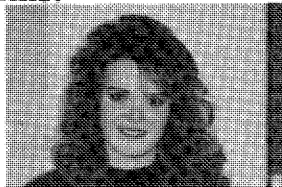

Karen Munch - Resp. Therapy - They should be allowed because they're professionals and they're doing their job but the men should be given a chance to get dressed first.



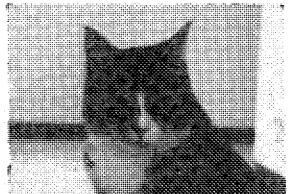
Peter Lazowski - Elec. App. - Sure it's a free world. If they can handle it I don't see why not.

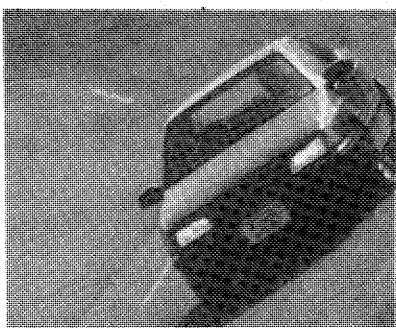
Claire Jonsson - Acctg. - I don't think they should be allowed. The men have a right to privacy. Male reporters are more appropriate for male sports.

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Students and the GST Credit

As part of the government's proposal for the GST, a credit will be paid every three months to Canadians with low and modest incomes to offset part or all of the tax.

Most students aged 19 or over are eligible to receive the quarterly GST Credit cheques. Students under 19 are also eligible if they are married or are parents.

Individuals may not realize that they are eligible and may not have applied for the credit. Some have little

or no income and didn't bother to file a tax return (or the green GST Credit Application Form) last spring. Revenue Canada Taxation needs both forms to calculate the credit.

It's not too late to apply for the credit. Individuals can still qualify for the full credit, even if their application is not received in time for the initial payment, which is scheduled to be made in December 1990 in advance of the introduction of the GST on January 1, 1991.

The following table

shows some examples of the annual GST credit at various levels of income.

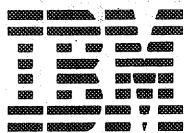

The Convocation Centre at Camrose has always been one of the toughest gymnasiums

to win in for visiting ACAC teams. In front of a packed house the task is even tougher. The Oaks played outstanding defense in the first half building up a 34-19 lead which took the crowd right out of the game. The half time score marked the second time in four league games the Oaks have held their opposition under 20 points in the first half. According to head coach, Dave Hoy, this team's defensive effort in the first half was the story of the game.

The NAIT Oaks gave new meaning to the word domination as they sunk the Clippers 20-1 at the NAIT Arena on Saturday afternoon, the 24th.

In the first, the Oaks peppered BBC goalie Jason Vanbinsbergen with 33 shots and scored nine goals while the Clippers could only salvage one shot on NAIT goalie Chuck Edwards.

In the second, the Oaks chipped in six more markers and outshot the Clippers 25 to 3.

In the third, the period was more even with the Oaks outshooting the Clippers by a 22 to 10 count. The Oaks added five goals to their total while Briercrest broke the Oaks shutout hopes.

A pair of alumni, Murray Melnyk and Ted Bradshaw, joined 14 current Oaks for the contest.

Murray Melnyk led NAIT with four goals

while Darren Perkins chipped in three. Scott Melnyk, Jeff Wildeboer, Greg Geldart and Bill Moody each added a pair while Randy Wong, Corey Hastman, Ted Bradshaw, Bob Duchak, and Ian McAmmond scored singles.

A number of the Oaks also played less than 12 hours later in Stony Plain as the Oaks downed the Stony Plain Eagles 5-1 in a Saturday evening matchup.

Grant Chorney tallied twice for the Oaks while Scott Melnyk, Todd Kinniburgh, and Greg Geldart rounded out the Oaks scoring.

The Oaks outshot the Eagles 33-32 and held period leads of 2-0 and 3-1. Alec Sheflo received the call in the NAIT nets.

With the lull in the

season approaching, NAIT coach Rick Carriere is using every opportunity to keep his team near the top. "Intensity in practice is the key now. We've got to keep pushing ourselves to stay on top of our game as we only have a pair of games over the next four weekends and we need to be in top form for the second half."

The Oaks see their final league action of 1990 on Saturday, December 1st and Sunday, December 2nd when they entertain the Grande Prairie Regional College Nordic Wolves at the NAIT Arena. Game time is 7:30 p.m. on Saturday and 1:30 p.m. on Sunday. Admission is free with your NAIT Student/Staff I.D. card.

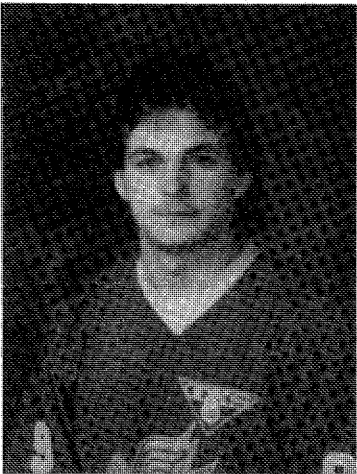

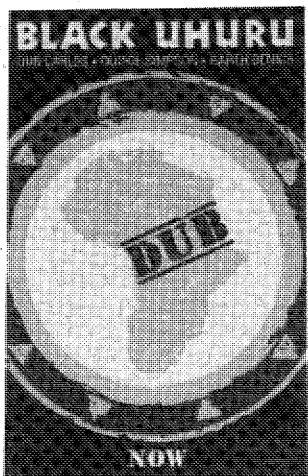
Steve's Albums of the Week
