

JANUARY GRADUATION A SUCCESS

On Saturday, January 13, NAIT held its first ever Winter Graduation in the North Cafeteria. Ninety-nine students officially became graduands at the ceremonies which lasted about an hour and a half.

Catherine Wyatt, Chairperson of the Board of Governors, was the first speaker of the afternoon. She delivered the following greeting from the Board: "We wish you every success in your chosen career fields."

Stan Souch, President of NAIT, then spoke of NAIT's history and progress through the 1980's. He passed on his belief that NAIT students are "thoughtful, creative and courageous" before turning the microphone over to guest speaker Alex Mair. Mr. Mair, who worked at NAIT for five years in the Radio and Television Arts program before moving to the Public Affairs department, retired in 1981 to become a freelance broadcaster. He quickly displayed his sharp wit by replying to Dr. Souch's introduction as a "provincial treasure" with the statement "After an introduction like that, I can't wait to hear what I have to say." Mr. Mair's speech focused on the breakdown in communication in our society that has occurred over the last few years. He said the graduands must reintroduce communication by being "the bridge between the thinkers who don't work, and the worker's who don't think." Finally, Mr. Mair expressed his confidence in the students by saying "You took in the time, you made the effort, and you have the talent."


At the conclusion of Mr. Mair's speech, graduand Donna Durnford presented him with a NAIT care package which included a coffee mug, neck tie, desk calendar, and flag, all bearing the NAIT logo.

After the formal ceremonies, there was nothing but praise for the graduation ceremonies. Catherine Wyatt said it was a "wonderful ceremony" and she was looking forward to the next one. Dr. Souch commented that it was a

"good pilot to see if we should have a spring and fall graduation every year. It's clear that it's very popular." Wally Romanko, the man responsible for all the organizing "was very pleased," partly because more people than expected showed up. Mr. Mair was also enthusiastic, saying the graduation would draw public attention to the graduands and increase their employment opportunities. He also added "They deserve


to be recognized."

Although the NAIT bookstore has resumed its normal functions after the recent flood, full repairs will probably not be made for several more months. The flood, which occurred when a water pipe along an exterior

wall froze and burst, damaged many ceiling and floor tiles. According to Bob Kerr of Facilities Management, replacing the tiles would involve moving several of the bookcases. To avoid the inconvenience of moving the cases to the bookstore staff, NAIT is looking at delaying repairs until May. Mr. Kerr said

there would be no problems for the staff despite the damaged tiles, and May would be the most convenient time for them.

It is not known yet how much it will cost to repair the damage, or how much of the inventory was damaged. However, much of the damaged stock was sold to students at discount prices.

A exhibition of the NAIT Photographic Technology students' work will be displayed at the Provincial Archives from January 22 to March 30. This joint photographic project was set up between the Provincial Archives and the NAIT Photographic Technology several months ago. The Archives provided the photo students with film and photographic paper, and asked the students to photograph four "historic neighborhoods" in Edmonton during the month of November. The areas chosen by the Archives were Chinatown, Little Italy, Fort Road, and 118 Avenue. At the end of the project, students turned over all photographs and negatives to the Archives. In return, the students received files in the Archives under their own

names. That means that on future resumes, the students can claim the file and exhibition as part of their previous experience.

According to Brock Silversides, of the Archives, "This will be an interesting and valuable documentary view of the city as seen through the eyes of Edmonton's up and coming photographers." The students are also looking forward to the exhibition. According to Helen Woodstra, a second year student, "It gives the students exposure, especially since the Archives staff are doing a lot of work promoting it."

GOODBYE TO A LEGEND

By the time you read this, the VIA Rail "Canadian" will probably have completed its historic last trip across Canada. Like many others, I'm sad to see the death of most of Canada's rail travel, and I'm sorry that one of Canada's most important traditions is no more.

Of course, VIA's "demise" is not a surprise to most people. The quality of service had dropped substantially from the railway's heyday, followed quickly by its ridership (8 million riders in 1980 compared to just 6.4 million in 1988). As cars and airplanes became more common and business trips more rushed, the train found itself competing with forces greater than itself.

There were advantages to the train of course. It gave a relaxing ride that was, in many ways, more enjoyable than cars or buses, with scenery that put airlines to shame. More than a way of getting from here to there, the train represented something special, almost romantic. After all, it was the railway that convinced British Columbia to join Confederation, thereby making Canada a truly "trans-continental" country. The route of today's trains, almost unchanged since 1886, provided voyagers with breathtaking mountain scenes and wide open plains. To many, Canada's only rival was the world-famous Orient Express.

The train was also a social symbol. While cars were used for "family" trips and planes for quick jaunts to another city, the train made the trip an experience on its own. People met, talked and became friends during the days of travel together. The images of steam engines in TV shows and movies of old seem to have an attraction for all. Perhaps the best known such scene may be of David Niven playing the true English gentleman Phileas Fogg in "Around the World in Eighty Days." There's something magical about the flair and personality of the train, even in today's society.

Of course, the cuts to VIA rail have drawn strong and sustained opposition, even involving court challenges based on the Constitution. While many people blame Prime Minister Brian Mulroney and Transport Minister Benoit Bouchard for the cuts, they are not entirely responsible. VIA's constant loss of money is not surprising as no national railway in the world covers all its own costs (Amtrak president W. Graham Clayton thinks his company may do it by the year 2000). The decline in ridership started years before Mulroney was even chosen leader of the Conservatives and the on-train service, which many considered a major reason for the loss of riders, can not have degenerated as it has overnight.


I received a second-hand look at Canada's rail service recently when my younger brother took the train from Toronto to Calgary for his Christmas vacation. I heard of delays at almost every stop. There were stories of employees refusing or not being able to tell passengers if there was time for them to leave the train to get a meal when delays occurred. There was the evening when 3 waiters went without sleep to serve dinners to five times as many people as the dining car was built for. There were the stewards who showed the passengers how to read the steam gauge in the cars to save time.

My brother's train finally came in 13 hours late, then continued on to Vancouver to arrive well over 24 hours late.

This absurd example of unreliability is unfortunately not an isolated case. I have heard of similar problems for other travelers, along with much apathy and down-right rudeness from some VIA workers. Under the circumstances, it's not a surprise to see much of VIA's service cut.

However, real buffs need not despair for long. Rail travel will make a comeback in this country. Likely, it will be a private enterprise that brings the old "Canadian" back. It won't happen quickly, but with a great tourist market, good promotion, strong service, and a beautiful country to work in, all the ingredients are there for a successful future.



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
Mr. Computer Systems Jasen Holoboff

I am currently a student in Computer Systems Technology and one day I hope to graduate.



As Mr. NAIT, I hope to reflect an attitude of caring, competition, and good natured fun that is a part of all students attending NAIT.




Mr. Animal Health Joe Acker




Miss Secretarial and Office Administration Katherine Kalmbach

I hope you find yourself participating in Queen week activities this year, and come out and vote Friday! Hope to see you out at all the events.




Miss Instrumentation Karrie Filisher




NAIT's Perry Pearn On Top of the World

Last week, Stu Hart, the founder and promoter of Stampede Wrestling, announced that, at 74, he was going to call it quits. The wrestling fan will be the big loser.

For over 30 years, Stu Hart brought the biggest names in the wrestling world to Western Canada. Harley Race, Dory Funk, and Nick Bockwinkel were just a few of the stars who made stops in the territory when they held the NWA World Title.

Stampede Wrestling was a fixture in homes across Canada and around the world for parts of four decades. In past years, CFRN discovered that if you didn't want to alienate viewers and lose advertising dollars you didn't pre-empt soap operas and Stampede Wrestling.

The success of Stampede Wrestling on television can, in large part, be attributed to the show's host, Ed Whalen. Over the years, the former news director of CFAC has become a legend for his spontaneity--like when he was attacked by Abdullah the Butcher and opened up the wrestler for 17 stitches with his microphone.

A number of wrestlers who developed into champions got their start in the business under Stu. Tiny and Al "Murder" Mills came from the Camrose area and went on to become world tag team champions in the 1950's. One of Stu's 12 kids, Bret Hart, became one half of a tag team which were world champions in the 1980's.

Without Stampede Wrestling, Saturday afternoons will never be the same.

Have you ever wondered how it feels to be Jacques Cousteau? If so, the opportunity to find out is right here at NAIT.


The NAIT Scuba Club, one of the most widely recognized in North America, has classes to teach scuba diving on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings. According to Joyce Townsend, NAIT pool supervisor and the person responsible for starting the program eight years ago, a person must attend one class a week for six weeks to be eligible for the exams to become a certified

a club membership for already trained divers is \$15. At the end of the six week course, students must pass a written exam, followed by an open-water exam to receive their "sea-card."

The sea-card is recognized by PADI (Professional Association of Diving Instructors) and allows the diver access to equipment anywhere in the world. In fact, the NAIT club is known as far away as Hawaii and Australia. With 7000 divers passing through the class since 1981, at least six of which went on to become commercial divers, it isn't surprising. In fact, Ms. Townsend has been told of NAIT club members joining clubs in Vancouver and Houston and then ending up helping with the teaching there because their training was so thorough.

According to Ms. Townsend, the NAIT classes are so good partly because they emphasize rescue and self-rescue techniques. According to Ms. Townsend: "It's a sport, but it's a dangerous sport if you're not careful." To add to the safety, all people wishing to join must pass a medical examination.






In what was billed as a battle for California bragging rights, the mighty San Francisco 49ers definitely


