Soccer Ooks Capture Bronze At Nationals

The NAIT soccer team travelled to Nanaimo, B.C. to play in the National Soccer Championships on November 10-12, and came home with a bronze medal.

The Ooks met the host Malaspina College in their first game on November 10. After fifteen minutes, Malaspina was ahead 2-0. One shot by the Ooks hit the goal post and two other goals were called back. Finally, with about fifteen minutes to go, the Ooks scored. Charles O'Toole then tied the game. With a chipped shot over the Malaspina's goalkeeper's head, Lionel Gomes got the winning point.

They moved on to play Capilano (B.C.). After scoring an early goal off one of NAIT's defenders, Capilano took three more goals to lead 4-0 at the half. The Ooks were struggling with both injuries and illness. Paul Wilson was suffering a contusion from the Malaspina match. Other team members had muscle strains and one had the flu. Administrator, Mark Bosworth, said Capilano was obviously the better team. NAIT lost that one 4-0.

An hour later, NAIT faced

SAIT in the consolation round. The Ooks clearly dominated the Trojans and won 8-1. Charles O'Toole scored two, Lionel Gomes scored four, and Paul Wilson and Nandor Takats each had one.

In their fourth and final game, NAIT met Durham College (Ontario) to play for the bronze medal. The teams were fairly matched and the score was 1-0 for Durham, at the half. Kevin Wilson scored the tie goal in the second.

This forced the game into two fifteen-minute overtimes. The Ooks put on a great deal of pressure, but couldn't pull

off a win in overtime. After overtime came the penalty shots. Durham shot first, scoring four goals. Curt Elchuk shot first for the Ooks and scored one. He was followed by Keith Johnson. Ian Steinke and Charles O'Toole each scored one goal.

With the final shots the score was tied 4-4. Scott Parsons' first shot was about twenty feet over the goal, but his second shot hit the mark. Thus, NAIT took the game 2-1 and won the bronze.

The final placings were:

1. B.C. (Capilano)
2. Quebec (Ahunistic)
3. Alberta (NAIT)

Bosworth said the team was fairly happy with the win, but they had gone into the championships with hopes of retaining their national title.

EXTRA NOTES: The Ooks may end up with the silver

medal. Capilano College is caught up in a controversy over two ineligible players. If Capilano is found guilty, NAIT will move up its second place. Bosworth said would be great, but, "in their hearts", it will always be a bronze.

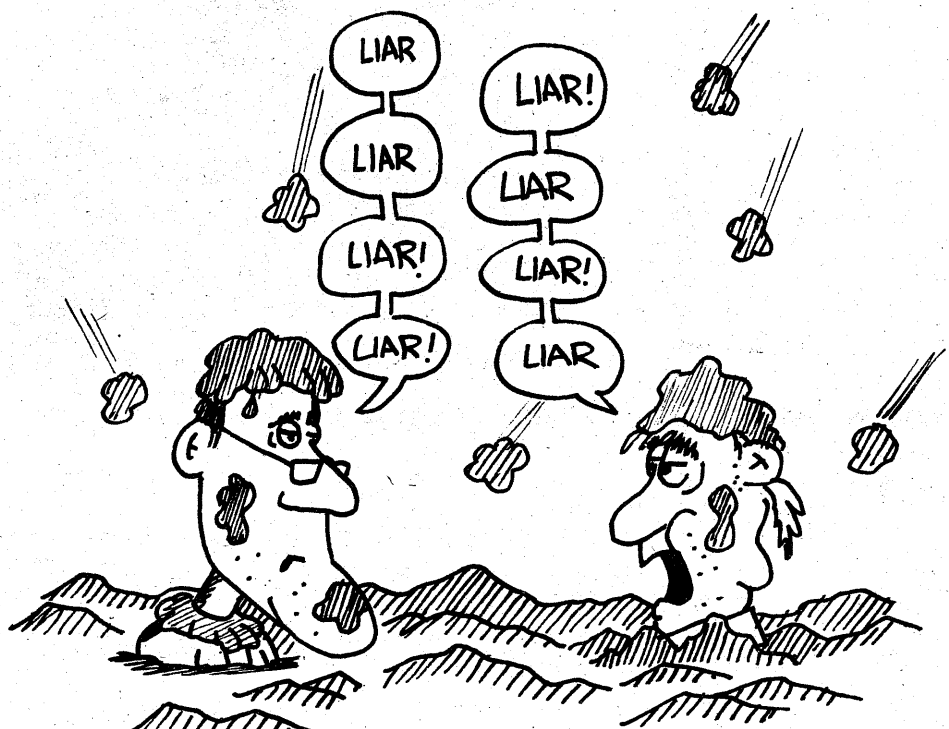
Those candidates who are elected will gain experience and knowledge from the responsibility of their positions.

TAKING STOCK

DEFINITION - Bonds and Debentures:

Bonds and "Debs", like all the products introduced so far, are debt instruments, and trade on the **Bond or Debt Markets** usually **OTC** (over the counter). Bonds and debs are identical except for one aspect -- bonds are backed by collateral, while debs are not. Technically, Canada Savings Bonds are debentures, as no specific assets are pledged as guarantees of repayment. In fact, no federally-issued bonds carry collateral. Their repayment is backed by the 'right of taxation', and thus offer the highest credit rating available.

New investors should stick to bonds and debs with credit ratings of A or better - any broker should be able to advise you of the current status of any government or corporate bond. (NOTE: common usage is that bonds and debentures are referred to collectively as bonds.)

DEFINITION - Price:

Because bonds trade publicly, the price fluctuates. Prices are quoted as percentage of the face value. i.e. a \$1,000 bond might be selling at 98 (\$980) or at 108 (\$1,080). **Par Value** or **parmeans** that the bond is trading at face value, or 100. Thus, an investor can earn interest and make a capital gain by trading bonds. Price

is determined by the float (dollar value of bonds available to and/or held

by the public), the term to maturity, (up to 25 years), current interest rates, and credit rating.

DEFINITION - Basis Points:

A basis point, or "beep", is one percent of one percent. If a bond price is at 98 and rises to 98.04, it has gone up 4 beeps. (NOTE: Changes in the Bank of Canada rate are usually quoted this way.)

DEFINITION - Yield:

Yield is similar to interest rate, but the two have a major difference. Yield = interest rate when and only when the bond is trading at par. Also, bonds trade more on yield than interest rate.

Interest rate is the percentage of interest paid to the bondholder based on the face value of the bond. A \$1,000 bond with a 10% rate pays \$100 in interest annually.

Yield is the percentage of interest paid to the bondholder based on the purchase price of the bond. This same bond if purchased at 95 (\$950) yields (over one year) 10.53%.

Obviously, the difference is that the same rate of interest is paid out - but an investor who buys below face value (<100) invests less

money for the same return - and thus receives more money for the dollars invested. Similarly, if the bond was purchased at 105 (\$1,050) the yield would be 9.52%. (Yield is calculated as interest income [one year in dollars] divided by the purchase price [dollars] multiplied by 100.)

DEFINITION - Commission

Brokers charge a commission for the buying and selling of bonds (and any other publicly traded product, although it is sometimes waived - as in T-Bills). Be aware that OTC products such as bonds are subject to the brokerage firm's in-house minimum (usually \$35 - \$75 per trade), but *the broker actually sets the commission based on his/her own judgement and practices*. The commission to be charged is specified on the Buy or Sell Ticket as a percentage. **This does not show up on your contract - the total amount you pay is shown as a single price.**

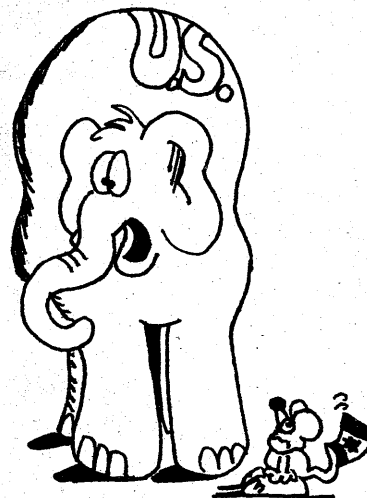
If a bond is offered for sale at 98, and you are buying \$5,000 face value, the cost is \$4,900. A broker might charge \$50 (100 basis points)

commission. Your contract would show a total price of 99, and a total cost of \$4,950. On a sale, if you are selling a \$5,000 bond at 105, your proceeds would be \$5,250.

The commission is subtracted from the price and proceeds, and your account credited with the net sale. i.e. Sell \$5,000 @ 104, total proceeds = \$5,200 (commission = \$50). Before placing a buy or sell order, ask your broker how much commission you are being charged especially if he or she has quoted you a "net" price.

If you have to work for the answer, the broker is probably charging more than he/she thinks you'd be willing to pay - find out, then decide.

The U.S. Government conducted a comprehensive survey in 1973 to determine how Americans find jobs. They surveyed all categories of wage and salary workers (except farm workers) — from professionals and administrators to construction workers and mechanics. The sample consisted of 10.4 million men and women who had found new jobs. The chart shows the methods by which they obtained their jobs.

The obvious winning category here is the group of job seekers who exercised their *own* initiative in building on personal contacts and making themselves known to potential employers.

To have the most effective job search you must, of course use several different methods. But in order to use your time wisely, you should spend more time with those methods that have worked well for other job seekers.

Just how much time *should* you spend on your job search? This same government survey found that 65% of all job seekers spent only 5 hours a week looking for work (and the average length of unemployment was 12 weeks!). If you spend more time, you can expect to find a job sooner. Ideally, you should spend as many hours looking for a job as you would spend working at it once you find it. For example, if you plan to work forty hours a week, try to spend forty hours a week on your job search.

In order to decide how much time you would spend each week using each job-seeking method, keep in mind how effective the methods are. Use our sample worksheet below to model your own weekly job search plan.

Theatre Review: KISS OF THE SPIDER WOMAN by Dellia Tardif

Kiss of the Spider Woman is now playing until Dec. 4 at the Citadel's Rice Theatre. Having lived a sheltered life, and not knowing what to expect from the production, it caught me off guard.

The play takes place in a small cell in Villa Devoto prison in Buenos Aires. Two men, Molina (Joseph T. Cazalet) and Valentin (Jack Jangedijk), interact with each other, exposing themselves gradually to emotional bonding. The bond develops and grows throughout the play until both physical and ideological barriers are dismantled in the tangled web of Molina's movie fantasies.

The nudity of Molina and Valentin was unsettling; but their kiss left me feeling like a 'peeping tom' invading the bedroom and emotional privacy of the two men.

Molina, a homosexual, desired above all to love and be loved as a 'real woman' by a 'real man'. Joseph T. Cazalet's portrayal of Molina was in the words of the character "wonderful, super".

Valentin, a sullen, veiled revolutionary, mellowed into a sensitive, unfettered lover.

Jack Langedijk plays the sensitive Valentin more comfortably than he plays the sullen Valentin.

A production worth taking in, but so as not to be surprised, remember The Rice Season is 'Adult Theatre' with strong language and strong themes.

Basketball Ooks Start Season With 2 Wins

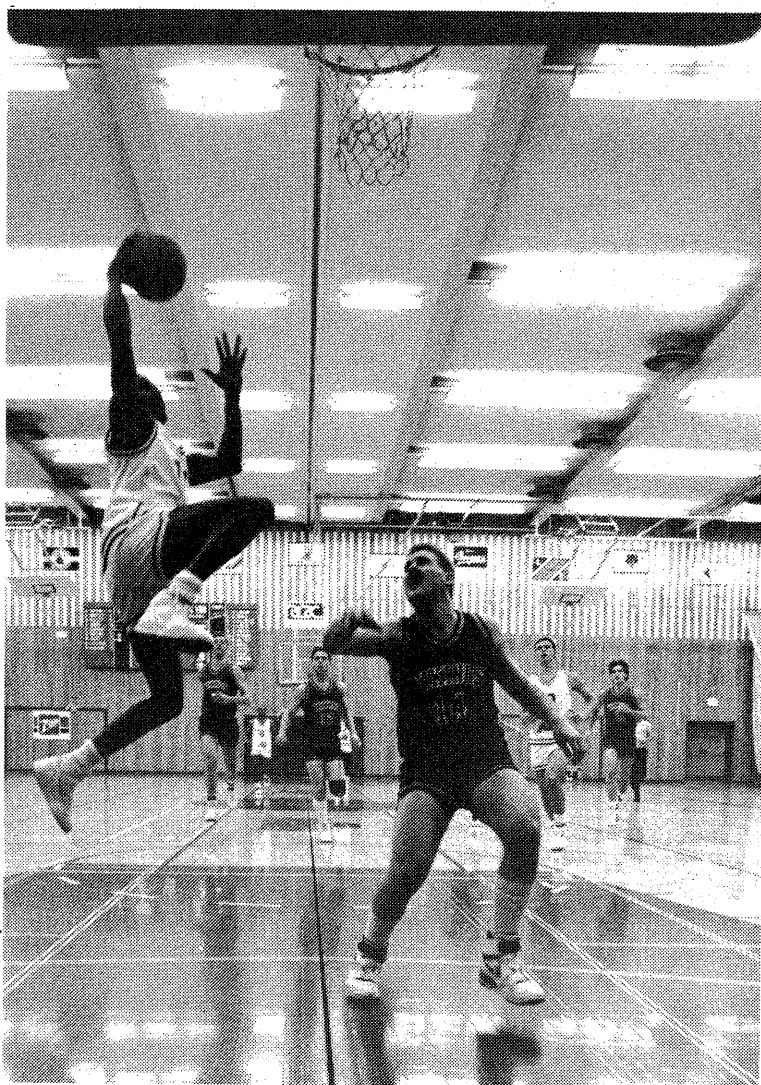

The NAIT Men's Basketball Team opened the season with a pair of victories at the NAIT Gym. On Thursday, November 11th, the Ooks scored a 93-73 victory over the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings. On Saturday, November 13th, the Ooks downed the Red Deer College Kings 97-68.

In Thursday's game, the Ooks' winning margin was not indicative of the game's flow. The Ooks jumped out to a 12-4 lead in the first three minutes of the game and held a 47-40 advantage at half time. In the

second half, the Vikings shaved the Ooks' lead to 57-54 in the second half. The Ooks then pulled away in the final few minutes for the 20 point win.

Wayne Grant was the top scorer for the Ooks with 21 points. Adrian Toppin (16 points), Dexter Amour (14 points), Norm Barthel (13 points), and Bryan Lazaruk (12 points) also reached double digits for the Ooks. Guy Pallister spearheaded the Camrose attack with 23 points on Thursday evening.

In Saturday's contest, the Kings could only stay even with the Ooks for the first five minutes of the game. The Ooks trailed 12-11 at the five minute mark before outscoring the Kings eleven points to two in the next five minutes to grab a 23-13 lead. The Ooks increased the lead to 44-23 at the half, and coasted for the better part of the second half.

Dexter Amour and Bryan Lazaruk led the NAIT attack with 29 and 23 points respectively. Other Ooks in double digits included Wayne Grant with 20 points and Chris Mantley with 11. Jason Stanier replied with 18 points in a losing cause for the Kings.
