COURTYARD CARNIVAL



The election will be held on October 5, 1990.



NAIT Hockey Ooks head coach Rick Carriere acknowledges that one of the assets going into his first season of running the team is his strong core of assistant coaches. For the 1990-91 campaign, the Ooks will have four assistant coaches all of whom have played with NAIT in previous years.

Randy Repchuk will be returning for his

fourth year in a coaching role. As a former assistant captain with the Ooks, Randy played a key role in NAIT winning a national title in 1984-85 and is still in NAIT's top ten scoring list with 73 goals and 93 assists for 166 points in three seasons. Randy's primary concern will be working with the forwards and the centers.

Cleo Rowein will be back for his third season as goaltending coach. As a player, Cleo shut down the opposition in 1984-85 as the Ooks capped off a n undefeated regular season with a national title. During his career, Cleo posted a 2.94 goals against average, won 78 per cent of the games he appeared in and was named All-Canadian three times.

J.C. McEwan will join the coaching ranks of the Ooks after being a member of the St. Albert Saints coaching staff during the 1989-90 season. As a player, J.C. played an instrumental part in national NAIT's championship seasons of 1985-86 and 1988-89. J.C.'s leadership will be one of the foundations the 1990-91 team will be built upon.

A member of 1988-89 and 1989-90 National Champion Ooks, Marty Volcan will round out the NAIT coaching staff. After four seasons of wearing the blue and gold, Marty will instill his inspiration and dedication into the players who represent NAIT.

NHL Mishandles Chemical Dependency

The NHL's mishandling of substance abuse in the past is coming back to haunt them. When the Edmonton Journal reported the substance abuse of Grant Fuhr recently, the story did not go by the desk of John Ziegler unnoticed.

The likely scenario is one in which Fuhr meets with the gurus from Ziegler's office and subsequent punishment is handed out

The NHL has taken the stand that substance abuse is not a significant problem. The substance abuse of Bob Probert, Don Murdoch, and Borje Salming is public knowledge and may very well be the tip of the iceberg.

The ultimatum that a lifetime ban will result

from the use of certain substances has caused many players to live with their addiction rather than seek treatment. In all likelihood, if the NHL had stressed rehabilitation instead of banishment, the Grant Fuhr case could have been put to rest much earlier.

A strong supportive rehabilitation program supported by both the teams and the player's association is the only way to deal with dependency.

Luckily, Grant Fuhr's problem did not cost him his life, but it could have. When the NHL lost Pelle Lindbergh, steps should have been taken to see that substance abuse be dealt with fairly, honestly, and openly. How long will it be before another life is snuffed out due to the NHL motto of "Let's keep it in the closet."




