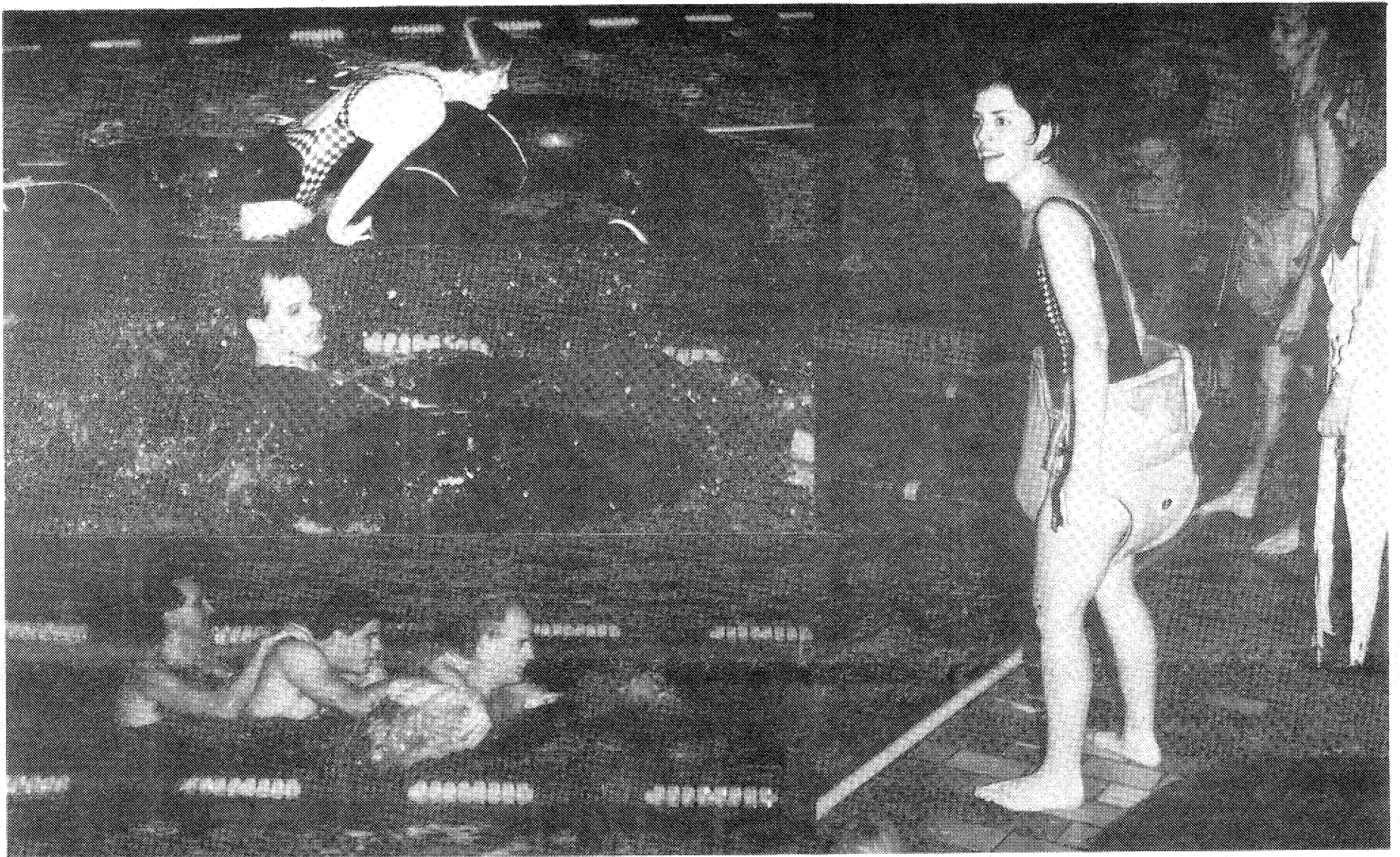

The bloodiest war Canada has ever fought ended at 11:00 a.m. on November 11, 1918. It was World War I and 60,000 Canadians died fighting for our freedom. 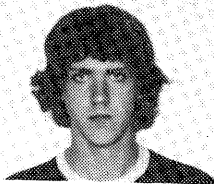

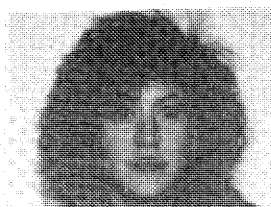

Ken Barnett - Surveying - All the recreational facilities are on the main campus.



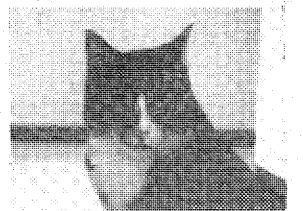
Darren Pollack - Surveying - Too far to walk to or from the parkade.

Otis Hendricks - Surveying - Too far to walk to any plug-ins for your car when it's cold.

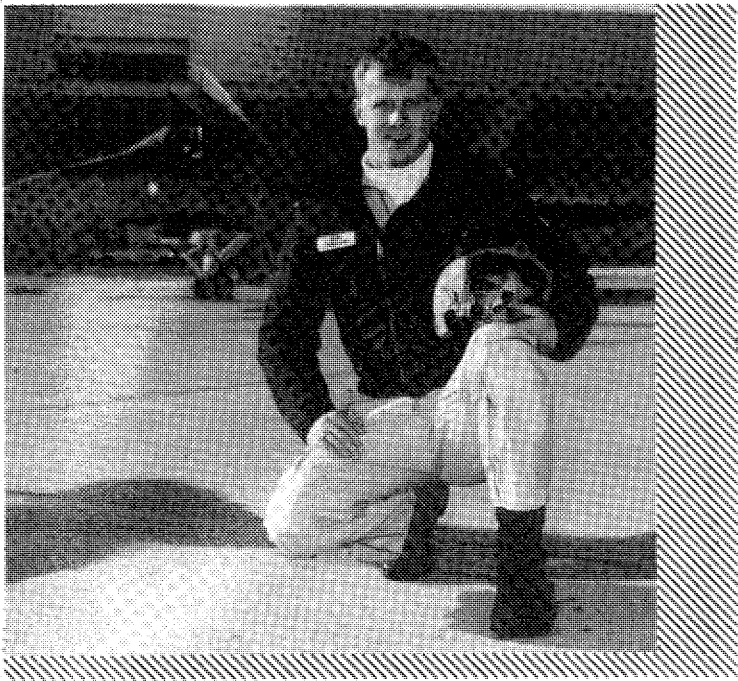

## Lest We Forget

Remembrance Day is this Sunday. Many of us live from day to day with little regard for those who serve or who have served on our behalf in the Armed Forces. On only one day of the year is there an exception? On Remembrance Day, some people can relate to a friend or a family member who is a veteran while others must try to comprehend the contributions of those with whom they have no association.

My family has no military background. In fact, they have always had a rather negative view of the Forces. In spite of this, I began applying myself with the idea of becoming a Military Pilot shortly before I graduated from high school in 1982. I served in the Armed Forces from 1984 until this past September, when I was medically released due to an unfortunate injury.

Although I was never able to complete my entire pilot training course, I have experienced many

aspects of the Forces. I've participated in CF-18 missions, in Search and Rescue Operations, in Crash Investigations, and in NATO Operations Europe to name a few. But now I'm a student at NAIT. My military life is over except for contact with my friends who are still serving.

So what is Remembrance Day for me? It's the many nights I spent at Cold Lake working in the Command Post while search teams looked for a missing aircraft; too often to find a fatality. It is the frantic feeling I experienced every time there was a crash alarm, and I wondered which of my friends was in trouble. It is the memory of when I was off duty this past August on my father's farm, riding in his tractor and hearing over the radio the name of the pilot who died in the Tutor crash at Moose Jaw. I recognized the name as that of my training mate and friend, Officer Cadet Ian Bell. Finally, it is dealing with my girlfriends' confusion and sense of loss over the death of her father. He died in a preventable accident in

Germany while flying a CF104 Starfighter during 1969. His daughter was only 3 weeks old at the time.

During Remembrance Day 1986, I and a group of my Navy friends toured some Legions to show the local "colors" in respect for the veterans. The veterans were always very happy to see us and they threw old time dances etc. on our behalf. At one such dance, an elderly lady wearing a war medal asked me to dance. While dancing she began to cry but did not want to stop dancing. When the dance was over she apologized and then thanked me for the dance. She told me that I bore a striking resemblance to her husband, a pilot, as she last remembered seeing him before he went off to war in WWII, never to come home again. This boastful pilot 'would-be' took a big reality break at that point.

After the personnel on the search crews have risked their lives to find the foolish or trouble-stricken, they rarely receive a notable word of recognition. But when a military force serves the

Government of Canada in a public manner, whether it be at Oka or in the Middle East, public resentment soars. All too often, this resentment is directed at the soldiers instead of the politicians who ordered them to carry out their duty. Ultimately, the elected members of our government represent us, and should act on our behalf when they send the men and women of the Forces off to risk their lives. During the great wars, many gave their lives for our freedom, and this devotion is instilled in the hearts of those who serve in the Forces today. It is up to us to handle this devotion responsibly.

So this November 11th, leave your frustrations with the government and not our military members. Take a moment to think about our veterans and those who may soon be veterans. Ponder the stories behind those saddened eyes, the shallow smiles, and the chests covered in a wall of medals - and give thanks for their sacrifices.

.... Lest we forget.

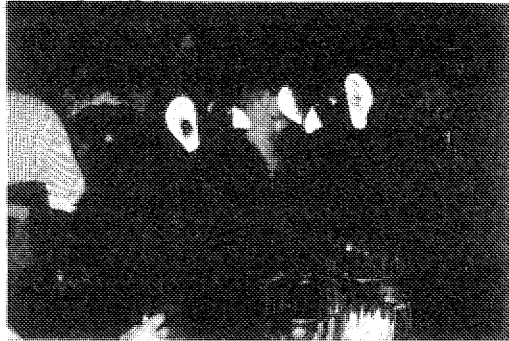

## Have You Been Shot Lately?

Prevention of illness by immunization is a lifelong process - not one which ends in high school. It should be tailored to meet individual needs for those at risk in certain occupations, foreign travel, chronic illness and lifestyle. Examples of "at risk" occupations requiring special immunization are: Health Care Workers for Hepatitis and Animal Workers for Rabies. Flu vaccine is given to persons 65 years and older and to those persons with chronic diseases. It is available from your Doctor or Public Health Clinic each October and November.

All adults require maintenance of immunity to Tetanus and Diphtheria. This can be done with one "booster" injection of the combined vaccine

every ten years after age 15 (usual age of last school immunization). In the event of a dirty wound the booster would be given earlier.

Immunization for foreign travel varies according to the country of travel, where you will be staying (eg. urban or rural areas) and the legal requirements of the country. It is advised to begin your immunization two to three months in advance for maximum protection. Information can be obtained from your local Health Unit for specific requirements.

If you have any questions our staff in Health Services will be pleased to help you. Tetanus/Diphtheria vaccine is available at all our locations and we encourage you to come in for your "booster". No appointment necessary!

Given the events of the past weekend it's difficult to determine whether the NAIT Hockey Ooks are a team that can contend for top spot or a team that can be handcuffed by anyone.

On Friday, November 2nd, the Camrose College Vikings and the NAIT Ooks battled to a 3-3 overtime tie in Camrose after both teams came to grips with the inconsistent and incompetent refereeing.

The Vikings opened up the scoring at 5:26 of the first when Jeff Wiest tallied on a Camrose five minute powerplay.

The Ooks bounced back to tie the game at 14:39 of the second on Mark Hilton's unassisted shorthanded effort. Jeff Nicholas of Camrose completed the scoring in the second period with goals at 15:29 and 15:54.

The Ooks fought valiantly to tie the game in the third as Scott Melnyk scored his eighth of the season at 7:13 and Bill Moody

netted his first of the year at 12:23.

There was no scoring in overtime.

Artie Feher of Camrose and Rob McKinley of NAIT played well in the nets stopping 44 and 34 shots respectively.

On Saturday, November 3rd, the two teams met in a rematch at the NAIT Arena. Fans expecting a close game were disappointed as the the Ooks coasted to a 10-0 win.

Kevin Lovig and Mark Hilton paced the Ooks with two goals

each while Dean Beattie, Randy Wong, Ian McAmmond, Dale Dach, Lonnie Spink, and Scott Melnyk added singles.

Alec Sheflo recorded the shutout for the Ooks blocking 18 shots. Artie Feher and Chad Bannister were peppered with 47 shots in the Vikings net.

The Ooks (4-1-1) are one point behind the Red Deer College Kings (5-1) in the battle for first place and take on the Kings in a home-and-home affair this weekend. The Ooks

entertain the Kings on Friday at 7:30 and visit Red Deer on Saturday at 7:00 p.m. Admission is free with a NAIT Student/Staff ID card.

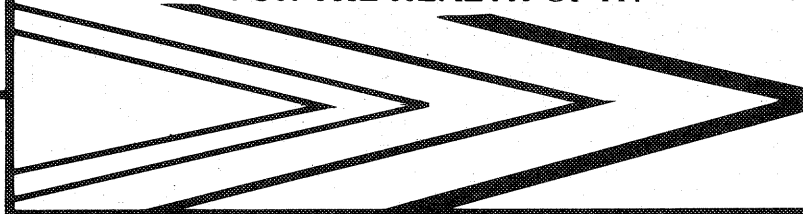

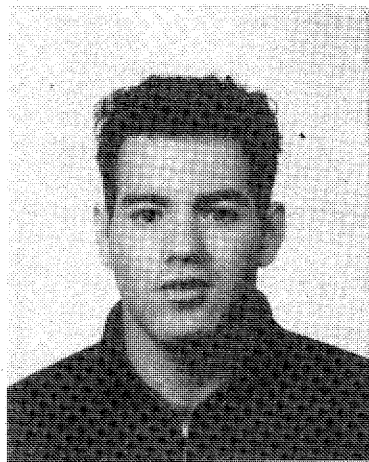

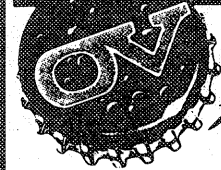

Coach Wally Buono deserves the credit for the big turnaround in

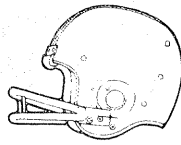
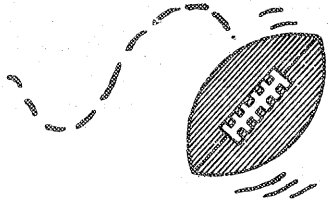
the Stamps. The Stamps have transformed from pretenders under Larry K. to contenders under Wally B.
