Philosopher's Corner

Did you know that you may be violating copyright laws every time you photocopy an article from a magazine without permission from the publisher? While this statement may sound somewhat extreme given how commonplace this practice is, particularly amongst students, it is a valid one. (Some magazines even have fees. regulations and procedures for obtaining permission to photocopy their material printed on their inside covers.)

The law exists for a reason, of course, and its validity is acknowledged by NAIT in its Academic Regulations. Under COPY-RIGHT-POLICY, GUIDE-LINES AND PROCEDURES, (D.6.1 Policy) it states:

"NAIT supports legislation related to Copyrights, Patents,

Trademarks and Industrial Design and does not sanction or authorize infringements or violations by NAIT Staff."

Under (D.6.2) guidelines it states:

1) Any reproduction, in any form, of copyright print or non-print works, patents, trademarks and industrial designs constitutes infringement or violation.

3) NAIT will make every attempt to facilitate the implementation of this policy.

We are all guilty of breaking this law on numerous occasions (and one could argue justifiably so, perhaps). What about more flagrant examples? I am referring to course materials given to students in the form of photocopied handouts. In one of my courses I have been given no fewer than 307 pages

of these handouts (yes, I counted them). Only one of them contains any reference as to authorship. Few indicate their source or origin. Unless my understanding of the law is very flawed, I suspect this is both illegal and a violation of NAIT policy.

This is not a moot point. I think it is extremely important that educational authorities both acknowledge and identify their sources. Only by this means can students begin to evaluate the information they receive.

Is my evaluation a correct one? Is this situation common in other technologies? If so, is NAIT then simply unaware of it or choosing to ignore it? Perhaps now is a good time for NAIT to "make every attempt to facilitate the implementation of their own policy."

There was a certain attraction to knowledge and skill that gave me a desire for it. That attraction is still there, and I'm still following it, but not in the classroom. Classes are ugly, and I believe I know why.

It seems a great number of instructors, and their superiors, have never taken the time to examine the true nature of their vocation. Teaching is a job that makes some money and provides various other benefits that are valued differently by each individual. But there is much more to it than that. There is a higher goal. If he loses sight of it (or, God forbid, doesn't even know what it is) a common phenomenon occurs. They take on the same characteristics as a contentious wife: "If you don't take out the garbage, you won't get any...." Or, more appropriately, "This is what we're doing. If you don't think like I do (and therefore do as I do) when you do what I ask, you fail." And they'll defend their position out of a poorly directed sense of responsibility, or some kind of self - righteous indignation.

This type of attitude is an atrocious lie. It is not the doing that constitutes success or failure as much as it is the learning. Let me explain. Failure or success is never the result of methodology. It is the result of true learning (or lack of). Learning, by my definition, is the process of assimilating observed relationships and the subsequent results from which con-

clusions may be drawn about other relationships. If Quality observations, and Quality assimilations are made, then Quality methodology and applications become apparent on their own. This is learning, and it's what should be taught. However, practicality does not permit this. True learning is too time consuming, and our educators (seemingly) couldn't care less. What they really seem to want is for you to mimic what you should be learning. As long as the class average is O.K., who cares? You should! Such attitudes transform us from living, growing, thinking entities into little humans that are programmed to imitate. It's a very thin veneer over a faulty structure. It's easy to see through, and it's ugly. It's low quality. People dislike it.

That is why I don't go to class much anymore. I prefer to spend my time in Quality Learning as opposed to memorizing methodology. True learning is enjoyable. It's something you instinctively seek out. It is well it's beautiful. One may not use the "right" format, or the "right" methods. Exams may point out some of the course concepts have been overlooked. But if you're really learning, you know why you're doing what you do. And if you stumble onto something you've never seen before, you can derive how to do it from the concepts and mental processes you've acquired. For those who have discovered this, it puts them light-years ahead of those who have sacrificed their minds and their futures by forsaking the substance of education for its

I'm not trying to point fingers or lay blame. The fact is that the educational system, as honorable as its goal is, lends itself to such apathetic abuses. If you really understand that, the source of a great many problems, not only at NAIT but within our North American society, becomes apparent. Our educational system encourages the substitution of awareness (resulting from the rational process of true higher learning) for the ignorance of better mimicry. It's ugly low quality, and it affects every area of life and society that it touches.

If you want not only to look good but to feel good for the summer months TAKE TIME to get active. Good is where the action is!







The Historic Agreement

On March 23, 1988, an greement between NAITSA ind the NAIT Board of Governors was signed. This agreement outlines the principles by which the licensed lounge will operate. Basically, in return for NAITSA's \$250,000 donation to NAIT for the renovations, we get the right to operate the lounge as a business. The Board will hold the Institutional liquor licence and NAITSA must therefore agree to operate the lounge in a professional and responsible manner. Following are a few of the 51 principles outlined in the agreement.

Preamble:

In consideration of NAITSA donating two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250) towards the capital cost of a renovation to the NAIT Activities Centre, including an area to be designated as a

licensed lounge, the Board agrees to grant NAITSA a license to occupy and operate such lounge.

Ownership:

The Board is the registered owner of the premises in which the lounge will be located.

Security:

The Board responsible for the overall security of the campus, however, NAITSA shall provide at its expense such level and form of security as the Board deems necessary for the operation of the lounge.

Profit/Loss:

NAITSA shall be entitled to all profits and be liable for all

Users (Day to Day Operation):

Upon presentation of identification NAIT population and their respective guests shall be entitled to use the lounge.

Beverage Service:

The Board shall use its best effort to obtain from the A.L.C.B. and maintain in force for the duration of the license hereunder an Institute License for sale consumption οſ alcoholic beverages including wine, beer, and liquor in the lounge.

NAIT's new licensed lounge will offer the NAIT community a relaxed social atmosphere where good food and drink will be available. Open to students, alumni holding privilege cards, and NAIT and NAITSA staff, the lounge will help complete NAIT's well rounded personality. This past year, NAITSA has been involved in ongoing discussions and planning with NAIT related to the design and implementation of the lounge. The entire project, which also includes new instructional space and new offfices for NAIT's athletic staff, is slated for completion in August of '88. Located on the main level of the Activities Center, the newly renovated area will make better use of existing facilities.

Lounge Operations

- Full time staff will be hired by NAITSA to operate the lounge as a NAITSA business, much the same way the NAITSA store operates.
- Alcohol awareness will be a priority for the operation of the lounge.
- The lounge will have a self-contained kitchen serving such food as hamburgers, chicken fingers, and spud skins.
- The lounge will employ students as part-time waiters and waitresses.
- Hours of operation are yet to be decided, but most likely the lounge will open

around noon for food service and study space, with beverage service beginning at around 3:30 or 4:00 p.m. on weekdays.

Consumption will continue until around 11:00 p.m. on weekdays and 1:00 a.m. on weekends.

- Entertainment for the lounge will be large screen TV's, an occasional comedian, and whatever else NAITSA can dream up.
- Capacity is approximately 130 persons. The lounge includes a raised area, (upper right corner) and a full service bar with stools.

A Good Way To Die

Back To Beulah Is Great!

I sat down in a very comfortable seat, kind of like the ones at the Paramount movie theatre. Then the lights went down and the show (play) started.

Back to Beulah is a story

about three not altogether "stable" women that are living in a half-way house. These three are one step away from going back to Beulah (the nut house). It's a story about how these three deal with the unusual opportunity of putting their case worker in their shoes. The unofficial leader of the group acts the part of the case worker and puts the real case worker "through the ringer."

Although the Toronto Maple Leafs may make the playoffs, the image of the Leafs has tarnished considerably in the past 20 years. The Leafs were once a proud, winning hockey club. Today, the Leafs are no more than league doormats.

The fall of the Leafs from grace can be attributed in large part to Harold Ballard. Unlike a good owner, Ballard has a tendency to move in and make the changes himself instead of letting his general manager make the decisions.

Ballard's eagerness to run the team has often done more harm than good. The coach of the Toronto Maple Leafs not only has to deal with his general manager, but with Ballard. Subsequently, a coach may not be able to do what he was hired to do--coach.

The Leafs have let a number of great players slip through their hands in the past few years. Randy Carlyle, the former Norris winner, is now the leader of the Winnipeg Jets blueline corp. Lanny MacDonald, the former Masterdon winner, is providing leadership both on and off the ice for the Calgary Flames.

The fact the Leafs play in the weakest NHL division, the Norris, has not helped matters. With teams like St. Louis, Chicago, and Minnesota in the division, the Leafs do not need as many points to make the playoffs as teams in other divisions do. This season, the fourth place team in the Norris will have considerably less points than New Jersey in the Patrick. As a result, there is little incentive for the Leafs to improve.

For the Leafs to become contenders instead of pretenders, a number of changes must take place.

Harold Ballard should seriously consider giving greater control of hockey operations to his general manager when he hires one. The Leafs must look ahead to the future and draft individuals who will make the team better. The Leafs must also trade for talent and leadership without losing the mortgage.

The Leafs can be great again. The question is "How long will it take?"


