAITSA Executive, or any Technology Club on campus.

## Student Position On Academic Council

The existence of Academic Council at NAIT is required by Provincial Statute under the Technical Institutes Act. The purpose is primarily to serve as an advisory body to The Board of Governors on matters concerning the academic environment at NAIT. The Council is made up of representatives from administration, academic staff, and four student members.

Topics that are discussed and dealt with have a significant impact on students' access to the quality of education that is now and will be provided by the Institute. Such subjects as the instructor evaluation program, examination scheduling, library hours, transferability of courses and the role of the Continuing Education Department are a few of the more important areas under constant review.

Student involvement in the Council is not only a requirement of law, but essential to ensure that the interests of all of us are represented before important decisions are made.

This past year I have had the opportunity of bringing

the concerns of the NAITSA Council and those of individual students to The Academic Council. The input from the student body is both welcomed and encouraged.

My year on the Council has been a challenging and rewarding experience. My involvement on the Instructor Evaluation committee gave me a feeling of satisfaction and accomplishment.

I strongly encourage any students that are interested in the long-term well-being of NAIT to get involved and to get nominations in for a position on Council. There are still a lot of issues that have to be settled and their impact on students can often only be assessed by students.

There will be an Aids Information Session for the NAIT community. It will be held on March 16, 1988 at 12:15 in the Little Theatre (H-5).




















## Cry Freedom

One of the things that I enjoy about a Richard Attenborough film is his use of the old "epic" style. His previous movie, Ghandi, is famous for spectacular crowd scenes that literally take your breath away. While Ghandi took place over forty years ago, Attenborough's latest film, Cry Freedom, is set in South Africa, and is continuing to happen right now.

I have always been the

first to complain about the rising cost of films, primarily because of their general poor quality. This film is one of the few I recommend being worth \$6.50 and the ONLY one that must be seen in a theatre. Attenborough's brilliant use of the relatively new THX sound system is revolutionary and a VCR will not do justice to the effect.

The story focuses on the life of Steven Biko, an African nationalist and elegant spokesman for black rights in South Africa, and his association and friendship with the editor of a white newspaper. The well executed plot is based on documented truth, so I refrain from spoiling any part for those who are not familiar, but I believe an Oscar would have been in order if this film had been released earlier.

The only mark I have against it is a very subtle, yet recognizable trend. Attenbor

ough is English, and all the English whites in the film are portrayed as the "good guys". The editor, most of his friends and the British government are all painted with a somewhat rosy brush as they are the ones who help the blacks, and are simply caught in a helpless situation. The Dutch whites, or the Boer decendants, are portrayed as the perpetual "bad guys". They are the terrorists, soldiers and police that use little black kids for target practice. My

objection to this is that the picture is not as simple as Attenborough paints. At no time have we seen British whites leaving in droves from the atrocities in South Africa, nor has the British government condemned them officially; therefore I question his rosy interpretation of the situation.

#### The Prisoner of Zenda

Truth be known, The Prisoner of Zenda is not a very good book either, and literati have never been able to



stage, I extracted from the book the characters, the locale, the situation in which they found themselves, and wondered if there was a philosophical peg on which the story could be hung. I truly believe I discovered the theme that made the book a Classic. Whether it is intended to be or not, it is a moral tale!

Obviously Rassendyll and Flavia should end up together. They are a match made in Heaven. However, admission to Heaven was never easy, and, to reach this conclusion devoutly to be wished, the rightful King must be disposed of. There is no way of doing this without corrupting the leading characters with the stains of Machiavellian self interest. As hero and heroine, they are bound by their integrity and sense of honour to do what is right, even if it means sacrificing their own inclinations and desires. In a word, just the kind of stunt God likes to pull on an admission exam. So they part, having served something greater than



themselves, and it's straight "8's" all the way and two packets of Kleenex. That is Classic.

It is therefore an old fashioned play, a romance, a tribute to nobleness of spirit that is potentially embarrassing in a contemporary society where such outbursts are only undertaken by bleeding heart liberals, Pinko's and those who are completely out to lunch.

I shall watch public and critical reaction with bated breath."

This critic's reaction is not critical of the play, and only a little of the production.

I wholeheartedly enjoyed this play, what I could hear and understand. Unfortunately, my seat was high in one of the wings, and the thick middle-European accents being used by some of the characters were sometimes unintelligible. I recommend that you try and get a seat near the centre of the theatre, where you will enjoy it even more than I did. As Warren says, it is an old fashioned play, produced with some of the style of '30s musicals. with some very amusing characters. There is also lots of action, swordfights all over



the furniture, and even Sonia gets into the act with her frying pan!

The Prisoner of Zenda plays at the Citadel until March 13th, half price tickets for students, and I heartily recommend it for the whole family.







The NAIT Ooks closed out the regular season with a split and will face the Red Deer College Kings in the ACAC semi-final series which starts at the NAIT Arena on Thursday night. The Ooks finish the regular season with 16 wins, seven losses and one tie.

On Friday, February 26th, the Ooks dropped a 5-3 overtime decision to the Vikings in Camrose.
