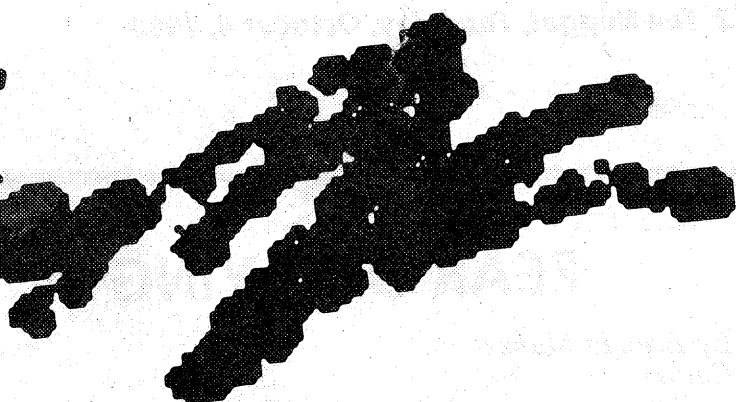

UPDATE ON THE SMOKING DEBATE

Last week, the Nugget asked you to participate in a poll to estimate how many students and staff would agree to NAIT's becoming a 100% smoke free institution. Here are the results: No's defeated yes's by a margin of 99 to 96. However, the accuracy of the poll is questionable. It seems readers handed in more than one vote per person.

However, nobody should really panic yet. Through NAIT's Joint Worksite and Health and Safety Committee are the recommending body, Administration will have the last say.

Early last year, the General Council, lead by NAITSA's student executives, was able to convert the Naitrium lounge into a completely non-smoking

area. Because NAITSA contributed in the funding to renovate the room, Administration gave them a say in the matter. The decision was then taken to the students. More students signed the "non-smoking billboard" than did the "smoking" one so General Council obliged. Thus, the Naitrium became smoke free.

Roxanne Beaubien, President of the Student's Association feels that Administration will still take into consideration the student body's opinion even though the implementation of the proposal would effect the entire institution.

If Administration does implement the Health and Safety Committee's recommendation, it won't be until September 1991.

Both smokers and non-smokers can lobby

to Administration and make their views on the matter known. As it is, there are a wide variety of free-floating opinions on the issue.

On the one hand, some smokers feel they have a right to "light up" even if it is medically proven that both mainstream and sidestream smoke are harmful to everyone's health. Smokers are not willing to suffer from cold temperatures in the winter or rain in the summer if they don't have to.

Presently, NAIT has a number of designated smoking areas. Basically, you can smoke anywhere smoking is not restricted. This includes the famous Tower Lounge with that fabulous view. Some smokers are dead set against giving these places up. The question was, "Should NAIT

become completely non-smoking?" One of you so eloquently answered this way: "@ NO!" You're a smoker, we guess. So far, you have every right to be one, where you're allowed.

Non-smokers on the other hand are just as adamant about their right to breathe smoke-free air. Leading the pack is Don Price, co-chairman of NAIT's Health and Safety Committee.

"We don't feel that smokers have the right to infringe on other people's territory," he says. He argues that sidestream smoke has some very real and harmful effects on non-smokers and that NAIT's partial smoking policy has just not been working. Simply partitioning two areas does not stop smoke from reaching non-smokers.

The Canadian Lung Association estimates that two-thirds of smoke from the burning end of the cigarette goes into the environment. This smoke may cause eye and nose irritation as well as aggravation of allergies all the way to an increase in the risk of getting heart disease and lung cancer.

Until any decision is reached, non-smokers should become aware of their rights. The Nonsmoker's Bill of Rights was ratified by many government bodies, community organizations and lung associations all over Canada in 1975. Among other things, it states that "non-smokers have the right to express firmly but politely their discomfort and adverse reactions to tobacco smoke." Mind you, smokers have the right not to listen.

"DON'T LEAVE DICK FOR DEAD!!"

The "Don't Leave Dick For Dead Campaign" is a great way to raise the awareness of everyone, even those people who don't drink. When it comes to alcohol, even if you aren't a regular who consumes huge amounts of this vicious substance, everyone knows someone who drinks.

This campaign is very credible and it's purpose is: "an alcohol awareness and abuse prevention organization promoting responsible decisions about use or non-use of alcohol amongst post-secondary students."

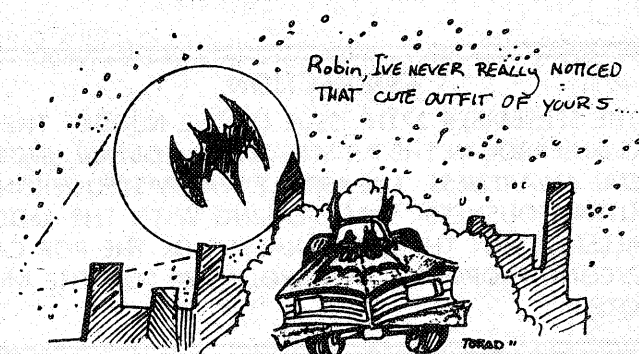
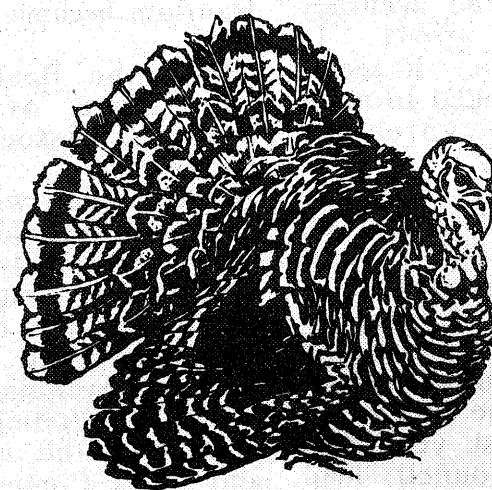

TOWER NOISE WILL CONTINUE FOR AWHILE

NAIT's Tower Building has been under construction since May. The sounds of heavy machinery often reverberate throughout the construction site much to the frustration of some of the students attending classes at the time.

"It's just bothersome when you're trying to listen to the teacher and you hear this jack-hammering," says a Business Administration student who studies in the building.

Bob Kerr, Director Facilities Management, explains that the construction being undertaken is

imperative not only for the continued use of the building in the future but also to improve its health and safety conditions. He adds that time was taken to schedule the noisiest parts of construction when the least amount of people would be bothered. Mr. Kerr notes that crews held off the noisy work until after last April's final exams and continued on until the summertime. However, not all of the work could be completed then. As a result, workers now use the evening shifts and Sundays to do most of the noisy work.

An instructor who teaches in the building

says that the noise is sometimes audible but not to the extent where classes are really disturbed.

The building, built in the 1960's has three major defects. The air intake system located at ground level allows exhaust from the planes at the Municipal airport into the ventilation system. With a southwesterly wind, the occupants of the building receive more exhaust fumes than fresh air. Secondly, the two original elevators are no longer sufficient to handle the traffic flow up and down the building. Lastly, the building's wooden window frames have

become badly deteriorated as a result of old age.

Construction is well underway to remedy these problems. Four new elevators are being built to service the occupants of the building. The two old elevator shafts will then be used as part of the new air intake system which takes fresher air from the top of the building instead of the bottom. Also, the building's wooden window frames are being replaced with more durable aluminum.

The completion dates have been moved from mid-September to mid-October for the first two

elevators and January for the second two, due to unavoidable delays. The pouring of the concrete walls was delayed as a result of rain and there were difficulties in obtaining steel in the right dimensions. Then came complications with getting enough manpower to do the work. All of these, says Bob Kerr, are normal construction delays.

An instructor observes that though some of the noise may continue for a short while, the reconstruction of the building will in the long run, prove more beneficial for those working inside.

2. The committee is named the Joint Nasa/Naitsa/Aupe Daycare Committee.

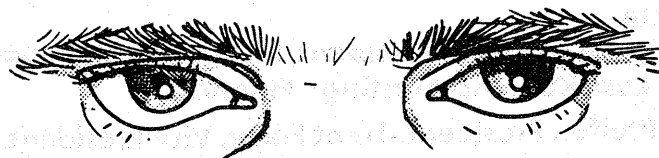
3. We have completed our survey of students and 73 students have indicated they would use a facility if one was available.

The NAIT Ooks plan of winning two tournaments in two weekends went down the pipe at the University of Alberta Golden Bears Invitational Hockey Tournament this past weekend.

The Ooks finished the tourney with a record of one win and two losses.

On Friday, the Bears clung to a 5-3 lead over the Ooks with less than four minutes left in regulation before they opened the floodgates with three goals to cap an 8-3 victory.

Doug McCarthy paced the Bears with a

pair, while Dan Wiebe, Rick Parranto, Marty Yewchuk, Cory Clouston, Rob Glasgow, and Adam Morrison added singles. Darren Perkins, Scott Melnyk and Dave Midbo replied for the Ooks in their first setback of the preseason.

The Bears outshot the Ooks 33-20 and held period leads of 2-0, and 5-2.

On Saturday, the NAIT Ooks could not hold onto the lead and dropped a 5-4 decision in overtime to the University of Calgary Dinosaurs.

Alex Bouma, Randy Wong, Dale Dach, and Todd Kinniburgh scored

for the Ooks in a losing cause.

The shots on goal were even at 34-34. Chuck Edwards and Alec Sheflo shared the netminding duties in the NAIT net. The Dinos led 2-1 after the first and 4-2 after two.

On Sunday, the Ooks outscored the Red Deer College Kings 7-4.

Scott Melnyk, Dale Dach, Lonnie Spink, Darren Perkins, Bob Duchak, Randy Wong, and Mark Hilton accounted for the Ooks scoring.

Outshooting Red Deer 31-24, NAIT held advantages of 3-1 after one and 6-2 following two. Derrick Labrecque

and Alec Sheflo tended goal for the Ooks in the victory.

Despite the results, NAIT coach Rick Carriere was positive. "Our forechecking came to the forefront. It held us in the games against the Bears and the Dinos. In addition, our powerplay is showing potential."

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks have 32 players in camp and will enter the regular season with a roster of 25. The Ooks now have a record of five wins, two losses, and one tie in the preseason. The Ooks conclude the preseason with a game in Camrose on Friday night and an

appearance at the ACAC preseason hockey tournament from October 12th through the 14th.

FUTURE OF CCAA HOCKEY

The Canadian Colleges Athletic Association National Hockey Championships are still up in the air.

After a recent meeting of the ACAC in Medicine Hat, it was determined that the league will take steps to pursue national championship opportunities for its teams whether it be in the CCAA or elsewhere.

The underlying current at the meetings is that the ACAC would like to continue the CCAA championships. However, the reluctance of other provinces to make a commitment has forced the ACAC to set out a game plan.

In an offer of goodwill, the ACAC has offered to host the OCAA championship from Ontario for the 1991 national title. Ontario has so far been

hesitant to make a commitment.

NAIT coach Rick Carriere has already hinted that the ACAC is looking at the alternatives. "Our first priority is to stay within the framework in the CCAA, but if every other conference in the CCAA is reluctant to play the ACAC championship, our league will pursue other avenues for a national title. We are already talking with the CAHA about the possibility of vying for the Allan Cup and the CIAU about the possibility of going for their championship."

Without a strategy to compete for a national title, ACAC hockey players would be ineligible for the Jimmie Condon Athletic Scholarships which would have a severe impact on the players, the institutions, and the league.

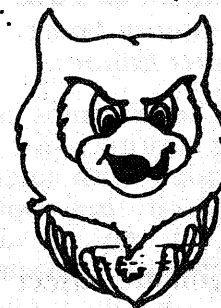
Built by Charles Comiskey, the facility has played host to a number of baseball's most memorable teams and events. Comiskey was home to the first all star game, Babe Ruth's called shot, Nellie Fox

and the Go-Go Sox of 1959, and the Black Sox of 1919.

Although Comiskey is no Wrigley or no Fenway, its atmosphere was legendary. From "Andy the Clown" to the showers in center field to the exploding scoreboard to Harry Caray singing "Take Me Out to the Ball Park" in the 1970's, Comiskey was unique.

The Chicago fans have not had a division winner since 1983, but the 1990 version of the South Siders gave the fans a lot to remember. From Bobby Thigpen shattering the save record to the team's pennant run, to Steve Lyon's undoing his pants to brush off his uniform before he remembered he was not on a sandlot with no one watching.

When the White Sox move across the street to the new Comiskey Park, fans will be in a ball park patterned after the old, but it won't be the same. As for the old Comiskey, it will become a memory like Brooklyn's Ebbets Field, New York's Polo Grounds, Montreal's Jarry Park, Cincinnati's Crosley Field, San Francisco's Seals Stadium, Philadelphia's Shibe Park, St. Louis' Sportsman Park, and Bloomington's Municipal Stadium. Time waits for no one including the amphitheatres for the boys of summer.

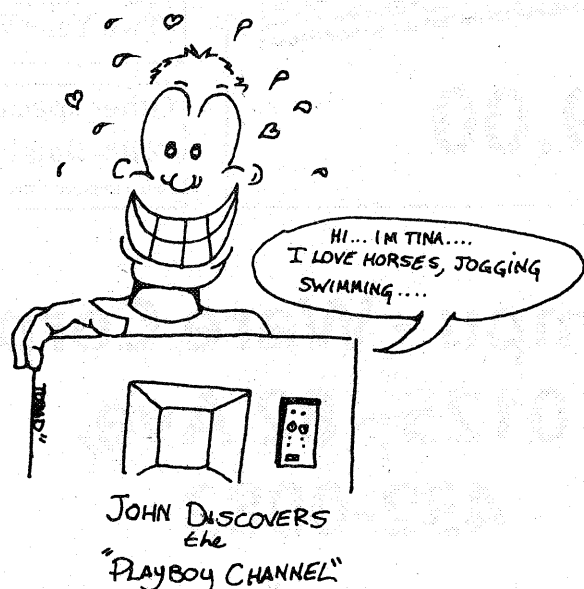

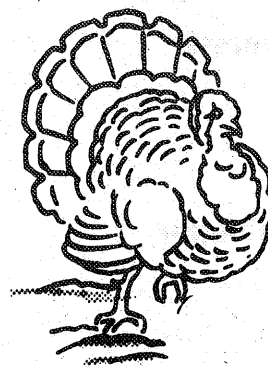

A fine sentiment. And drinking in moderation won't undermine that well-intentioned toast. But, if someone takes several alcoholic drinks a day or despite periods of not drinking goes on benders, they run the risk of real physical harm.

One of the real dangers of alcohol is that it sneaks up on you and the damage may be done by the time you become aware it's happening. The following health risks apply to all of us; they're not reserved for the down-at-heel, they can apply to you or your colleagues.

- **Ulcers.** Alcohol irritates the gastrointestinal tract. Taken with aspirin, the risks are even greater.
- **Liver damage.** Irreversible liver damage is a major cause of death, but other disorders, like hepatitis, may result.
- **Neurological disorders.** The effect of excess alcohol on the brain is to accelerate the natural loss of brain cells which can seriously deplete the body's surplus. Symptoms associated with the aging process develop—clouded thinking, memory failure, disorientation, stiffened limbs and poor co-ordination.
- **Cancer.** Abuse increases the risk of certain types of cancer, including mouth, larynx and esophagus.
- **Malnutrition.** If your lifestyle interferes with your getting proper nutrition, you're a candidate for this problem. Alcohol does have calories— you get heat and energy, but little nutrition.

If you drink in moderation, you may never face any of these. But it pays to have a healthy regard for the potential problems associated with that common social acquaintance—alcohol.

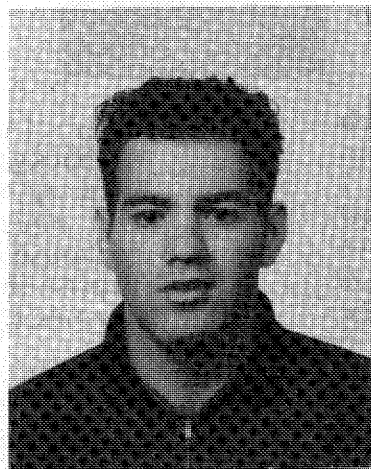


ATHLETIC'S DIRECTOR CANDIDATES

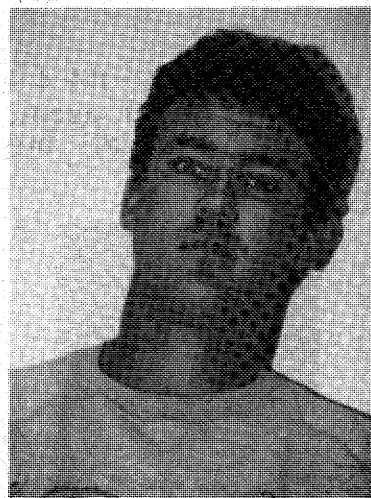

Background: Graduated from the 4th class Power Engineering program at NAIT in 1989 and am currently in my second year of

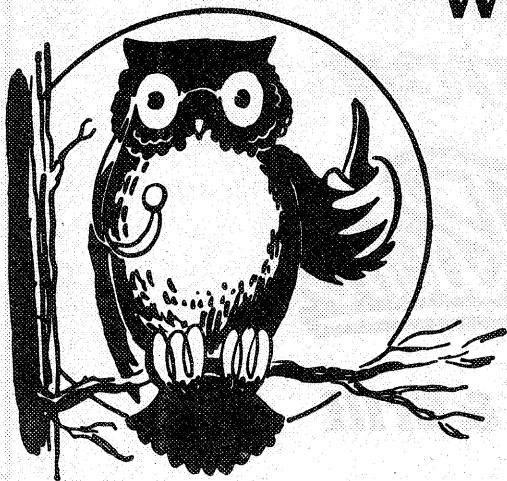
