

National College Week

This week is National College Week. Here are some facts:

Full time college enrollments in Canada surpassed university full-time enrollments in the late seventies and have grown annually since then. It is estimated that one in seven Canadian adults use the services of a community college or a technical institute.

There are currently an estimated 500,000 full-time students enrolled in Canada's college system. A conservative estimate of part-time enrollments is in excess of 1.5 million.

In 1984-85, community colleges spent almost three billion dollars, accounting for nine per cent of total educational expenditures in Canada.

Approximately 25,000 full-time faculty teach in the college system in Canada with an estimated 150,000 part-time instructors.



At precisely 12:15 p.m., Wednesday, November 23rd, more than 6,000 faculty and students from Alberta's colleges and institutes participated in simultaneous balloon release as part of their activities celebrating College Week '88, November 21st to 27th. This celebration was initiated three years ago by the Association of Canadian Community Colleges to promote college/institute education and to draw attention to the impact these institutions have on their communities.

"Each year more than 200,000 Albertans are involved in some type of education program at a college or technical institution", says Anne Raslask, Public Relations Officer at the Lethbridge Community College. "We're hoping that with this balloon release we can convey the extent of our college system and the number of people in Alberta who can convey the extent of our college system and the number of people in Alberta who benefit from a college or technical education."

Community colleges and technical institutes constitute the largest and fastest growing sector of postsecondary education in Canada. Since emerging in mid-1950's, community colleges, technical institutes, and cegeps have become the alternative to university for young and adult learners. Full-time college enrollment surpassed that of the universities in the late 1970s and the gap has grown annually since. There are currently an estimated 2 million students enrolled in full and part-time programs in Canada's 140 colleges and institutes.

Renowned for the diversity of: their programming, institutions reflect national and regional economic priorities and the concerns of the communities they serve. ACCC President, Richard Mackie believes, "that College Week '88 will allow our membership to draw national attention to the very positive presence we traditionally sustained as builders of communities which value the quality of life

Nationals certification of chefs tested at NAIT

'Cookery is become an art, a noble science; cooks are gentlemen.'

Either Robert Burton (1577-1640) was misinformed, or there's been a decline since the 17th century in the general regard for cooks. Every hearty eater, of course, appreciates a meal that only a well-trained cook can prepare. But according to the Canadian Federation of Chefs de Cuisine (CFCC), even fine cooks are not highly enough regarded by the restaurant industry, parly becuase of misunderstanding about what a chef must do.

A step toward raising the level of regard, and the skills of chefs, was taken on November 4 and 5 and NAIT. The Canadian Culinary Institute, the educational arm of the CFCC, with support from the food-service industry and the Canadian Jobs Strategy, is well on the way toward developing a national certification program for chefs. NAIT's Hospitality Education staff, who are playing a prominent role, hosted a two-day session at which a certification exam was tested; a previous testing had been conducted at George Brown College, in Toronto. last April

Selected to test the exam were four veteran chefs from across Canada. The skills covered in the exam are more extensive than might be expected. A key point in the need for certification is that

cooks; they are supervisors who must handle a budget, plan menus, cost out supplies, oversee sanitation, and manage staff. Restaurant owners often fail to realize that many good cooks have little experience in these matters and no training. So when promoted from cook to chef, says Bruce Wilson, CFCC President, they frequently find themselves unable to cope. The range of skills expected of a chef, as well as cooking, is thus tested by the certification exam. It is highly practical, emulating a day in the life of a chef.

Arranging for the session (actually one and a half days long) was John Pidhirniak, Manager of Canadian Jobs Strategy Programming, with assistance from Food Production Manager Peter O'Neill and instructors Henry Bachman, Sigi Mueller, Ted Veiser, Raoph Walker, and John White. The Canadian Culinary Institute's National Education Committee, which is chaired by John Pidhirniak, was in attendance to oversee the proceedings.

"It was an excellent session," says John, "in which the bugs were worked out, and the exam was validated for actual use." Real candidates will face the exam in April 1989 and, on passing, will become "Certified Chefs de Cuisine."

To assist Journeyman

chefs are not merely skilled Cooks in preparing for the exam, a learning package is being developed, NAIT has been contracted by the Culinary Institute to do this, and the result will be suitable for classroom study. At work on the formal elements of the package is Bill Fricker of Program Development Services.

> The new certification is expected not only to ensure that Canadian chefs are properly qualified, but also to help them gain the respect (and salary) accorded chefs in Europe. It should also serve as a powerful incentive for Journeyman Cooks to improve their qualifications and mobility in the industry.





Hockey Ooks Salvage a Split in Calgary

To this point in the season, there has been a lack a effort towards team goals on the NAIT Hockey Ooks. There is no doubt that the team must work together and place team goals ahead of individual ones in order to be a winning hockey club. The Ooks may have taken a step in the right direction by salvaging a weekend split in Calgary.

On Saturday, November 19th in Calgary, the Ooks dropped a 6-5 decision to the Mount Royal College Cougars. On the following afternoon, the Ooks recorded a 3-0 shutout over the SAIT Trojans. The Ooks now have a record of four wins, four losses, and one tie.

In Saturday's game at Calgary's Centennial Arena, the Ooks did not play to their potential.

In the first, the Cougars gained a 2-0 lead on markers from Jim Kambeitz at 3:56 and Kelly Para at 7:38. Scott Melnyk pulled the Ooks within one at the 9:56 mark on the powerplay. Robin Dube and J.C. McEwan picked up assists. The Ooks then tied the contest at 18:19 as J.C. McEwan tallied on a play with Troy Arndt and Robin Dube.

In the second, the Cougars regained their

goal advantage as Mike Wegleitner found the mark at 10:59. The Ooks tied the contest at 12:06 as Ted Bradshaw scored with the help of Craig Sterzer and Randy Wong. The Cougars closed out the period with goals from Matt Kabayama at 14:46 and Mike Cormack at 18:52.

In the third, the Ooks cut the lead to 5-4 on Robin Dube's goal from Scott Melnyk and Murray Bokenfohr at 16 seconds into the period. The Ooks then pulled even at 16:48 as Murray Bokenfohr tallied from Robin Dube and Scott Melnyk. Dave Svrcek of MRC scored the winner a short 46 seconds later.

The Cougars outshot the Ooks 26 to 25. MRC's Buddy Brazier and NAIT's Rob McKinley tended their respective creases.

In Sunday's match at Calgary's SAIT Arena, the Ooks recorded their first shutout of the season.

In the first, the Ooks opened up a 1-0 lead as Craig Sterzer connected with the assistance of Kent Maltais and Ted Bradshaw.

In the second, Brad Fenton increased the Ooks'

receiving a Robin Dube pass.

In the third, the Ooks rounded out the scoring with ten seconds left in regulation time as Robin Dube put the biscuit home.

Rob McKinley turned away all 43 shots directed at the NAIT net. Jeff Stayko stopped 34 of 37 drives in the SAIT crease.

NAIT coach Perry Pearn was pleased with Sunday's win. "The win was the most unselfish and most dedicated effort we'd seen in some time from the team. This type of sacrifice is needed in every ACAC game in order to be successful."

Lyndon Campbell was the top scorer for the Ooks with 20 points.



Again, Lyndon Campbell was the high scorer with 29



Jim Nashim Position: Middle



CANADIAN ROCK HISTORY CHALLENGE

First known as "Chad Allen and the Expressions" this band was formed in 1964 shortly before landing their first recording contract.

The first album was titled "Hey, Ho (What You Do For Me)" and released in early 1965. Later they released a single entitled "Shaking All Over". Shortly after, lead vocalist Chad Allen left the band and quitar player Randy Bachman brought in a new member to try our as lead singer and keyboard player, his name was Burton Cummings.

In late 1968 they released their second album entitled "Wheatfield Soul" and included the smash hit singles "These Eyes" and "Laughing". In early 1969 another album called "Super Golden Goodies" was released and yet another one late that year called "Canned Wheat" which found its way to the charts with the number one song "No - Time". The "American Woman" album was next to be released (February 1970) and contained the hit classics "American Woman", "No Sugar Tonight", and "Hand Me Down World". In 1971 they released yet another album this one called "Share the Land" which made its way to the #2 snot on the Canadian charts wit

"Broken" and "Albert Flasher". From 1972 - 1975 the band released the following albums: "Best of the (Vol.1)", "So Long Bannatyne", "Rockin", "Live at the Paramount", "Artificial __(Vol.2)", "Road Food", "Flavours", and "Power in the Music". Some of the singles which emerged from this prolific effort were: "Raindance", "Guns, Guns, Guns", "Running Back to Saskatoon", "Follow Your Daughter Home", "Glamour Boy", "Star Baby", "Clap for the Wolfman", "Dancing Fool", as well as others.
