During the month of September 1990, twenty parking permits were reported stolen (from vehicles) or lost. This has caused a tremendous problem because students, from this school, have been caught illegally selling these permits.

The parking permits that NAIT issues to it's students are nontransferrable. That means, once you buy a permit you cannot sell it. However, you can use your permit when traveling with a friend in his/her vehicle.

In four out of the twenty instances that occurred in September students were caught selling permits to others. Beware, these permits are being sold at discounted prices (approximately half of the retail value), so don't get sucked in by anybody offering you a great deal. Should you be in a situation where you find a parking permit you can return it to the Parking Office (Room 0112).

People who are using these illegal parking permits and who are caught will ultimately not be able to find their vehicle when they wish to leave, as these vehicles will be tagged and towed at their expense. Not only will they be out the money for the tagging and towing of their vehicle but, they will also be out the money that they paid for the illegal permit.

Should you be the unfortunate person who loses her/his permit you can go to the Parking Office and sign an affidavit or a declaration saying that your permit has been stolen or lost and receive a new one. As of yet there are approximately eight outstanding permits that have yet to be turned in.

Consider yourself warned. There are parking permit pirates (if you will) wandering the hallowed halls of our school. Look out, 'cause the Parking Attendants are on to you!

Looking for a Challenge?

Do you want more for your education than just a diploma?

Why not think about joining the Army Reserves? The Army Reserves offers a Reserve Entry Scheme for Officers (RESO as it is called). This three year program offers part-time employment plus three months of summer training and is available to full-time time post-secondary students. So if you are looking for a physical and mental challenge in the following professions: Accounting, Armoured Vehicles, Chaplain, Electrical and Mechanical Engineering, Electronic Engineering, Gunnery (includes Surveying and Computer Operation), Infantry, Medical Administration, Military Intelligence, Military Police, Professional Engineering, Radio and Electronic Communications, Transportation and Warehouse Management RESO could be just what you're looking for.

To apply to the RESO program you

must be a Canadian Citizen or landed immigrant, physically and mentally fit. Physical training wouldn't start until May of 1991 so you would have 7 months to gear up to running 5 miles and doing 25-30 sit-ups and push-ups. Academic requirements are a high school Diploma with an average of no less than 75%, and enrollment in a post-secondary institution, in this case NAIT. The NAIT programs that are eligible for application into the RESO program are: Architectural Technology, Air Conditioning Engineering Technology, Civil Engineering Technology, Mechanical Engineering Technology, Computer Systems Technology, Electronics Engineering Technology, Electrical Engineering Technology, and Telecommunication Engineering Technology.

In speaking with Chad Szymanski, a second-year student in secondary education at the U of A; and Karen

Bell, a recent psychology graduate from the U of A they said if you can make it through the first year the rest is easy. The first year is physically demanding and this is where you are pushed to your physical and mental endurance limit.

Brian Denness says there is a stringent screening process that all applicants go through before they even reach basic training. From all the applications that they receive only 50% will pass through this screening process.

All positions are open to females. The physical requirements have been adjusted, but are still demanding. Over the past five years the Reserves has seen an increase in the number of females who have entered the program. The attitude towards women in the Reserves is also changing to a positive one. Two shortcomings are that not many women are above the rank of Major and not many stay in after they reach their 20's.

Two Reserve Officers who have been with the

Reserves for more than ten years stated that the knowledge and experiences learned are invaluable. You take whatever you learn in the Reserves with you and quite often it is applicable to civilian life.

So if you want something more challenging than your day job why not look into the Reserves.

Calgary is favored to

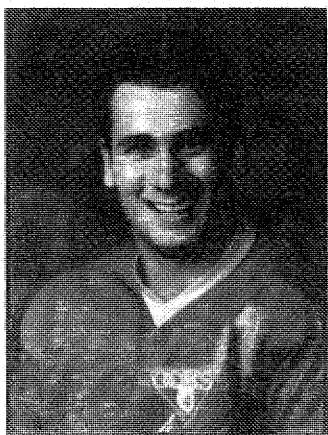
