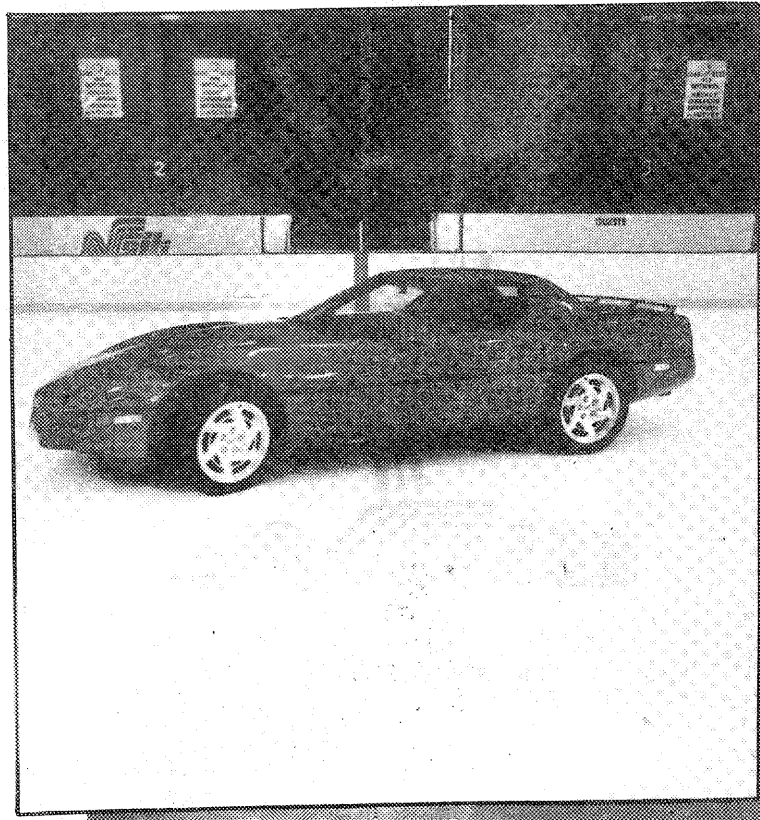

Once again, the NAIT Foundation's "Meet Us at The Mall" campaign is underway. This project is designed to create awareness for NAIT and the NAIT Foundation as well as offer a grande prize of a 1991 Corvette valued at over \$58,000 through a car raffle.

The "Meet Us at The Mall" display and car raffle travels to every major mall and trade show in Edmonton and it's surrounding area

beginning December 20, 1990 and ending on August 24th, 1991 at West Edmonton Mall. It can easily be said over 1,000,000 people will have been exposed to the project.

This year's 1991 corvette is a beautiful medium quasar blue convertible equipped with a 5.7 litre tuned-port-injection V8 engine. It also has over \$7000 in options, including a removable

hard-top, leather reclining seats, and a deluxe AM-FM stereo package. As well, a matching mini-convette valued at \$2,200 accompanies the grande prize.

On April 27th, 1991 there will be an early bird draw for a trip for two to London, England plus \$2,000 cash. Tickets can be purchased at student stores, the cashier's office and NAIT Foundation office beginning December 10, 1990. Tickets are only one for \$3.00 or three for \$5.00.

The goal of NAIT Foundation's "Meet Us at The Mall" project is to net \$100,000 of which \$90,000 plus a possible matching grant will be directed towards the General Endorsement Fund. \$10,000 plus a possible matching grant will be directed to capital equipment for Westerra Campus. To date the total amount of money raised by "Meet Us at The Mall" project exceeds \$640,000.

Students are encouraged to get involved with this worthwhile project by selling raffle tickets. NAITSA is offering cash prizes to the large and small technology and individual student that sells the most tickets. A goal of \$25,000 worth of ticket sales has been set by NAITSA President Roxanne Beaubien.

Based on that goal, it means \$2,500 in cash is up for grabs. The breakdown would be \$1,425 to the large technology, \$712 to the small technology and the balance (\$363) to the individual student who sells the most tickets. Sales are on a technology per capita basis.

Of course, if higher sales are achieved then the cash prizes will be higher. Ten percent of the total student sales is available in prizes from NAITSA.

In addition, prizes are available for the individual student who sells the most tickets in a two week period. A

random draw every two weeks will also take place for those who have returned their cash and stubs from completely sold books. The sooner you sell and return the money and stubs the better chance you have of winning a prizes. Prizes include Oiler tickets and various gift certificates. Remember, the more you sell the more you can win! NAITSA welcomes you to come down and visit their office to pick up your book of tickets. A YEAR LATER...

December 6, 1989 was the day that Marc Lepine walked into the University of Montreal engineering building. For 20 minutes he terrorized students and staff before turning his weapon on himself. The massacre, the worst in Canadian history, ended with 14 women dead and 13 others injured. The insanity and senselessness of the killings, prompted an outpouring of grief, sorrow, and rage.

It's a year later, and the echoes of that semi-

automatic rifle can still be heard through the hallways of the building, the blood still stains many walls and floors even though everything has been wiped several times. For those who lost their wife, their daughter, or their friends, they continue to live with the loss and continue to ask why.

December 6, 1990 will be a time to remember the pain and the loss that is experienced by those most affected by the tragedy. For the rest of us, it will be a time to reflect, to

express once again our grief and rage. For society's part, it will be a time to review our morals and to change those that led to this brutality. We should also hope that the progression of change will continue into the future generations.

On December 6, please take a moment of silence to remember those that died and those that survived. Special memorials will be set up in main campus and engineering building.

Update On Pool Fatality

The official statement released by Sandy Wright, Director of Marketing and Public Affairs for NAIT regarding the accidental death of Chadi Masri is as follows:

"As of November 28, 1990 - 17:00 (5:00 pm) NAIT is continuing it's investigation into this fatality. A review of all relevant policies and procedures is also underway. NAIT will not release any further statement until the investigation is concluded. NAIT will support and cooperate fully with the Medical Examiner's office should a fatality inquiry

be called."

When questioned, the police confirmed that their investigation is completed at this time and that any further action is up to the M.E.'s office.

Linda, a spokesperson for the M.E.'s office, said that the file on Chadi Masri is not complete at present, but she sees no reason why it should not be completed by December 20, 1990. On the 20th and 21st of December the Fatality Inquiry Review Board, will meet and decide whether or not a fatality inquiry is necessary.

Silent Victories at NAIT

Deaf or hard of hearing people have two major obstacles to overcome in their lives, these are in addition to the normal obstacles faced by anyone.

First, there is the problem of a limited vocabulary. At three years of age, the average child has a vocabulary of approximately 30,000 words and will pickup 30 to 35 words a day (every day), most of them unconsciously. In comparison, a deaf child will have a vocabulary of just a few thousand words, and will pickup only those words and meanings directly communicated to him/her in a form he/she can understand (eg. A.S.L., lip reading, etc.).

This means that a person with a hearing disability has to make a much greater effort to succeed in society. The only difficulty that hard of hearing/deaf people have in understanding

the course material, at NAIT is the speed with which it is presented. This difficulty arises, not because they are unintelligent, but because the course material is designed to be presented to hearing students.

Some individuals with a hearing disability may have to take a two-year course in three years, but again not all of them will have to do this. Some students, even with the communication obstacle, can complete their courses on time. Many hearing students fail part of their courses and must take an extra semester or more to finish. What's the difference? A hearing disability in no way denigrates that person's ability to understand concepts that are explained to them. It also does not lower their intelligence.

In researching this article, I interviewed three deaf students here at NAIT. The first was a

female student named Elke Kraemer, in the Dental Lab Technology. Elke is a very personable, warm, intelligent and very sociable young woman. When she first came to NAIT she felt awkward, scared and out of place. But that soon changed with the help of the people at the Services to Disabled Students unit here at our school. Now she feels much more independent and more her own person because she, with the help of the A.S.L. interpreters, is able to learn on her own without having to attend a "special" school. She would also like to thank the people at the S.D.S unit for "waking her up" to the possibilities that exist for her in the world.

The second student was Jonathan Cota, a 19 year old in Chemical Technology. Jonathan uses an "F.M." system, which consists of a receiver worn by him and a microphone worn by his instructor. This

device allows the instructor's voice to be carried to Jonathan, in that very limited frequency range he can hear somewhat in. The system, along with speech-reading allows him to understand what his instructors are saying.

One of the interesting things about Jonathan, is that he is what is called an "oral" deaf person. That is to say that he can speak almost as clearly, (most of the time) as a hearing person. Even though deaf from birth, he is able to express almost anything without a great deal of visible effort. The effort came in the form of the many long and hard hours of training and speech therapy. But this ability like that of some one with perfect pitch is not universal, you either have it or you don't; and most deaf people don't have it.

My final interview was with Dean Saunders, a 28 year old alumni of the Electronic Engineering Technology. He is presently doing a post-graduate course in Bio-Medical Equipment Technology. Dean is another student who experienced some difficulties in communication, as did some of the other deaf students at NAIT. But when he got out in the

work force he proved himself flexible and adaptable by designing a electronic system check to replace the audio check that he could not make. Now he is back at NAIT further developing his electronics skills. Dean, along with Jonathan and Elke, is a very motivated and independent person.

All of the students I interviewed further re-enforced the fact that while they have some similarities to each other, most notably that they are deaf, they are still individual people. As individuals, each one has their own goals and dreams.

This brings up the second major obstacle faced by deaf/hard of hearing people and that is hearing people's general perception of them. Their perception is that the hard of hearing/deaf person is a disabled person. When in fact they are a person with a disability. Too often we tend to just see the disability and not the person. This kind of attitude is harming both those people who are hard of hearing/deaf and those who are not. If we refuse to look past the disability and see the person beyond, then are we not the ones who are truly disabled?

Ooks Close First Half on Winning Note

The NAIT Ooks (8-3-1) completed the first half of the regular season with a pair of wins over the Grande Prairie Regional College Nordic Wolves at the NAIT Arena (0-13-0) to remain three points behind the league leading Red Deer College Kings (10-3-0).

Speciality teams accounted for six of the seven Ooks goals in a 7-1 victory over the Nordic Wolves on Saturday, December 1st.

In the first, Greg Geldart notched his fourth of the season on the powerplay to give the Ooks a 1-0 advantage with 1:44 gone in the frame. The

NAIT powerplay clicked again at 8:16 as Ian McAmmond pocketed his fifth of the season.

In the second, Todd Kinniburgh netted his fourth of the campaign at the 3:20 mark. One minute and 50 seconds later, NAIT penalty killer Greg Geldart widened the advantage to 4-0. Ian McAmmond closed out the period's scoring at 15:13 to give the Ooks a 5-0 advantage heading into the second intermission.

In the third, Daryll Doerksen of Grande Prairie ended NAIT's shutout hopes at 9:55. The Ooks rebounded with a pair of goals as Randy Wong picked up his seventh of the season, a powerplay marker at 11:41, and Doug Wadlow tallied his first of the year, a shorthanded effort at 19:26.

Travis Benn blocked 54 of 61 shots in the Grande Prairie crease. At the opposite end, the

NAIT duo of Rob McKinley and Chuck Edwards stopped 8 of 9 drives.

The Ooks then silenced the Wolves 19-1 on Sunday, December 2nd.

Scott Melnyk spurred the Ooks with four goals. Kevin Lovig completed the hat trick while Todd Kinniburgh and Mark Hilton tallied twice. Jeff Wildeboer, Dean Beattie, Darren Perkins, Doug Wadlow, Ian McAmmond, Bob Duchak, Greg Geldart and Randy Wong rounded out the NAIT attack.

Mark Harris answered with the lone Wolf goal.

Outshooting Grande Prairie 95 to 11, the Ooks held period leads of 10-0 and 14-0. Chuck Edwards and Alec Sheflo shared the NAIT netminding duties.

The Ooks will be one of the teams in Lethbridge for the Alberta University Cup

from Friday, December 28th through Sunday, December 30th. The Ooks will battle for provincial bragging rights along with the University of Alberta Golden Bears, the University of Calgary Dinosaurs, and the University of Lethbridge Pronghorns.

Following the excursion to Lethbridge, the Ooks will travel east to meet the University of Brandon Bobcats on January 4th and 5th. The Ooks will also play the University of North Dakota State Bottineau on January 6th.

With the first half complete, NAIT coach Rick Carriere is confident his team can build on its experiences. *"I'm quite pleased as everybody has contributed in the first half. The key will be to play with consistency and intensity in the scheduled exhibition contests. We have to*

tighten up defensively in these games in preparation for the second half and subsequent playoffs."

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks resume regular season action on Friday, January 11th, and on Saturday, January 12th when they entertain the SAIT Trojans at the NAIT Arena. Game time is 7:30 p.m. on Saturday and 1:30 p.m. on Sunday. Admission is free with your NAIT Student/Staff I.D. card.

Basketball Ooks on a Roll-Remain Undefeated

The NAIT Men's Basketball team improved their league record to 5 and 0 with an 87-71 victory over the Lethbridge Community College Kodiaks last Saturday afternoon. In doing so, two all time school records were set. Chuck Royer hit for 7 three point baskets and the team made 12 three pointers in the game, shooting 80% from three point land. The strong perimeter shooting early in the game forced Lethbridge into changing from a zone into a man to man defense. However, despite shooting the ball extremely well, the Ooks found themselves down 45-43 at half time with key players in foul trouble. The team played much better in the second half outscoring the Kodiaks 44-26 with some great pressure zone defense. NAIT Ooks assistant coach Darren Aughtry believes that "defensive intensity has become a trademark for the Ooks this season...something the team will have to keep up to become ACAC Champions."

Chuck Royer finished

the game with a season high 27 points to lead the Ooks. Rob Hansuk added 16 points mostly from long range and Norm Barthel had 14 points. The Ooks have one league game left in Red Deer this Friday against the Red Deer College Kings. R.D.C.'s gym is widely recognized as one of the toughest gyms in the ACAC. After final exams the Ooks will host the 7th Blue-Gold Basketball classic in the NAIT gymnasium December 21-23. The team travels to Vancouver to play in a tournament at Douglas College December 28-30. NAIT Ooks Men's Basketball team wish all their fans a Merry Christmas.

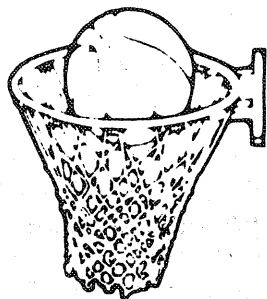

Posing their draw weight they struggled in losing to Grant MacEwan 8-6 and Lakeland 5-4. They rebounded to beat Keyano College 10-1.

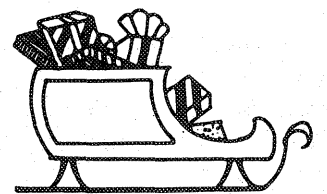
Mini tournament II is scheduled for Grande Prairie February 7, 8, and 9. The Provincial will be hosted by Grant MacEwan March 2 & 3.

Well, Shaw did their utmost to keep the survey from getting off

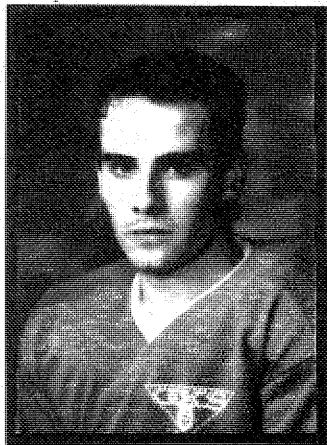
the ground by not informing their subscribers. A sheet at Shaw asking for comments showed that subscribers preferred TNN by a wide margin.
