



Free membership in the Alberta Society of Engineering Technologist, (ASET), is available to students enrolled in a number of engineering technologies or applied science programs at NAIT.

Membership gives students a variety of. valuable benefits, including an attractive automobile insurance program, regular chapter meetings, a job referral service and various ASET materials.

Once NAIT students graduate, they are well on their way to achieving their formal, professional credentials. In the meantime, as student members of ASET they are entitled to many of the regular benefits at no charge.

Graduates automatically upgraded Engineering Technician Technologist Training (E.T.T.) status when they leave NAIT, which is also free for the remainder of the graduating year. Once they accumulate two years of appropriate work technical experience they can apply for formal certification by ASET.



On Friday, November 9th, the NAIT Ooks deserved to win and scored a pair of powerplay goals en route to a 7-2 win over Red Deer.

In the first, the Ooks moved out in front on Lonnie Spink's fifth of the year at 8:08 and Ian McAmmond's second of the season at 11:48. The Kings pulled to within one on Corey Belitski's powerplay at 14:05. McAmmond's second of the period at 14:45 gave the Ooks a 3-1 lead heading into the second.

In the second, Scott Melnyk and Alex Bouma scored within nine seconds of each other -- at 4:07 and 4:16 respectively -- to give the Ooks a 5-1 advantage. Stu Jackson netted Red Deer's second powerplay goal of the game with 17:38 gone in the frame.

In the third, Corey Hastman closed out the night's scoring by padding NAIT's lead with markers at 4:37 and 10:07.

Rob McKinley played solid in the NAIT net blocking 18 of 20 shots. Marty Braithwaite was kept busy and stopped 39 of 46 in the Red Deer crease.

Saturday, On November 10th, the Red Deer College Kings were the better team on the ice and the result echoed that -- a 6-5 win for the Kings over NAIT in OT.

In the first, the Kings jumped out to a 1-0 lead on Corey Belitski's powerplay goal at 17:10.

In the second, the Kings widened the lead to 3-0 as Belitski added a second goal at 1:41 and Howie Finch tallied at 2:46. The Ooks then pulled to within one as Scott Melnyk and Todd Kinniburgh found the mark at 7:06 and 7:58 respectively. The Kings reinstated their two goal lead at 12:38 as Erin Ginnell turned on the red light.

In the third, Mark Hilton of NAIT shortened the Kings lead to 4-3 as he connected on the powerplay at 1:45. Daryl Mitchell then netted Red Deer's fifth goal at 6:16. The Ooks

then erased the lead on goals by Greg Geldart at 13:56 an d McAmmond at 18:05.

In overtime, the Kings won the game on Daryl Mitchell's tally at 4:35.

The Ooks outshot the Kings 42-30. Besse received the call in the RDC net while Alec Sheflo got the nod in the NAIT net.

The Ooks (5-2-1) and the Camrose Vikings (5-3-1) are one point behind the Red Deer College Kings (6-2) in the battle for first place. The Ooks now take on the Mount Royal College Cougars (4-2) in Calgary this weekend. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Saturday and 1:30 p.m. Sunday.







Outdoor Education Program In Time With The Environment



It has long been the goal of the NAIT Outdoor Education program to offer students a positive first experience with the outdoors and at the same time respect the environment while doing so. "Take out your garbage and someone else's" has been a motto of the program since its inception. Program Co-ordinater Gregg Meropoulis notes that "We continue to use the same campsite areas for our Wilderness Skills and Canoeing classes each year and that to treat the area with respect and keep it clean for next years classes is only good commonsense." While weekend courses in Wilderness Skills utilize a site South of Entwhistle and the canoeing program camps out on the side of Moose Creek all campsites are inspected by our instructors as they leave the area to ensure the area is "at least as clean" as when they arrived. While a small amount of evergreens are utilized to demonstrate signal fires and lean-to construction - the majority of the wood utilized is deadfall. Following this philosophy of environmental respect the program strives to educate students of their responsibilities toward preserving these outdoor areas for upcoming generations.

Norm Barthel goes up high against Todd Dalke of Grande Prairie.



The NAIT men's basketball team won it's first two league games last weekend defeating the Grande Prairie Regional College Wolves 73-61 (O.T.) on Friday and 84-44 on Saturday. NAIT pulled away to a 15 point lead with seven minutes to go only to see it evaporate as the Wolves played great defense and hit some big shots. Two points at the buzzer by Jeff Fitzpatrick of the Wolves sent the game into overtime. Leading the way for NAIT were Neil Vany (16 points) and Rob Hansuk (14 points).

In the words of Ooks head coach Dave Hoy, "You only play each team twice so every game is important." Game time is 8:15 p.m. Friday, November 16 in the NAIT gymnasium.







Smith Principle

This week's column: Historical Adversaries -Landlords and Tenants.

For years, intermittently, I've For worked in property management and no I'm not a glorified care-taker. The fact that originally I accidently into fell this management area, does not lessen importance of my position. For some years now, I have tried to repair the fence between these natural enemies. Landlords just want their money to cover the mortgages on the first of each month and tenants think the landlord is nothing more than a cheap money grubber.

Today, I'm involved with a 15 suite building with long-term tenants. low changeovers, and everyone has something to say about everything. Sure, there's still the odd horror story and the eviction notice and maybe, even a legal matter now and then, but on the whole my people are happy, comfortable and know my door is open all the time.

When I move anyone in they are told all of the important areas of

the Landlord and Tenant' Act and the Civil Law area I can use to get them out if necessary. This is not a scare tactic in any way. I have found over the years there are many myths surrounding what the tenant is actually entitled to and/or what the landlord can and cannot do.

With a vacancy rate now of around 1.5% do not be surprised at another rent raise in January for April 1, 91. It is even more important now for any tenant to know his or her rights when renting. The following list will give you a good idea of things I've noticed over the years that tenants don't do and should:

1. Ask for a condensed version of the landlord and tenant act, or phone them and have it mailed to you.

2. If under lease read it thoroughly and ask questions, do not accept an answer of this is the normal renting lease just sign it - make sure when you do sign it the mgr. signs at the same time.

3. The damage report should be done as soon as you move in and with the caretaker check the smoke detector, caulking in the

bathroom, taps for leaks, and all electrical outlets along with checking for cleanliness. 4. Question the times when the mgr. is on the premises and if there is someone there all the time-security method is there window and patio screw-in bolt locks from the inside

5. While examining the suite if you're interested in renting, find out the personality of the bldg. are there frequent parties - loud stereos etc. - find out before you decide on the suite what you may be up against.

6. The most important all paper flow (eg. eviction for breach, rent raise, 24 maintenance notice) everything must be in black and white - you can make a notice of objection to any paperwork you receive (dif. check this area

7. If you suspect a master key has been used without a 24 hr notice - complain in black and white with a copy to landlord and tenant.

Happy renting, and go after your interest on damage deposit.
