




The Spirit of NAIT Award for best mascot was also up for grabs and had a surprising number of entries.


First and second place were decided by the students on Friday in the Business and



NAITSA passed four changes to its bylaws at a general meeting in the North Lobby on March 8th.

Pat MacEwen, NAITSA President, reviewed the proposed changes individually before he called for votes on each. All were approved by overwhelming majorities.

Here is a summary of the changes:

1. Secretary/Treasurer was made an elected official with voting rights. (Bylaws 23.b and 18.1.c)
2. Activities Director was added to the list of positions paid \$6 per hour up to \$290 (total) for the period of May to August. (Bylaw 49.b)
3. To create a tax-ree benefit for the NAITSA executive, the word "tuition" replaces "bursary" (Bylaws 49.b and c.)
4. Students' NAITSA fees are

increased by \$20. (Bylaw 6.2.d.)

The meeting was originally scheduled to start at 12:00 noon. By 12:20, only 43 people were in attendance. NAITSA executives were

successful in finding a quorum of 200 by convincing students in the halls to attend the meeting.

Students were not required to produce student I.D. to attend the meeting.

Editorial:

At the Public Trough

Once again, the government goes to the public trough. Only this time it is the local student government, and they do it with the permission of 200 students in a quorum vote March 8, 1989.

Only three students in attendance voted against the increase. Here are the numbers that I based my "no" vote on:

Writing on the Athletic Board in the 1988 "Notes to Financial Statement" note four says "In the current period, the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology provided \$20,500, and the Students' Association provided \$163,191 to the Board." (Art Hooks says NAIT pays coaches salaries.)

The question I tried to have Pat MacEwen answer at the general meeting was, has NAITSA tried to find other ways of saving or raising money? Perhaps by having NAIT carry more of the athletic burden, students would not have been hit up for another \$20 (a 27 percent increase).

NAITSA, in my first year '86-'87, gave a yearbook and a phone directory for the \$75 fee. The phone directory was done away with, and the yearbook now costs \$15. Today's student who wants a yearbook sees a 47 percent increase of costs for fewer services.

In 1988, NAITSA had a total revenue \$721,000 from interest association dues, sales, advertising, games room, and student store. \$408,000 was raised through student fees. Using the same student population figures the \$20 increase will raise \$109,000 next year.

The NAITSA publications are budgeted to lose over \$94,000 in '88-'89. Perhaps these should be examined and the financial position turned around. Travel expenses budgeted for NAITSA executive in '88-'89 are \$10,800.

Fundamentally, did our student government try to find the best way to raise the equity in the building fund, or was their solution simply the easiest?

From the reaction from the students in attendance, who cheered when I was asked to sit down, I would guess the quorum says NAITSA found the best way!!

Do you think it is appropriate for an elected representative of the students of NAIT to wear a button supporting his or her personal choice of political party on campus?



I think the same level of discretion and fairness in our student executive would be appropriate.

Dear Editor:

In less than a week, NAIT will be playing host to the Canadian Colleges Athletic Association National Championships in hockey and men's basketball.

With the nationals around the corner, the CCAA should take a serious look at improving its image nationwide.

For too many years, the CCAA has stood in the shadows of the CIAU. There are a number of reasons for this.

Firstly, too many coaches in the CCAA take their responsibility lightly. Some of these coaches want all the publicity in the world, but when it comes down to it, they don't deserve it. Some coaches feel that scores should only be reported to the local media when their team wins. This type of childish mentality is bush league. It does not foster good relations with the local media and does nothing to increase the credibility of the CCAA. Like the NCAA penalizes teams which engage in shady recruiting practices, maybe the CCAA or college athletic directors should ban the coaches who engage in this type of activity from the CCAA for a year.

Secondly, the method of reporting material to the media outlets in Alberta through the wire services is poorly handled. On the Prairie Scoreboard of Canadian Press, information always appears about the AJIIL and the CIAU but never the ACAC. When the ACAC hockey semi-final

series between Red Deer and SAIT was underway, no final score of game two came across the wire. If this is the fault of CP, the ACAC should investigate. If this is the fault of the company paid to do ACAC stats, they should be replaced.

Thirdly, the CCAA needs to increase its exposure nationally. How about a national television contract for the national championships? Surely, TSN, CBC, CTV or an independent network would be interested in some of the action. National corporate sponsors (excluding alcohol and tobacco companies) could also play a role in the development of the CCAA profile.

Fourthly, fans of CCAA teams must badger the media constantly. If a score wasn't on the radio or in the newspaper, phone and inquire to the people in charge. Increased coverage is more likely when there is greater vocal support.

If the CCAA wants to step ahead, action is required now.

University Appeals for Political Support

The University of Calgary Students' Union is calling upon all of Alberta's political parties to address the university's underfunding crisis during the current provincial election.

Don Kozak, president of the Students' Union, stated, "The province's long standing policy of accessibility is in jeopardy. If the political parties do not address the problem of university access now the problem will only worsen."

September 1988 was the first time the University of Calgary was unable to accept all qualified students who applied for admittance. Entrance restrictions are being caused by the severe shortage of academic space with the University of Calgary currently handling 2,500 more students than they have space for. As well, the faculty workload has increased dramatically. Since 1979-80, University enrollment has increased by 56.8 percent, while the number of faculty members has only increased by 11.9 percent. The resulting pressures have forced the

university to close its doors to qualified students at a time when the demand for a university education is increasing. Alternative options for young Calgarians

hoping to obtain a university education are limited, with Mount Royal College also forced to turn away qualified applicants.

Kozak stated further that, "It is unfortunate that the U of C will be turning away qualified high school graduates, but when you consider that provincial funding per full-time student has decreased by 25 percent since 1980, the U of C has little choice if we hope to sustain an acceptable level of quality."

Many students may also be discouraged from pursuing an education due to financial reasons. In July 1988, 12.3 percent of Alberta's students were unemployed, and therefore unable to contribute traditional summer earnings towards their education. As well, 25 percent of all Canadian graduates face a student loan debt of more than

\$10,000. "Mortgaging their future to gain an education is a dilemma many young people are not willing to undergo," said Kozak.

"What students need are politicians willing to support our educational institutions and to create programs that will allow all qualified Albertans the opportunity to attend university," concluded Kozak.



Registration Up...Changes Made

If you are planning to take classes next year or during the summer session, the counsel centre recommends that you sign up for your classes as soon as possible.

Abortion on Demand

Since 1803 the criminal courts in Canada recognized that a fetus had a right to life. That is, until 14 months ago when the Supreme Court said "Forcing a woman, by threat of a criminal sanction" (reference to the then existing abortion law) "to carry a fetus to term...is a profound interference with a woman's body and thus an infringement of security of the person."

Up until this time a woman could receive the maximum penalty of life imprisonment for illegally aborting the fetus. This indicated first degree murder, and that a human life was at stake.

The courts also felt that the therapeutic abortion committees which decided whether or not an abortion was warranted were not functional and didn't do their job.

The courts were right on this one. It was a Morgentaler theory that the committees were usually made up of citizens who best exemplified political purity. Therefore, many women who needed the support could not receive it because the administrators who sat on these boards had made their decisions before they entered the room.

So now we sit and wait. The courts did their job. Our government waits for them to do it again. In the meantime there is no law. Pro-abortionists leap for joy as they hold demonstrations of their own. Back in Vancouver pro-life supporters sit in a cold cell for believing that the rights of an unborn child should be recognized and our own lives continue.

Figures in released in Canada for 1985 read as follows:

- 60,956 abortions (about the population of Lethbridge)
- 16.2 abortions per 100 live births
- B. C. has the highest abortion rate (26.1 per 100 live births) and P.E.I. the lowest (0.5 per 100 live births)

These figures are numbers prior to the new abortion ruling made 14 months ago. People like Jim Borowski and MP David Kilgour are now portrayed as crusaders and troublemakers.

Heaven knows we can't rock the political boat.


Borowski and Kilgour both believe there are instances where an abortion must be done. These cases do include rape and incest.

Yet a blind ear still exists in the capital and it appears through past issues like free trade that we as Canadians must make the decision for our so called *power-puffs* in Ottawa.

Abortion on demand is now available in Canada and the fetus still has no rights.

Student Loans

How about running your own show this summer? Interest free student loans are now being made available for full-time students at the elementary, secondary, post-secondary, or vocation school levels for those students who intend to go back to school.

The maximum loan available under the program is \$3,000. Also, to assist you in starting your new venture, the Federal Business Development Bank is making available, at no cost, seminars and workshops on "How to Start a Business" and "Marketing." As well, an experienced counsellor from the Federal Business Development Bank C.A.S.E. (Counselling Assistant to Small Enterprises) will be available to assist you in establishing your business. Again, no cost.

If the proposed business is partnership, all the partners must be eligible, and all partners will be jointly liable for the loan repayment.


Your proposed business must provide either a product or service and must fall under the definition of a private business. Your business must be run by you or your partners independently. Certain types of businesses, such as sales on a commission basis, and franchises do not qualify.

The loan must be repaid on or before October 6, 1989. It is recommended that these payments be made on a monthly basis in order for you to be successful. If you pay back the loan one month early, you will receive a \$100 cash rebate.

The loan remains interest free until October 6, 1989. If you do not begin your business within two weeks of receipt of the loan, or if your business ceases operation prior to August 14, 1989, the loan must be paid back immediately.





Lean On Me



The MHC ladies and mixed were also crowned champions, and along with NAIT will carry Alberta's colors in the Canadians.





6. The remaining Officers will serve a term from September to April with elections occurring in April.





Canadian Rock History Challenge

by Labatt's

Formed as one of Canada's first 'heavy metal' bands, this trio released their first single, "Not Fade Away" in September, 1973 on an independent record label. They followed this in April 1974 with their 'self-titled' debut album on the same label. Together the two releases attracted enough North American interest to land them a recording contract with a major record company. What followed was certainly one of the most prolific recording efforts that a Canadian band has ever made.

"Fly By Night," the band's second album, was released in 1974 shortly after signing and featured the title track as a single along with the song "In the Mood". After this they released "Caress of Steel" (Oct. 1975) which stayed in the R.P.M. charts for 24 weeks. They followed that in April 1976 with the album "2112" which went all the way to the top ten and stayed on the record charts for a staggering 42 weeks. Next, they released their first live album entitled "All The World's A Stage" in October 1976.

The band continued to release almost an album per year throughout the late seventies and into the eighties with the following amazing list of works: "A Fairwell to Kings" (1977), "Hemispheres" (1978), "Permanent Waves" (1980), "Moving Pictures" (1981), "Exit...Stage Left" (Live: Nov. 1981), "signals" (1982), "Grace Under Pressure" (1984), "Power Windows" (1985), "Hold Your Fire" (1987), and their latest (live) album "A Show of Hands" (Dec. 1988).

The early eighties also features some of the band's best known singles including: "The Spirit of the Radio" (Feb. 1980), "Limelight" (March 1981), "Tom Sawyer" (June 1981), and "New World Man" which went gold for them in September of 1982.






