

Tragedy In The Pool

At approximately 12:10 p.m. on Monday, November 19th, a 16 year old boy named Chadi Masir was pulled from the NAIT swimming pool. Although the lifeguards immediately applied C.P.R and artificial respiration until the ambulance arrived, it was to no avail.

We at the Nugget, along with the entire staff and student body would like to convey our deepest sympathies and most heartfelt condolences to the family and friends of the deceased.

Chadi was last seen floating in an inner tube at the shallow end of the pool, while playing with his classmates. He was over at NAIT's pool on a P.E. class from St. Joseph's Composite High school, taking swimming lessons for the first time.

After the swim ended at approximately 11:10 a.m. the pool was cleared and two P.E. in structors, accompanying the classes, checked the pool and locker change room. At no time until 12:10 p.m., when discovered by a NAIT student swimming lengths, was anyone able to see

Chadi laying at the bottom of the pool. He was approximately 5'4" tall and was found in the pool at the 5' depth.

The medical examiners office later reported that drowning was the cause of death and there was no other medical condition that caused his death. Presently, the NAIT administration and the pool staff are investigating ways to prevent this kind of accident from ever happening again.

One important aspect of an accidental death that is often overlooked is the effect that it has on the people who were





in charge of the area where the death occurred. The pool staff of NAIT have had a superb safety record for the entire 17 years that the pool has been open, until this tragic incident. The safety standards maintained at our pool are much higher than those required by law.

Unfortunately, people can not helping feeling guilty, even though there was nothing they could do to prevent this accident. But this is just human nature and is no excuse for the student body to circulate wild rumors about the pool staff's negligence when

they don't even know the facts of the case. According to the police investigation, it was an accidental death and no blame has been assessed to the pool staff. What we at NAIT should be doing, is giving our support to the pool staff during this trying period, just as we would appreciate the same support if we were in their position.

As founder and president of Shaw Cable systems Ltd. (formerly Capital Cable TV Ltd.), Mr. Shaw managed the growth of the company from its beginnings in 1966 to its position now as Canada's fourth largest multi-system cable television operator.

Shaw Chairman of the Board of Mannville Oil and Gas Ltd., a Director of Melcor Developments Ltd., and Director and President of the Shaw Family Foundation. Mr. Shaw also served on the Board of Directors of Edmonton Northlands, the Canadian Cable Television Association and the Canadian S i m m e n t h a l Association. He is a past member of the Board of Trustees of Graceland College in Iowa.

Mr. Shaw serves as Campaign Chairman, Partners in Tomorrow, Northern Alberta Institute of Technology and is a member of the University of Alberta President's Council, the Edmonton Art Gallery President's Circle Club and the Rotary Club.

Construction Bulletin

In keeping with the Department's (Public Works - Construction Branch) objective of providing adequate water for fire protection and domestic purposes, it has been found necessary to replace the existing cast iron water main with 20 mm PVC on 103 Street - 117A Avenue - Princess Elizabeth Avenue. Road surface will be restored as soon as is practicable after construction.

This work will necessitate certain lane or road closures, parking restrictions and interruption of water service. We regret any inconvenience which the above work may cause. Work will commence on November 26, 1990. The estimated time to complete this work is approximately three weeks.

It may be necessary, on a temporary basis, for us to connect a hose to your house in order to provide you with a continuous supply of water. Please ensure that a water tap is left open enough to provide an adequate flow (about pencil size) which will prevent the water from freezing in the hose. There will be no additional charge for this.

For your protection, the work site is well marked and barricaded. Please ensure that your family members are aware of the construction activities and that children in particular stay clear of the open excavated area for their safety. Construction sites are dangerous. If you see any vandalism or children playing on our site, please call the Police at 423-4567.

Bob Duchak and Randy Wong capitalized on powerplay opportunities at 10:46 and 14:16 to give the Ooks a 3-0 The advantage. Cougars roared back with a pair before period's end as Corey Taylor netted a powerplay goal at 16:46 and Mark Greyeyes tallied at 19:57.

In the second, the tied the Cougars contest on Mark Holick's marker with one second left in the period.

In the third, the Ooks

pulled in front 5-3 on goals by Lonnie Spink at 4:22 and Kevin Lovig at 8:34. The Cougars then pulled even as Aaron Nosky and Trevor Pohl found the net at 12:40 and 15:33 respectively.

In overtime, Mark Greyeyes made no mistake on MRC's first opportunity of the extra frame at 4:06 to give the Cougars the victory.

Randy Beekhuizen faced 51 shots in the MRC goal while Rob McKinley was tested on 25 occasions in the NAIT crease.

Sunday, On November 18th, the Ooks broke a two game losing skid with a 6-5 OT triumph over the

Cougars. Shane Morson's point blast gave the Cougars a 1-0 lead at 2:42 of the first. The Ooks tied the game on Randy Wong's wrist shot at 4:46. Corey Taylor of Mount Royal then banged in a rebound to give the a 2-1 Cougars advantage at 5:46. The lead was short lived as NAIT's Corey Hastman evened the score on the powerplay at 8:49. The teams traded goals to close out the period as Lonnie Spink tallied for NAIT at 11:25 and Pat Findlay countered for Mount Royal at 13:14.

NAIT's Kevin Lovig broke the deadlock at 2:12 of the second. The Cougars then bounced back with a pair as Al Stafford and Mark Greyeyes turned on the red light at 5:06 and 6:23 respectively.

Lonnie Spink of the

Ooks scored the lone goal of the third at 17:54 to send the game into overtime.

Kevin Lovig's tally at 1:51 of the extra period capped off intense NAIT pressure in the overtime period.

NAIT outshot Mount Royal 57 to 26 in the contest. Rob McKinley of NAIT and Ken Weiss of MRC received the calls in net.

NAIT coach Rick Carriere had mixed feelings about the weekend. "We played well and created a lot of scoring opportunities. However, we gave up too many."



The NAIT swim team returned victorious from the fall ACAC championship meet this past weekend. Five colleges participated in what proved to be a very


exciting competition.

With Rocky opening this weekend, the eyes of the entertainment world have turned to boxing once again.


Sylvester Stallone raked in millions for his continuing saga of Rocky Balboa, George Foreman has done the same with his quest for the heavyweight title.


If so, you are the person who should fill one of the three vacant student positions of Academic Council.


