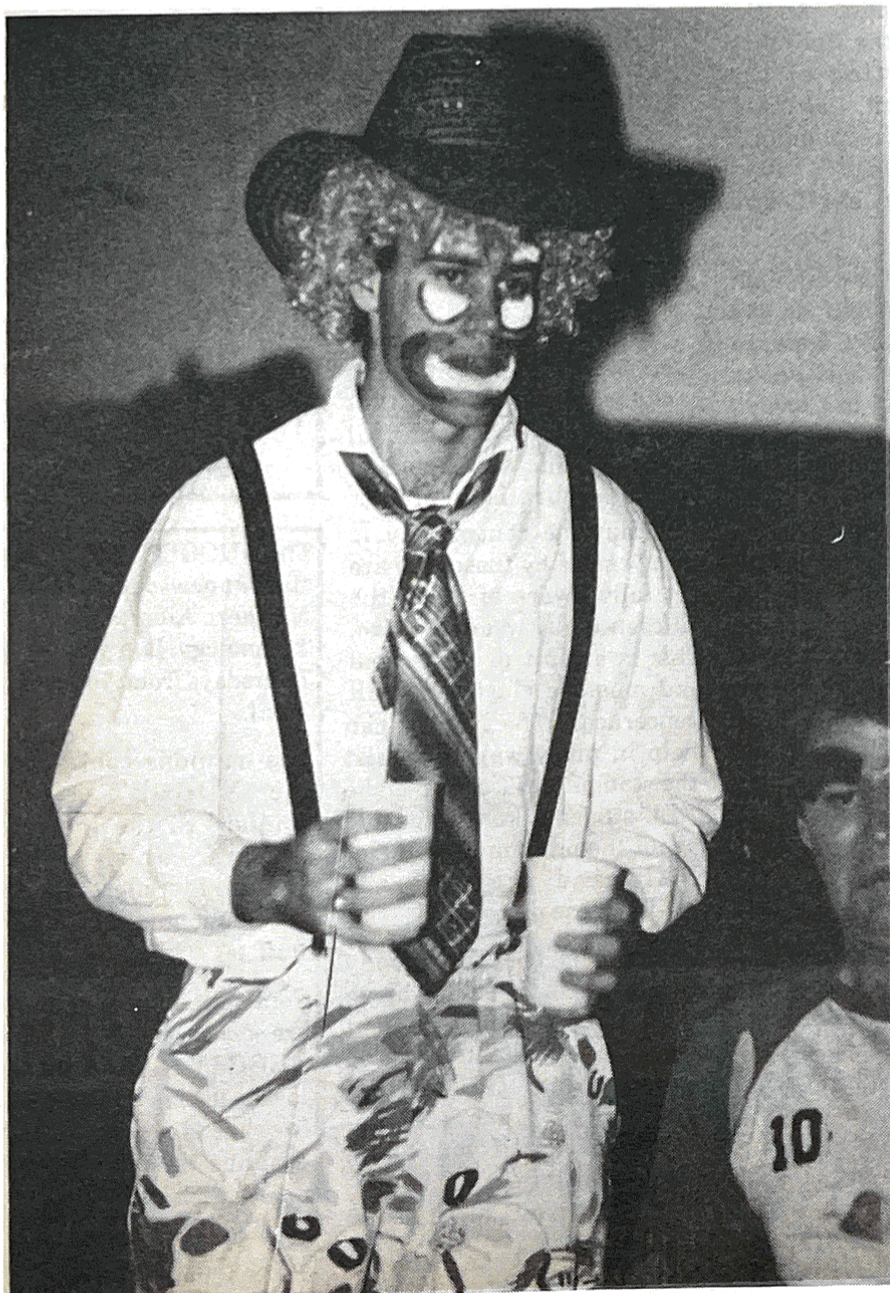

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Dear Editor,

RE: Editor's comments regarding John Reeves' Letter to the Editor in the last issue of the Nugget.

There are two quite different issues in discussion here. The first is the new Student Feedback form and mechanism. The other is the complaint/grievance procedure.

The Student Feedback form is intended to allow you, as a student, to let your instructors know what they are doing right, what they are doing that helps you learn, and what they might change so that you can understand more easily. Virtually ALL of the staff in this institute are vitally concerned with your needs and expectations, because without you, the students, NAIT would not exist. However, in the past, this was not made clear to all students as it should have been, and they felt left out. Therefore, there is an increasing awareness on the part of staff, instructors, program heads and administration, that they MUST SHOW students that that concern is there. That is why the Student Feedback form has been made mandatory throughout the institute, rather than being used in most programs by most instructors as has been the case in the past. This form is Your method of communicating in a semi-formal way with Your instructor, to help him know what he is doing right, and what might be improved, from your point of view. As Dr. Souch said at the February 22, 1988 meeting of the Academic Council, "at NAIT we strive to help people succeed, not fail." This includes both staff and students.

The student has NEVER had either the right or the responsibility By Law to choose who to hire and who to fire in any school in Canada. There is nothing new about this, and we are NOT being discriminated against. That is simply the law. The customer does not hire and fire the employees of the corporation. The customer does have the right to get what he paid for, as students have the right to get the education they come here for.

If they do not, there is a complaint procedure. This has always been in place, if not as visible in the last couple of years as the Student Feedback issue. There seems to be a feeling among students that this procedure does not work, and perhaps, in the past, they were right in some cases. However, in keeping with NAIT's new focus on students' needs and expectations, ALL staff members are being re-acquainted with the details of

this procedure. In the business world, 95% of unsatisfied customers don't tell anyone who can help them. Unfortunately, the same is true of NAIT. In brief, if you have a problem with one of your instructors, or some other problem that you feel needs attention, that is the general procedure. First, talk to your instructor. In many cases, this will be the end of it. If you are not satisfied with this, or your instructor cannot help with your problem, there is one of several people that you can talk to next. In some programs there are people known as Staff Advisors and others called Assistant Program Heads. If either of these positions exist in your program, they are the people to talk to. In any case the Program Head follows next. By this time, most problems have been either solved or explained to the satisfaction of all concerned. If not, the next person to speak to is the Associate Dean of Student and Staff Affairs for your Division. (Business, Health, Engineering Technologies and Industrial). If necessary, they can introduce you to the other people responsible, up to the President, Dr. Souch. This procedure has always been in place at NAIT, but unfortunately in recent years, has not been known by all students.

Mr. Seeth Seethram, Vice President of Student and Staff Affairs, has stated publicly on several occasions that he is always available and willing to speak with any student on any subject. If you find that the procedure outlined does not work, or you just want to talk to someone "at the top", call Mr. Seethram at 7704, or drop by the Administration Offices in the main building and see if he is in.

I feel that this attempt on some people's part to try and combine both functions, that of feedback and that of complaint into one document and procedure is improper, and that the controversy is being raised by those who are not fully aware of all of the differences between the two. This is a fault of the school and must be clarified to all concerned. The Nugget can help in many ways to assist the staff of NAIT and to make ALL students knowledgeable about the procedures of life at NAIT and the concerns behind those procedures.

Each of the Technology Representatives have received a copy of a document outlining the methods and philosophy of the Student Feedback procedures. Contact yours if you would like to read it in detail.

We agree evaluations or feedback can indicate the effectiveness, strengths and weaknesses, of instructors in meeting their objectives for students. However...we disagree with which way to do that

Formative, Student Feedback. The feedback is not given to anyone other than the instructor who is strongly recommended to share the results with the Program Head but is not required to.

Formative and Summative, Instructor Evaluation. The feedback is given to the instructor and the Program Head.

A Program Head can make a more informed appraisal if he sees the total instructor from all levels. Student evaluations round off, in a SMALL WAY, instructor performance appraisals. From this the Program Head spots situations developing before they become full blown problems for complaints.

To expect students to single themselves out and take a complaint through the channels is idealistic.

**Canadian Oxy funding helps NAIT and PITS**

Editorial

A joint venture for petroleum-industry training has been struck between NAIT and the Petroleum Industry Training Service (PITS), motivated by a \$25,000 funding initiative from Canadian Occidental Petroleum Ltd.

Details were unveiled on October 13th for a 1.6 million dollar proposed expansion to the existing PITS training centre located at Nisku.

The addition to the Nisku training center will complete the world-class facility announced in the throne speech in April 1986. There has continued to be a demonstrated need in the petroleum industry for training in production operations, well service, and safety.

The expansion will be utilized by both institutions, PITS will use the facility in its existing upgrading programs, future upgrading programs, and pre-employment training. Of benefit to NAIT will be the hands-on experience provided to students in Petroleum Engineering Technology, Petroleum Exploration Technology and Petrochemical Engineering Technology, and to a lesser extent, students in Instrumentation, Materials, Mechanical Engineering, and other technologies.

The donation received by the NAIT Foundation will be used for initial planning of the proposed expansion.

## Taking Stock

If the noise level of the cafeteria is any indication, we all successfully completed midterms and (maybe more of a challenge) survived the Hallowe'en weekend!

An now, a word or two about the debt market.

### Definition:

**Interest:** These are funds an investor receives in exchange for the use of his or her money. I'm sure we're all familiar with interest we pay - on loans, overdue bills, etc. From an investor's perspective, it's the same transaction except that we become the creditors. Technically speaking, when you deposit money into a savings account and the bank pays you interest, you are a creditor - lending them your money with a "payable on demand" clause. The debt market operates the same way - except you "buy" or "invest in" a "debt instrument", whether it's a T-Bill, CSB, Term Deposit, Bond or Debenture.

Interest can be paid as simple (regular) or compound. Simple interest means that you are paid the interest owing to you on a regular basis i.e. monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually. Compound interest accrues or collects as an amount owed to you, but no payments are actually made to you over the life of the loan. Because the interest is not paid out, it becomes, in effect, an additional amount lent to the issuer of the debt instrument. Thus, they are obliged to pay interest on this amount as well as on the amount originally lent or invested. On maturity date, the full amount of principal and all accumulated interest is paid in full. CSBs are an excellent

NAIT and NAITSA staff will attend two workshops on suicide to help them prepare a proposal on what to do to help prevent suicide in the NAIT community. "Dr. Souch is concerned" about the problem, said Hugh Becking of NAIT's Counselling Centre.

Dorothy Chapman of the Health Services Unit and Bev O'Neil, Secretary Treasury of NAITSA were registered to attend "Students at Risk" on October 28 and 29. Hugh Becking and Pat McEwen, President of NAITSA, will attend "Suicide in Your Community" from November 6 to 8.

Hugh Becking expects the proposal will be presented to Dr. Souch in mid-December.

## HOW YOU CAN HELP A SUICIDAL FRIEND

### 1. Listen:

They need someone to really hear what they are saying. Pay attention to the feelings behind the words.

### 2. Evaluate the seriousness of their thoughts and feelings:

They may be just upset. However, if depressed, become agitated and restless, be concerned.

### 3. Take every complaint and feeling expressed seriously:

Don't be fooled by their calmness, as underneath this there may be very distressed feelings.

### 4. Do not be afraid to ask directly if the person has had suicidal thoughts:

Most welcome the question as it gives an opening to discuss the problem.

### 5. Be positive and supportive:

A strong stable direction is required. Convey the idea that everything needed will be done to help the person over this crisis.

### 6. Do not be misled by comments that they are over the crisis:

Follow-up is important and some form of professional help needed.

### 7. Be positive in your outlook of the future:

Lead the person to see that their predictions of a hopeless future are only guesses, not facts.

### 8. Help the person to see alternatives to suicide:

Look at what the person feels will be accomplished by their death and show them alternative ways to the same goal.

### 9. Action is required:

Do something that gives the person something to hang on to.

### 10. Do not avoid asking for assistance:

Don't try to handle everything alone. Be calm, yet firm, so that person will feel realistic plans are being developed to relieve the crisis.

### Lastly:

Arrange for persons to stay with the person in crisis. Make the environment as safe and provocation free as possible. Do not argue about suicide as you can't win. Involve professional persons as soon as possible.

Marketing Interest Group

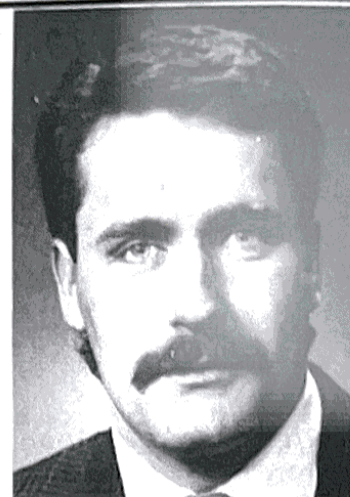

# SWAP Student Work Abroad Programme

SWAP is the Student Work Abroad Programme. It was established approximately twelve years ago and now operates working holiday activities for Canadian students in Britain, Ireland, New Zealand, Australia and Japan. In 1987 almost 1700 students took advantage of SWAP. The objective of SWAP is to provide students with the opportunity to "live" in a country for a period of time. SWAP takes care of all red tape for working holiday visas, provides two nights' accommodation at the destination and runs an orientation programme which advises students on how to go about their employment and accommodation search and assists each participant book his/her travel through Travel CUTS, Canada's national student travel bureau.

The programme provides the means to fund (through working) one's stay in the host country and it is hoped, creates the opportunity to learn more about its people, culture, etc. through extended first hand experience. SWAP is a means to facilitate a real learning experience on how some other part of the world operates.

### The Experience of a Lifetime

Why go back to the same old summer job when you could be working within walking distance of Buckingham Palace, teaching English in Japan, or skiing on your weekend off in New Zealand? Plan now to turn next year's summer job into the experience of a lifetime. A representative of SWAP, the Student Work Abroad Programme will be on campus to tell you about opportunities for working holidays in Britain, Ireland, New Zealand, Australia and Japan on November 3, 1988 in H-5.

A SWAP working holiday provides you with a means to fund a long term stay in the host country (by working) giving you the chance to get to know the people and culture. Last year's 1,700 participants worked at jobs as diverse as: sheep shears, bank teller, bell hop, office worker and farm hand. SWAP's flexibility allowed them to spend a whole summer abroad or to participate in SWAP Britain in July after working a couple of months in Canada or to use SWAP Australia as the starting point for an Asian odyssey.

SWAP takes care of all the red tape for working holiday visas, provides two nights' accommodation at the destination, runs an orientation programme

which advises students on how to go about their employment and accommodation search, arranges for participants to have access to the advice, assistance and services of the local student travel organization and assists participants with all travel arrangement through Canada's national student travel bureau, Travel CUTS.

### How SWAP Works

Travel CUTS offices are the key contact point for potential SWAP participants. SWAP brochures will be available at the EMPLOYERS' FAIR and also at the TRAVEL CUTS office located at 10424 - 118 Avenue. The SWAP brochure outlines all the details for each programme including eligibility, visa duration, amount of support funds required and services available. Registration forms are included and participants simply follow the step-by-step instructions and forward their application to the TRAVEL CUTS office located at 10424 - 118 Avenue, Edmonton, Alberta T5G 0P7. Additional information is also available by calling Loretta at (403) 471-8054.

### Who Runs SWAP

The Student Work Abroad Programme is a programme of the Canadian Federation of Students.

The Programme Director, David Smith and Assistant Director, Margot Haldenby work at the Travel CUTS and CFS-Services offices in Toronto. To deal with the now over 1,000 participants on SWAP Britain a full time SWAP UK co-ordinator works in London, England. Travel CUTS staff in Ottawa and Vancouver also assist SWAP staff in arranging visas from the appropriate embassies and consulates during the busy spring period.

### Interested in Working Abroad?

SWAP, the Student Work Abroad Programme can help you. SWAP operates its working holiday programmes in Great Britain, Ireland, New Zealand, Australia, France, Finland and Japan.
