The NAIT President's Committee on Harassment has concluded its investigation into an invasion of privacy complaint concerning a recent incident in the ladies' locker room on main campus. After hearing evidence presented by the complainants and respondents, Committee members unanimously agreed that the allegations had not been proved conclusively and the matter is now closed. The complaints were submitted to the Institute by an individual student on the NAIT Ladies' Basketball team on January 23, and by the entire team on January 24, 1990. The complaints arose from an incident that allegedly took place on January 12, 1990. In concluding the matter, Mr. Seeth Seethram, Vice President of Student and Staff Affairs and Chairman of the Committee, stated that "No evidence was submitted during the course of the investigation that proved conclusively that the accused were guilty of the charges." He went on to say that the testimony contained conflicting evidence such that it was not possible to form any sound basis of fact on which to judge the matter. The Committee, composed of two women and three men from the Institute, heard evidence from six witnesses during the course of the investigation. Both the complainants and the respondents agreed that the investigation was well conducted, and accepted the findings on the Committee.

On February 7, 1990, 1250 people converged on the Edmonton Convention Centre to take part in NAIT's 15th Annual Business Conference, 850 of which were students from six technologies: Accounting, Finance, Computer Systems, Marketing, Management, and Secretarial and Office Administration.

The morning started out with registration and a continental breakfast from 7:15 a.m. to 8:30 a.m., then onto the morning agenda, which was comprised of two 1 hour 15 minute sessions. Back in December, students picked which morning sessions they wanted to attend from the forty different speakers.

The guest speakers came from a variety of companies such as Henry Singer's & Blu's, IBM Canada, Edmonton Police Services, Alberta Tourism Education Council, Proctor & Gamble and Stanely Associates Engineering Ltd. Some of the guest speakers were past NAIT graduates who came back to share their knowledge with us.

Lunch was at 11:30 a.m. and after all the students, guests speakers, instructors, and guests were seated the head table was piped in by Mary Thurber, an Instructor in Computer Systems Technology. At the head table sat Michelle Kohut, President of Secretarial Society for Secretarial and Office Administration; Bill Freund, Computer Systems Society; Shelley Vetsch, President of Business Administration Society; Ken Pilip, NAIT Board of Governors; Hon. Norm Weiss, Alberta Minister for Career Development and Employment; Dr. Stan Souch, President of NAIT; Bonnie Herron, Conference Chairperson; Gordon Hayward, Conference Committee Member; Stephen Lewis, Keynote Speaker; Sharon Kashuba, Dean of Business and Health Sciences; Ron Hodgson, Chairman NAIT Foundation; and Garry Meadus, Chief Executive Officer of the NAIT Foundation.

was on Stephen Lewis, former Ambassador of Canada to the United Nations. Lewis spoke from 12:15 p.m. to 1:15 p.m. and left the crowd in a state of mesmerism. His speech covered four major areas: equality of the sexes, the European Economic Community, the environment, and his fourth world starvation scenario. His views were provocative, knowledgeable, and sometimes depressing. He addressed major political happenings since the turn of the decade and referred to the 80's as the "lost decade." Mr. Lewis seemed to thrive on the title of the Business Conference - New Decade - New Challenges, as he would constantly refer to it while challenging students not to become the lost generation by letting the 90's become another lost decade.

Another strong point brought up by Lewis that is not common knowledge to most Canadians is the fact that Canada is the only bilingual country in the world and that we are held in high global regard for this. The speech was well received by everyone even though some of Mr. Lewis's prose were above the average vocabulary of most of those in attendance.

After a gourmet lunch and a powerful speech from Mr. Lewis, it was off to the afternoon session. Each technology had its own afternoon session. These ranged from Your Money: How to Make the Most of It, by Don Popowich of Nesbitt Thomson Deacon Inc. to Marketing Edmonton To the World by Mr. Rick Antonson of Edmonton Convention and Tourism Authority.

Immediately following the afternoon session was a social, giving students, instructors and guests a chance to mingle and discuss the day's events.

In conversation with Bonnie Herron, she said, "Students, Staff and invited guests were enthusiastic participants in this year's conference." Herron also said that she has received positive feedback as to the conference being an "enjoyable day," "informative and interesting," as well as very positive feedback about Stephen Lewis and his speech.

1990 Student Summer Job Fair

Okay. Alright, I've had enough! I'm really tired of this already, and now I'm mad. In fact, I'm real mad (as distinguished from crazy). I was going to write a nice, calm, unemotional article explaining to the students of NAIT why they should be aggressively seeking full-time or summer employment. It would have been somewhat elegant, perhaps even a bit unassuming, yet instructional and thought provoking, rather than the effusive tirade which shall descend upon you now.

At this point, some of you reading this are probably thinking "Good God, this guy is a little unbalanced. It must be true what they say about increased solar activity and irrational behavior."

Alas, this is not the case (though apparently the relationship between solar activity and erratic behavior does exist). What brought this snit on was the phone call we had this past Friday from an employer who received only a few applications on his current posing. He went on to indicate quite clearly that if

THIS was the response of NAIT students, he would begin to post at SAIT. Now you may say 'Well so what? It's only once cranky employer!'. Let me explain further. It has a very good reputation. Up to this point it has recruited almost exclusively from NAIT, primarily in the Business and Engineering programs.

One complaint a day like this is fairly easy to absorb. I typically turn my chair to the east and break into my mantra for half an hour, or failing that, it's a trip down to the Nest for a few hits. But that day I had not one, but two calls in the same vein. THAT is what brought me to this state, and I have only one warning, a dire warning at that; do not, and I'll repeat DO NOT come into the Placement Centre in May and complain about the lack of jobs. For yours will be a sorry and untimely demise.

So what should you be doing now if you haven't started already? Well, besides praying, get your resume together or updated. The LRC has an excellent section of resource books on resumes, job search and interview skills. A good basic

study on all three areas can be found in the 'Job Seekers Handbook' which is available at the Placement Centre.

Use a balanced job search approach. This involves three major points of concentration: newspaper advertisements, placement agencies and the hidden job market. If your entire job search is to wait for the Saturday Journal to read the Career section, it will be you and the rest of mankind applying on the meager offerings. In the grand scheme of things, the newspaper only accounts for the 15% of the jobs available out there. Thus, it is a must that you continually follow the postings in your area at NAIT and through the Career Section of the Nugget. And foremost, if you do anything right in your current life, learn and understand how to use the hidden job market.

If this all seems tough now, you should see how it looks six months after graduation when the rejection letters keep flowing in like a cold front from the Arctic. There is a study which shows that students who bring their job search well before graduation typically find jobs that are related to their

training and pay more than those who begin their job search upon graduation. This trend becomes even more amplified when graduates wait for several months after finishing school to begin looking for employment. It's not a pretty picture.

Rather than drowning you with more information, I will finish with some quick pointers:

-get a copy of your transcripts now. It can take 5 to 10 days for the Registrar's Office to process a request. In that time you may have missed an opportunity.

-read the application instructions on job postings carefully. Each week we sent about five resumes back to students who have applied incorrectly. This can result in a missed opportunity.

-use the services of the Placement Centre. We can provide information and help on resumes, interviews, and job search techniques

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Health Tips

Wax In Ears

It is not advisable to use cotton tipped applicators or other objects to clean your ear canals.

A small amount of earwax is beneficial in order to protect the canals from dirt, insects and microscopic germs. The glands that produce the ear wax are closer to the outer half of the canal and are constantly working outwards to clear wax and other debris. Using cotton wool tips can compact the wax on the eardrum and cause inflammation and 'muffled' hearing. Olive oil drops instilled in your ears will help soften wax, make it flake and fall out.

Blood Pressure

Have your blood pressure checked each year, especially if there is a history of elevated blood pressure, heart attack or stroke in the family. Any blood pressure increase can be detected at an early stage, and can often be corrected

with a change in diet, reducing salt intake, regular exercise and losing weight if necessary. The staff in Health Services will check your blood pressure. Come in any time; an appointment is not necessary.

Cholesterol

It is recommended that all adults have their cholesterol checked periodically. This is a blood test and is ordered by your doctor. Cholesterol is a fatlike substance; too much in the body can be harmful but a certain amount is necessary for cell structure. Excess cholesterol is deposited in the walls of the blood vessels and can lead to a blockage.

How you can reduce your blood cholesterol:

1. Lower your intake of animal fats and dairy products (Lean meat and skim milk is fine)
2. Eat more fruits, vegetables & grain products
3. Exercise and lower or control your weight.

Got Those Winter Blues?

Many people feeling "down in the dumps" during the reduced daylight hours this time of year may be suffering from a newly described ailment-Seasonal Affective Disorder, or SAD. It is characterized by excessive sluggishness during the daytime, long but restless hours of sleep at night, irritability, depression, and loss of interest and sex.

SAD is distinguished from true clinical depression by two remarkable differences: a craving for carbohydrates (because of a tendency to "fatten up" during the winter) and a reversal of the depression symptoms after exposure to artificial-light therapy or with the return of the longer daytime hours of spring. IN fact, SAD is not unlike the response of many northern mammals to winter: hibernation. The importance of these findings is that SAD sufferers can be treated effectively and quickly with supplementary light.

How can one supplement the dosage of winter light? You can increase outdoor activity during the daytime, travel to sunnier climates

A joint project between our Photographic Technology program and the Provincial Archives of Alberta has resulted in the formation of a major exhibition depicting various historic neighborhoods of Edmonton. The exhibition, at the Provincial Museum of Alberta, began last week and will be held until March 30.

Four areas were chosen for the students' subject matter - Chinatown, Little Italy, the Fort Road, and 118th Avenue - all with an emphasis on buildings, residents, and businesses. A cross-section of the total photographs taken is featured in the Museum.

The remaining images were deposited with the Provincial Archives and may be viewed there. The whole collection, says Brock Silversides, Senior Archivist,

is "an interesting and valuable documentary view of the city as seen through the eyes of Edmonton's up-and-coming photographers."

Says Program Head Fred Solylo, "The project was an excellent training exercise, because the students had to capture images that would characterize each area. It was gratifying that even though the assignment was not mandatory, we still got nearly 100 per cent participation."

The joint project is a "first" for NAIT and the Archives, but in light of its success there is talk already for a similar project for next year, emphasizing other parts of the city that need documenting.

The current exhibition is one more good reason - particularly for NAIT staff - to visit the Provincial Museum of Alberta!

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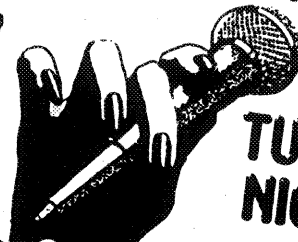
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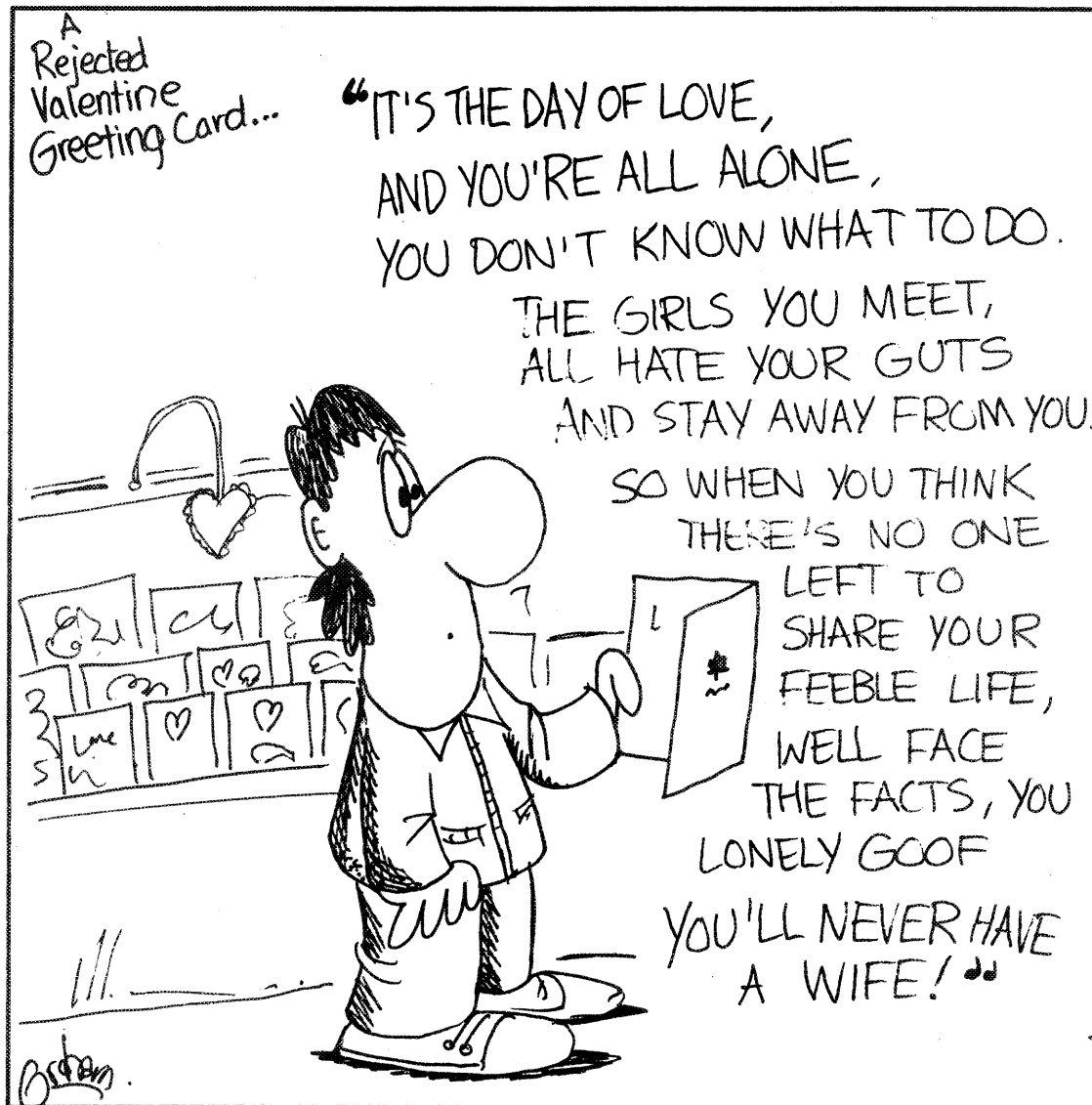

The NAIT Hockey Ooks almost fell from the undefeated ranks this past weekend when they met the SAIT Trojans in a two game series down in Calgary, but Todd Lorenz saved the day.

Lorenz scored his third of the game with less than a second left on the clock as the Ooks nipped the SAIT Trojans 6-5 at the SAIT Arena on Friday, February 9th.

The Ooks had their hands full with the SAIT Trojans, who have been the Ooks nemesis so far this season. However, the specialty teams kept the Ooks in the game with two shorthanded and three powerplay goals.

In the first, the Trojans jumped out to a 1-0 advantage on Jeff Turner's goal at 7:44. The Ooks tied the contest on the powerplay at the 10:52 mark when Todd Lorenz capitalized on a Randy Wong feed. The Ooks then forged ahead on Ivan Krook's shorthanded tally at 12:09. The NAIT powerplay clicked again at 13:38 when Todd Lorenz tallied. The Trojans pulled to within one as Carey Coroy scored with

the man advantage at 16:19. Ted Bradshaw found the top corner to give NAIT a 4-2 lead at 17:54 on the powerplay.

In the second, the Trojans evened the score at 4-4 with goals from Jeff Turner and Mark Woolgar at 15:40 and 15:47 respectively.

In the third, the Trojans took a 5-4 lead on Todd Oliphant's tally at 4:22. Ivan Krook placed the Ooks on even terms at 7:22.

A shrewd coaching move by NAIT's Perry Pearn set the stage for the game winning goal by Lorenz. With a face off in the SAIT zone and only four seconds left on the clock, Pearn elected to pull the goaltender and send out a sixth skater. The move paid off as Greg Geldart won the draw back to Randy Wong. Wong fed Lorenz who flicked the biscuit in the net just before the period ended.

Rob McKinley of the Ooks stopped 20 of 25 shots, while Ian MacLeod of the Trojans blocked 39 of 45 drives.

The Ooks completed a series sweep with a 6-2 triumph over the Trojans on Saturday, February 10th in Calgary.

In the first, Todd Oliphant of SAIT gave the Trojans a 1-0 lead at 6:21. The Ooks then bounced back as Mark Thiessen found the mark at 14:12. The Ooks then went ahead as Greg Geldart completed a crisp passing play with Marty Volcan and Clark Polglase at 14:28. Marty Volcan lifted the Ooks into a 3-1 lead when he scored from the slot at 17:41.

In the second, Ted Bradshaw notched the Ooks fourth goal at 2:58. The Ooks gained a 5-1 lead on Murray Bokenfohr's tally at 4:14.

In the third, Alex Bouma netted the biscuit from close in to give the Ooks a five goal margin. Jeff Turner of SAIT rounded out the scoring at 18:05.

NAIT's Derek Shybunka turned away 12 of 14 shots, while SAIT's Ian MacLeod redirected 42 of 48 drives.

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks, now 19-0-1, play their final home games of the regular season against the Red Deer College Kings on Saturday, February 17th, and the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings on Tuesday, February 20th. Both games start at 7:30 in the NAIT Arena.

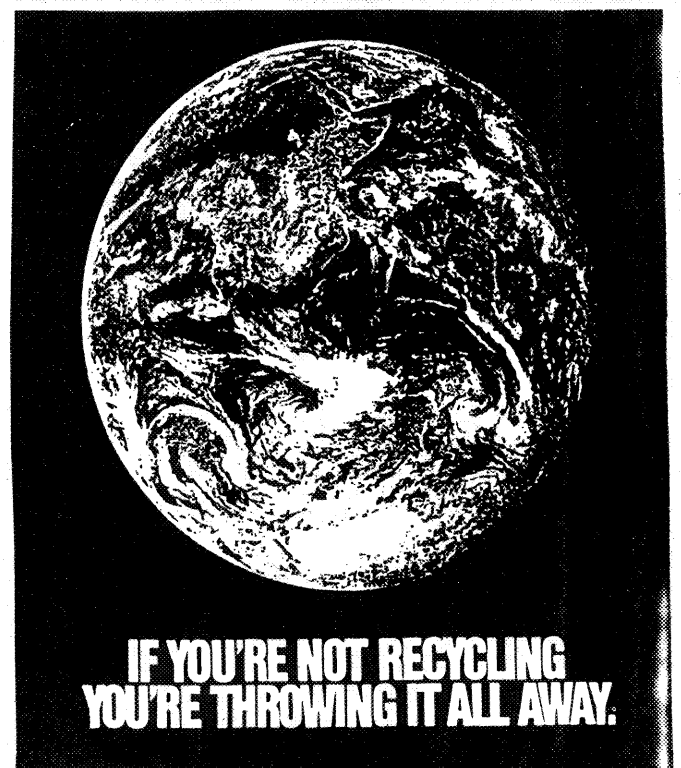

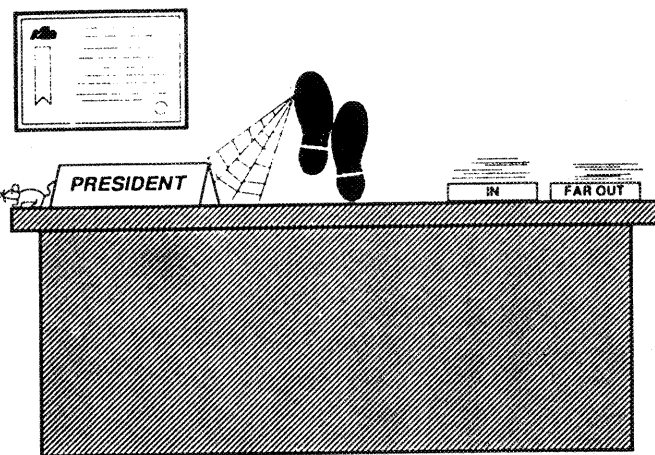

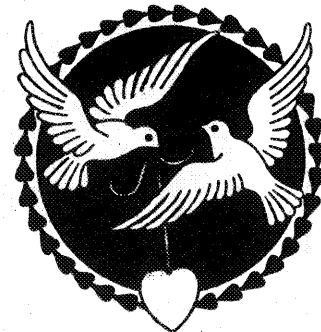
How do I WANT thee? Let me count the ways


