The Commerical Cooking class was shocked and saddened last week when Susan Halter, a second year student, died suddenly as the result of a heart attack. Susan, who was apparently in good health, died on November 20.

According to program head John Barlow, Susan was a "very good student" who was well liked by other students and staff. She died with no warning at all at the age of 23.

The money will not leave NAIT until all the legal aspects are fully clear to all involved.

A SKIER'S DREAM

-1 Degree Celsius Accumulation of 20 cm. Severe Storm Watch in Effect It's Going To Be A Beautiful Day

For many skiers, those are the ingredients of a perfect day on the slopes. But for many of us, those particular ingredients do not come together that often. I guess that is why we are such a hardy bunch. Survival of the fittest is the name of the game. The real test comes when you spend most of your day standing in lift lines, or as some people have called them "Life Lines", because you seem to spend your life in them.

Our friends at Skiing Louise Ltd.; the company that operates Lake Louise Ski Area; have been doing their homework over the summer. You see this ski season (which for them in Lake Louise has already started) they are introducing two new "High-Speed Quad Chairlifts" to the front face of Mt. Whitehorn. These new "State of the Art" four passenger chairlifts give you even more skiing for your money. Detachable quad chairs travel at more then

twice the speed of conventional double or triple chairs, yet it slows down to a near stop for loading and unloading. These lifts will virtually eliminate "Life Lines" and greatly increases the amount of skiing in any one day. In fact the increase is 100% at the base and 65% of the total lift area. The running time of a person riding these lifts from the base to the top of Mt. Whitehorn is just 10 minutes. A far cry from the 30+ minutes it took riding on the conventional lifts the year before.

Last year Sunshine Village opened their high-speed quad chairlift, known as the "Angel Express." This chairlift replaced the Angel double chairlift, which some say had been there before skiing was invented. The Angel Express, like the chairlifts at Lake Louise, greatly reduced the lift lines at the base of the mountain. And take it from me, an experienced rider on these "Quads," they MOVE.

You get into line of one of these chairs and there is no standing around; before you know it you're on the chair, up the mountain and skiing again. AMAZING!!

If anyone the many ski resorts want to keep up in the fast paced industry of skiing, they better have themselves a "Quad" to be a real contender. Many ski resorts such as Lake Louise realized this and have

done their homework. Places like Fernie Snow Valley; 618 km. south of Edmonton in the B.C. Rockies; is featuring a "High-Speed Quad" this season, better known as the EL-QUAD. As well, Big White out in Kelowna has installed the "Ridge Rocket" over the summer. Last year's ski season brought out "Quadzilla," the high-speed quad at Panorama in the

heart of B.C.'s Okanagon Valley.

As you can see the ski industry is alive and well, doing great things now and will continue to do so in the future. So my suggestion is to grab a friend or a group of them and take advantage of the many ski trips being offered by different technologies through out NAIT.

This week's Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic is being called a success by Red Cross workers. As of 3:00 on Tuesday afternoon, 341 donors had passed through to give blood.

According to nurse Flo Shandro, "The turnout was really good. We haven't seen numbers like this for a long time." Considering October's serious blood shortage, the turnout is encouraging. In fact, the Red Cross was looking at leaving NAIT off it's traveling clinic list if this year's turnout was low. However, there is no danger of that now.

According to Shandro, present blood stocks are

acceptable, thanks in part to such traveling clinics. The Edmonton Red Cross conducts such clinics everywhere between Red Deer and Grande Prairie.

The nurses were happy to see a large number of firsttime donors coming to the clinic. The worst problem suffered by some donors was apparently only a feeling of weakness after giving.

Blood donations to the Red Cross can still be made at the Red Cross House (9931 - 106 Street) every Monday to Friday between 11:00 - 2:00 or the Blood Centre (8249 - 114 Street) from 10:30 - 8:00 Tuesday to Thursday, 10:30 - 2:30 on Friday and 9:30 - 1:30 on Saturday.
