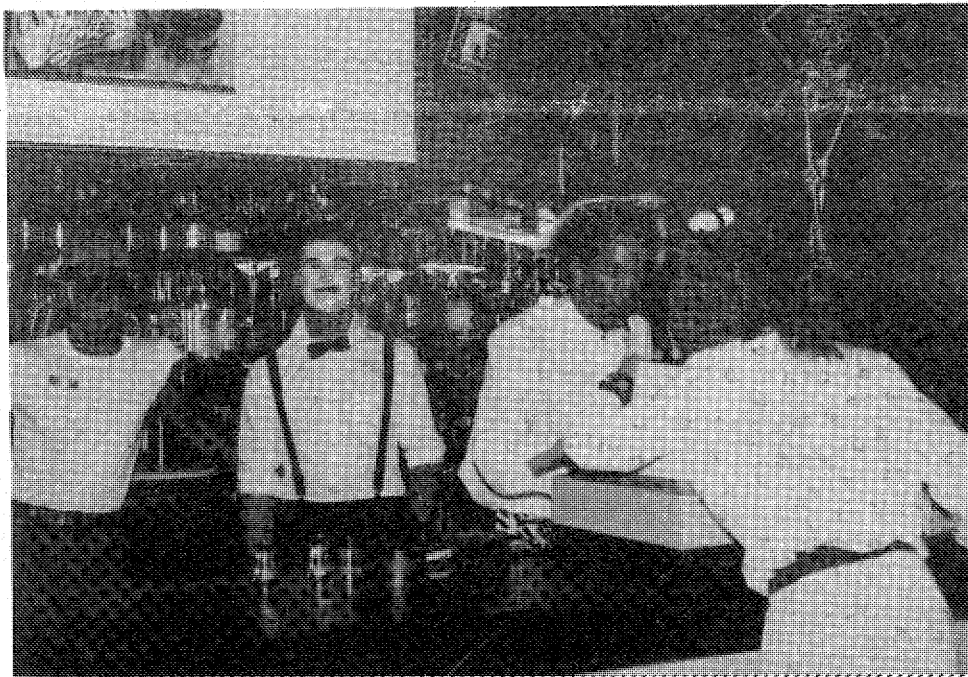

The negative effects of Bart Simpson have carried so far that some schools in the U.S. have banned the wearing of the "Underachiever T-shirts".

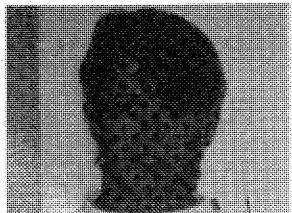

So I ask "Who is Bart Simpson" and why is he still on television when he is such a bad, negative influence on the younger generation.

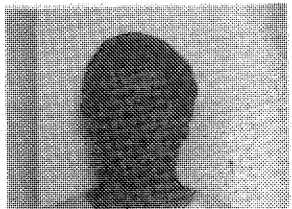

ANIMALS SAVED!

They're saved! The animals in the Alberta Wildlife Park are safe for another two years. The park that is located 20 km north of Edmonton has been given the additional funding of \$750,000 for this year and \$550,000 for next year. This funding is to help phase out the operation of the park over the next couple of years. The above funding did not come easily, but with much hassle and hard work. The park was supposed to be closed at the end of this month because Steve West, the Alberta Parks Minister, felt the park could not be economically run.

If the park were to be closed its staff would loose their jobs, and all the animals would have to be relocated. Now, the matter of the animals: they would be sold, killed, or sent to game farms in the U.S. to be hunted down. Gee, how does being sent to a game farm appeal to you?

Many people claim that the major reason behind the decision not to shut down the park was Freddie. Freddie is a six year old giraffe who is 16 feet tall. It would have been extremely hard (or next to impossible) to try and relocate or move him because of his size. The only option left would most likely be to dispose of (or axe) him.

To many it seemed that closing the Wildlife Park came down to a matter of dollars and cents. That's really sick. When you're dealing with 2,000 plus animals you can't just make a snap decision about what will become of them. It's too easy a way out to say that these animals will just be relocated, and just forget about them from that point on. The majority of these animals cannot even be adopted because many of them are exotic and require special food and care.

Let's get with the program and have some respect for the welfare of these animals. The Alberta Wildlife Park is supposed to be responsible for the care of it's occupants, not be the cause of their demise.

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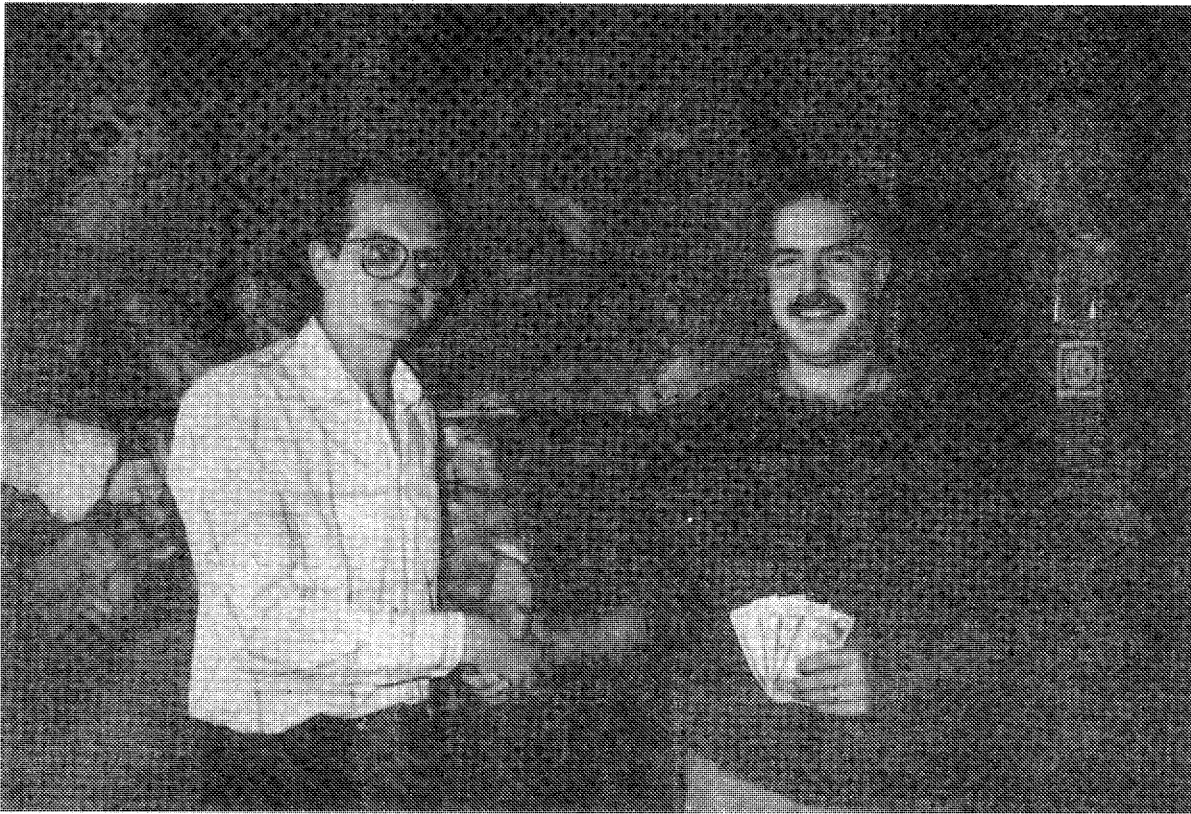

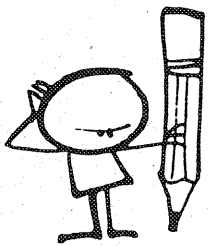

Hockey Ooks Home Opener is Saturday

On Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. in the NAIT Arena, the NAIT Hockey Ooks play the Red Deer College Kings in their home opener of the 1990-91 season. The contest features two clubs who have always played intense, spirited affairs.

The Ooks come into the game knowing that the season will not be a cakewalk. Every team in the ACAC will be gunning for the defending league champions who finished the preseason with a record of eight wins, three losses, and one tie.

The realization came to the Ooks at the ACAC Preseason Hockey Tournament in Red Deer on the weekend when the Ooks were upset by the SAIT Trojans.

On Friday, October 12th, the Trojans exploded for five unanswered goals en route to a 9-7 win over the Ooks.

The Ooks appeared to have control of the

game as they held a 4-1 lead after the first and a 7-4 following the second. However, no one told the Trojans they were out of the game as they held the Ooks off the scoreboard in the third and pulled out a 9-7 win.

Greg Geldart sparked the Ooks with three goals, while Mark Hilton, Kevin Lovig, Randy Wong, and Dean Beattie added singles.

On Saturday, October 13th, the Ooks took out their frustrations on the Grande Prairie Regional College Wolves with a 15-2 triumph. Interestingly, the Ooks outshot the Wolves 89 to 28.

Bob Duchak led the NAIT attack with a hat trick while Scott Melnyk, Grant Choney, Randy Wong, and Mark Hilton each tallied twice. Darrin Newell, Bill Moody, Tim Murphy, and Jeff Wildeboer rounded out the Ooks scoring.

The two teams were tied at 1-1 after the first before the Ooks netted nine goals in the second for a 10-1 advantage

after 40 minutes. The Ooks then outscored the Wolves by a five to one count in the third for the 15-2 win.

On Sunday, October 14th, the Ooks downed the Mount Royal College Cougars 5-2.

Dean Beattie, Randy Wong, Greg Geldart, Lonnie Spink and Todd Kinniburgh accounted for the NAIT scoring.

Outshooting the Cougars 61 to 18, the Ooks held period leads of 2-1 and 3-2.

As for the netminding chores, Chuck Edwards played against SAIT while Rob McKinley received the call against Grande Prairie and Mount Royal.

The Ooks open up the regular season on the road this Friday when they take on the Vikings in Camrose at 8:00 p.m. before hosting Red Deer on Saturday night.

On the way to Lake Macqua 36 kms south of Ft. McMurray both vans got stuck ascending an icy hill. The opening ceremonies included a heart warming

historic account that canoeing played in the development of Ft. McMurray. The ceremonies ended with all the competitors forming a circle, joining hands and chanting their own team cheer. It snowed throughout most of the day.

Their were five colleges that competed in the meet. They are as follows: Camrose Lutheran University

College, Lakeland College, Grant MacEwan Community College, Keyano College and NAIT.

The men's war canoe came in fourth, if the course was another 25 meters longer they would have placed third.

When the St. Louis Blues broke the bank to sign defenceman Scott Stevens over the summer, a cloud of

uncertainty moved over the entire NHL.

Although Stevens is not a franchise player, he is a blue chipper that can improve almost any club he plays for. As a free agent, Stevens sought to secure the best deal for himself and found it with the Blues.

However, his signing altered the direction of the salaries in the NHL. Player after player has negotiated or renegotiated his contract to be in line with

Stevens.

As a result, the team payrolls will escalate and the fan will eventually have to foot the bill through higher ticket prices. While some fans will continue to attend the same number of games, many will go to less or stop going.

With declining attendance, the NHL sees staged expansion as an alternative to raise some much needed capital. However, when

Milwaukee pulled out of the expansion derby, one wonders if \$50 million dollars for an expansion franchise may scare potential owners away.

In addition, the NHL's hopes of expanding into large television markets may be hurt by groups deciding to pass on owning an NHL team. Without key markets, the hopes of the NHL obtaining a network deal with ESPN, NBC,

CBS, or ABC is remote.

In short, increased salaries, lower attendance, massive expansion, and small television revenues may put the future of the league in jeopardy. If the NHL begins to wither away, the blame should not be put on the fans or the players, but rather the owners who have placed their interests on the line in the quest to win a Stanley Cup and to line their pocketbooks.

1990-91 Ooks Have the Potential

On the blue line, the returning trio of Darren Perkins, Jeff Wildeboer, and Randy Wong will have to make due without Blaine Peerless who is lacing up the blades in England this winter. The rookie blueliners -- Dave

Midbo, Terry Nieth, and Steve Wienke -- will be worked into the system and should make NAIT's defense one of the most imposing in the ACAC.

All in all, the Ooks have the talent to contend for another national title -- whether it be in the CCAA, CIAU or CAHA. However, the key to the team's success will be the ability to achieve team goals and develop a strong work ethic.

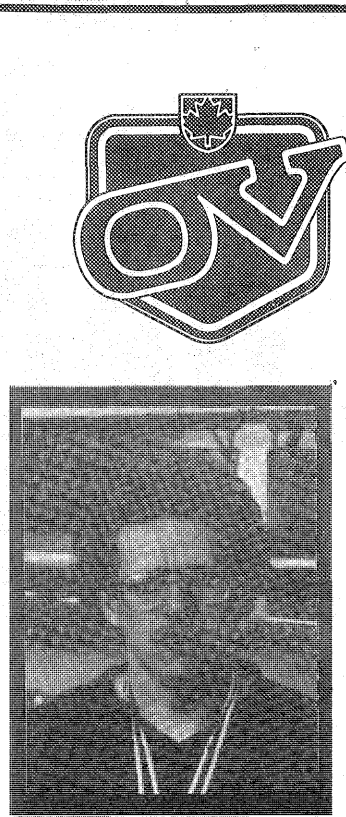
