Apprenticeship Review On Hold

"The province has yet to decide or accept any recommendations" which were presented to it last year in a review of the apprenticeship system, said Faye Orr of Alberta Career Development and Employment. A decision is expected "probably by the spring legislature", said Orr.

Ken Kowalski was named the new Minister of Alberta Career Development and Employment in September. Rick Orman was the previous Minister.

NAIT's recommendations were presented to the Apprenticeship and Industry Training Review Committee in a report dated September 8, 1987.

NAIT recommended that these possibilities be

investigated to see if a change was needed.

- shortening the training period
- move to a competency-based format of training, with variable entry and length of training, from the current fixed time, fixed entry and exit format of training
- development of more pre-apprenticeship programs and the possibility of introducing one year of technical training prior to apprenticeship
- increased attention to quality of instruction, including instructor evaluation by apprentices
- supervision by NAIT of the administration of provincial and inter-provincial exams

more efficient use of training facilities by negotiating with and offering inducements to apprentices and employers about the location and timing of training

establishment of a single western Canadian training centre for a particular trade

Florin Bergh, Dean of NAIT's Industrial Division is optimistic about NAIT's role in the apprenticeship system. "NAIT remains strongly supportive of the Alberta apprenticeship program, as an economic development / manpower training system which is most effective and responsive to industrial needs. Indeed, NAIT has historically provided more apprentice training than any other Alberta institution.

Editorial:

What is your diploma worth?

Do you know the difference between a degree and a diploma? Do you know the worth of your diploma, how to market it, and who your target market is?

One inexperienced young NAIT business graduate I knew did not, and it destroyed her credibility at work.

A few years ago the two of us both worked for the provincial government in positions at the same level of responsibility. She applied for a management position in an area where she had little if any practical experience and which no one expected her to get. Now, the government is a monolithically bureaucratic institution, and they have books of rules about everything. Their rule on management positions is that a university degree is a minimum requirement, a fact which was clearly stated on the job posting. When my co-worker didn't even make the first cut for interviews, she stormed down to personnel and indignantly told them that she had a "degree". (I guess she didn't know that only universities grant degrees.) She was angry when she only heard university graduates were interviewed instead. She conceitedly told everyone who would listen that she couldn't understand why anyone would want to bother with a university graduate when a NAIT graduate was available.

This kind of snobbism does not give NAIT a good name.

A college or technical school diploma takes only two years to earn, while a university degree takes three or four years. We have the jump on university graduates in that our training is more practical and we are more immediately useful to employers. We are already at work and climbing the corporate ladder while our university counterparts are still stuck in school. However, large organizations with many levels of hierarchy seem to prefer university graduates for management positions. Their rationale seems to be that university graduates are more suitable for the high proportion of conceptualization required in upper management positions because their education is designed to teach them to handle the theoretical.

I think there is also another reason. University graduates have the advantage of the old boy network. Just as there are NAIT snobs, there are also narrow-minded university snobs. Universities have been around longer, so right now more of their graduates are in a position to hire. Technical institutes and community colleges are relatively new, and as more and more of our graduates reach the top, we will have our own old boy network.

So, business graduates, when you are looking for a job, keep in mind that organizations which are dinosaurs have you segmented into technical, administrative, and senior clerical positions. If you want management, look for a more innovative firm.

And remember one thing. When it comes down to the crunch, it isn't the diploma or the degree that gets the job. It's the person.

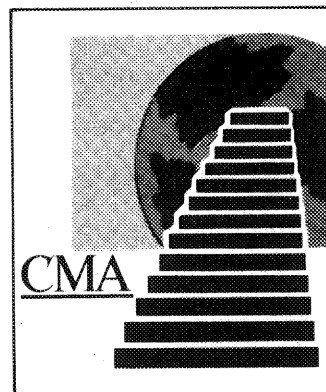

AIDS ALERT

In October 1987 an AIDS Task Force was formed with representatives from different areas of NAIT. Chaired by the Dean of Student Services, the Task Force consisted of the President of NAITSA, the Supervisor of Health Services, the Chairman of Health Sciences, the Program Head of Paramedics, a Human Resources Manager and the Director of Physical Facilities.

After many meetings it was decided that as AIDS was not spread by casual contact, working or even living in close contact with AIDS sufferers (as long as there was no sexual contact and no sharing of needles or syringes for drug abuse) there was no need for a special AIDS policy for NAIT. AIDS sufferers would be treated as any other sufferer from a serious life threatening disease. The Task Force and the Safety Committee voted to have condom machines installed in some male and female washrooms.

It was decided the main thrust would be education - (as have most workplaces, educational institutes, health authorities, etc.) - and an AIDS Education Committee was set up with Dorothy Chapman, Supervisor of Health Services as the chairman and a representative from NAITSA, NASA, and AUPE. The committee sat in February and hosted a very successful showing of "AIDS the New Epidemic", in H5 at 12 noon on March 23rd. Stu Jeffries, K97 and Good Rockin' Tonite host, introduced the video which he had narrated. The turnout was standing room only. The question period afterwards was excellent and feedback very positive.

The video "AIDS ALERT" was shown March 30 in the South Lobby running continuously from 12 noon - 1:00 p.m. There was a poor audience turnout which may have been due to the closeness to the other video showing or the public nature of the location.

The AIDS Committee is holding the first meeting of this academic year in October - give any suggestions or voice any concerns you may have to your NAITSA representative.

Health Services has a varied supply of clear and informative AIDS literature which is available from the display stands near and in the Health offices. The nurses are available for confidential counselling or to answer any queries on this or any health matter or concern.

Taking Stock

This article continues our discussion of money market instruments and introduces TD's and GIC's as your second step in building your portfolio.

Definition: Canada Savings Bonds (CSB's): These are instruments which are issued only by the federal government. They offer interest (regular or compound) and usually mature in seven years. There are no commissions charged to the buyer. Commissions are paid by the federal government to the selling institution.

Advantages and Disadvantages:

They rank with T-bills as an excellent vehicle for your emergency funds. They can be cashed in on any business day, and are fully guaranteed as to principal and interest to any amount by the federal government.

You may have noticed that they are only available for purchase for a brief time, usually the last week of October.

Compound interest bonds are available in denominations as little as one hundred dollars. Regular interest bonds begin at three hundred dollars.

Referring to the previous article, once you have saved the first twenty-five percent of your emergency funds the balance can easily be saved by investing in CSB's on the payroll deduction plan. This plan is offered through an employer. You decide the principal amount of the bond you wish to purchase based upon the monthly payments. The payments are deducted directly from your paycheck and must be paid in full by the tenth month. Once the bond is paid in full you can take possession of the physical certificate.

Definition: Term Deposits (TD's) and Guaranteed Investment Certificates (GIC's): These are popular money market investments. Insured by CDIC, they offer security, and pay interest. They are also widely available through banks, trust companies, credit unions and brokerage houses. The first three offer their own versions of these investments. Brokerage firms typically survey the money market and can usually offer the same investments. One call to your broker will provide you with all the information you need to decide which is best for you.

Advantages and Disadvantages:

While TD's and GIC's can occupy a niche in your portfolio, be aware that they can carry certain drawbacks. For example, if you need your money in a hurry, you may find yourself paying a "penalty" - giving up a portion of the interest, often as much as half. For this reason alone, it would not be wise to place your emergency funds into such an investment. Rather, they should be considered a second-level investment. Assuming you have T-Bills and CSB's, the value of which equals or slightly exceeds your emergency capital requirements, why have TD's or GIC's at all? Simply, because they have an aspect which can provide you with an enormous advantage - unlike typical money market instruments, they can be purchased with maturities of up to 5 years. This is a potential drawback for emergency capital but if you forecast falling interest rates you can "lock in" your money at the original rate. You may choose, however, to save all of your emergency capital in this manner.

One slight drawback to owning CSB's is that while you can cash them at almost any time and receive your funds (P and I) the same day, interest is only paid up to the last full month that the bonds were held. Thus, if you "cash" your bonds on October 31 you will only receive interest up to September 30th. Where possible, cash your bonds on or shortly after the first of any month.

The other thing to be aware of is that any bonds cashed before January 31 following the year of purchase forfeit all interest.

CSB's can be purchased through any financial institution. It is easiest to buy them from a broker as it can be done over the phone. Most other institutions require you to order them in person and pay at the same time. Brokers require payment to be made by November 1st.

Rule of Thumb: T-Bills and CSB's should make up the 75% of emergency capital. I recommend 2/3 CSB and 1/3 T-Bills.

Note: The current issue of CSB's has been set at 9 1/2 % (guaranteed for the first year), maturing Nov. 1, 1998, with a maximum purchase of \$75,000. Payment due date is Nov. 1, 1988.

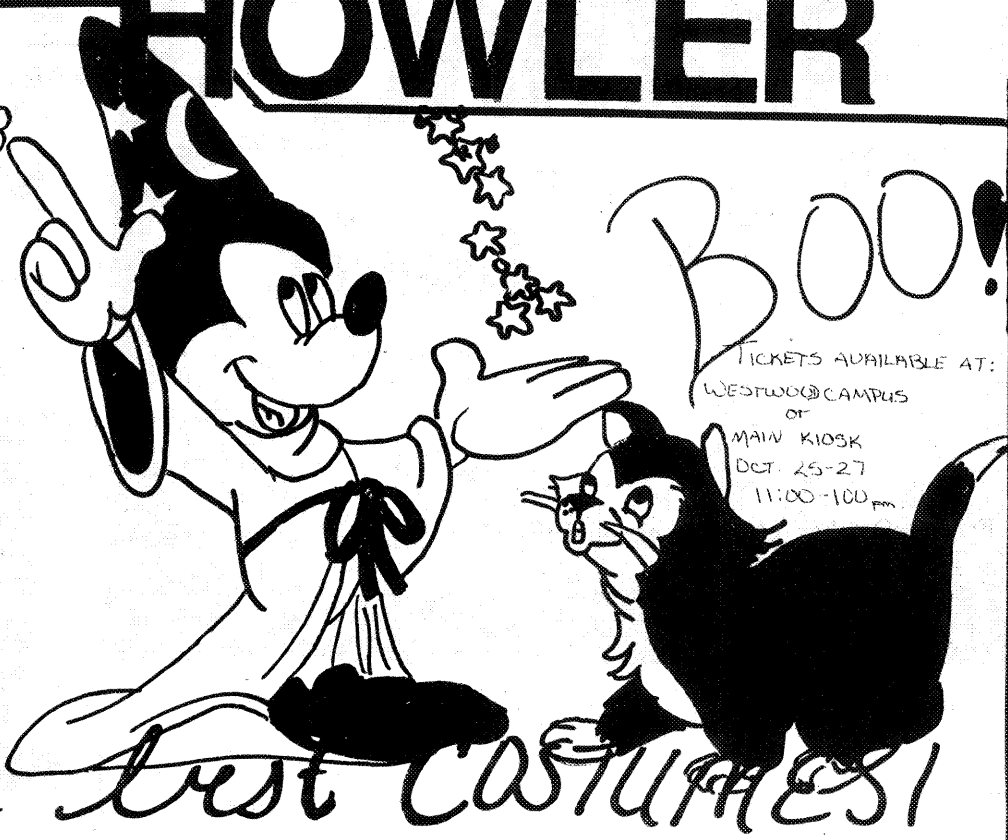

Eight different goal-scorers found the mark for SAIT including Jeff Turner, Cam Lazoruk, Todd Oliphant, Lee Odelein, Kurt Woolf, Cody Gunlock, Ron Brandson,

and Wally Fizer. Cory Siermachesky answered with a hat trick for the Ooks while J.C. McEwan chipped in a pair and Brad Hammett added a single.

The Trojans outshot the Ooks 39 to 33 and were ahead 2-0 following the first and 3-1 after two periods. Ten goals were scored in the final period.

On Saturday, October 15th, the Ooks moved into the consolation final with an 8-4 victory over the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings.

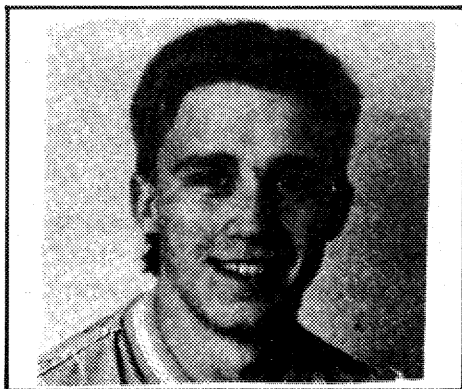
NAIT, as a student body, raised over ten thousand dollars. The U of A, crammed with nearly twenty-five thousand students, only managed a mere three thousand and something.

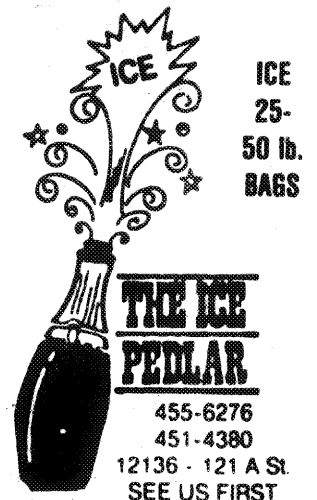

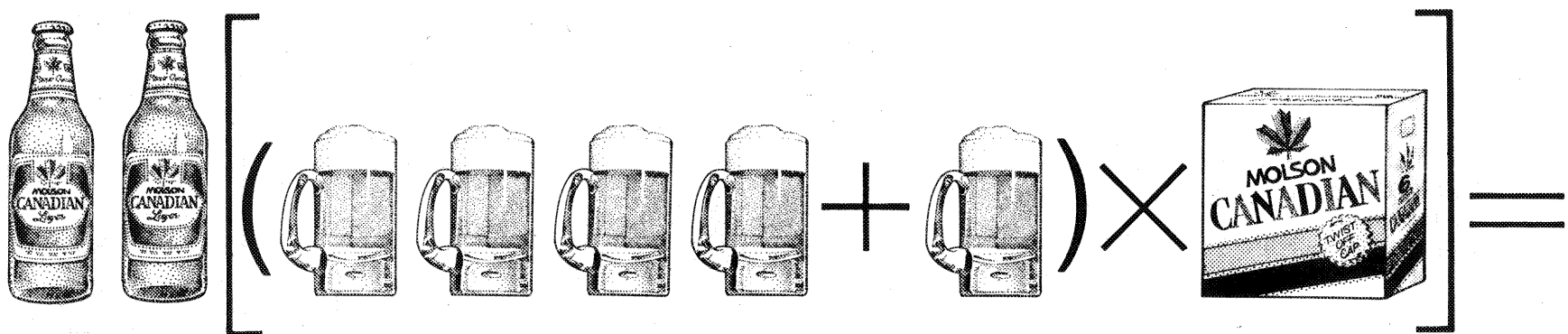
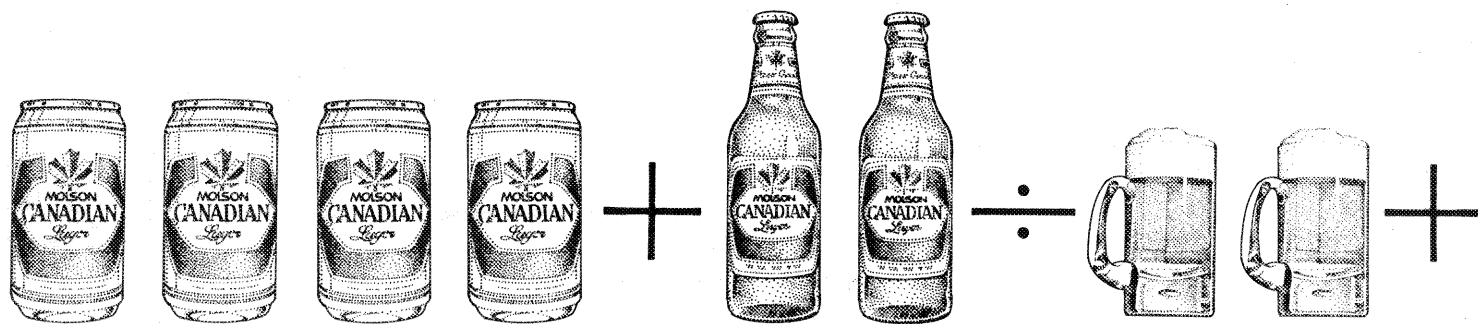
