Registration Line Ups Over

Registration at NAIT, August 24 to 27 produced forms on 5119 students. "The line-ups were really fast," said Don Yuchuk, Registrar, "It was due to a very organized staff and the students were just superb."

The longest line-ups were on Wednesday, August 24th from 10:30 to 1:30. The maximum wait was estimated at approximately one hour.

The average wait was 5 to 10 minutes.

Registration in the four days was up from last year's figures of 4,800 to nearly 5,000.

Calls to the registrar's office increased 400% during registration. The increase to over 800 calls a

day (from an average of 200 to 250) caused the phone lines to jam.

The registrar's office dealt with the overload of calls by utilizing a new phone number with recorded telephone messages to direct callers to slower work hours.

The students who did not register on the designated days started to line-up early Monday, August 29th. The 500 to 600 late registrations should soon be completed.

Another 1,000 students will be registering for January. "Generally it was a good registration," said Yuchuk. "I would like to thank the students for their patience. NAIT students are just the greatest."

Marketeers take note

By next week 5500 to 5600 students will have registered at NAIT. That's more people than many hometowns have. Now consider the number of staff or even the 25,000 to 27,000 students in continuing education during the year.

What a population! What a market! Collectively our buying power must be appealing to some enterprising marketeers.

Could a valid NAITSA card or NASA card be used to obtain discounts on purchases at designated establishments. There is presently one establishment which recognizes a NAITSA card as a confirmation of a discount. New York Steak and Pizza offers a 10% discount on all food orders year round.

Many school related supplies and services are available on campus at a reduced profit and therefore at reduced cost to the students. However, not all requirements for living are available at NAIT.

It is understood that a business does not operate on a basis of moving its product without profit. On the other side of the coin, consideration should be given to establishing buying patterns in new buyers. Buyers comfortable and familiar in an establishment are very likely to return.

What group would be responsible to approach local, provincial or national franchise establishments to promote this idea? NAITSA is our collective voice. Maybe they'll consider the idea.

FINANCIAL WELCOME

The Financial Aid and Awards Office on Campus is responsible for the administration of the NAIT Student Awards program and acts as liaison between students and sources of financial assistance, primarily the Alberta Students Finance Board. Application and information on financial assistance may be obtained from the office along with information on scholarships.

Financial Resources

The most reliable indication of your financial resources is your bank account. Most students obtain funds for their education through summer employment, part-time employment while a student, savings, parental contribution, spousal contribution if married, etc. However, students who have not acquired sufficient funds on their own may be eligible for a student loan. Both the federal and provincial governments provide student loans and application forms for student loans from all provinces can be obtained from the Financial Aid and Awards office. Completed application forms for financial assistance should be submitted through this office.

Scholarships and bursaries are another source of funds that students should investigate. Scholarships and bursaries recognize academic achievement and in some cases financial need. Application deadline for student awards administered by NAIT is **October 31, 1988**.

The staff of the Financial Aid and Awards Office is available to discuss and financial problems in the hopes that students who are not continually concerned with money matters will be better able to deal directly with their academic concerns.

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The Politics of Health: AIDS and Smoking

I haven't heard anyone complain about NAIT's new smoking policy. Yet.

I'm fully expecting to walk down the hallway, some day soon, and overhear an indignant tirade about how not being able to light up in the hallway is an erosion of freedom, as if the next step was the inception of a Soviet-style gulag underneath the cafeteria.

I've heard this argument before, that smoking restrictions are a violation of human rights, and I disagree.

This is a health issue, not a human rights issue. Second-hand smoke is dangerous to other people, and doing whatever you want wherever you want without concern for others is licence, not a right.

A human rights issue that masquerades as a health issue is the problem of how society deals with AIDS victims. While some smokers may be a bit disgruntled because they now have the inconvenience of walking a few extra steps from the hallway to a smoking lounge, other people have been refused admission to school or lost their jobs because they have a fatal disease, even though it is not spread by casual contact.

Why do people react this way to AIDS? During a discussion with a friend of mine, she told me that she was terrified she might have caught AIDS from the toilet seat of a bathroom shared with a co-worker who later died of AIDS. I was astonished, because she is an

intelligent woman. I have come to the conclusion that her response was caused by a combination of anxiety and denial of the casual sex she had had.

NAIT's current policy, according to Seeth Seethram, Director of Student and Staff Affairs, is that a potential student or instructor would not be refused admission or employment because he or she had a contagious disease, including AIDS. However, he added that the victim would have to take the extra precautions necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

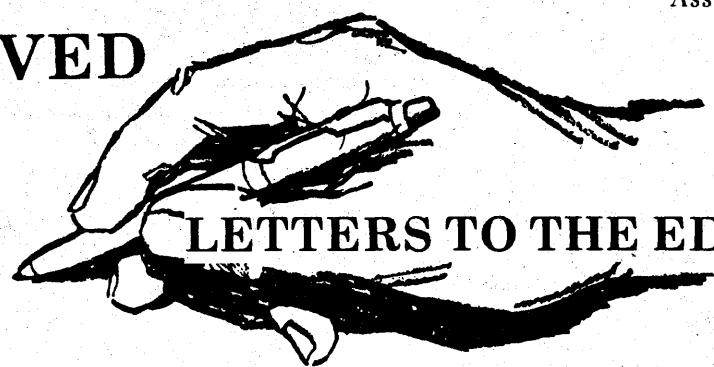
No hysterical reactions here. No Soviet-style gulags either.

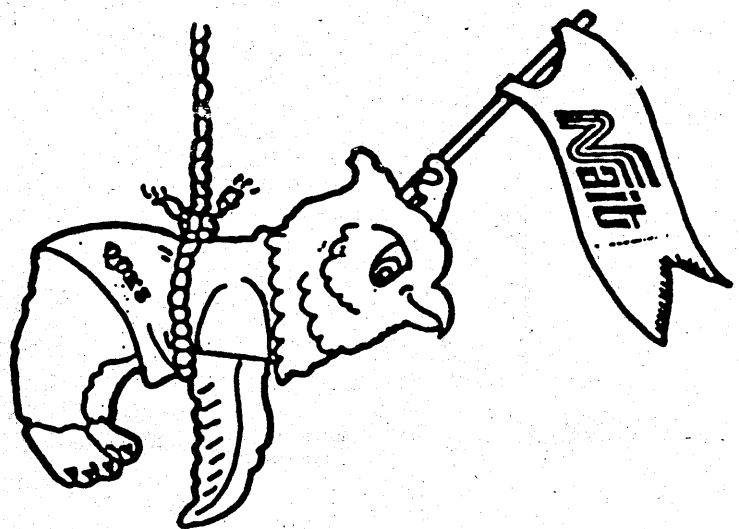

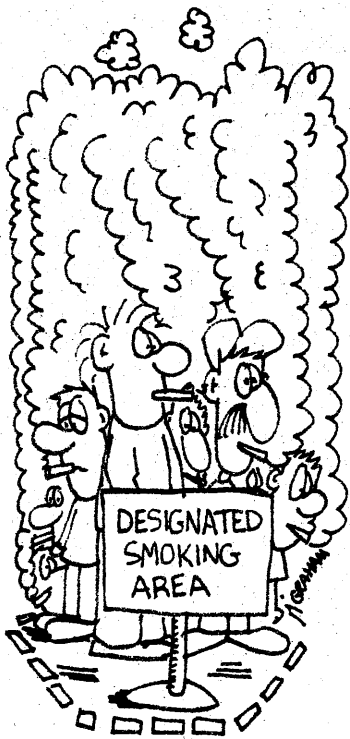

The newly established Scholarship will be awarded annually. Up to ten outstanding graduates of business programs in Alberta who intend to become CMAs will be eligible.

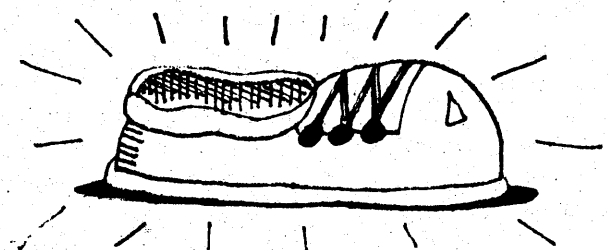
The CMA accreditation takes a minimum of two to

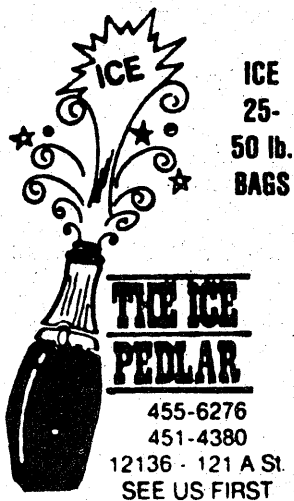
This past summer while we were all busy learning about the real world, a NAIT grad was being honoured by the real world.

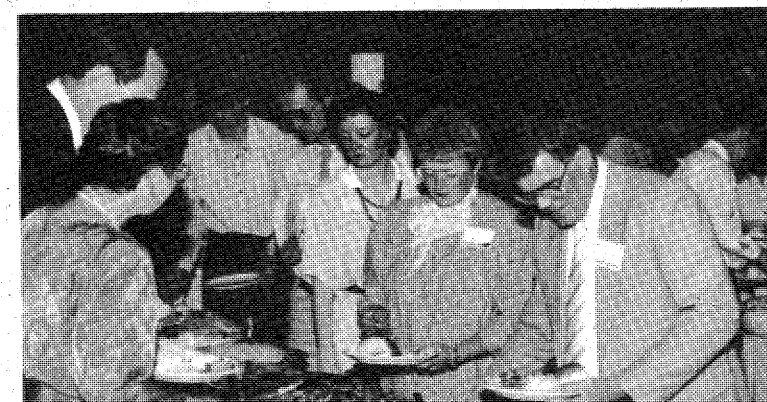

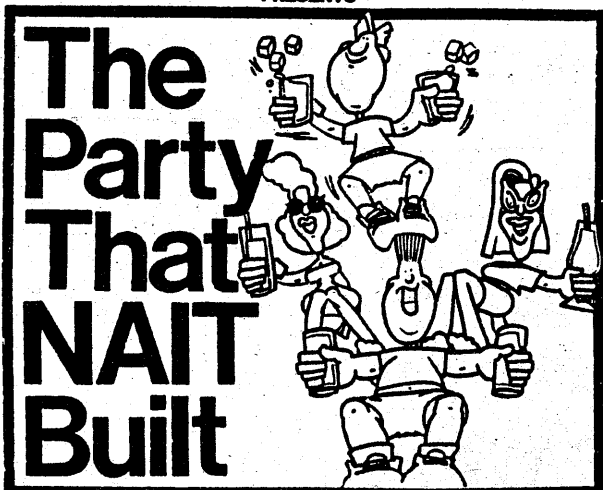

The NAIT Hockey Oaks are now preparing for the 1988-89 ACAC hockey season. Last year, the Oaks finished first in the regular season and were ranked number one in the nation. However, the playoffs proved to be a major disappointment at the Oaks were eliminated by the Red Deer College Kings in the first round of the playoffs.

The Oaks will have a strong nucleus of veterans returning for the upcoming season, but a number of positions will be filled by rookies. For the first time in their history, the Oaks will be playing host to the Candian Colleges Athletic Association National Championships. In addition, an overseas tour of Czechoslovakia and Poland during the holiday season is a distinct possibility.

The coach of the NAIT Hockey Oaks is Perry Pearn. Perry is a graduate of the University of Alberta and is in his tenth season as the coach of the NAIT Hockey Oaks. Under Perry's leadership, the Oaks have

captured three Canadian Colleges Athletic Association National Hockey Championship titles. The Oaks were national champions in the seasons of 1981-82, 1984-85, and 1985-86.

The Oaks will compete in a 24 game ACAC hockey schedule this season along with the Red Deer College Kings, the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings, the SAIT Trojans, and the Mount Royal College Cougars.

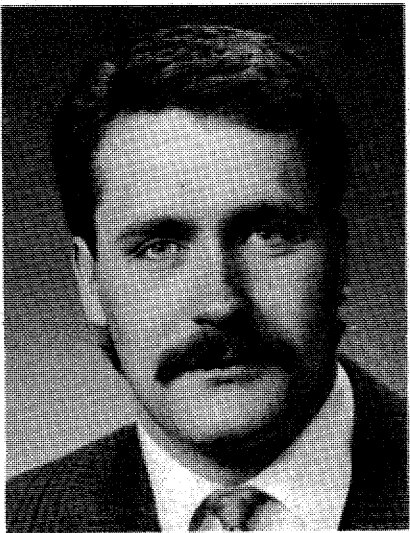

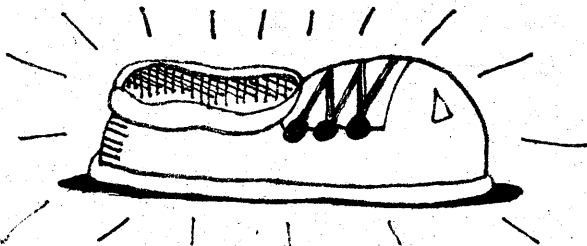
Remember my office door, in E133, is always open to talk about problems, ideas or just to shoot the breeze.

The individual winners are David K. Hook (Spruce Grove), John S. Kelly

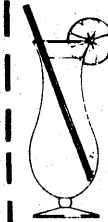
